PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. We have eight members of Council.

At this time, I would like to go to Chair Announcements. We do not have any.

Reports of Officials; and the Library Director's Report.

MS. McINTOSH: Good evening, everyone. This is Christine.

Many of you know that September was

Love Your Library month. And libraries across

Allegheny County were soliciting donations

from supporters to be matched by a match pool

of \$200,000 from the Jack Buncher Foundation.

Our Board President, Andy Amrhein, set a goal of \$50,000 for the Library. And I thought he was absolutely out his mind. But we hit it. We just -- we were over 50- -- I think it was \$50,038. So kudos to Andy. I never thought we would make it.

I don't know what our match will be, because it's not a dollar-for-dollar match.

But I will know by the end of October, and I will let everyone know.

As far as our programs, all of our youth programs are virtual through the end of

the year. You can see them on Facebook or on YouTube. We have Baby Jam, Toddler Tuesday, Mother Goose on the Loose, and Preschool Power storytimes daily.

And we have some special programs.

The one I wanted to talk about briefly is, it will take place on Friday, October 23 at 7:00 p.m. It's called How to Toon. It's with Joe Wos. He's a cartoonist and an artist.

This program is open for grades three through six. And we do ask that you register because you need a Zoom invitation to participate.

One program that we are hosting in person for youth is our Halloween Storywalk, which will take place on Saturday, October 24, from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. This will happen outside of the building. We still ask that you wear masks and socially distance.

But it will begin at the front
entrance to the Library, and then you'll walk
to different stations outside around the
building to read the book Pumpkin Pumpkin by
Jeanne Titherington. And staff will be there
to help guide you through the storywalk.

You can come any time between 2:00 and 4:00. The walk takes about 20 minutes.

And there will be a surprise for the children that attend at the end of the storywalk.

And then for adults, we're doing a hybrid. Some of our stuff is in person, if we have 12 people or fewer, so that we can socially distance. We do ask that you wear a mask.

One of these programs is Spinal Stenosis, the Nonsurgical Treatments of Spinal Stenosis. We'll be hosting on Tuesday, October 20, at 7:00 p.m. in Council chambers.

And then on Thursday, October 29 at 7:00 p.m., we are hosting An Evening with Haunted Pittsburgh. This is a virtual event, so you would have to register at the Library. And we'll get your email and send you a Zoom invitation. This is -- these programs -- these paranormal programs usually are standing room only.

So we -- the Library is still under our COVID hours, which are Monday through Thursday, 10:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m.; Friday and Saturday, 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. We

are currently closed on Sundays. We will be revisiting that for the new year.

We are still currently one of the few libraries that are open for in-person services. The few libraries that are allowing in-person services are requiring people to make an appointment to come in. We do not. You can come in and browse and check out what you would like. You can use the computers for one hour at a time per day.

But please come in and see us. We've been very busy. We're doing our best to keep everything disinfected and cleaned. And we've have no incidents. So we hope so see you in there. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you.

Any questions from Council?

(No response.)

Hearing none; can we turn to the Police Chief's Report, and Chief O'Connor.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Police Chief is here. Can you hear me?

PRESIDENT MOURY: Yes, sir.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Excellent.

The Chief requests that residents

don't leave their cars in their driveways unlocked with the keys sitting in them, unless your car winds up on the North Side.

That's -- that's the only thing I have. That is an important thing. But that's the only thing I have.

Any questions?

PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. Hearing none; thank you, Chief O'Connor.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOURY: We'll go to the Fire Chief's Report.

MR. USELMAN: Good evening. This is Rob Uselman with -- Assistant Chief with the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company.

A few quick announcements prior to the incident report for September.

We want to thank everyone in the community who came out to support our food truck fundraiser event we had in September.

It was a big success. The weather was great.

And there was a lot of good food there. I know, I was there with my kids. So everyone enjoyed it. And it was -- we appreciate the

1 support.

One thing that's coming up is, BPTV did a segment with Andy Amrhein from Evey Hardware on the fire department. I actually haven't seen it yet, or the cut of it, so I'm interested, as everybody else, to see that. So watch for one of his upcoming episodes, a segment on this Saturday's show.

I'm not sure exactly when that airs. But as soon as we get it, we will post it on our Fire Department Facebook link as well so everyone can see it.

Another thing that happened was, WTAE has a Hearts for Heros TV show, and they focused on Bethel Park recently. There is a link on our Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company Facebook page.

So if anybody missed that, go to the Facebook page and click on the link. There's a lot of good information there. And it shows some of the things we do as the fire department for our community. So I just wanted everybody to see that.

One big thing is, October is Fire Prevention Month for the nation. Due to

COVID, we do not have an open house this year, which we normally do in October. But we have teamed up with the National Fire Protection Agency. And on our Facebook page, there's a link on a bunch of good information about fire prevention.

And, basically, the key focus this year is Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen. So go out to the Facebook page to check out that information.

A couple things we want to focus on, though, is cooking is the number one cause for home fires and home injuries in the United States. So it's very important that, when you're cooking, you use extreme -- extreme caution, take caution. We don't want to have any cooking incidents where we have to come and potentially put out a fire that's in your house.

So just, if you're cooking, some basic rules we like to say is stay close. If you're using the -- baking or roasting food, just check it regularly, and stay in the house or in the kitchen where your food is. Keep anything away that can catch fire, away from

your stove top. That's a big one. If you have paper towels or anything close to that, it can catch fire.

And to help protect the children, a lot of kids don't understand how hot foods can be when they're on the stove. So talk to your kids about a kid-free zone of at least 3 feet around the stove and areas where hot food and drink is prepared and carried.

So, with that, I have -- that's our announcements. Now I'll get into the Incident Report.

So, for September 2020, we had five structure fires, one brush fire, five gas leaks, two power lines down, a couple electrical problems, vehicle -- one vehicle accident, two water conditions, eight good intent calls, one smoke investigation, and eight fire alarms, for a total of 35 calls.

And that is all for the Chief's Report.

And keep in mind that we still do have our Trick or Treat. And that's from 6:00 to 8:00 on -- (inaudible/poor connection) -- also.

Also, remember our Halloween decorating contest is taking place this month. And even though we do have judges, please nominate a house that you see that deserves to be recognized. One of the judges can possibly miss a house, and we don't want anyone to be left out.

Judging will be done between October 23rd and November 1st. And the winners will be announced November 9 at the Council meeting. And because of COVID-19, winning certificates will be sent to everyone.

And, finally, I want to let you know a few programs that we kicked off today. The first one is called Bethel Park Kindness

Project. The purpose of this event is to

recognize acts of kindness within the community such as mowing someone's lawn, going shopping for another person, going to Mass, or even walking your neighbor's dog.

People are encouraged to submit acts of kindness through October 30 at 6:00 p.m. And they can include the acts starting back in January 1st of this year. So we can -- this will be a ten-month project.

To submit an act of kindness is very simple. You can email us at kindnessatbethelpark.net, or you can drop off your submission at the Community Center to Michelle's attention. All entries that are receive will receive a Kindness Certificate and will be recognized at an upcoming Council meeting.

The second thing that we're doing is called the Sidewalk Chalk Competition. And that's from Sunday, October 25 to Friday, October 30. Entries have to be in at 6:00 p.m.

Those who are participating should stop by Evey Hardware to pick up their chalk at no cost beginning October 18, and just

the Resident Comment Section for non-agenda items for the -- under abundance of caution, Council has moved our meeting tonight from an in-Council chambers to a Zoom meeting. So I believe we have some people that submitted some written comments.

So at this time, I would like to turn to Mr. Christian.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Thank you, sir.

There are four residents who have submitted emails. Some of them are quite lengthy in nature. And so I'll go -- as I move forward and read them all, trying to stay in the three-minute time length -- time frame.

The first one is from Lindsay Flinn from 973 Highfield Road.

"To Bethel Park Council Members. It has come to my attention that there was an incident of racial discrimination from one Bethel Park Public Works employee to another employee. There were reports of witnesses.

It was minimized, disregarded, and ignored by various folks in charge. I would like to see this situation handled properly and not swept under the rug. I'm also in

favor of a zero tolerance policy for racial discrimination within our Municipality and School District. Hate has no place in Bethel Park. Our community deserves better. Lindsay Schmidt Flinn."

The second one comes from Elizabeth Bedford Krebs from 3235 Comanche Road.

It states, "Dear Bethel Park Council,
I am writing to ask for an update on the
progress and plans Bethel Park has developed
regarding race relations in our community. As
reported in the Almanac, Diane Ford attended
the Bethel Park School Board's final June
meeting to provide a progress report on a
cultural competencies and inclusion
initiative.

She has led at the high school during the past two academic years. She has worked with the school district in attempting to promote unity and develop a better sense of understanding. My goal was to have a district-wide initiative, and still is, Ford said.

She submitted a program proposal including a recruitment plan and marketing

strategy for board members to review. Ford further states, "We have to do something now that's not going to take years to begin to implement." As pulled from the Almanac July 9, 2020.

On August 6, 2020, a roundtable discussion on race was held on Bethel Park Council chambers, organized by Ken Nagel, who serves on the Bethel Park School Board, and attended by many municipal officials and several prominent citizens. From the Almanac of August 13, 2020.

It looks like these two events fell on deaf ears. On September 21, 2020, Bethel Park Community Foundation held its third annual Fantastic Four Golf Outing at Nemacolin Country Club, featuring Wendy Bell, as a member of Team KDKA Radio's Foursome.

This is the same Wendy Bell who was fired in March 2016 following her on-air racist comments about a shooting in Wilkinsburg. It is also the same Wendy Bell who asks, "Are you going to bankrupt America and the future for less than one percent of our population? Many of whom are already ill

or aged. I'm on a fence." Once again, it's the same Wendy Bell who most recently encouraged Pittsburghers to shoot protestors onsite.

What is going on? How can Bethel

Park be developing a plan for inclusion and

acceptance while promoting someone who behaves

in racist and hateful ways? What has happened

in the past two months to move this initiative

forward?

Racism is not a problem that begins and ends upon entering a school building. Why don't others in Bethel Park work with Ms. Ford to incorporate this initiative into all areas of our community -- school, citizens, Bethel Park Community Foundation, and municipal government?"

We are at the three-minute mark at this point in time. Do you want me to continue, Mr. President?

PRESIDENT MOURY: No. Go on to the next.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Okay. And the third one is from Nancy L. Mikus from 5928 Oak Park Drive.

"I would like to know what is being done about the Pubic Works incident involving an employee using a racial slur toward another employee. I would also like to know why the actor was not fired and, additionally, why the supervisor has also not been fired for telling the harmed employee that, "It shouldn't bother him because he is only 25 percent black."

I am absolutely outraged over this kind of behavior, behavior that should have had a zero tolerance policy attached to it.

No person of municipal employment should be allowed to act in such a manner, contrary to decency, equality, and without prejudice.

Racism in our municipality has no place here.

You cannot simply say this is a personnel issue. This is exceedingly more than that. Action speaks volumes, and your silence and inaction is speaking even louder. An extremely concerned resident."

And the final one, it's from Amy Morrow at 231 Logan Road.

"To Bethel Park Council, we have become aware of an incident of a racial slur being used against a Public Works employee by

another employee in front of two witnesses.

It was reported to those in charge. It was also reported that it was minimized by a superior, saying that they shouldn't be upset since they are only 25 percent black. This is actually another incident of discrimination.

Following the investigation, witnesses were intimidated and called names by a select few other employees for telling the truth. Employees have said they fear coming forward because of retaliation. This was mishandled at best.

In August, our community had a virtual forum about inclusion and race relations in our community. September, Wendy Bell was welcomed to participate in a fundraiser supporting our community. Later in September, the above incident took place and was essentially swept under the rug.

As our elected officials, you are to represent our residents and community, and therefore set the experience of zero tolerance of this ugly behavior. It is also your responsibility to protect your employees and provide a safe and welcoming work environment.

It was said that an investigation was done about said incident and that all parties involved were dealt with. However, it was later shared that the employee in question was suspended for a week without pay.

But after being sent home, he was allowed to return to work the next day because a call from a Council was received, asking for the punishment to be lifted, and that the guilty party does lawn work for said Council member.

This is absolutely unacceptable.

These employees are our friends, neighbors,
and family members. And you have an
obligation to this entire Municipality to set
the example, and that did not happen. By this
action, a pretty reckless precedent was set.

The employee deserves an apology, as does Mr. Christian, who was undermined in his ability to do his job.

Many residents sent emails to Council regarding this incident. No one received any response from Council at all. The only ones to respond to emails sent at all were Mr.

Christian and Mayor Jack Allen. Absolutely

unacceptable that these residents were ignored.

Following my emails that I did post to social media, I received several messages from community members citing their own experiences with hate speech in Bethel Park.

One was a former employees also.

My request is that this situation be resolved properly. And that going forward a policy of zero tolerance be adopted for our community and the Bethel Park Employee Handbook, especially when witnesses are present for incidents. It would be ideal if the Municipality and School District worked on this jointly to set guidelines across our whole community.

Racial slurs are more than discrimination. They are hate speech, plain and simple. Our whole community, and most definitely this employee, deserve better.

Once again, please make sure better comes from this."

And as the final comments,

Mr. President, if you don't mind, I would like
to read what we presided to the residents

1 | regarding these comments.

PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,

Mr. Christian. Go ahead.

MR. CHRISTIAN: "To all our residents, while we cannot comment regarding a confidential personnel matter, we can tell you that the Municipality of Bethel Park does not tolerate discrimination or harassment, and is firmly committed to dealing with it.

The Municipality has very clear policies in place prohibiting any type of employment discrimination or harassment based on race, nationality, gender, religion, or other illegal basis.

Regular training sessions are held for all employees regarding Municipal and non-discrimination policies, as well as how to prevent and respond to allegations or incidents involving illegal discrimination or station harassment. And all violations are thoroughly investigated by the Municipality with appropriate disciplinary action taken as needed."

PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,

25 Mr. Christian.

We have two members of the Cool Springs group that are here this evening, actually, in Council chambers. I don't know if they wanted to say anything. Or we can wait until we had any questions on the agenda.

(No response.)

PRESIDENT MOURY: We will wait to ask if they have any questions on the agenda.

Okay. At this time, I would like to turn to Health, Safety and Welfare; and Mr. Hannan.

MR. HANNAN: Mr. President, we have two items under Health, Safety and Welfare.

The first one is a Copper Circuit Transition and Phone Line Reduction and Labeling.

mentioned last month about doing a bond issue, which was completed last week by the Bethel Park Municipal Authority.

We did a, roughly, 30 million dollar bond issue. And we were fortunate that the interest rate came in. We were projecting around three percent over 30 years. It came in at 2.62 percent. So we saw significant savings versus what we were projecting our debt service to be.

So we have an ongoing process. The 22 million dollars is going to be spent as part of the upgrade to the sewage treatment plant. The balance, at this point in time, will be spent -- or dedicated to spending on the system.

It's tied into consent orders. It's tied into a plan that the Municipal Authority has been following over the last several years on system upgrades. So we continue to work to enhance and improve the water quality and the sewer issues, storm sewer and sanitary that we may have.
