## Tri-Community South EMS Director Nora Helfrich Retires



Tri-Community South EMS Director Nora Helfrich retired after serving the communities of Bethel Park, South Park and Upper St. Clair for 41 years.

The Municipalities of Bethel Park, South Park and Upper St. Clair thanked Nora for her service at a luncheon at the Upper St. Clair Community and Recreation Center on Oct. 28. Helfrich can be proud of the enduring legacy she has built for Tri-Community South EMS!

She came to Tri-Community South as a volunteer EMT in 1980, was hired as a part-time employee in 1982, and became full time in 1983. She went on to paramedic training, becoming a supervisor, and later, supervisor of support services. While serving as supervisor, she went to nursing school and became a registered nurse.

In October of 2000, founding Director Mary Ann Scott retired from the System, and Helfrich was named as the new director. She inherited a System that faced declining income because of a significant

## Update: Local Park Projects and Stream Stabilization

> Over the past several months, special events were held for work being done on Saw Mill Run as well as Birch Tree, Oak Tree and Millennium Parks. Details follow; full information can be found at www.bethelpark.net, Community, Bethel Blog.

## Saw Mill Run Stream Stabilization Groundbreaking Sept. 9

The project will stabilize about 350 ft . of stream bank to Saw Mill Run off of Milford Drive.
"Over the years, this section of the stream has really changed, and this project will help stabilize the stream banks along with improving our storm water management of the area," said Bethel Park Municipal Council President

## Tim Moury.

According to Municipal Engineering Director Stacey Graf, the project will mitigate the erosion problem within the headwaters of the stream.
"Many streams in Western Pennsylvania have highly eroded banks, property being lost, fallen trees, exposed sewers, and vegetation being swept away," she said. "As the severity of the rainfall events are changing, this scenario is playing out all over the Municipality."

The project is being funded in part by a Growing Greener Grant through the Department of Environmental Protection.

## Birch Tree Park Playground Installation Groundbreaking Sept. 24

"Neighborhood Parks are a very important part of our community," said Moury. "The new playground equipment at Birch Tree Park will provide a place for the neighborhood children to play within walking distance of a number of their homes."

The new playground equipment was selected by area residents and will be in compliance with current playground safety standards.

Another large part of the project was extensive storm sewer work that's already been completed.

The storm sewer project cost $\$ 265,000$ and was completed by Morgan Excavating in 2020.

decrease in insurance company reimbursements, increasing costs because of outlandish increases in insurance premiums and a decreasing pool of volunteers because of the aging of the communities the system serves. Nonetheless, throughout the 21 years of her leadership, the System remained financially stable, and in 2001-2020, operated with a positive ledger balance, requiring no funding from the municipalities' tax base.

Among the many accomplishments during her tenure as director, probably the most enduring is the construction of the Tri-Community South headquarters building and Bethel Park base in 2005. The project was completed on time and under budget, and the facility is still fully functional with the capabilities built in at the time of construction meeting all requirements 16 years later. Helfrich was involved in every aspect of the design and capabilities of the new base.

Also under her leadership, TCS was recognized by the National Center for Early Defibrillation, now known as the Sudden Cardiac Arrest Association, as having the best small-community early defibrillation program in the USA in 2003. The System was recognized as
"Pennsylvania's Ambulance Service of the Year" in 2007 by the Pennsylvania Emergency Health Systems Council. TriCommunity South earned accreditation by the Commission for the Accreditation of Ambulance Services (CAAS) in April of 2006 and was only the second EMS system in Pennsylvania to achieve this. TCS has maintained its accreditation ever since, with re-accreditations in 2009, 2012, 2015, 2018, and 2021. The receipt of each of these awards owes much to her leadership.

Helfrich has received individual honors as well. In 2008, she was honored by the Emergency Medical Service Institute,
 now known as EMS West, for her outstanding contributions to EMS in Southwestern Pennsylvania. In 2011, she was named among the "Pennsylvania Stars of Life" by the Ambulance Association of Pennsylvania and the Pennsylvania EMS Provider Foundation. In 2021, on the eve of her retirement, Nora was awarded the 2021 "Dr. George Moerkirk Memorial Contribution to EMS Award." The award is given annually by the Pennsylvania Emergency Health Services Council (PEHSC) to an individual who, "provides a significant contribution to the Pennsylvania's EMS system."

## Oak Tree Park Playground Installation Groundbreaking Oct. 1

"Incorporated into the renovation of Oak Tree Park we were able to accomplish two goals," said Moury. "We're upgrading the playground equipment and pavilion and including storm water management. Each of our parks will have its own identity, and Oak Tree Park will be known as the only park with 'Gaga Ball'!"

Not only is the playground being upgraded,
 but it was also moved from its old site due to the location of the new underground tanks installed to collect stream water drainage. The old pavilion was also removed to make room for a larger overall playground space.

According to Graf, the new playground featuring equipment selected by local area residents will accommodate both younger and older children (ages 2-5 and 5-12). Other amenities will include swings in the upper area, a sunshade for patrons using the playground as well as baseball spectators, and Bethel Park's first Gaga Ball pit! Gaga ball is a dodgeball type game where players roll the ball with their hand to tag other players.
After the playground is complete, work will be done on sidewalks near the park.

## Millennium Park Groundbreaking Ceremony Oct. 15

Upgrades to the Park include a new playground, new walking trail, updated ADA compliant restrooms with the addition of a concession stand, and the Municipality's first synthetic turf baseball field. Over 76 new trees were also planted with the help of Tree Pittsburgh and a generous donation by the Bethel Park/Upper St. Clair Breakfast Rotary.

The new .32 mile ADA compliant walking trail outlines the new ball field and runs behind the existing baseball field now offering guests a .5 mile loop trail to enjoy.

Other improvements will include multiple pitching and base distances allowing for a variety of age groups involved in softball and baseball to play, and underground tanks adjacent to the new field area to hold about 49,000 gallons of stormwater. The lower parking area is also being reconstructed to meet current ADA guidelines along with the associated walking trail.

The total project cost is $\$ 975,000$ with part of it funded by a grant from the Land \& Water Conservation Fund through Pennsylvania DCNR for $\$ 268,300$.

## Be Storm Water Smart

Understanding How Storm Water Affects Your Wallet, Safety, Health, and


## What is Storm Water?

Storm water is water from precipitation that flows across the ground and pavement when it rains or when snow and ice melt. The water seeps into the ground or drains into what we call storm sewers. These are the drains you see at street corners or at low points on the sides of streets. Collectively, the draining water is called storm water runoff.

## Good Rain Gone Wrong

Storm water becomes a problem when it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants as it flows or when it causes flooding and erosion of stream banks. Storm water travels through a system of pipes and roadside ditches that make up storm sewer systems. It eventually flows directly to pollutants storm water carries along the way empty into our waters, too, because storm water does not get treated!


Pet wastes left on the ground get carried away by storm water, contributing harmful bacteria, parasites and viruses to our water

Vehicles drip fluids (oil, grease, gasoline, antifreeze, brake fluids, etc.) onto paved areas where storm water runoff carries them through our storm drains and into our water.


Waste from chemicals and materials used in construction can wash into the storm sewer system when it rains. Soil that erodes from construction sites causes environmental degradation, including harming fish and shellfish populations that are important for recreation and ou economy.

Chemicals used to grow and maintain beautiful lawns and gardens, if not used properly, can run off into the storm drains when it rains or when we water our lawns and gardens.


What Happens When It Rains?
Rain is an important part of nature's water cycle, but there are times it can do more damage than good. Problems related to storm water runoff can include:


Flooding caused by too much storm water flowing over hardened surfaces such as roads and parking lots, instead of soaking into the ground.

Increases in spending on maintaining storm drains and the storm sewer system that become clogged with excessive amounts of dirt and debris.


Decreases in sportfish populations because storm water carries sediment and pollutants that degrade important fish habitat.

More expensive treatment technologies to remove harmful pollutants carried by storm water into our drinking water supplies.


Closed beaches due to high levels of
bacteria carried by storm water that
make swimming unsafe.

We can help rain restore its good reputation while protecting our health and environment while saving money for ourselves and our community.

Last year we did not experience many snowstorms, but I would like to thank the residents who took it upon themselves to shovel out their neighborhood fire hydrants. I would also like to ask that other residents do the same this year as it will save firefighters drastic time searching for hydrants that may be needed if your house is on fire.

In November, everyone changed their clocks, so you should have also changed the batteries in your smoke and CO detectors as well. If you haven't changed your batteries, be sure to take the time to do so now! As you are changing the batteries, check to see if there is a sticker on your detector stating the date of manufacture. Smoke detectors are typically good for 10 years, and CO detectors are usually good for seven years. A detector older than that may not be reliable.

Below l've also included several safety tips to help keep you safe this winter. Many of these are issues that we encounter in this community every year.

## HOW TO REACH US

None of our three fire stations are regularly staffed with members. If you need us to respond to your emergency, you must call the Police Dispatch at 412-833-2000 or call 911. If you have a non-emergency question or concern, the best and fastest way to reach us is through our "Contact Us" page on the website at www.bethelparkvfc.com. You may also call us at 412-835-1127 and leave a message on the answering machine.

## Candles

Candles cause an estimated 15,600 fires in residential structures, 150 deaths, 1,270 injuries, and $\$ 539$ million in estimated direct property damage each year. On average, a candle fire in the home is reported to a fire department in the US every 40 minutes! Over half of home candle fires start because the candle is too close to something that will burn.

More than $1 / 3$ of candle fires begin in the bedroom. Avoid using candles in the bedroom or other areas where people may fall asleep. December is the peak month for candle fires with Christmas being the peak day. Young children and older adults have the highest death risk from candle fires. The majority of candle fires result from human error and negligence. Following these simple tips could help save your life.

- If you do use candles, ensure they are in a sturdy holder and placed where they cannot be easily knocked down.
- Put candle holders on a sturdy, uncluttered surface.
- Keep candles out of the reach of children and pets.
- Don't burn a candle all the way down - put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container.
- Never use a candle if oxygen is used in the home.
- Have flashlights and battery-powered lighting ready to use during a power outage. Never use candles.
- Set a good example by using matches, lighters and fire carefully.
- Never put candles on a Christmas tree.
- Never leave the house with candles burning.
- Extinguish candles after use.
- And NEVER leave burning candles unattended!


## Carbon Monoxide

Often called the silent killer, carbon monoxide (CO) is an invisible, odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. A person can be poisoned by a small amount of CO over a longer period of time or by a large amount of CO over a shorter amount of time. Fire departments in the U.S. respond to an estimated seven calls every hour in which carbon monoxide was found. In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel can be sources of carbon monoxide. CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home.

Test CO alarms at least once a month; replace them according to the manufacturer's instructions. If the CO alarm sounds, immediately go outside to fresh air and keep your windows and doors in the house closed. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for, call the fire department and wait outside for them to arrive.

During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up. If you need to warm a vehicle, be sure to remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor indoors, even if garage doors are open.

Gas or charcoal grills can produce CO also so they can only be used outside. Other ways to prevent CO conditions from occurring is to have your heating equipment and chimneys inspected by a professional every year before cold weather sets in.

## Holiday Decorating

Each year, hospital emergency rooms treat about 8,100 people for injuries, such as falls, cuts, and shocks related to holiday lights, decorations, and Christmas trees. In addition, Christmas trees are involved in more than 400 fires annually, resulting in 30 deaths, 90 injuries, and an average of more than $\$ 17$ million in property loss and damage. Have a safe and happy holiday season by following these safety tips.

As Russ starts his 31st year in the volunteer fire service, he said, "It has been a true honor to serve the communities in which I have lived, to be able to experience numerous different departments and experience how things are done in different states. It allows me the ability to take different parts from each one and bring them back to the fire company I was raised in."

Russ would like to encourage anyone that ever had the dream of being a firefighter to look into volunteering in your local fire company. The relationships you make, the training you receive, and the experience is truly life changing!

Joe joined the fire company at age 21 in 1980 and has primarily responded out of Station 1 on Brightwood Road. He has served in various rolls including Chief Engineer, Vice President and President. Joe had no previous experience before joining and obtained various trainings over the years to become one of our most experienced drivers and pump operators. Joe is currently retired but enjoys serving as Treasurer of the South Hills Fireman's Association. Joe joined as a way to help the

## Trees

- When purchasing an artificial tree, look for the label "Fire Resistant." Although this label does not mean the tree won't catch fire, it does indicate the tree will resist burning and should extinguish quickly.
- When purchasing a live tree, check for freshness. A fresh tree is green; needles are hard to pull from branches and when bent between your fingers, needles do not break. The trunk butt of a fresh tree is sticky with resin, and when tapped on the ground, the tree should not lose many needles.
- When setting up a tree at home, place it away from fireplaces and radiators. Because heated rooms dry live trees out rapidly, be sure to check the stand daily to ensure it is filled with water. Place the tree out of the way of traffic and do not block doorways.


## Lights

- Indoors or outside, use only lights that have been tested for safety by a recognized testing laboratory, which indicates conformance with safety standards.
- Check each set of lights, new or old, for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections, and throw out damaged sets.
- Always follow manufacturer's recommendations as to how many sets can be plugged in together. Most light sets have a maximum of three.
- Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, house walls, or other firm supports to protect the lights from wind damage. Use only insulated staples, not nails or tacks, to hold strings in place. Or, run strings of lights through hooks or clips (available at hardware stores).
- Turn off all lights when you go to bed or leave the house. The lights could short out and start a fire.
- For added electric-shock protection, plug outdoor electric lights and decorations into circuits protected by ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs). Portable outdoor GFCIs can be purchased where electrical supplies are sold. GFCls can be installed permanently to household circuits by a qualified electrician.


## Decorations

- Use only non-combustible or flame-resistant materials to trim a tree. Choose tinsel or artificial icicles of plastic or nonleaded metals. Leaded materials are hazardous if ingested by children.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near other evergreens. Always use non-flammable holders, and place candles where they will not be knocked down.
- In homes with small children, take special care to avoid decorations that are sharp or breakable, keep trimmings with small removable parts out of the reach of children to avoid the child swallowing or inhaling small pieces, and avoid trimmings that resemble candy or food that may tempt a child to eat them.


## Heating

Did you know that heating equipment is a leading cause of home fire deaths? With a few simple safety tips and precautions, you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

Chimneys and vents should be cleaned and inspected by a qualified professional every year. Keep anything that can burn at least 3' away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater. Never use your oven to heat your home! Portable space heaters should be plugged directly into an outlet and not an extension cord. Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed. Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.

And finally, TEST YOUR SMOKE ALARMS MONTHLY!!!

HELP US HELP YOU!
While the tax money we are receiving is a great help to our operation, it's not enough and was never intended to be enough to pay all of our expenses every year. The tax was set at a level adequate to cover certain expenses. The tax support we receive is paying the bills and upkeep associated with our three stations located here in Bethel Park. This, along with fuel for our vehicles and insurance costs associated with these facilities, make up the entire sum of our fire tax. The fire company still has vehicle payments, equipment costs, and other insurance costs not covered by the tax support.

Just to give you an idea, right now we have a monthly vehicle payment of over $\$ 14,000$. If the fire tax were designed to cover all expenses, the tax would have been set at a much higher level. We still rely on support from donations and other fund raising activities. As volunteers, we do our job with no remuneration, and are proud to serve the residents and businesses of Bethel Park. ## Protect Yourself from Fraud

Millions of people are defrauded every year. Keep these tips in mind to prevent yourself from becoming a victim:

- Identify imposters: Scammers often pretend to be a family member, charity or someone you trust. Don't send money or give out personal information in response to an unexpected request.
- Do your research: Conduct online reviews of any companies before hiring to ensure their legitimacy.
- Verify Caller ID: Caller ID's can be spoofed. If someone calls asking for money or personal information, hang up. If you think the caller might be telling the truth, call back to a number you know is genuine.
- Don't pre-pay: Don't believe the promise of a prize or item if they request you make a payment beforehand for taxes, fees or delivery.
- Payment Methods: Legitimate companies won't require you to pay by money wiring services or by purchasing and relaying gift card numbers.
- Talk to someone: Before you give up your money or personal information, talk to someone you trust. Scammers want you to make decisions in a hurry. Don't be rushed, talk to a friend.
- Hang up on robocalls: These calls are illegal, and often the products are bogus. Don't press 1 to speak to a person or to be taken off the list. That could lead to more calls.

## Winter Safety Tips

To help you stay safe on the roads this winter, we've put together some tips for you to consider. We appreciate your efforts in keeping our community safe for drivers and pedestrians!

- Avoid driving on ice-covered roads if possible.
- Inform friends/family of your travel plans and allow for sufficient time to arrive safely.
- Dress warmly, even when driving, in the event of a vehicle breakdown.
- All sidewalks must be clear of snow and ice within 24 -hours of accumulation and keep in mind that snow/ice cannot be deposited on roads (BP Ordinance 59.50).
- Avoid parking on the street when snow is predicted to enable Municipal salt trucks to clear the roads completely.

## RENTAL PROCEDURES

Reserving a room at the Bethel Park Community Center for your next event is a simple, straightforward process and may be done up to a year in advance. However, it is recommended that you reserve your space early as dates fill up quickly!

- Requests for rentals must be submitted in writing and should include the following information:
Renters' name, address, phone numbers, date requested, time requested, specific room(s) requested (if known), purpose of rental and approximate number of guests expected. Requests may be returned to the Community Center in person or via email to communitycenter@bethelpark.net.
- Within a week, you'll receive written notification if your requested space is available or not.
- If available, we'll send you a Reservation Permit along with rental Terms \& Conditions and additional rental information to complete.


## Payment Schedule

- Fifty percent of total rental fees is due with the signed Rental Contract.
- The remaining $50 \%$ is due 30 days prior to your event.
- A refundable security deposit and room layout is due seven days prior to your event.
Please note that while we want your event to be a success, failure to meet any payment deadlines may result in rental cancellation.
Fees paid will not be refunded.


## Cancellation Policy/Fees

If you need to cancel your event, your request MUST be submitted in writing to the Community Center Director. Cancellation fees follow:

- Cancellations received in writing more than 60 days prior to the scheduled date will receive a refund of $50 \%$ of initial rental payment, less a $\$ 5$ processing fee.
- No refund will be issued if written cancellation is received less than 60 days prior to event.


## Other Rental Notes

- Any use of the Community Center which requires Municipal staff to stay after the scheduled closing time shall be charged an additional $\$ 40$ per hour for any portion of an hour that may be needed.
- Rental rate includes the set-up of tables and chairs.
- Renters will be responsible to visit the Community Center one week in advance of their event to sign-off on all seating/room arrangements. The security/damage deposit should also be paid at this time. Rate: $\$ 100$ per area rented.


## Membership Fees \& Renewals

A membership card is required to use the Bethel Park Community Center Gymnasium and Walking Track. Both residents and non-residents can purchase 12 -month memberships at the Community Center during normal business hours.

All that's needed to purchase a membership is completion of a simple membership application and photo identification (such as a drivers license) to prove residency; once payment is received, an identification photo will be kept on file for each member - a process expected to take less than 10 minutes. New members will receive both a wallet size member card as well as a small key tag card.

Individual memberships will include five complimentary guest passes, and Family memberships will include 15 complimentary guest passes.

## Homeless Education Information for Parents/Guardians: 2021-2022

In compliance with the federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, the Bethel Park School District is attempting to identify all children within the district that may be experiencing homelessness.

The term homeless children and youth is defined as individuals who lack a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence. This includes individuals who are:

- Sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship or a similar reason.
- Living in a hotel, motel, trailer park, or campground due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations.
- Living in emergency or transitional shelters.
- Living in cars, parks, public places, abandoned buildings, bus or train stations, or similar settings.
- Living in substandard housing (no running water or working utilities, infestations, etc.).
- Unaccompanied homeless youth meaning any child who is not in the physical custody of a parent/guardian.
Children who are experiencing homelessness may qualify for enrollment in free breakfast and lunch programs, access to appropriate instructional and social emotional learning supports, and transportation so they can remain in their school of origin.

If you believe your child/children may qualify for these services or if your living situation changes during the school year and your children become homeless, please contact David Muench via email at muench.david@bphawks.org. The district will work with any parent/guardian so that your child/children's education suffers as little disruption as possible.

A strategic plan is the vehicle which asks an organization to look back, look around and look into the future. Through visioning, clarifying the mission, examining core values, and setting achievable goals, the strategic plan will guide the Bethel Park School District over the next five years in achieving our vision to be the best educational system possible.

The Board of School Directors initiated the development of a new strategic plan in March of 2021. There were two guiding principles: (1) to be stakeholder driven and (2) to establish the vision and the plans to make Bethel Park "best in class" in all areas. We believe these principles built a broad sense of ownership and built a shared vision for the best possible future of the Bethel Park School District. Moreover, when a plan is built based on these principles, the plan provides a consistent influence over time and can overcome any changes in system leadership.

The planning was driven by a Steering Committee, which was comprised of board members, administrators, professional and support staff, students, parents and community members. The Steering Committee was divided into six sub-committees, each with a specific area of focus. The sub-committees spent ample quality time looking back over our history, looking at what is happening in the education world, and looking ahead to anticipate our needs and opportunities for growth into the next best version of Bethel Park. This included careful analysis, discussion and evaluation of the relevant data for each sub-committee.

In the end, there was tremendous value in the planning process. 17 broad goals and numerous corresponding action plans were identified. The goals and action plans were grouped into six categories according to the sub-committees. You can see a draft copy of our plan by visiting our website at https://www.bpsd.org/. I will point out that the goals in each sub-committee have been listed in order of priority based to the findings of a stakeholder survey. Here again, the stakeholder voice mattered in our work.

We owe a debt of thanks to the committee members who volunteered hours of time, typically in the spring and summer evenings, to review data, discuss the implications of the data and envision the goals we should adopt to achieve our vision. You can see in the plan a complete list of the Steering Committee. We are most grateful for their service and advanced thinking.

The real work of the Strategic Plan happens after it is adopted. Through the commitment of resources, financial and human, we work every day for the next five years to fulfill the goals and action steps. It is also essential we establish a system of measurement for each goal, so the progress we envision can be tracked and reported regularly. We will call this our Balanced Scorecard. Each of the goals will be assigned to a district administrator or staff member, who will shepherd the goal to fruition and update the Balanced Scorecard. I look forward to sharing our progress on the Balanced Scorecard over the next five years.

## Andrejko Posthumously Honored

In August, the Bethel Park School District and Community Foundation honored the late John J. Andrejko by dedicating in his honor the newly refurbished bell that sits just outside of the high school.

Andrejko, a giant of a man with an even bigger heart, worked at Bethel Park for more than three decades in a variety of administrative roles, where he impacted thousands of students.
"It used to amaze me how many people would come up to my dad, no matter where we were whether we were out to dinner or on vacation or wherever we were - and they would just pour their heart out to him just thanking him for all he did for them," said his son, John Andrejko.
"I think that shows what kind of a guy my father was and how he dealt with everyone," said a visibly emotional younger Andrejko.

The bell, like Andrejko, symbolizes an important institution at Bethel Park.

In the late ' 70 's, the bell that once sat outside the old Bethel Township High School on Park Ave., was set to be destroyed before a group of preservation-minded students, guided by Andrejko, stepped in to first hide the bell and then pay for its refurbishment. That bell stood outside of Bethel Park High School until 2019, when it was donated to the Bethel Park Historical Society.


The new bell isn't new at all and is actually of the same vintage as the bell that once sat outside the old schoolhouse. It even has an inscription that reads "Pittsburg," which was an accurate spelling of the city's name from 18911911, before the " $h$ " at the end was permanently reinstated by the United States Board on Geographic Names.

School counselor, Jim Knapp, assistant superintendent, Dr. Zeb Jansante, and council president, Tim Moury located the bell after an exhaustive search for the exact right replacement.
"We searched high and low for the new bell and we finally found it all the way down in Houston...Pennsylvania," joked Dr. Jansante.

The bell was then sent to Michigan, where it was completely refurbished.
"That original bell represented Bethel Park's unique tradition and John well understood that," said Andy Amrhein, the director of the Bethel Park Community Foundation, which funded the new bell's refurbishment.
"This new bell is an ideal way to honor that tradition and recognize someone who meant so much to so many people."

## Figlioli Hired as Director of Curriculum \& Instructions



In September, Mandi Figlioli joined Bethel Park as the district's Director of K-12 Curriculum \& Instruction, specializing in STEAM-related programming. Elizabeth Wells, the district's other Director of Curriculum \& Instruction, will continue to oversee literacy and the humanities.
Figlioli joined the district from the Burgettstown Area School District, where she held a variety of roles, including Assistant to the Superintendent, Supervisor of K-12 Curriculum \& Instruction, Professional Development Coordinator, Director of that school's Cyber Academy, Federal Programs Coordinator, District Assessment Coordinator and Grant Writer.

Figlioli has also written a children's book called, Miss Makey and the Magic Bin. She also served as the Benedum Master Teacher at Washington \& Jefferson College and designed and taught a course for EDU 321 called, "Diagnostic Teaching." She is also an active member of the Remake Learning Network.

A Weirton native, Figlioli earned her bachelors and master's degrees from West Virginia University.


## Raptor Visitor Screening System

Bethel Park recently transitioned to Raptor, a district-wide school visitor screening system. It provides schools with an effective way to help keep unwanted visitors out while keeping track of those admitted in.

The new system:

- Electronically signs in and signs out visitors
- Prints visitor badges
- Screens all visitors against the national sex offender database
- Provides real-time offender alerts

By scanning a visitor's driver's license, other ID, or in putting valid identification information, Raptor instantly screens for registered sex offenders in all 50 states. If a potential threat is identified, the Raptor
 system sends instant alerts to designated officials, including administrators and law enforcement, including our School Police Chief, via email and/or text messaging.

Bethel Park has also begun using a coronavirus screening tool for visitors during the school day.


## Dot Day

In September, Bethel Park celebrated International Dot Day. Teachers throughout the district facilitated a series of collaborative projects.

International Dot Day, a global celebration of creativity, courage, and collaboration, began when teacher Terry Shay introduced his classroom to Peter H. Reynolds' book "The Dot" on Sept. 15, 2009. The Dot is the story of a caring teacher who dares a doubting student to trust in her own abilities by being brave enough to "make her mark."

# Bethel Park School District Appoints New Directors of Technology and Student Support Services 

The Bethel Park Board of School Directors recently approved the appointment of Brett Slezak as the new Director of Technology and David Muench as the new Director of Student Support Services. The school board also promoted Dr. Sarah Shue to the position of Supervisor of Special Education.

Brett Slezak comes to Bethel Park from Allegheny Valley School District where he served first as a Health and Physical Education teacher for grades 7-12 before becoming that school district's technology integrator. In 2020, the Pennsylvania Educational Technology Expo and Conference (PETE\&C), a statewide event that provides quality programs focused on technology in the educational field, named Slezak their Technology Administrator of the Year.

Slezak holds a master's degree in Exercise Physiology from the University of Pittsburgh and has spent most of his career finding ways to integrate technology \& STEAM learning in unexpected ways. His achievements include co-creating Rachel's Neighborhood STEAM garden, a cross-curricular learning space that incorporates sustainability across all curriculums. Brett has also piloted a student wellness program that provides FitBits for every freshman and sophomore student to be active both in and out of school. Additionally, Brett taught middle and high school students to prototype wearable technology and build robots in Health and Physical education classes.

Slezak played an active role in the CREATE Lab's Arts \& Bots program and has presented locally and nationally on the use of technology in Health and PE classes, including a 2015 presentation to the National Science Foundation. Additionally, Brett was a Hummingbird Robotics teacher advocate \& trainer for the ABC CREATE Satellite Network that services over 15 school districts in the Alle-Kiski Valley. In January 2016, Slezak was selected as a Champions of Learning Award Finalist for technology integration.

David Muench has been with Bethel Park since 1999 in a
 variety of roles and has consistently demonstrated the qualities of an outstanding leader and has made a positive and lasting impact on the students, staff, parents and community members. His career began at Bethel Park as an emotional support teacher, coach and sponsor. In those capacities, Muench demonstrated excellent teaching skills, innovation, creativity, initiative and connections with students.

Muench was then promoted to Dean of Students at the high school, where he wrote and implemented new attendance policies and connected families to more support services and built strong workplace and community partnerships throughout the district. More recently, he has served in two key leadership positions at the district level. As the Bethel Park High School Assistant Principal, Muench oversaw teacher evaluation and student discipline and he oversaw scheduling. He fostered positive and collaborative relationships with students and their families and supported the teaching staff.

Since 2005, Muench has served as the Independence Middle School principal. During his 15 -year reign, IMS developed personal electronic learning devices for every student and redesigned its support structure in Math, English and Reading.

Muench obtained his Bachelor of Science degree in Education from Slippery Rock University and his Master's degree in School Leadership from the University of Pittsburgh. He also earned his Superintendent's Letter of Eligibility from California University of Pennsylvania in 2011. Muench is currently enrolled in that university's doctoral program, with an intended completion in summer 2022.

Dr. Sarah Shue is the new Supervisor of Special Education. Dr. Shue has been with Bethel Park since 2018, where she has served as the Assistant Director of Special Education with a special focus on supporting the district's elementary schools.

Prior to Bethel Park, Dr. Shue was a special education teacher in the Canon McMillan School District.

A 2005 graduate of James Madison University, Shue earned a Master of Arts degree in Elementary and Special Education from Chatham University in 2008; and her Doctorate of Education with a focus on Emotional and Behavioral Disorders from the University of Pittsburgh in 2018.
"These are impressive and accomplished educational leaders who bring us valuable experiences and an unyielding commitment to excellence," said Bethel Park superintendent, Dr. James Walsh. "I feel most fortunate to have them on our Bethel Park team. We look forward to locking arms with them as we pursue our vision to be best in class in all areas."

Multiples often share a unique bond and the Kosanovic triplets are certainly no exception. They are believed to be the oldest set of identical triplets currently living in Oregon.

Born just two minutes apart, on Nov. 28,
1948, the triplets' respective
paths have continually crossed, converged and aligned ever since.
Throughout their childhood growing up in Bethel Park, the three have shared a room, wore identical clothes and sat in the same class in school. Upon their 1966 graduation from Bethel Park High School, they went their separate ways for military service during the Vietnam War. Joe enlisted in the Navy, Gery joined the Air Force, and Jim served in the Army. Even then, however, they always found ways to stay close, such as a three-way phone call on a party line when they were all stationed in different states.

Their careers eventually took them in different directions, with Gerry eventually settling in Eugene, Oregon where he served as a school principal, while his brothers remained back in Pennsylvania.
"We all had different interests," Gerry said. "That's always been our hallmark, we were identical in some obvious ways but also very different in many other ways."

In 2003, Jim Kosanovic moved to Portland, Oregon and Joe followed the Kosanovic's Oregon trail when he moved to Redmond in 2011.

Now retired, the brothers speak frequently and get together a few times each month to play a round of golf or to just visit with each other.

Being identical triplets has been a big part of their identity from the beginning. "When we were younger it was an identity issue; you were a triplet, not an individual," Jim said. "Students and teachers on the high school campus didn't know if you were Jim, Gerry or Joe coming at them."

The boys quickly learned how to have fun with their situation. In the fourth grade at Logan Elementary, the brothers sat one behind the other, with Jim in the front row, Joe behind him and Gerry in the back. "If Jim was absent, Joe and I would just move up seats," laughed Gerry. Unfortunately, Gerry said his "brilliant plan" backfired as he ended up with all the absences that year.

Later, at Joe's wedding, he swapped ties with his brother, Jim in an attempt as a prank on his new wife. The trick did not fool Joe's new bride but it did confuse Joe's boss, an enormous ex-football player who hoisted Jim in the air - thinking he was Joe - for a congratulatory bear hug.

There have also been numerus unintended cases of mistaken identity. "I was in Paris, in front of Notre Dame Cathedral, and someone approached me and said, 'Gerry, how's it going?'" Jim recalled.

Joe had a similar experience on an airplane, when a man two rows behind him started smiling and gesticulating, trying to get his attention. "It was Gerry's dentist," he laughed.

Through it all, the triplets have always remained close, both emotionally and physically. According to family lore, as infants, the triplets would even scoot their cribs together in the nursery. They've clearly never lost that sense of closeness.
"We can tell the same jokes, off-color or not, and we just always get them," Joe said. "The three of us share something unique that's the best thing about it," Jim said.

Gerry agreed, adding, "Having a twin or in our case triplets is just a lifetime of fun!"

Even though all three of the brothers Kosanovic are now firmly planted in Oregon, they insist that they are most proud of their Bethel Park roots.

## BETHEL PARK SCHOOL DISTRICT ANNUAL PUBLIC NOTICE - 2021-22

The Bethel Park School District uses the following procedures for locating, identifying, and evaluating specified needs of school-aged students requiring special programs or services. These procedures are described in this notice as required by law.

The District, as prescribed by Section 1402 of the School Code, routinely conducts screenings of a child's hearing acuity in grades Kindergarten, 1, 2, 3, 7, and 11. Visual acuity is screened in all grades annually. Speech and language skills are screened in Kindergarten and on a referral basis. New students are initially screened the year of admission. Gross motor and fine motor skills, academic skills, and social-emotional skills are assessed by classroom teachers on an on-going basis. Other screening activities include but are not limited to the review of cumulative group-based achievement and ability data; health and attendance records; grades; and information shared by the parents. Specified needs from all of these screening sources are noted within the child's official file.

School records are always open and available to parents, and only to school officials who have a legitimate "need to know" information about the student. Information from the records is released to other persons or agencies only with appropriate authorization that involves written signed permission by parents.

Parents with concerns regarding their child may contact building principals at any time to request a screening or evaluation of their child, or by contacting the Special Services Department. (Names and phone numbers of the appropriate contacts are listed at the end of this notice.) Communication with parents and eligible students shall be in English or the native language of the parents.

Screening information will be used by the Intervention Team or Student Assistance Team within the student's school to meet his or her specific needs, or to document the need for further evaluation. Student Assistance/Intervention Team services are provided to students in grades kindergarten through 12. The pre-referral process identifies those students at-risk for academic or behavioral needs and includes parental involvement in making determinations as to whether a student may benefit from intervention services. Individual student plans are developed and monitoring of specific goals with data to determine student progress and efficacy of interventions are put into place. If a student is not making sufficient progress, a referral for evaluation may be issued by the school district or a parent may request a multidisciplinary evaluation at any time.

The Multidisciplinary Team consists of parents, teachers, a certified school psychologist, other related service personnel, and persons familiar with the student's educational experience and cultural background. The evaluations conducted by the Team must be sufficient in scope and depth to provide information about the student's academic functioning, adaptive and social behavior, learning problems, strengths, information obtained by the Intervention Team or Student Assistance Team, and information from the parents. After all evaluations are completed, an Evaluation Report ( $E R$ ) will be compiled and include specific recommendations for the types of interventions necessary to meet the student's specific needs. This evaluation will be completed and a report sent to the parents within 60 calendar days. Parents are then invited to participate in a meeting where the results of the evaluation will be discussed.

If the student meets criteria for the presence of a disability and need for specially designed instruction, an Individualized Education Program (IEP) will then be developed for specially designed instruction for the student within 30 calendar days. The IEP team must consist of: the student's parent(s), special education teacher, regular education teacher(s), and local education agency representative (LEA). Students of transition age, or younger if determined, must be invited to participate. The building principal, Director of Special Services, or Assistant Director of Special Services will serve as the chair/LEA, and a district psychologist, other specialists as needed, and other administrative staff when appropriate may attend.

Prior to the initiation of services, parents will be presented with a Notice of Recommended Educational Placement, which explains the services and educational placement recommendations Parental consent must be obtained before providing initial special education and related services. The Procedural Safeguards Notice describes the parents rights and options if they disagree with the individualized program presented.

## Services for Students Who Are Mentally Gifted

When screening results suggest a student may be eligible for Gifted Education, the school district seeks parental consent to conduct a multidisciplinary evaluation. Additionally, a parent may request a multidisciplinary evaluation at any time. The initial evaluation based on a multiple criteria approach is summarized in the Gifted Written Report (GWR) and used by the Gifted Individualized Education Program (GIEP) team to develop the GIEP. After the initial evaluation, students identified as mentally gifted are reevaluated before a change in educational placement is recommended or under recommendation of the GIEP team. The Notice of Recommended Assignment (NORA), signed by the parent, gives the school district permission to provide services. Parents can obtain further information by contacting their child's school principal or the District's Special Services Department at 412-854-8410.

## Services for Eligible School-Age Students

The Bethel Park School District provides a free, appropriate, public education to eligible students. To qualify as an eligible student, the child must be of school age, in need of specially-designed instruction, and meet eligibility criteria for one or more of the following physical or mental disabilities, as set forth in the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act and Pennsylvania State Regulations: Autism, Deaf-Blindness, Deafness, Emotional Disturbance, Hearing Impairment, Intellectual Disability, Multiple Disabilities, Orthopedic Impairment, Other Health Impairment, Specific Learning Disability, Speech or Language Impairment, Traumatic Brain Injury, or Visual Impairment including Blindness.

The Bethel Park School District provides a full range of placement options and services to eligible students. Options in the district range from supportive intervention in the regular classroom to itinerant, supplemental, or full-time levels of intervention, depending on the student's individual needs. Inclusive intervention practices of the general education curriculum and classroom with supplementary aids and services are the first step in the continuum of placement options. Other placement options to meet the student's needs may include, but are not limited to services secured from the Intermediate Unit, another school district, an approved private school, or a private licensed academic school program. Placement options provide for a free and appropriate public education (FAPE) for all eligible students. The District also provides related services such as, but not limited to: transportation, speech and language therapy, physical therapy, occupational therapy, nursing services, psychological services, social worker services, paraeducator support, and personal care assistant services.

The following programs are currently provided within the District: Learning Support, Life Skills Support, Emotional Support, Autistic Support, Blind or Visually Impaired Support, Deaf and Hearing Impaired Support, Physical Support, Speech and Language Support, and Gifted Support. As evidence of the full continuum of services, educational placements outside of the District have included, but are not limited to: Emotional Support at Pace School, Wesley School Programs; Learning Support at ACLD Tillotson School; Life Skills Support at Mon Valley School, Pathfinder School, Education Center at the Watson Institute, and the Children's Institute; Blind or Visually Impaired Support at Western Pennsylvania School for the Blind; Deaf and Hearing Impaired Support at the Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf and the DePaul School for Hearing and Speech; Autistic Support at Wesley School Programs, Pathfinder

School, Mon Valley School, Pressley Ridge Day School for Autism; and Multiple Disabilities Support at the Children's Institute and Pathfinder School.

## Services for Students Who are English Learners

The education of students whose dominant language is not English is the responsibility of every school district/charter school in Pennsylvania. English learners must be enrolled upon presentation of a local address and proof of immunization. The Home Language Survey (HLS) is administered for all students and retained in the student's permanent record. For those students whose primary home language is other than English (PHLOTE), the district must also determine the student's English language proficiency and, if appropriate, English as a Second Language instruction will be provided following all regulations, policies, and procedures. ## Services for Students Identified as Homeless and/or

 Foster CareThe Bethel Park School District follows all protections outlined in the McKinney Vento Act related to ensuring that any child identified as homeless or in foster care has equal access to the same free, appropriate public education as provided to other children. The District implements child find activities for other students in addition to those identified as homeless or in foster care such as wards of the state, highly mobile children, and migrant children in order to provide equal access to evaluations and services. ## Services for Students in Nonpublic Schools

Parents of non-public school students who suspect that their child has a disability and is need of special education may request a multidisciplinary evaluation through a written request to the District's Special Services Department. Parents can obtain further information by contacting their child's school principal or the District's Special Services Department at 412-854-8410.

## Services for Preschool Age Children

Act 212, the Early Intervention System Act, entitles all preschool age children with disabilities to appropriate early intervention services. Young children experiencing developmental delays or physical or mental disabilities are eligible for early intervention services including screening, evaluation, individualized education program planning, and provision of appropriate programs and services.

The Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare is responsible for providing services to infants and toddlers, defined as children from birth through two years of age. Contact the Alliance for Infants and Toddlers at 2801 Custer Avenue, 2nd Floor, Pittsburgh, PA 15227,

The Pennsylvania Department of Education is responsible for providing services to preschool age children from three to five years of age. Contact Project DART of the Allegheny Intermediate Unit at 475 E. Waterfront Drive, Homestead, PA 15120, 412-394-5736, or on the internet at http://www.aiu3.net/.

Bethel Park School District ensures that all students transitioning from early intervention programs to kindergarten or first grade programs within the District are transitioned without disruption of services. Parents of children entering school age programs are notified of the District's transition activities, which occur before kindergarten registration of each year. The District follows the federal and state regulations pertaining to the evaluation process and based on identified needs, subsequent documentation and provision of special education and related services.

Information Regarding Signs of Developmental Delays and Other Risk Factors for Parents to Look for that May Indicate the Possibility of a Disability

If your child is less than the age of beginners (age 5 before September 1) and at least 3 years of age, your child may be considered to have a developmental delay when difficulties exist in the areas of cognitive, communicative, physical, social/emotional and self-help
development where a delay in comparison to typical development is present. Parents who have questions about their child's development or possible presence of a disability may talk with their family physician or health care provider or contact the Allegheny County Health Department at 412-687-2243.

If you have questions regarding difficulties your child may be experiencing, please contact the Special Services Department at 412-854-8410.

Potential signs of developmental delay and other risk factors that could indicate the presence of a disability may include:

By the age of 3: Not saying many words; not using 2-3 word phrases and sentences; not walking; awkward gait (walking); excessive salivation; not answering "show" or "what" questions; and/or not using utensils to feed self.

By the age of 4 (all of the above included): Not toilet trained; difficulty with directional words (in, on, under, out); not playing with other children; not able to draw a circle, cross or imitate a vertical line; not able to understand the child's speech most of the time; and/or difficulty following simple two-step directions.

By the age of 5 (all of the above included): unable to answer "where" questions; unable to recall details from a story; not drawing a person with at least 6 parts; immature speech patterns ("me" instead of "l"); and not able to hop forward on one foot without support.

Other warning signs at any age: Little to no eye contact; over/under sensitivities to pain, light, noise; hand flapping; no awareness of space (always bumping into other people or things); awkward hand or foot positioning; won't touch or eat certain textures; child no longer can do things he/she used to do; developed normally, then stopped; echoes what is said; and/or plays with toys inappropriately (watches wheels spin on a car toy, but does not play with the car).

Protected Handicapped Students/Chapter 15
The Bethel Park School District, in compliance with state and federal law, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and Chapter 15 of the Pennsylvania Public School Code, will provide to each protected handicapped student without discrimination or cost to the student or family, those related aids, services, or accommodations which are needed to provide the student equal opportunity to participate in and obtain the benefits of the school program and extracurricular activities to the maximum extent appropriate to the student's abilities. In order to qualify as a protected handicapped student, the child must be of school age with a physical or mental disability or diagnosis, which substantially limits or prohibits participation in or access to an aspect of the school program. These services and protections for "protected handicapped students" are distinct from those applicable to all eligible or exceptional students enrolled (or seeking enrollment) in special education programs.

## Confidentiality of Student Records

Bethel Park School District and its employees are required by Federal Law and State and Federal Rules and Regulations to protect the rights of students including confidentiality of personally identifiable information for all students in accordance with state and federal law and the District's student records policy. The foundation of these rights comes from Federal legislation entitled, Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (also known as the Buckley Amendments). There are State Rules and Regulations dealing with regular and special education students' rights and privacy. All students are covered by the State Regulations contained in Chapter 12 known as Students' Rights and Responsibilities.

The basic premise of the above-mentioned laws, rules, and regulations is that information about
students cannot be disclosed without written parental consent. There are different categories of information: Educational Records, Personally Identifiable Information, and Directory Information. Education Records consist of information directly related to students which are maintained by the educational agency. Personally Identifiable Information includes the student's name, the name of the parent or other family members, a personal identifier or a list of personal characteristics that would make the student's identity easily traceable.

Education Records and Personally Identifiable Information cannot be disclosed or released without written parent consent, or if a student is over 18, without student permission.

There is certain information that can be released without consent, which is called Directory Information. Directory Information means information contained in an educational record of a student which would not generally be considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if disclosed. The School District designates what information is labeled as Directory Information. It shall include the following: the student's name, address, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student.

Disclosure of information means to permit access to or the release, transfer, or other communication of education records, or the personally identifiable information contained in these records, to any party, by any means, including oral, written, or electronic means. This means that information about a student cannot even be shared in conversation without permission. This also applies to other Bethel Park personnel who do not have an educationally relevant reason to possess knowledge of a student.

Written parental consent is necessary for disclosure of Personally Identifiable Information and Educational Records. The consent must: (1) specify the records that may be disclosed; (2) state the purpose of the disclosure; (3) identify the party or class of parties to whom the disclosure may be made. Furthermore, the Bethel Park School District must maintain a written record of disclosure for the parents to inspect in case information has been released.

In accordance with 34 CFR §300.624, please be advised of the following retention/destruction schedule for the Pennsylvania Alternate System of Assessment (PASA), Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA), and Keystone Exam related materials:

- PSSA, Keystone Exam, and PASA test booklets will be destroyed one year after student reports are delivered for the administration associated with the test booklets.
- PSSA and Keystone Exam answer booklets and PASA media recordings will be destroyed three years after the completion of the assessment.
A parent may file a written complaint alleging that the rights described in this notice were not provided to: Pennsylvania Department of Education, Bureau of Special Education, Division of Compliance, 333 Market Street, Harrisburg, PA 17126-0333.

The Department of Education will investigate the matter and issue a report of findings and necessary corrective action within 60 days. The Department will take necessary action to ensure compliance is achieved. Complaints alleging failures of the school district with regard to confidentiality of personally identifiable information may also be filed with: Family Policy Compliance Office, U.S. Department of Education, 400 Maryland Avenue SW, Washington, DC 20202-4605.

# Bethel Park's Johnson Receives $6^{\text {th }}$ Annual Hilda M. Sundermann Award from NSTOY-PA 

In September, Mrs. Katie Johnson, a music teacher at Benjamin Franklin and William Penn Elementary Schools became the sixth recipient of the Hilda M. Sundermann Award presented by the National State Teachers of the Year ~ PA Chapter. (NSTOY-PA).

Mrs. K.D. Meucci, a Benjamin Franklin fourth grade teacher and an NSTOY-PA Class of 2017 member, nominated Mrs. Johnson during the Fall semester of the 2020-2021 school year for the NSTOY-PA Apple Award recognition. The NSTOY-PA Apple Award recognizes other exemplary educators in PA who are making a difference in their schools. A separate committee next considers all Elementary Certified teachers honored with the NSTOY-PA Apple Award during the year for the Hilda M. Sundermann Award. Hilda M. Sundermann, a member of NSTOY-PA, was an impactful elementary teacher in the Pittsburgh city schools for a number of years. NSTOY-PA colleagues partnered with her husband, Hank to honor her education legacy by founding this award in her name. Thoughtful consideration goes in to selecting an annual recipient, for the teacher named must embody the same spirit and love of teaching elementary students that characterized Hilda's remarkable career. The committee determined that Mrs. Johnson reflects Hilda's commitment and passion for children and is very deserving to receive the sixth annual recognition.
K.D. Meucci wrote in the Apple Award nomination: "I am continually inspired by Mrs. Johnson's passion for music education. She strives to create a welcoming classroom where students are excited and engaged in meaningful learning. The energy in her classroom is contagious. Her ability

to connect with her students and her talent for teaching cross-curricular concepts and igniting students' love for music are both truly superior.

As a special area teacher, Mrs. Johnson is a master at incorporating science and social studies instruction into her music lessons. She collaborates with grade level teachers to meet standards in other subject areas. For example, she uses music to teach vibrations and sound science with rubber bands and water filled glasses. She encourages students to build their own instruments using their knowledge of how sound travels. She chooses historical songs, specifically about the Underground Railroad and the War of 1812. She teaches with music ranging from Native Americans to the instrumentals of Star Wars to reach all learners and build connections." Not only does she foster positive and trusting relationships with each student, she goes beyond to include the families in this relationship. She clearly communicates the expectation of her classroom, but more so communicates the expectations of how students are supposed to treat each other. She truly is an example of a teacher who strives to build well-rounded people, who happen to have a love and appreciation for music."

## Franklin's Meucci Dedication to Her Students

Teachers have an extremely demanding job and Bethel Park teachers' dedication to their students has been welldocumented over the years. Still, one Bethel Park teacher's dedication to her students was so extraordinary that it has gained national media attention.

Mrs. K.D. Meucci, a fourth grade teacher at Benjamin Franklin Elementary School, surprised everyone when she decided to read to her students via livestream just one day
 after undergoing brain surgery for a non-cancerous meningioma tumor that had grown to the size of a racquetball. The reading took place from her hospital bed in the Intensive Care Unit at Allegheny General Hospital.
"I just wanted my students to know that I was all right and that we were going to try to keep things as normal as possible no matter what," she said.

Meucci said she began streaming bedtime story readings to her students via Facebook Live back in 2019 in an effort to maintain a classroom connection. Soon, it expanded to include other guest readers including fellow teachers and administrators, parents and local elected officials and celebrities.

According to Meucci, that connectedness took on an added importance during the height of the pandemic. "We weren't in school and I just wanted to make sure that my students knew that though we weren't together physically, we were still a class and we were still learning together," she said.

Her story was featured on WTAE-TV' and soon thereafter, news organizations from all over the world were reaching out to Meucci wanting to know more about her story. Media organizations from all over the world soon contacted Meucci to gain her interest in appearing on their programs or stories. However, at press time, the teacher hadn't decided whether or not to share her story with a larger audience.

Meucci said she has been touched by the outpouring of love she has received from the Bethel Park community. "I have received gift cards that will last me for months and l've even had parents come to my house to help with my family's laundry and other household chores," she said. "It really has been unbelievably touching."

She concedes that the attention she has received for doing her job has been both flattering and a little bizarre, but she chalks it up to this unique period in our collective history.
"Is it common for a teacher to livestream a bedtime story to her students immediately following brain surgery? In retrospect, no, it's probably not terribly common," she laughed. "However, what has happened over the past few years that has been 'normal?'
"I just think literacy is so important and I wanted to impress upon my students that no matter what you have going on in your life, you always have time to read because reading is that important," she said.

Homecoming at Bethel Park fell a little earlier than usual this year as the annual high school tradition was held during the third full week of school.

The weekend brought hundreds of alumni and friends of Bethel Park back home. The weekend began with a parade from St. Valentine Catholic Church to the high school campus. The parade was followed by Bethel Park's football game versus Canon-McMillan (34-27, L); and an outdoor dance in the athletics parking lot on Saturday night.

This year's Homecoming Queen was Brooke Veith. Alecko Fekos was crowned King. Frank Visnikar and Anna Rosemeier were the Prince and Princess respectively.

# Bethel Park Hosts Gold Star Football Game 

In October, an obviously inspired Bethel Park football team beat West Allegheny, 26-10. However, the game will be remembered by anyone who was there more for what it represented than anything that happened on the scoreboard.

The teams were honored to have been chosen to participate in the Western Pennsylvania (WPA) Gold Star Games, a series of high school football games that serve to honor fallen military members from Western Pennsylvania. "When my brother died, someone said to me, 'You die twice,'" Tabay recalled. "'When you die, your soul leaves your body. But you're truly gone when your name is forgotten.'

Tabay organized four Western Pennsylvania (WPA) Gold Star Games this fall, including Bethel Park's matchup with West Allegheny.

The annual induction ceremony is typically held during basketball season. Unfortunately, the pandemic forced the postponement of last year's ceremony. The Bethel Park Athletic Hall of Fame Class of 2021 is expected be inducted during this year's basketball season.

A belated congratulations to our 2020 Inductees!
More about this year's inductees:

1) Alan Smith (Class of 1969) - A High School All-American Swimmer, who lettered on the Boy's Varsity Swim team from 1966-1969. He was a member of the 1969 PIAA Gold Medal 400 YD Freestyle Relay Team, as well as capturing three PIAA silver medals in the 200 YD \& 400 YD Freestyle events. He was also a 3X-WPIAL Champion in those same events. He set the school and pool record in three freestyle events, and two relay events, including setting the WPIAL Record in the 400 YD Freestyle Relay. He helped guide Bethel Park to four consecutive WPIAL titles (1966-1969). He swam collegiately at Kent State University, helping the Golden Flash capture its first MAC championship. As a prep coach, he guided St. Martin's to 24 Louisiana State Championships.
2) Doug Michalke (Class of 1971)-A four-year letter winner on the Boys Swim
 Team, he helped guide the Black Hawks to consecutive WPIAL titles in 1968 \& 1969. A 4X All-State and All-WPIAL selection, he captured a pair of PIAA Gold Medals in the 200 YD Individual Medley and the 400 YD Freestyle Relay. He set school records in six different events, and set the WPIAL Record in the 400 YD Freestyle Relay (with his teammate standing next to him). He went on to swim collegiately at the United States Naval Academy, where he was an NCAA Qualifier in both the 400 \& 800 YD Freestyle Relays. He has coached high school swimming in Atlanta for 30 years.
3) Van Richardson (Class of 1982) - A varsity football player (1979-1981), he helped guide Bethel Park to the WPIAL finals in 1980, a game in which he had a pick 6 for the Hawks. He was a 2X AllConference selection at linebacker. He was an All-WPIAL honoree by being named to the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette's prestigious Fabulous 22. He was also a 1981 2nd Team All-State selection. He played collegiately at WVU, serving as team captain in 1985, and guiding the Mountaineers to a pair of bowl wins.
4) Wes Richardson (Class of 1989) - Another force on the gridiron (1986-1988), he was a 2X AllConference Linebacker, as well as earning All-South Area accolades in 1988. He played collegiately at WVU, where he finished his career 13th on the All-Time Tackles list. In 1993, he guided the Mountaineers to their first ever Big East Championship, and earned a trip to the Sugar Bowl, while being named 2nd team All-Big East.
5) Danielle Gratton (Class of 2005) - She collected 7 varsity letters, three in volleyball and four in basketball. An All-WPIAL 2nd Team selection in volleyball, where she guided the team to a Section championship in 2004. It was on the hardwood where she carved out her legacy in Lady Hawks folklore. She tallied 1,122 career points, earning 2005 first team All-State accolades, as well as being selected as a member of the Post-Gazette All-WPIAL Fab 5, and the Tribune-Review's AllWPIAL Terrific 10. She led the Lady Hawks to the 2005 WPIAL title game, as well as back-to-back section titles. She played collegiately at both the University of IL and Ball State, helping the Lady Cardinals win their first ever MAC championship.
6) Adam Lazenga (Class of 2010) - A four-year starter in both varsity football and wrestling (2006-2010), he became one of the most decorated two-sport athletes in school history. In football he was a 3X All-Conference selection, earned All-WPIAL accolades as a member of the PostGazette Fabulous 22 and the Tribune-Review Terrific 25, was the 2009 Almanac Football MVP, and was selected as a member of the 2009 All-State Team. He helped lead the Black Hawks to back-toback conference titles, a trip to Hershey for the 2008 PIAA championship game, and capture the school's only WPIAL football championship. In wrestling, he earned 135 career wins, setting records for wins a season (45) and pins in a season with (30). He captured three individual section titles, a WPIAL silver medal, and was the 2010 WPIAL Heavyweight Champion. He twice placed at the state tournament including capturing a bronze medal in his senior campaign. He guided the wrestling team to its only WPIAL championship in 2009. He went on to play football at the University of Pittsburgh, where he twice was named to the All-Big East Academic Team.

Lily is also an exceptional student who currently carries a 4.574 GPA and was recently recognized as a National Merit Scholarship semifinalist, placing her in the top one percent of all American high school students. She has also earned the title of AP Scholar with Distinction, after scoring a 3 or higher on at least five AP exams, as well as having a minimum AP average of at least 3.5.

A cellist in the chamber orchestra, Gaston insists that playing in an ensemble is lot like being on a team. "You quickly realize that you are part of something much larger than yourself and you try your best to contribute in any way you can," said Gaston.

Lily also serves as the vice president of the National Honor Society (NHS) and as the presidential advisor of the Student Government Association (SGA).

Sixteen students were named AP Scholars with Distinction for receiving an average score of at least 3.5 on all AP Exams taken, with scores of 3 or higher on five or more of these exams. Six students were named AP Scholars with Honor for receiving an average score of at least 3.25 on all AP Exams taken, with scores of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams. ## Two Bethel Park High School Students Named National Merit Scholarship Semifinalists

Bethel Park High School seniors Lily Gaston and Oluwatoyosi Egbebi have each been selected as semifinalists in the 2022 National Merit Scholarship Program through the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. They represent less than one percent of the U.S. high school seniors and qualify to continue in the competition for National Merit Scholarships worth nearly $\$ 30$ million to be offered next spring.

These students were among the highest-scoring participants in Pennsylvania, and out of more than 1.5 million juniors in more than 21,000 high schools nationwide, who entered the program by taking the 2020 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, which is the initial screening for program entrants. The nationwide pool of semifinalists includes the highest-scoring entrants in each state.

To become a National Merit finalist, each semifinalist and his or her high school are required to complete a detailed
 application that provides information about the candidate's academic record; participation in school and community activities; leadership abilities; employment; and honors and awards received. Merit Scholar designees will be selected on the basis of their skills, accomplishments, and potential for success in rigorous college studies. A semifinalist must have an outstanding academic record, be endorsed and recommended by a high school official, write an essay, and have good SAT scores on the qualifying test.

Keelan Donovan, Davis Jakel and Macy Mathias also earned recognition from the program.

Ringgold saw several major accomplishments in Grimm's tenure including the 2018 Class 3A state baseball championship, WPIAL and PIAA diving championships and several other runners-up for WPIAL championships.

Prior to serving as Ringgold's athletic director, Grimm was the school's girls basketball coach.

Grimm is a 2010 graduate of Colgate University, where she also played basketball. A Pittsburgh native and Serra Catholic alum, Grimm Holds the Eagles' career records for points (1,940), three-point field goals (283), steals (391), and assists (497). She also led Serra Catholic to the 2005 Class 1A girls basketball state championship. Grimm was named first-team all-state honors in 2005 and 2006 and was named the 2005 Associated Press Pennsylvania State Player of the Year.

## Gorman Repeats as WPIAL Singles Tennis Champion



In September, in a match played at North Allegheny, Bethel Park's Mia Gorman repeated as the WPIAL Class 3A champion with a 6-1, 6-2 straight sets victory over Peters Township junior Kat Wang.

She hopes that the fourth time is the charm.

## Bethel Park Announces its Strategic Plan, 2021-2026

In October, Bethel Park Superintendent, Dr. James Walsh unveiled the district's five-year strategic plan to the board.

More than 80 Bethel Park residents, including school board members, administrators, staff, faculty, community members, parents, local business owners, and students contributed to the plan via their participation on the strategic plan steering committee, which began last spring and continued throughout the summer.

The larger group was divided into six subcommittees, each focusing on one topic to come up with a series of goals for the district. The subcommittees were: curriculum and instruction; the student experience; budget and finance; human resources; diversity, equity and inclusion; and facilities and infrastructure.

The groups spent a lot of time sharing their thoughts and ideas with each other and monitoring the best practices and emerging educational trends both locally and nationally.

The curriculum and instruction subcommittee has made improving student performance on state and national achievement tests one of their top priorities, including increasing the number of Bethel Park students taking and excelling in the Advanced Placement tests.

The student experience subcommittee to a universal approach to improving the learning outcomes for all students and to improve the school atmosphere through a series of measures. The student experience group also seeks to increase student and community engagement in the district to make sure students feel more connected, respected and valued.

As you can imagine, the budget and finance subcommittee's goals were more tangible. They sought to develop a metric to determine the return on investment for district spending and to develop a long-range budget plan for the district.

## IMS' Persi Presents Haitan-Inspired Metal Art Lesson at Prestigious Global Makers Day Virtual Conference

Ms. Nina Persi, an art teacher at Independence Middle School, recently presented at Global Maker Day, a worldwide celebration of learning in which makers from around the world discussed different projects, learning spaces, creations, art lessons, coding, 3D designs, etc. The virtual event was live streamed via YouTube Live.

Persi's presentation, Haitian-Inspired Metal Art, was decades in the making and was reflective of a deeply personal journey for the veteran art teacher that began in the Creole-speaking nation a little more than 20 years ago.
"Haiti is the poorest nation in the Western Hemisphere and whenever it is discussed in the news, it's never for positive reasons," she said. "It is always about natural disasters, scandals and other terrible tragedies."

Still, the Haiti Persi discovered was much more nuanced and complex than that. "I was blown away by the vibrancy of their arts scene, their music, the incredible people and their amazing culture," she said. "I have always felt an obligation as a teacher to share that unique perspective with my students."


Since that time, Persi has taught her students about Haitian arts and the rudimentary tools used to create such beautiful pieces. She has also revisited the tiny island nation and would love to return again.
"Everything in Haiti is handmade because electricity is so sporadic," she said. "The quality of the metal art, which is made from old steel drums, is incredible when you consider that they are doing it while using hand held tools like a ball-pein hammer, an awl, and chisels of various sizes."

Persi's students don't use those tools when creating their own Haitian-inspired art pieces. Instead they use tooling metal, which is like a heavy-duty aluminum foil. Then, to create designs and texture on the front and back of the metal, her students typically use items like bamboo skewers, plastic popsicle stick-like items, X-acto knives, and light sculpting tools used mostly for clay.

Still, to Persi, who said she intends to teach this lesson until she retires, the Haitian-Inspired Metal Art lesson provides students with valuable insight into what beauty human beings are capable of creating with even the most basic of tools. "Everything I share with my students can be picked up at the dollar store," she said. "And the creations they are able to make with those tools are just incredible. I just thought others should know about it as well."

Bethel Park School District has announced that assistant superintendent Dr. Janet O'Rourke, is retiring effective Jan. 1, 2022.
"Throughout my two plus decades in the Bethel Park School District I had the opportunity to work with many extraordinary people," said Dr. O'Rourke. "I was always proud to be a part of this community striving to do the best we can for the children of Bethel Park."

After graduating from South Fayette High School in 1985, O'Rourke earned her bachelor's degree in Elementary Early Childhood Education from California University of Pennsylvania. She also earned her master's degree (Elementary School Counseling) from CalU. O'Rourke earned her doctorate of education in Administration and Policy Studies from the University of Pittsburgh.

Dr. O'Rourke began her teaching career in Bethlehem-Center Middle School in Fredericktown, Pa., where she served as a middle school counselor. That allowed her to teach career readiness programs for students in sixth, seventh and eighth grades.

After five years at Beth-Center, O'Rourke earned her first administrative appointment as the assistant principal at South Butler School District's Knoch Middle School where she spearheaded that school's student advisory program.

In fall of 1999, O'Rourke joined Bethel Park School District first as an assistant principal and later as the principal. O'Rourke worked with parents and staff on building an excellent transitional school that married the best practices of an elementary program with the best attributes of a middle school program.

In 2012, Dr. O'Rourke was elevated to Director of Secondary Education. Four years later, she was again promoted, given the title of Assistant to the Superintendent for Human Resources, Evaluation and Assessment. During her tenure as a central office administrator, Dr. O'Rourke was able to collaborate with staff on a number of key initiatives that include STEAM principles, one-to-one technology initiative and she worked diligently to increase the number of mental health interventions available to students. Throughout O'Rourke's time in the district, she also collaborated with others to write a number of grants that brought in more than $\$ 350,000$ in educational funding.
"It has been a true honor and pleasure to serve the Bethel Park community for the past 22 years," she said. "Though I am looking forward to my retirement and my next chapter, Bethel Park will always occupy a major part of my heart."


## Student Support Services Director, Sutton Retires

In September, Lori Sutton retired as the Director of Special Services. Sutton began her career with the District as the Assistant Director of Special Education. She was promoted to the position of Director of Special Education in January of 2013 and held that position until her retirement earlier this fall.

Over the years, Lori was instrumental in the writing of the SRO, SPO and Safe Schools Initiatives Competitive Targeted Grants and the more recent ESSERS grants. She was a key player in Crisis Management and has supported students in the early college enrollment program. Annually, Lori coordinated and participated in the process of the Miranda Awards. She has been involved with numerous events at Pathfinder, Auberle and Watson and countless others.

In a series of public meetings held both in-person and virtually, Bethel Park School District Superintendent Dr. James Walsh and Assistant Superintendent, Dr. Zeb Jansante, recently presented Bethel Park's kindergarten through eighth grade facilities feasibility study. The year-long study conducted by Hayes Design Group Architects outlined four options for how to best move forward, all of which included a reconfiguration that will eventually return sixth grade students to Independence Middle School.
"The one message we need to make abundantly clear to everyone and which we keep repeating over and over again is that we must do something," said Dr. James Walsh. "Doing nothing is not an option."

Dr. Walsh explained that Bethel Park School District is well aware of the role modern facilities play in providing excellent learning spaces for the children of the community. As with owning a home, however, sooner or later, items need to be maintained, repaired, or replaced and for several Bethel Park facilities, that time has long since come.

According to Dr. Walsh, the School District has a number of high-priority facility needs that will require maintenance, repair, or replacement in the near future. Therefore, as part of the district's Strategic Plan, a comprehensive evaluation of its facilities was commissioned by the district to proactively plan for the future.

To help identify its needs, Bethel Park School District assembled a team of community volunteers who served on the Facilities Subcommittee. Due to the nature of the committee's work, these volunteers included people with diverse backgrounds in various areas and different ideas for how to address these imperatives.

The volunteers on the Facilities Subcommittee spent several months reviewing and discussing the state of Bethel Park School District's facilities and offered their input that is being used as part of the district's Master Facilities Plan. This included some of the facility-related capital projects that were identified in the Hayes Design Group Architects K-8 feasibility study.

The completed feasibility study, which can be found on the school district's website under the Facilities Planning tab on the left-hand side of the landing page, conclusively demonstrated the district's seven kindergarten through eighth grade buildings are all aging and in need of major investments for things like accessibility, heating and cooling modernization, electrical and sewage upgrades, fire safety and security improvements. Estimates to renovate all of the buildings varied from between $\$ 70$ million and $\$ 100$ million.

Other options being considered also include an elementary school redistricting plan as well as the potential creation of a modern elementary center. It is also important to note that more options could emerge as the process moves forward and more information becomes available.
"We have to address these issues now so that our buildings are not falling apart around the staff and students," Dr. Walsh said at one of the public meetings.
"We need to make sure that no matter what the board ultimately decides, we are giving our students their best chance to succeed as 21st Century learners while at the same time remaining faithful to our fiduciary responsibilities to our taxpayers and property owners," he said.

Dr. Walsh estimated that the loose timeline for any sort of reconfiguration would be at least 30 and 36 months and would involve lots of planning and a series of public meetings.

## Two Bethel Park Alums Selected in the MLB Draft



Over the summer, Bethel Park grads, and former teammates, Mason Miller (BPHS, '16) and Justin Meis (BPHS, '18) were each drafted by Major League Baseball teams. Miller went to Oakland in the third round (97th overall) while Meis was drafted by the hometown Pirates in the 10th round (283rd overall).

According to MLB.com, Miller's fastball can hit 99 mph and averages 95 mph . He also throws a slider and changeup. The 6 -foot- 5 righthanded pitcher had 24 strikeouts in 14 innings in winning both of his starts for Division III Waynesburg in the pandemic-shortened 2020 season. In 2021, as a graduate transfer, Miller led Division I GardnerWebb in innings ( 92 2/3) and had a 3.30 ERA and 121 strikeouts with 30 walks over 14 starts.

The right-handed Meis, who pitched collegiately at Eastern Michigan, became the first graduate of a WPIAL school taken by the Pirates in the first 10 rounds of the draft since Neil Walker was selected in the first round in 2014.

In 10 games this season for the Bradenton Marauders, the Pirates' Low-A affiliate, Meis went 1-1 and posted an excellent 2.04 ERA. Miller posted a 1.50 ERA in three appearances for the Athletics' rookie affiliate in the Arizona Complex League.

The two Bethel Park products were part of a larger story regarding the strength of WPIAL baseball as a total of seven former WPIAL players taken in the 20 -round draft that stretched over three days and was televised on MLB Network.

Miller noted that having two players drafted on the heels of a state baseball championship capped off a special year for Bethel Park baseball. "It's been a pretty notable year for Bethel Park," Miller said. "They have always had a competitive team, but haven't gotten the credit they've deserved. Winning the state championship was great."
