3	PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. I'd like to call to
4	order the Regular Council Meeting of August 10, 2020.
5	Mr. Christian, would you please call the
6	roll.
7	MR. CHRISTIAN: Dr. Campbell?
8	DR. CAMPBELL: Here.
9	MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Cenci?
10	MR. CENCI: Here.
11	MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Consolmagno?
12	MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Present.

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: All nine members are here 2 and accounted for. At this time, could we stand for the Pledge 3 4 of Allegiance. 5 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance was 6 recited.) 7 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. At this time, I 8 would like to go to Chair Announcements. 9 An executive session of Council was 10 conducted on August 10, 2020, tonight, before we came to 11 the floor for personnel and legal issues. 12 At this time, I would like to turn the 13 Reports of the Officials; and the Library Director's 14 Report. 15 MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. My name is 16 Christine. I'm the Director of your public library, 17 where we provide opportunities to explore, learn, 18 create, and connect. 19 August is usually a downtime for us, but we 20 do have a few programs going on. We have Introduction 21 to Scratch Programming, which will be virtual through 22 the Zoom platform. So it will take place on August 13th 23 and 14th at 2:00 p.m. This two-part class will teach 24 kids computer coding skills using the Scratch Program

1 platform. This is for grades four through six. 2 We also have team breakout games, which will 3 be virtual, on Monday, August 24th at 7:00 p.m., where you will have 45 minutes to work together to figure out 4 5 the clues, solve the mystery, and break into the prize 6 box. 7 We ask that you register. And tell your friends because you'll do it as a group. This is for 8 9 grades seven and up. So whenever you -- you can either call and register or you can register online. But when 10 11 you do so for a virtual program, we ask for your email. And you'll receive a Zoom invitation in your email. 12 13 We are doing Storytime in the Park in person. Last week was our first week doing it this 14 15 year. So we ask that you come and read and play with us 16 while we explore and discover some of the community's 17 finest parks. Don't forget to bring a blanket and 18 sunscreen. This program is for two- to six-year-olds 19 20 with their caregiver. No registration is necessary. 21 Just come. We ask that you do wear a mask and practice 22 social distancing. It's on Tuesdays in August at 9:30. 23 So on August 11th, our staff will be at Elm Park, and on 24 August 18th at Miner's Park.

1 And summer reading programs for adults 2 continue through the end of August, through the 31st. 3 So you can submit an entry for the weekly \$25 gift card 4 raffle with each book read or listened to. All entries 5 submitted by the 31st of August will be entered into our 6 grand prize drawing, which this year is a dash cam. 7 We have a few fundraisers coming up. A big 8 one, a golf outing, on Monday, September 21st at 9 Nemacolin Country Club. It's \$200 per golfer. If you 10 want to join us for dinner only, that's \$75. 11 The day begins with brunch at 10:00 a.m., 12 with a shotgun start at 12 noon. And proceeds benefit 13 the Bethel Park Fantastic Four Charities, which are the 14 Community Foundation, the Education Foundation, the 15 Historical Society, and the library. 16 And September is Love Your Library Month. 17 So we ask that you show your library some love by 18 donating during that month. Your donation will be 19 matched on a prorated basis by the Jack Buncher 20 Foundation. This year's match pool is \$200,000 for all 21 of the libraries in Allegheny County. 22 Watch for commercials detailing all that the 23 library provides to you free of service -- I mean free 24 of charge -- services free of charge to residents of

Bethel Park and all of Allegheny County. These 1 2 commercials will be on BPTV, on YouTube, and on our 3 Facebook page. The library will not be hosting its annual 4 5 book sale in September due to Covid-19 restrictions. 6 And we are not accepting donations of books, DVDs or used material at this time. 7 8 And given that most classes, programs, and 9 events will remain virtual through the Zoom platform through the end of the year, the library's operating 10 hours will remain limited. So we're open Monday through 11 Thursday, 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.; Friday and Saturday, 12 13 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. We will have no Sunday hours 14 for the remainder of the year. And we are currently one of only eleven out 15 16 of the 70 library locations in Allegheny County that are 17 open for in-person services. So, that is all I have. 18 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very much. 19 20 Can we turn to the Police Chief's Report; and Chief O'Connor. 21 22 If you didn't hear me earlier, that was my fault. I didn't have my microphone on. I think 23 24 Mr. O'Brien turned it off.

1	MR. O'BRIEN: Don't let in happen again.
2	CHIEF O'CONNOR: Good evening everybody.
3	Chief here.
4	And, again, this month, we had to cancel the
5	National Night Out. We also have no Crime Watch
6	meetings scheduled. I don't know when they'll resume,
7	when it's safe to resume. We will pick back up, but not
8	until it's safe to resume.
9	What I do want you to know is, though, we
10	have some very dedicated team of officers out there
11	every day serving the community. In addition to this
12	pandemic, we are in an opioid epidemic. We had a rash
13	of overdoses the end of July. Our officers, in two
14	cases, administered Narcan and saved two individuals.
15	Our arrests are up. And not everybody is
16	going quietly into the night. I don't know if the
17	COVID-19 is making people agitated. It could be. But
18	we don't get to social distance when we're putting
19	Narcan up someone's nose or rolling around on the ground
20	getting them into handcuffs. But our people will be out
21	there doing their job for the community every day.
22	And, again, a very dedicated staff of
23	officers, dispatchers. And the dispatchers are working
24	really hard now with the C-19. They have to screen

1 every medical call and let the first responders know if 2 the person's positive or not. And our admin staff will step out of their traditional roles and help out, too. 3 So I just wanted to report that we're fully 4 5 functioning. We'll get through this. It's a little 6 difficult, but we'll get through it. So I just want to 7 tell everybody, we're there for you. And God bless 8 America. Questions? PRESIDENT MOURY: Any discussion from 9 10 Council? 11 (No response.) PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none; thank you, 12 Chief. 13 14 Can we turn to the Fire Chief's Report. 15 MR. USELMAN: Good evening. My name's Rob 16 Uselman, Assistant Chief with the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company. 17 It's good to see everybody in person again. 18 19 I hope everybody is having a wonderful and safe summer. 20 With that, we'll get into the Fire Chief's Report. 21 First thing's first, we do have a 22 fundraising announcement for this Sunday, August 16th 23 from 12:00 to 5:00 behind the Brightwood Station on Park Avenue. We're actually having a Yovi's food and Kona 24

1 Ice truck. So please come out. We do get a portion of the proceeds that will be generated. 2 3 The community is so great to us. And we're 4 very gracious to have a wonderful and supporting 5 community when it comes to our fundraising. So we hope 6 everyone can make it and get some food. If you need 7 more details, there's a menu on our Facebook page at Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company at Facebook. 8 9 So with that, here's the Incident Report for 10 July 2020: We had two structure fires, three brush 11 fires, three gas leaks, two vehicle accidents, one 12 unstable load, two odor investigations, one assist EMS, 13 nine good intent calls, 20 fire alarms, and five CO 14 alarms, for a total of 48 incidents. 15 One thing I will say with it being so dry, 16 please use caution when you're having a recreation fire. 17 We've had a couple incidents this past weekend where, 18 you know, fire was spread easy in these dry conditions. 19 So please be safe out there. 20 And that's all I have. 21 PRESIDENT MOURY: Any discussion from 22 Council? 23 (No response.) 24 Thank you very much. PRESIDENT MOURY:

1 Can we turn to the Mayor's Report; and Mayor 2 Allen. 3 MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you, Mr. President. And good evening. I just had a couple 4 5 announcements this evening. Two weeks -- I think it was two weeks ago, I sent out a SwiftReach message, saying 6 7 that Community Day was cancelled this year. So if 8 anyone didn't get that message, I just want to let you 9 know that it is cancelled. 10 Council looked at it long and hard, and, you know, based on the situation, they did opinion polls and 11 12 so on. Most people didn't want to have it, and they 13 were not comfortable being there. So it will be back 14 next year bigger than ever. 15 But on a happy note, our Community Center will reopen on August 22. But there will be limited 16 17 hours. And, actually, the hours are pretty good. 18 Monday through Friday, they'll be open 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 19 p.m.; Saturday, 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.; and Sunday, 12 noon to 6:00 p.m. 20 21 And on that note, the Rec Department needs 22 your help. They're in search of a new logo and a new 23 slogan. So get creative and submit your ideas by August 24 And you can win up to \$200 Amazon gift cards. 18. And

1 complete contest details can be found under Bethel Park 2 Recreation and Community Center Facebook page, or you 3 can call 412-831-1328. And the contest is open to all 4 Bethel Park residents regardless of their age. 5 And, lastly, our Bethel Park Farmers Market 6 needs your help. Our farmers market has been nominated 7 in the Top Ten Farmers Markets by the city paper's Best in Pittsburgh 2020 Readers Poll. 8 9 We know that our Bethel -- or our farmers 10 market's great. Now we need to let the people around us 11 know that they are. So voting runs now through 12 September 2nd. And you can vote by visiting the Bethel 13 Park Farmers Market on Facebook or their website, which 14 is www.bethelparkfarmersmarket.com. 15 The winners will be announced on October 7. 16 And don't forget to visit our farmers market still every 17 Tuesday 3:00 to 7:00 through the end of September. And 18 that may actually be increased until the beginning of 19 So we still have a good two months to get October. 20 their fresh produce. 21 And that's my report. 22 Thank you very much, Mayor PRESIDENT MOURY: 23 Allen. 24 And just as a follow-up, the Community

1 Center will be reopening, as the Mayor said. Stay 2 tuned. Just like with everything else, there's going to 3 be some different protocol. It's not going to be just business as usual. 4 5 So as we get closer, the Manager and staff have been putting together a plan to keep the residents 6 7 safe. 20	PRESIDENT MOURY: And we liked it that way.
21	Mr. McLean?
22	MR. McLEAN: Mr. President, no there are no
23	additional agenda items under General Policy and
24	Finance.

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you, Mr. McLean. 2 Are there any additional items? 3 DR. CAMPBELL: Mr. Moury? PRESIDENT MOURY: Dr. Campbell. 4 5 DR. CAMPBELL: I had several people contact 6 me within the last several weeks about, you know, 7 basically, kudos and great praise for the new Internet 8 website that we have, Bethelpark.net. 9 And we've done quite a bit of work in 10 Council in hiring and establishing the infrastructure to 11 kind of build up the -- our IT section as much as 12 possible. And we have a new look on our website. It's 13 easier to navigate. It has a variety of email 14 subscriptions that residents can sign up for. 15 And, particularly, there's nine I'd like to 16 highlight just to let our citizens know. Bethel Park 17 event cancelations and closures are on the website now. 18 Bethel Park recreational informational program, including news events, breaking news like water main 19 20 breaks, road closures, snow closings, other emergencies. 21 There's a lot of community service and 22 assistance events. With COVID-19, there's been a lot of 23 food drives, a lot of collection events that have taken 24 place. You could subscribe there.

The coronavirus information, we've put on quite a bit of data just to try and inform our citizens of, you know, nuts and bolts, things about the virus prevention, as well as how it's affected the government, and their government.

6 The farmers market, the Mayor talked about 7 that today. You could look there and see specials, the 8 vendors who are there, the timing of the events. Field 9 notifications and closures, whether they're having work 10 done on them or weather events.

You could also find new Municipal, Council, Commission, and Board events all posted on there as well. And, importantly, also, utility traffic closures, road closures, events will be posted on that as well. We have a newer vigor that's been established, also, with our media, our online content.

We're still keeping the chronicles. We're still keeping the swift water reach -- outreach. We think that's very important. If necessary, we're still going to be able to public on hard copy on the Municipal walls, on the buildings, on the doors and all for other events.

But we've also adopted a new agenda, meeting and software management. It's called Unicode. And it's pretty impressive. You notice we have service pros.

We're no longer killing rainforests -- entire 1 2 rainforests every time we have a meeting. 3 You want me to take the mask down so you can hear me a little better. 4 5 But, you know, we're going paperless. And 6 we're really updating and modernizing. This has spilled 7 over even to our police department with some of the 8 department -- with some of the innovations and 9 developments that we put into play there to bring their system up to speed. 10 11 Everything like our munici- -- our Municipal mission statement, our -- the Manager's initiatives, the 12 13 values that we have, Blueprint Bethel Park, our ten-year 14 plan, that will all be on there as well. And it's accessible. And you can, you know, take a good look at 15 16 that. 17 And hopefully, this will engage and nurture a lot better civic involvement, you know, for the 18 citizens of Bethel Park. And, really, and part of the 19 20 reason I wanted to mention this, I want to -- I want to give some kudos out to some folks. 21 22 Karen Colussi, Dave Cable, they've done 23 incredible jobs with the web site, the communications, 24 email modules, the subscriptions.

1 Kelly Gastgeb with her social media 2 training, the advancement and marketing that she's done 3 not only for the directors, but also, you know, for us 4 as well. 5 Kim Weightman, you know, for the press and 6 news releases, the training of the directors, better 7 communicate both verbal and written with the residents. 8 And, of course, the division leadership of 9 Laurence Christian, our Municipal Manager. 10 So that's all I got to say about that, 11 Mr. President. Thank you. 12 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very much, 13 Dr. Campbell. 14 I just would also give accolades to staff. 15 You know, we're doing things a little differently now. We're in the midst of a study to review the 16 17 Municipality. We've been talking about this for the 18 last probably two years. So we're in the middle of kind 19 of looking at that. 20 We want to make sure that we're serving the 21 needs of our residents today and in the future. We 22 talked about the long-range plan, some of the different 23 technology, which I'm getting used to. Some of us, they 24 have to take kicking and screaming, because I kind of

1 like paper. But this is the way of the future. It's 2 going to make us, hopefully, more effective and more 3 efficient. 4 So I appreciate everything everybody's done 5 from the staff perspective to get us to where we are and 6 really set us on a new direction of where we want to go. 7 Any other discussion? 8 (No response.) 9 PRESIDENT MOURY: At this time, can we turn 10 to Planning and Zoning; and Ms. Gibbons. 11 MR. HANNAN: You skipped Health, Safety and 12 Welfare. 13 PRESIDENT MOURY: Oh, I'm sorry. 14 Can we turn to Health, Safety and Welfare. 15 MR. HANNAN: Some people still can't use the 16 technology. 17 PRESIDENT MOURY: It was a technical glitch. MR. CHRISTIAN: I'll take responsibility for 18 19 that. 20 PRESIDENT MOURY: Yeah, it was the Manager's 21 fault. As you know, all good problems. 22 MR. O'BRIEN: You're just mad you're first 23 on the list for voting. 24 MR. HANNAN: We can change that.

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: You're right. Okay. Health, Safety and Welfare; Mark 2 3 O'Brien. 4 MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Moury, there are no items 5 under Health, Safety and Welfare. 6 PRESIDENT MOURY: You have to beware of 7 Mr. O'Brien. Thank you, Mr. O'Brien. 8 Are there any additional items? 9 (No response.) 10 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none; now I would 11 like to go to Planning and Zoning. 12 And we do have one resident that signed up 13 to speak, Doris Pavacik (phonetic). And her comment we 14 received via email: "I want to know how any individual 15 organization, business, et cetera can assume ownership 16 of a portion of a state highway?" 17 We will be back in touch and let you know. 18 So, Ms. Gibbons? 19 MS. GIBBONS: Ordinance 8-10-20A Lindermer 20 Street Vacation. 21 I move that we approve Ordinance 8-10-20A 22 approving the vacation of Lindermer Street. 23 MR. McLEAN: Second. 24 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion by

1 Ms. Gibbons and second by Mr. McLean that we approve 2 Ordinance 8-10-20A approving the vacation of Lindermer 3 Street. Any discussion of this item? 4 5 (No response.) 6 PRESIDENT MOURY: And the last thing is, 7 this is, I believe, subject to the person wanting the 8 vacation, getting the agreement with the adjacent 9 property owners. So that even though they currently own all the properties, but in the future, if they need 10 access, that they'll be able to do it -- they'll be able 11 12 to -- the property owners will be able to gain access. 13 Any discussion of this item? 14 (No response.) 15 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Christian, would you 16 please call the roll. 17 MR. CENCI: Yes. 9 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Harrison? 10 MR. HARRISON: Yes. 11 PRESIDENT MOURY: Motion passes 9-0. 12 Ms. Gibbons? 13 MS. GIBBONS: Ordinance 8-20-20B, Beekeeping in Zoning Districts. 14 15 I move that we approve Ordinance 8-20-20B to 16 add provisions and regulations on the keeping and 17 maintaining of apiaries, bees, in all zoning districts. 18 MR. McLEAN: Second. 19 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion by 20 Ms. Gibbons and seconded by Mr. McLean that we move 21 [sic] Ordinance No. 8-20-20B to the approved -- to add 22 provisions and regulations on keeping the -- maintaining 23 of bees in all zoning districts. 24 Any discussion of this item?

1 MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Chairman? Beware of Mr. O'Brien. 2 PRESIDENT MOURY: 3 MR. O'BRIEN: What's the buzz all about? То be or not to be, that's the question. I believe that 4 5 this Ordinance is fair and has -- and has no reason for us to be beside ourselves. 6 Council has discussed on this matter and 7 8 does not pose a hive mentality. We must beware and be 9 careful to construct regulations to protect the 10 homeowners that reside beside the bee hive. By no means is this a honey of a deal. Or do we expect a swarm of 11 12 applications? 13 Currently, we do not wish anyone to feel the 14 sting of our new ordinance. And after tonight, this will truly be behind us. As Mr. Moury said so kindly, 15 16 and he asked me tonight to behave. 17 So in the words of my mentor and friend, the 18 Honorable Ralph Adam Holzer (phonetic), be brief, be 19 bright and be done. 20 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. PRESIDENT MOURY: You've been waiting a long 21 22 time for that one, haven't you? 23 Okay. Any other discussion? 24 (No response.)

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: Just real quick, there's a 2 lot of people I want to thank in particular. This was 3 something that was identified in the long-range plans 4 about where we want to be in the future, no pun 5 intended. Similar to what the chicken ordinance was, 6 this has been a long time in coming. 7 People from the community, the Planning 8 Commission, a teacher from the Bethel Park School 9 District was involved. We utilized some resources from 10 Penn State on how we can do this and also protect the 11 neighborhood. I've learned a lot, probably a lot more than 12 13 I need to know. But one of the things is, there's going to be initial fee on this. And it will be the first 14 15 time, if you want to put a hive in, you need to come in 16 and get a fee. And then each year following, you will 17 need to notify us whether or not you're going to 18 continue with the bee hive. Because if you don't, there 19 may be other insects that would take IT over, and you're 20 required to take it down. 21 So there is a small fee initially. But then 22 year two and forward, you will have to notify us. And

23 if you're not going to use it for bees, beware, you're 24 going to have to take it done.

O'BRIEN: Second. 11 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's motion by 12 Mr. Consolmagno and second by Mr. O'Brien that we 13 approve the Board of Parks, Recreation and Leisure 14 Services recommendation and approve the Bethel Park 15 Girls Softball Association 2020 Community Challenge 16 Grant Application in the amount up to, but not to 17 exceed, \$5,000. 18 Any discussion of this item? 19 MR. HARRISON: This -- this motion bothers 7 We have a lot of recreational type activities in 8 me. 9 the community, different organizations, baseball, so on and so forth. 10 I'm just concerned that this is going to set 11 a trend on where we're going to have request after 12 13 request to distribute money. And I don't know if we discussed it in detail, but I don't -- I don't like 14 this. Because I'm concerned it's like a -- it's like a 15 cancer; it will spread. 16 Thank you. 17 MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Chairman? PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. O'Brien. 18 MR. O'BRIEN: I don't remember the year, but 19 20 I'm going to say somewhere in the '90s, this was -- the 21 Challenge Grant Program was started by a group of 22 Councilmen, led by me. And it turned out to be one of the most successful interactions between our Recreation 23 24 and Municipal to generate money to make them feel like

1 they're part of the process, part of their facilities. 2 It applies to any -- any and all recreation. We've had 3 very creative grants over the years. 4 So I'm not really sure where Mr. Harrison's coming with this. I think it's great. 5 Thank you. 6 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you. 7 I'll just comment, also, to follow up, and 8 Mr. O'Brien. The money -- there's a \$25,000 limit set by the Recreation Board. And it's matched, really, 9 10 dollar for dollar. The match from the Municipal side is 11 money that's generated from the Banner Program, which 12 includes the banners that they sell at Park Avenue, 13 Millennium, and some of the other municipal fields. 14 So it's technically not taxpayer money. 15 It's coming from money generated from the Banner Fund. 16 So that's where it came from. 17 I'd like to thank the Recreation Board, the groups, and our Municipal staff for reviving this, per 18 19 Mr. O'Brien's conversation, and, really, given the group 20 a sense of ownership and a commitment. 21 So for this \$5,000, we're getting \$10,000 22 worth of work. So it's a good investment, which is 23 being paid for out of the Banner Fund. 24 PRESIDENT MOURY: Any discussion or
