I would like to call to order the Regular Council Meeting, 4 5 we're doing this remotely, for June 8, 2020. 6 Mr. Christian, would you please call 7 the roll. 8 MR. CHRISTIAN: Dr. Campbell? 9 DR. CAMPBELL: Present. MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Cenci? 10 MR. CENCI: Here. 11 12 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Consolmagno? 13 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: (Indicating 14 present.) (Audio muted.) 15 MR. CHRISTIAN: Ms. Gibbons? 16 MS. GIBBONS: Here. 17 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Hannan? 18 MR. HANNAN: Present. 19 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Harrison? 20 MR. HARRISON: (Indicating present.) 21 (Audio muted.) 22 PRESIDENT MOURY: He's muted. 23 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. McLean? 24 MR. McLEAN: Here. 25 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Moury?

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: Here. 1 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. O'Brien? 2 3 MR. O'BRIEN: Present. PRESIDENT MOURY: At this time, we 4 have all members of Council present. 5 6 At this time, I would like to turn to 7 the Reports of the Officials, and the Library 8 Director's Report. 9 MS. McINTOSH: Hi. Good evening. 10 This is Christine McIntosh, the Director of 11 your public library, where we provide 12 opportunities to explore, learn, create, and 13 connect. 14 Some of you may have seen some 15 activity going on at the library. During the 16 yellow phase of the Governor's COVID-19 plan, 17 the library has been providing curbside 18 pickups and returns. And now that Allegheny 19 County has moved into the green phase, the 20 library will be open to the public for limited 21 hours beginning Monday, June 15. 22 Hours of operation will be Monday 23 through Thursday from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., 24 and Friday and Saturday from 10:00 a.m. until 25 2:00 p.m.

Masks are required to enter the 1 2 Municipal Building and while in the library. 3 Children under the age of 2 or those with a 4 medical condition are exempt. 5 High touch areas such as counters and 6 tables will be disinfected regularly during 7 operating hours. And hand sanitizer is 8 available throughout the library for you to 9 use. 10 Public computers will be available for use, but are limited to one hour per day 11 12 to accommodate as many as people as possible. 13 All the toys and games in our Family Place area have been removed. And furniture has 14 15 been reconfigured to maintain social 16 distancing practices. Our study rooms are 17 available, but we are limiting to two people in a room at a time. 18 As we are limited in capacity, we are 19 20 asking all patrons who visit to conduct their 21 transactions and not linger in the library so 22 that we can accommodate as many people as 23 possible during our operating hours. 24 You may return library materials in 25 the outside book-drops at any time 24 hours a

All returned materials will be 1 day. 2 quarantined for a minimum of 72 hours before 3 being checked in. So if you check your account, you'll 4 notice they're still on there. Don't worry, 5 6 they will be taken off your account after the 7 quarantined phase, and no fines are charged 8 during that time. 9 We'll still offer curbside pickup for 10 those of you who are not comfortable coming 11 into the library. So you could call the 12 library and request items that are located in 13 our collection only. We cannot request and 14 receive materials from other libraries in 15 Allegheny County at this time. 16 Bethel Park Public Library is one of 17 a few, three that I know of, of the 70 library 18 outlets in Allegheny County that is opening to 19 the public at this time. 20 Please understand that all the 21 services to which you have become accustomed 22 may not yet be available. 23 All classes and clubs will be on 24 pause for the summer and will not be meeting 25 at the library.

We do ask for your patience and your 1 support of these new rules and regulations 2 3 that we must follow as we work to provide you the best library service that we can at this 4 5 time. 6 That is all I have this evening. 7 PRESIDENT MOURY: Is there any 8 questions? 9 (No response.) 10 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Consolmagno, we cannot hear you. We'll come back. There's 11 12 something with your audio. 13 Okay. At this time, thank you very 14 much. 15 If we can turn to the Police Chief's 16 Report; and Chief O'Connor. 17 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Here. Good -- good 18 evening everyone. 19 Since we are going back into -- we're 20 back in this green phase, some of our police 21 services are back open at the Municipal 22 Building at our offices. 23 Our record room is back open, if 24 someone needs to pick up a report in person. Although we still encourage people to do it by 25

7 1 mail. 2 Our prescription drug box is open. So if you need to drop off prescription drugs 3 4 for disposal, you can do that again. Our 5 property room is open. So if we were holding 6 people's property, we will release it now. 7 Contact the evidence custodian. 8 Our Crime Watch meeting is still 9 postponed. So follow us on Facebook, and we 10 will put a lot of updates up there as we can. 11 And that's all I have. 12 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very 13 much, Chief. 14 Are there any questions? 15 (No response.) 16 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none; can 17 we turn to the Fire Chief's Report. 18 MR. USELMAN: Good evening. This is Rob Uselman with the Bethel Park Volunteer 19 20 Fire Company. I'm the Assistant Chief. 21 For the Incident Report for May of 2020, last month we had 25 calls. And the 22 23 breakdown is as follows: 24 We had four structure fires, ten fire 25 alarms, two CO alarms, one burnt food, one

mulch fire, one odor investigation, three good 1 intent, one wires down, one assist medics, one 2 gas odor investigation. On that note, that 3 4 was the Incident Report. So, I would like to say one other 5 6 As we head towards one of the great thing. 7 holidays of this country, July 4, people will be lighting and playing with fireworks. 8 9 Please use common sense. Follow the 10 ordinances of Bethel Park and Allegheny 11 County. And for our parents, we recommend that they bring their own seating rather than 7 8 using the bleachers. 9 We will primarily be using the Community Center for Summer Fun 2020 program, 10 11 which I understand started today. And that 12 will be through June, July, and August. And because of that, regular Center hours and 13 14 programs are on hold until the end of August. 15 Hopefully, weekend rentals begin in 16 July. This (inaudible/poor reception) was 17 made to assist local parents (inaudible/poor 18 reception) and to give our staff time to 19 evaluate their procedures to reopen up, not 20 only the Center for daily use, but for all the 21 safe programs that they will offer. 22 And, finally, the only thing that I 23 have was, road construction started today on Route -- or, actually, yesterday, on Route 88 24 25 (inaudible/poor reception issue) Clifton.

a resident. His name is Mr. JJ Bolock. And 1 2 he represents Mr. John Murphy. It reads as follows: "To the Bethel 3 Park Council members: My name is JJ Bolock 4 and along with Goldberg, Kamin & Garvin 5 6 represent John Murphy. 7 This comment pertain to the action item for the McMurray Grading Permit 8 9 extension. It is our understanding that Mr. Murphy's request for a one-year Grading 10 Permit extension was denied and instead was 11 12 granted a two-month extension ending on 13 July 8, 2020. We again would ask that the 14 Grading Permit extension be extended for one 15 year. 16 The current site is in safe and stable condition. Further, the site is not in 17 danger of polluting any of the surrounding 18 19 area. 20 The need for a year-long extension is 21 crucial as further earth moving/grading cannot 22 occur until a new silt sock is placed on the 23 site per Allegheny County Conservation 24 District. This has been unable to occur due 25 to COVID-19.

1 A larger issue also preventing 2 further work being done is the discovery of a 3 PennDOT water outlet on the site. PennDOT 4 placed this water outlet on the site without 5 an easement or permission. This issue can 6 only be resolved by a joint permit from 7 PennDOT which cannot happen by July 8. 8 Due to these issues, which are out of 9 the control of our client, grading cannot continue at this time and cannot be completed 10 11 by July 8. Due to these issues, the original 12 one-year extension in completely reasonable. 13 We respectfully request that a one-year 14 Grading Permit extension be granted." 15 He would like -- goes on to clarify, 16 "The Joint Permit is actually from the 17 Pennsylvania Department of Environmental 18 Protection. A permit from PennDOT is however 19 also likely to be required. However, the fact 20 remains that earth moving/grading cannot 21 resume until those permits are obtained, and 22 that cannot happen by July 8, 2020. Thank 23 you, JJ Bolock." 24 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you, 25 Mr. Christian.

And there's a lot of area to feel comfortable about going 15 out again. 16 So I just want to encourage people, 17 if they feel safe, if they feel comfortable, 18 19 to start supporting our local businesses once 20 again. 21 That's all, Mr. Moury.
