(7:37 o'clock p.m.)

MR. MOURY: Okay. I'd like to call to order the Regular Council meeting of December 9, 2019. I apologize for us running a few minutes late.

Mr. Christian, can you please call the roll.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Campbell.

DR. CAMPBELL: Present.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Consolmagno.

MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Dixon.

MR. DIXON: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Gibbons.

MS. GIBBONS: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Hannan.

MR. HANNAN: Present.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Harrison.

MR. HARRISON: Present.

MR. CHRISTIAN: McLean.

MR. McLEAN: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Moury.

MR. MOURY: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: O'Brien.

1 MR. O'BRIEN: Present.

2 MR. MOURY: Okay. At this time can
3 we stand for the Pledge of Allegiance.

4 (The Pledge of Allegiance was said.)

5 MR. MOURY: Okay. At this time I'd
6 like to turn to Chair Announcements.

7 An Executive Session of Council was
8 conducted on Tuesday, December 3, 2019, for
9 personnel and legal matters, and tonight
10 before we came out, December 9, 2019, for
11 personnel and legal matters.

12 At this time can I turn to the Reports of
13 the Officials, and the Library Director's
14 report.

15 MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. My
16 name is Christine. I'm the director of your
17 public library where we provide opportunities
18 to explore, learn, create, and connect.

19 Our big announcement is that the carpet
20 installation is complete one week early and
21 the library did open this morning. That
22 carpet was 17 years old, it needed to be
23 replaced, and we had to move so much stuff.

24 We had to request a waiver from the state
25 library to close, and I hope that this carpet

1 lasts at least 18 years because that's when
2 I'm retiring. I never want to do it again.

3 (Laughing was heard.)

4 MS. McINTOSH: So during the time
5 that we were closed we also had our wireless
6 access points replaced and we added an
7 additional three wireless access points to
8 accommodate the increase in mobile devices
9 that are coming onto the network. And we also
10 had some painting done in what will be our
11 library's Teen Space. We are expecting the
12 furniture to be delivered for that area next
13 week.

14 So we will be having -- well, Ms. Elaine
15 will be hosting a grand opening of the
16 library's Teen Space on Monday, December 23rd
17 from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. Stop in, see the
18 space, have some refreshments.

19 The library took first place in the
20 nonprofit 18 and older division of the City of
21 Pittsburgh's Gingerbread House competition
22 with our King Friday's Castle entry. So I
23 want to say a special thanks to library staff
24 members Jackie Williams and Rob Kalchthaler
25 who really helped with the design. Jackie's

1 an artist so she really helped with the
2 execution. And Michele Loria and me for all
3 of our hard work. My job was to get it down
4 there in one piece, so I succeeded.

5 (Laughing was heard.)

6 MS. McINTOSH: The library is
7 hosting an 8-foot Christmas stocking full of
8 premium toys fundraiser through -- well, now
9 through Friday, the 20th of December, we will
10 be drawing. The ticket are a dollar each and
11 they are name brand toys. It's a huge
12 stocking.

13 So, like I said, the drawing will be
14 Friday, December 20th, at 4:00 p.m. A dollar
15 each. We've raised so far 200 bucks doing
16 that.

17 And then the library will be closed, I
18 hate to say this because we just were closed,
19 Christmas Eve and Christmas for the Christmas
20 holiday and then again New Year's Eve and New
21 Year's Day for the New Year's holiday.

22 Just a reminder that late fees are not
23 charged when the library's closed. The book
24 drop is always accessible if you need to
25 return something if you're going out of town.

1 That is all I have.

2 MR. MOURY: Thank you very much.

3 Any questions?

4 (No response was heard.)

5 MS. McINTOSH: Thank you.

6 MR. MOURY: Thank you very much.

7 Can we turn to the Police Chief's Report,
8 and Chief O'Connor.

9 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Good evening, Mr.
10 Mayor, Council. Hi, everybody, Chief here
11 with some announcements.

12 Our Crime Watch this month, we want to
13 think Emily, the municipal planner, she was
14 our guest speaker and she was talking about
15 blight and development.

16 Our next Crime Watch will be -- the first
17 one of the year will be January the 6th, 7:00
18 p.m., at the Community Center. I don't know
19 if we'll have a guest or not, but it's always
20 informative.

21 If you cannot follow us at Crime Watch in
22 person, then just go on and check our Facebook
23 page out and -- for updates. In fact,
24 something tells me there might be an update
25 coming tomorrow morning on Facebook. So you

1 might want to check it out.

2 (Laughing was heard.)

3 MR. MOURY: It's not a picture of
4 O'Brien, is it?

5 MR. O'BRIEN: No.

6 CHIEF O'CONNOR: No. No. He
7 wasn't the one shoplifting at Macy's.

8 (Laughing was heard.)

9 MS. McINTOSH: Not today.

10 (Laughing was heard.)

11 MR. MOURY: Strike that from the
12 record.

13 CHIEF O'CONNOR: We are in the
14 middle of our annual Presents from Police
15 where we collect presents and we -- for the
16 kids at Children's Hospital.

17 So we have a box in the lobby of the
18 police entrance at the Municipal Building and
19 also on Saturday from 10:00 to 12 noon in the
20 Millennium Shops. The Froggy radio station
21 will be doing their show, and they'll be
22 collection boxes down there, also.

23 So what we need is unwrapped toys. And
24 we'll take anything from an infant up to late
25 teens. So we need a wide variety of toys.

1 And our last run will be on Monday, the 16th.
2 We will take the toys that we have collected
3 here out to Aspinwall Police Department and
4 from there they'll get down to the hospital.

5 And on the 20th, which is I think a
6 Friday, all the officers from the area who are
7 involved will convoy down from Aspinwall
8 Police Department to Children's Hospital in
9 the police cars and the presents will all be
10 distributed to the kids.

11 So it's a really good contribution, if
12 you can drop by an unwrapped present either
13 here or down at Millennium Shops on Saturday.
14 So I thank you for that.

15 And, finally, just have a Merry Christmas
16 from everyone at BPPD. Thank you. God Bless.

17 Questions?

18 MR. MOURY: Thank you very much,
19 Chief.

20 We have no Fire Chief's report this
21 evening so we'll turn to the Manager's Report,
22 and Mr. Christian.

23 The fire department's having their yearly
24 elections tonight and so they are tending to
25 that business. They wish everybody a very

1 Merry Christmas.

2 MR. CHRISTIAN: So one of the
3 greatest things I get to do is introduce the
4 amazing employees from the Municipality of
5 Bethel Park. So if I could have Louis come on
6 up. Carol and Karen, if you could come up,
7 please.

8 First and foremost, I want to thank them
9 for coming here. This is an ask, it's not a
10 task. So getting here and introducing them to
11 council and the public, it's important to me.
12 Because, one, it showcases our employees.
13 They are amazing. They are what make this
14 Municipality kick each and every day.

15 Young Mr. Louie Lambros here, you may or
16 may not have seen him out there on the roads.
17 He is part of the engineering department and
18 he is in charge of the road program right now
19 and he is going to be working on the next road
20 program.

21 So young Mr. Louie there, he has been
22 here a year-and-a-half right now from the
23 Municipality. He has been married for a year
24 and he is a brand new father. They have a
25 little baby of three weeks old.

1 (Clapping was heard.)

2 MR. CHRISTIAN: So, as you can see,
3 he's probably got a little bit of bags under
4 the eyes. So he's working on that one. So
5 we're going to get him out of here real quick
6 after the introductions.

7 So one of the great things that Louie
8 does for us, again, he does the road program
9 and he works on the closed caption television.
10 So he gets out there with the sewer lines and
11 the storm lines and he gets to go over that
12 wonderful stuff that everybody gets to use
13 every single day. But people need to look at
14 it to make sure that it's still in good
15 working order. So he's one of the guys who
16 gets to do that in the engineering department.

17 Louie has a dog named Reggie.

18 MR. LAMBROS: Yes.

19 MR. CHRISTIAN: And one of the
20 things you may not know about Louie is, as you
21 notice, he a has a pretty good beard going on
22 there. Probably not as good as yours
23 (indicating), but it's pretty close. But one
24 of the things that people don't know about
25 Louie is he's one of the Renegades of the

1 Rotunda waving flags at the Pirates baseball
2 game. So you will see him there and you might
3 see him on television.

4 MS. McINTOSH: Right on, Louie.

5 MR. CHRISTIAN: So we thank him for
6 everything you do each and every day and we're
7 so appreciative of it.

8 MR. LAMBROS: Thanks, guys.

9 (Clapping was heard.)

10 MR. CHRISTIAN: Next in line is
11 Carol. You may not know her, but you might
12 have spoken to her. Her voice is probably one
13 of the first ones you'll see when calling in
14 to the Municipality.

15 So she's been here for a few years, about
16 12 now.

17 MS. HENDRICKSON: 13 years.

18 MR. CHRISTIAN: 13.

19 MS. HENDRICKSON: Something like
20 that.

21 MR. CHRISTIAN: So she handles
22 everything having to do with permits, code
23 enforcement.

24 MS. HENDRICKSON: Planning
25 commission.

1 MR. CHRISTIAN: Planning
2 commission. Yeah, I mean, she has her fingers
3 and hands in almost everything across the
4 engineering, community services department.
5 So she is a jack of all trades and master at
6 most of them, which is nice.

7 Carol was married for 40 years and she
8 lost her husband a couple years ago. She has
9 two children, four grandchildren, and one cat
10 named Gracie.

11 MS. HENDRICKSON: That's right.

12 MR. CHRISTIAN: And she is a
13 long-term Bethel Park resident, 24. And one
14 interesting fact about Carol, she's related to
15 Captain John Sommers, great, great, great,
16 great grandfather, who served with George
17 Washington in the Revolutionary War. They
18 like to think they were eating beans with
19 George.

20 MS. HENDRICKSON: They were
21 starving, actually, but we won't go into that.

22 MR. CHRISTIAN: So, again,
23 long-term Bethel resident and one of the
24 amazing people that work for you all in the
25 Municipality of Bethel Park. So thank you.

1 (Clapping was heard.)

2 MR. CHRISTIAN: And our newest
3 addition, most recent employee, is Karen
4 Colussi. We just started the IT department
5 and Karen is our IT communications
6 administrator. And so she's -- we were able
7 to steal her away from the county and she now
8 works for us.

9 But I'll let you do the introduction.
10 Let's go with background on yourself.

11 MS. COLUSSI: Okay. Hi, everybody.
12 I'm Karen Colussi. I've been here at Bethel
13 Park now for a couple months. I did come here
14 from the Allegheny County Police where I was
15 an IT and network administrator for 10 years.

16 And prior to joining the County Police, I
17 was a field service engineer for HP where I
18 worked on servers and desktop computers and
19 laptops and also printers.

20 I have a bachelor's and a master's in
21 information science, and it -- this is a very
22 great place to work and I thank you all for
23 the opportunity.

24 I am joined here tonight by my husband Al
25 of 18 years, and I have a son who is 14, and

1 we live in the community just right across the
2 border in Upper St. Clair.

3 MR. CHRISTIAN: Well, thank you all
4 so much for coming. We truly appreciate it.

5 (Clapping was heard.)

6 MR. CHRISTIAN: Thank you so much.
7 We truly appreciate it.

8 MR. MOURY: At this time can we
9 turn to the Mayor's Report, and Mayor Allen.

10 MAYOR ALLEN: Before Carol leaves,
11 you may have talked to her if you had a
12 problem with different things, with code
13 enforcement, but what you really know her from
14 is she took care of all the trash can
15 questions.

16 (Laughing was heard.)

17 MAYOR ALLEN: So that's -- that's
18 the voice. She is our trash can lady.

19 MS. HENDRICKSON: I tried very
20 hard.

21 MAYOR ALLEN: So thank you.

22 MS. HENDRICKSON: No problem.

23 MAYOR ALLEN: First of all, I want
24 to thank everyone that came to our tree
25 lighting last week. Public works and the

1 recreation department did a great job. We had
2 over 200 people, and it just gets -- it keeps
3 getting bigger and better every year.

4 The other thing is our Christmas lighting
5 contest, which is this month obviously.
6 Houses will be judged the last two weeks of
7 December. And if you have any nominations,
8 please call Janet Davin at (412)831-6800,
9 extension 211. I believe we have enough
10 judges, which is great to have them in place
11 this time of year. But call Janet if you have
12 any particular nominations.

13 One thing I wanted to do, it was -- it
14 was requested and it sounded like a great
15 idea, is have a proclamation. And this is to
16 designate December 13th, which is Friday, as
17 Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Day. So, whereas,
18 in 2019, an estimated 56,770 Americans will be
19 diagnosed with pancreatic cancer in the United
20 States. Whereas, pancreatic cancer is the
21 third leading cause of cancer related deaths,
22 and it will be the second leading cause by the
23 end of 2020.

24 So, therefore, I, Mayor Jack Allen, Mayor
25 of the Municipality of Bethel Park, do hereby

1 proclaim December 13, 2019, as Pancreatic
2 Cancer Awareness Day.

3 The community is encouraged to
4 participate and dedicate as each word
5 represents in an action to make a difference
6 in the fight against this disease.

7 And, therefore, I, Mayor Jack Allen,
8 encourage the Bethel Park businesses and
9 residents to purple out to show support to the
10 many who have been affected by this disease.

11 At this time I would like to bring up our
12 council president, Mr. Moury, please.

13 MR. MOURY: Good evening and
14 welcome everybody.

15 As everybody knows that I like to play a
16 little bit of surprise on people, but I don't
17 like them played on me just so you know.

18 (Laughing was heard.)

19 MR. MOURY: Mr. Dixon, could you
20 please join me up here. This is your life.

21 (Laughing was heard.)

22 MR. MOURY: While Paul's coming up
23 here, you do have to come up, and I'll ask his
24 family to come up, also, who's with us this
25 evening.

1 Just for everybody's information, tonight
2 is commemorating Paul's 20th year on Bethel
3 Park Council. At this time last year Paul
4 opted to -- not to run and seek re-election
5 for the position. And he had given 20 years
6 on the Municipal Council, as well as a few
7 years on the planning commission.

8 So I thought I would tell a little funny
9 story that we don't often talk about. When I
10 first met Paul a few years ago, Paul was on
11 the planning commission. As you have been
12 here, long-time residents, council was pretty
13 tenuous. There was different groups and we
14 argued and fought and didn't get a whole lot
15 done.

16 Well, Paul happened to be on the planning
17 commission when I first got on Council, and
18 what do you do when you think somebody's maybe
19 not seeing the things the way you do, maybe on
20 the other side, when Paul's turn to come up
21 for reappointment, he was not reappointed to
22 Council (sic).

23 So when he opted to run for Council, we
24 had a little disagreement. You know, we
25 didn't -- never really talked about it. But

1 to Paul's credit, not until today have we ever
2 really talked about that, that once he was
3 elected and got on Council -- and his family
4 and his father was also here because there's a
5 history of service to Allegheny County and
6 Bethel Park and the community with Paul, but
7 we never really talked about it. We kind of
8 joked about it this morning. But to Paul's
9 credit, he didn't hold it against me, at least
10 not -- I don't think.

11 But he's always been a big supporter of
12 what we're doing and our success as a group is
13 our ability to work together to really agree
14 to disagree and move on. But I just thought
15 that was a little funny story. Twenty years
16 later I can tell it now.

17 MR. DIXON: It wasn't funny then.
18 Only in retrospect.

19 MR. MOURY: Yes, it was for me.

20 But, no, I -- I am here to present Mr.
21 Dixon and his family a plaque commemorating
22 Paul's 20 years on Council, plus his
23 additional service to the community.

24 And let me read it to you. It says Paul
25 J. Dixon, Bethel Park Council, Ward 4,

1 December of 1999 through December of 2019.
2 Presented to Council member Paul J. Dixon for
3 distinguished service to the Municipality of
4 Bethel Park. Your dedication to the residents
5 of Bethel Park is in keeping with the finest
6 traditions of public service. There is no
7 greater service to your fellow man than to be
8 of public service.

9 So I wish you well, Mr. Dixon, on your
10 retirement, and we do thank you and I
11 appreciate all your years, and
12 congratulations.

13 (Clapping was heard.)

14 MR. DIXON: Thank you.

15 MR. MOURY: You guys will be seeing
16 a lot more of him. I don't know if that's
17 good or bad.

18 MR. DIXON: That's not a good thing
19 from their perspective.

20 Tim touched on a couple of things that --
21 that are pretty important to me, too. We did
22 have a rough start based on that planning
23 commission situation we'll call it. But when
24 I got on Council, I pledged to every member of
25 this Council that I would make every vote on

1 every single issue based on what I believe to
2 be in the best interest of our community and
3 the residents of Bethel Park. And I'm -- I'm
4 going to recognize Mr. Moury as doing the same
5 thing. We discussed that right at the
6 beginning and -- and we've always done just
7 that, haven't we?

8 I'm proud of the service that -- that
9 this entire Council provides to the -- to the
10 Municipality of Bethel Park. I'm proud to
11 have played a small part in that. And I have
12 some additional comments that I'll make in a
13 few minutes.

14 MR. MOURY: Thank you very much.

15 MR. DIXON: Thanks, Tim.

16 (Clapping was heard.)

17 MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Moury.

18 MR. MOURY: Mr. O'Brien.

19 MR. O'BRIEN: You know, Paul, we
20 worked together for a long time.

21 MR. DIXON: Yes, we have.

22 MR. O'BRIEN: I really didn't know
23 how many years it was, but they said 20. You
24 know, I gave a lot of thought about what I was
25 going to say tonight and how would I describe

1 working with Mr. Dixon, Councilman Dixon, over
2 these past 20 years. He's professional. He's
3 patient. He's a logical thinker with a
4 passion for his home, Bethel Park.

5 MR. DIXON: That's right.

6 MR. O'BRIEN: He has always
7 understood what it takes to make the difficult
8 decision using information, conviction, and
9 compromise.

10 Councilman Dixon, I have faith that in
11 your retirement you will find peace and joy
12 that awaits you. I will miss working with you
13 and I am proud to call you my friend.

14 MR. DIXON: Thank you.

15 MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you for
16 everything. It was a job well done.

17 MR. DIXON: Thank you.

18 (Clapping was heard.)

19 MR. MOURY: Mr. McLean.

20 MR. McLEAN: Mr. Moury, I just
21 wanted to note I have -- my family and Mr.
22 Dixon's family go way back.

23 MR. DIXON: Yes, they do.

24 MR. McLEAN: My father and his
25 father were very good friends --

1 MR. DIXON: They were very good
2 friends.

3 MR. McLEAN: -- and have a lot of
4 respect for each other.

5 MR. DIXON: Uh-huh.

6 MR. McLEAN: I know Mr. Dixon's
7 brother. He and I are fellow lawyers. But I
8 really got to know Paul when I was on the
9 planning commission --

10 MR. DIXON: That's right.

11 MR. McLEAN: -- and Paul was on and
12 I was new to the body and I learned a lot from
13 Paul until they kicked him off.

14 (Laughing was heard.)

15 MR. MOURY: Whoa, whoa, whoa.

16 MR. McLEAN: No; I'm just kidding.
17 So -- but after Paul got demoted to Municipal
18 Council, I then had the occasion of working
19 with him while he remained a liaison to the
20 planning commission when he became a member of
21 Council --

22 MR. DIXON: That's right.

23 MR. McLEAN: -- and I continued to
24 work with him and appreciate his guidance and
25 insight.

1 And then 10 years ago when I joined this
2 body, I had the chance to work with him again.
3 So I've had a chance to see Paul at the
4 planning commission level as a liaison and now
5 as a fellow Council person and I've
6 appreciated all of it.

7 The one thing I've really come to
8 appreciate over the last few years is that I
9 never had to worry about whether I'd gotten my
10 hair cut.

11 (Laughing was heard.)

12 MR. McLEAN: But beyond the humor,
13 what I have really appreciated is the insight
14 and the guidance. And Paul has provided a lot
15 of very good advice on tough issues when we
16 faced them and that has meant a lot to me and
17 it has meant a lot to this community.

18 And so it will be missed, Paul. We will
19 miss that insight. But stop by occasionally
20 and share it with us when you think we need
21 it.

22 But thank you again for your service.

23 MR. DIXON: Thank you. I
24 appreciate it.

25 (Clapping was heard.)

1 MS. GIBBONS: Well, Paul, our
2 stories are kind of funny in that way. We did
3 start together on the planning commission and
4 I also got thrown off the planning commission.

5 (Laughing was heard.)

6 MS. GIBBONS: And, look, here I am,
7 too.

8 But I want to thank -- I mean, I've known
9 you for a very long time and I want to thank
10 you for all the help you've provided and it's
11 been a pleasure working with you together on
12 Council. Thanks.

13 MR. DIXON: Thanks, Lorrie. It
14 goes both ways.

15 (Clapping was heard.)

16 MR. HANNAN: Paul, people on the
17 outside don't realize what it takes to be an
18 elected official, and you have -- your efforts
19 and, as Jim said, your insights to various
20 things have made this group a better group and
21 as we've matured and grown together to work
22 together to -- for the benefit of where we
23 live, you're a very, very real part of that
24 and I appreciate all the efforts that you've
25 put forward in that, that matter. So thank

1 you.

2 MR. DIXON: Thanks, Jim.

3 (Clapping was heard.)

4 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Excuse me, Paul.

5 I also am a past member of the planning
6 commission. It must be a prerequisite to get
7 on Council.

8 (Laughing was heard.)

9 MR. MOURY: But you stayed on.

10 MR. McLEAN: Yeah, he stayed on.

11 MR. MOURY: He didn't get thrown
12 off, though.

13 MR. DIXON: You didn't get thrown
14 off, did you?

15 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: I didn't get
16 thrown off.

17 (Laughing was heard.)

18 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: I don't have that
19 distinction.

20 But, no; in the short time that I've been
21 on Council, I appreciate the professionalism
22 that you've shown towards myself and also the
23 fellow Council members and to the residents of
24 Bethel Park. You truly will be missed. And I
25 appreciate working with you and good luck on

1 your retirement. Thank you.

2 MR. DIXON: Thanks, Joe.

3 (Clapping was heard.)

4 DR. CAMPBELL: Paul, I get to make
5 some comments, also.

6 I was never on planning and zoning.

7 MR. McLEAN: What's he doing here?

8 (Laughing was heard.)

9 DR. CAMPBELL: And, if anything, I
10 have the shortest tenure in working with you,
11 sitting alongside you. And I don't
12 necessarily remember what everybody says, but
13 I remember how they make me feel. And from
14 the first couple days, couple weeks, couple
15 months on Council, I just remember you being a
16 kind, compassionate, caring individual,
17 friendly, you know, really kind of wrapping
18 arms around a person who is new and wet behind
19 the ears on the board and made him feel
20 comfortable and one of the team. And I've
21 always valued your -- your graded, your --
22 your balanced comments and guidance, your
23 direction and your experience.

24 Twenty years is nothing to sneeze at. A
25 plaque is just such a small platitude for

1 everything you've -- you've done, your
2 service, you're altruistic service. I can
3 really say that. And for that I'm so grateful
4 for mentoring me the way you have. Thank you.

5 MR. DIXON: Thank you, Tim.

6 (Clapping was heard.)

7 MS. DIXON: I can't pass up a
8 microphone.

9 Okay. All right. My dad has always been
10 a doer. He is a person that doesn't stop with
11 well enough, but pushes and pursues until the
12 job is well done. Admiring him from afar, I
13 didn't realize the impact that would have on
14 me throughout my life, as a student, a nurse,
15 and then as a citizen in the human race.

16 When he ran for and was elected to
17 Council for the first time, I was a
18 15-year-old who obviously knew everything and
19 I told him he would become just like any other
20 politician to which he responded with
21 something that would change the way I would
22 perceive things for the rest of my life. And
23 he said, no, Ab, it takes people like me to
24 make sure the politicians don't have their way
25 with the people they are supposed to serve.

1 Thinking about this memory of my dad who
2 has served Bethel Park as the Councilman of
3 Ward 4 brilliantly for the last 20 years, only
4 one quote and one thought spoken by one person
5 came to mind, and these are words by Theodore
6 Roosevelt.

7 It is not the critic who counts; not the
8 man who points out how the strong man
9 stumbles; or where the doer of deeds could
10 have done them better. The credit belongs to
11 the man who is actually in the arena, whose
12 face is marred by dust and sweat and blood;
13 who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes
14 short again and again, because there is no
15 effort without error and shortcoming; but who
16 does actually strive to do the deeds; who
17 knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions;
18 who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at
19 the best knows in the end the triumph of high
20 achievement; and who at the worst, if he
21 fails, at least fails daring greatly, so that
22 his place shall never be with those cold and
23 timid souls who neither know victory nor
24 defeat.

25 Thank you, Dad, on behalf of our slice of

1 Bethel Park and our family, and thank you from
2 my heart for being a great example of what
3 makes the world a better place.

4 (Clapping was heard.)

5 MAYOR ALLEN: Now you've got him
6 going.

7 MR. DIXON: I guess that proves
8 that there's a first time for everything.
9 Thanks, Ab.

10 MAYOR ALLEN: Before you sit down,
11 I just wanted to add my comments.

12 I started on Council two years before you
13 did. So I was a newbie when you came on. I
14 looked forward to your opinions, especially
15 when it came to planning and zoning, because
16 it's like what do we do here, how do we do
17 this, and you always seemed to have the
18 answers. And even to this day, you know,
19 sitting at the meetings in the back.

20 But we've spent a lot of time together.
21 We had -- the Community Center was built while
22 you were here, Millennium Park, the Fire
23 Station. We can go on and on. But I
24 personally want to thank you for -- for
25 mentoring me when I first got on and I wish

1 you all the best.

2 MR. DIXON: Thanks, Jack.

3 (Clapping was heard.)

4 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. And with that,
5 I just want to wish everyone a Merry Christmas
6 and a happy holiday season.

7 MR. MOURY: Is there anybody else
8 up here that's an alumni to the planning
9 commission?

10 (Laughing was heard.)

11 MR. MOURY: Mr. Dixon.

12 MR. DIXON: Well, where do I start?
13 You guys took away half the stuff I wrote
14 here. I mean, I only have like just a few
15 pages.

16 (Laughing was heard.)

17 MR. DIXON: You put a microphone in
18 front of an Irishman and that's what you get.

19 Tim touched on a couple of things that --
20 that are important to me, and I think we
21 covered that. It was a tumultuous atmosphere
22 when I came on Council and -- and together we
23 pitched in and we fixed that. And it wasn't
24 my doing, it was all of us together
25 collectively that did that.

1 And, you know, just look at the progress
2 that we've made in the last 20 years. There's
3 so many things you can't -- we don't have the
4 time to list them all, from the Community
5 Center and -- and Millennium Woods. We did
6 those two pretty much at the same time.
7 The -- you know, the Recreation Center
8 addition that we put on, the very difficult
9 process that we went through to build the
10 firehouse.

11 All of these things we did together as a
12 Council and we became I think one cohesive
13 unit that worked together for the betterment
14 of this community. And we put -- we put aside
15 our egos and we just -- you know, you could
16 argue a point, we could lay out our positions
17 for each other, and whether you win or lose
18 the issue, we put our arms around each other's
19 shoulders and walk out of here friends. We
20 just put it behind us and moved right on to
21 the next issue.

22 We've always dealt with each other in a
23 very collegial and friendly way, and I really
24 seriously consider all of you my friends. And
25 that's been so important to me.

1 Coming on Council when I first got on, I
2 was pretty nervous because of the -- the
3 fractious nature of -- of the way things were
4 back then. But we were able to put all of
5 that behind us and -- and -- you know, look at
6 the -- the growth and the prosperity that
7 we've achieved in the last 20 years, and
8 that's going to continue in my absence, I
9 promise you that. I know that we leave --
10 that I leave this community in good hands, you
11 know.

12 So I better stop there.

13 (Clapping was heard.)

14 MR. DIXON: There is something that
15 I forgot, too. I spoke about Council and my
16 relationship with Council, our relationships
17 with each other, but I want to -- I want to
18 let the residents of Bethel Park know what a
19 fantastic staff that we have here.

20 The municipal staff is just so
21 professional and so good. They -- you know,
22 we might set the course for this community,
23 but they're the ones that stoke the engines.
24 You know, they're the ones that get us to
25 where we need to go, where we want to go. And

1 so our municipal staff, my hat's off to them.
2 Thank you all so much for everything that
3 you've done.

4 And, Mr. McTiernan, I can't forget you,
5 either. I've grown to -- I've grown very fond
6 of you over the years even if you are a
7 Philadelphia lawyer.

8 (Laughing was heard.)

9 MR. DIXON: And so, you know, I
10 guess -- I guess I'll just leave it with the
11 words of General Douglas MacArthur. Old
12 Councilmen never die. They just don't get on
13 the ballot.

14 (Laughing was heard.)

15 MR. DIXON: Thank you.

16 (Clapping was heard.)

17 MR. MOURY: Okay. At this time I
18 would like to turn to the approval of the
19 Bills and Payrolls, and Mr. Hannan.

5 we're establishing are we have to -- the
6 Authority will have to net at least \$100,000
7 through the refinancing even after all fees
8 and expenses.

9 And I don't know if folks will remember
10 or not, but we did this earlier this year with
11 some other bonds that we had. We authorized a
12 refinancing. And to make everybody aware of
13 an early Christmas present, that financing has
14 occurred and we received \$320,000 as a result
15 of that, which we are going to place for use
16 in capital projects.

17 So that's the thought process behind this
18 as well.

14 offsite from the Municipality and outside
15 right here.

18 2001 all the way up to 2011. We've got
19 financial purchasing records from 1998 to 2013
20 and, you know, dye tests.

21 Really, this is just -- these are records
22 that we no longer have to keep and the state
23 recommends that we dispose of them in
24 accordance with their laws.

2 I'd like to -- appreciate you pointing
3 this out. We'll save some space on storage
4 and I'm assuming we'll be doing this every
5 year so --

21 so that when we go into 2020, we will have the
22 citizens' contribution covered.

23 Now, there's -- there's money -- a lot of
24 other money. We have money in our budget.
25 We've gotten money from all sorts of sources.

1 But I'm just making an appeal to say if you
2 thought about making a contribution and you
3 haven't done it yet, now's the time so we can
4 meet that goal by the end of the year.

5 Thank you very much.

17 DR. CAMPBELL: Mr. President.

18 MR. MOURY: Dr. Campbell.

19 DR. CAMPBELL: As part of our Live
20 Well Bethel Park Program we had our first
21 Turkey Trot, 1st Annual Turkey Trot I may add.
22 A whole 5k, count it, 3.2 miles, and it was
23 spectacular. It was on Thanksgiving morning.

24 I'm happy to say that I completed it with
25 my daughter, my granddaughter Adrianna, as

1 well as no less than three other Councilmen,
2 Lorrie Gibbons, Joe Consolmaglo --
3 Consolmagno.

4 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Consolmagno.

5 DR. CAMPBELL: See, I'll get that
6 out there. Give me a little more time. I'm
7 still taking aspirin to prevent a TIA. And,
8 oh, we had a nurse here. So I appreciate
9 that. Who else? Lorrie. Oh, Tim Moury. And
10 our esteem -- our esteemed municipal manager,
11 Laurence Christian, showed up in shorts and
12 tennis shoes and he ran the blasted thing. So
13 by the time he was coming back, the rest of us
14 were about a quarter of the way, you know.

15 So it was a rather -- rather
16 invigorating, strapping, and breathtaking
17 experience for it. It was a wonderful event
18 and just a big shout out to all the folks who
19 made that -- that event possible. The rec --
20 council directors, Bethel Park rec department.
21 Bethel Park School District, they opened up
22 the Washington Elementary School for us so we
23 could have a place to stage and to decompress
24 afterwards and eat bagels and protein bars.
25 You know, it was a wonderful thing. And, of

1 course, the Montour Trail Association with all
2 their great work.

3 Stay tuned. This is -- there's going --
4 this is going to be an annual event. We've
5 got a lot of wonderful, exciting things we're
6 going to be doing as part of the -- the Live
7 Well Bethel Park Program.

8 We had -- last month for our Speaker
9 Series at the Community Center we had two
10 mental health nurses come from St. Clair
11 Hospital. They spoke on a lot of the holiday
12 stresses, seasonal affective disorder, holiday
13 stressors, holiday depression, which is a very
14 common, very, very important topic to talk
15 about this time of year. They did a bang up
16 job, a wonderful one, wonderful.

17 This coming month, on December 17th I
18 think it is, yes, the 17th, that's a Tuesday,
19 we're going to have our third event. We're
20 privileged to have John D'Angelo. He's
21 Tri-Community South's EMS training
22 coordinator, and he's going to provide us
23 updates on the opioid crisis. This is huge.
24 This is absolutely huge. Every single person
25 in Bethel Park, every person in the United

1 States will be touched by the opioid crisis in
2 one way or another.

3 He's going to -- John's going to review
4 the cause, the extent of this crisis, as well
5 as some of the means to mitigate it, some of
6 the things we can do to try to turn this
7 terrible crisis around.

8 These are exciting, dynamic programs that
9 we offer and they cost nothing. They're free
10 to -- to the community. When -- if you can't
11 make that particular Tuesday on the 17th,
12 they're being recorded by Bethel Park TV.
13 They'll be posted online, certainly on our
14 YouTube station, and, of course, as always,
15 they're free. So tell your friends come, come
16 enjoy them because they're wonderful. We have
17 very talented people coming to speak.

18 Thank you.

19 MR. MOURY: Could you tell us the
20 date and location.

21 DR. CAMPBELL: December 17th,
22 that's over at the Community Center, and that
23 will be at 7:00 p.m. And, again, it's free.

24 MR. MOURY: Thank you very much.

25 DR. CAMPBELL: Thank you.

1 MR. MOURY: Are there any other
2 items?

3 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: President Moury.

4 MR. MOURY: Mr. Consolmagno.

5 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: I'm feeling a
6 little blue today, but I wanted to tell you
7 why. It's a good reason.

8 I've been working with Officer Sean
9 Gorman, and he and I have been putting
10 together this program, join us for coffee or
11 milk to talk with a BP cop.

12 The event is scheduled for January --
13 Friday, January 3rd, 10:00 a.m. to noon, at
14 Reginald's Coffee Shop, the historic
15 schoolhouse. I think everyone knows where
16 it's located.

17 Yeah, January, if you didn't know, is Law
18 Enforcement Appreciation Month. And I ask
19 everyone, you know, right after Christmas to
20 leave a blue light on in your window in
21 support of our law enforcement in Bethel Park
22 and throughout the country as these gentlemen
23 put their lives on the line each and every day
24 they walk out their door. And showing a
25 little support to them I don't think is too

1 much to ask.

2 And Sean and I, like I said, have been
3 putting together this program and, you know,
4 come on up and have a cup of coffee with a
5 cop. I think you'll enjoy it. That's Friday,
6 January 3rd, 10:00 a.m. to noon. We selected
7 that day because school is still in the
8 Christmas recess. So all the children can
9 come up and grab a carton of milk and enjoy
10 the talk with a cop.

11 Thank you.

12 MR. MOURY: Thank you, Mr.

13 Consolmagno.

14 Any additional items?

15 (No response was heard.)

16 MR. MOURY: Hearing none; can we
17 turn to Public Works and Maintenance, and Ms.
18 Gibbons.

19 MS. GIBBONS: Community Center
20 Security Camera Upgrade.

22 last time, Mr. Dixon.

23 MR. DIXON: I do have a comment.

24 MR. MOURY: It's too late.

25 (Laughing was heard.)

1 MR. DIXON: Too late forever more.

2 I just wanted to add one thing. In case
3 anybody's wondering, I know I've talked to
4 some members of Council about why I'm leaving
5 Council, but in case anybody's wondering, I
6 just wanted to make it public.

7 You don't know how much time these
8 members of Council put in to serve the
9 residents of Bethel Park. It's enormous.
10 Hundreds and hundreds of hours.

11 I was talking to my wife Gayle the other
12 day and I mentioned one night last winter when
13 it was about 10 degrees out, it was snowing
14 and the wind was about 40 miles an hour, and I
15 was putting my coat on to go to a planning
16 commission meeting, and I looked at her and I
17 said I really don't want to go out tonight.
18 But you do it anyway. We all do it. That's
19 what we signed up for.

20 And I just really want to get my time
21 back. That's -- that's really the only
22 reason. 25 years I think is -- is a good time
23 of service for my community. I -- I still
24 very much love what I'm doing, and I -- you
25 know, serving others is a very important tenet

1 of my faith. And I think that serving others
2 is also the very foundation of being an
3 American. This country lives and breathes
4 through volunteerism.

5 And so, you know, my -- one of my
6 favorite presidents said ask not what your
7 country can do for you, ask what you can do
8 for your country. And -- and so here we are
9 at the local level serving our nation the best
10 way we can.

11 And so this is for my fellow members of
12 Council. Thank you.

13 (Clapping was heard.)

14 MR. DIXON: Carry on.

15 (Laughing was heard.)

16 MR. MOURY: Okay. Is there any
17 additional items?

18 DR. CAMPBELL: Motion to adjourn.

19 MR. MOURY: No, no, no.

20 Mr. Dixon, would you like to make the
21 final parting motion?

22 MR. DIXON: Motion to adjourn.

23 MS. GIBBONS: Second.

24 MR. HANNAN: Second.

25 MR. MOURY: All in favor.

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DR. CAMPBELL: Aye.
