2 MR. MOURY: I would like to call to order
3 the regular council meeting of October 9, 2017.
4 Mr. Arbaugh, could we have a roll call?

5 MR. ARBAUGH: Colella?

6 MR. COLELLA: Here.

7 MR. ARBAUGH: Consolmagno?

8 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Here.

9 MR. ARBAUGH: Dixon?

10 MR. DIXON: Here.

11 MR. ARBAUGH: Gibbons?

12 MS. GIBBONS: Here.

13 MR. ARBAUGH: Hannan?

14 MR. HANNAN: Present.

15 MR. ARBAUGH: Harrison?

16 MR. HARRISON: Present.

17 MR. ARBAUGH: McLean?

18 MR. MCLEAN: Here.

19 MR. ARBAUGH: Moury?

20 MR. MOURY: Here.

21 MR. ARBAUGH: O'Brien?

22 MR. O'BRIEN: Present.

23 MR. MOURY: All members present. At this
24 time, please stand for the pledge of allegiance.

25 (Flag saluted.)

1 MR. MOURY: At this time, I would like to
2 turn to chair announcements to review the agenda.
3 An executive session of council was conducted on
4 September 25, 2017 for personnel issues.

5 An executive session of council was
6 conducted tonight, October 9, 2017, before we
7 came out for legal issues and personnel issues.

8 At this time, we turn to the library
9 director's report.

10 MS. MCINTOSH: Good evening, my name is
11 Christine, I am the director for your public
12 library. We provide services to perform, inspire
13 and enrich the community, and we have some
14 classes and seminars going on during the month of
15 October.

16 First, I want to tell you about the sensory
17 story time, which happens every Monday at 9:30,
18 10:00, 10:30 a.m. This is a special story time
19 that provides books, songs, movement and sensory
20 activities for children with sensory or auditory
21 issues. This is for ages 3 to 5, we do ask that
22 you register.

23 Adult craft and coffee class on Thursday,
24 October 12th at 7:00 p.m., where you will recycle
25 old paperback books into a pumpkin, it's very

1 cool. We will supply the old books, we ask that
2 you please bring scissors, if you have them. We
3 do ask that you register, we have limited space
4 for this program.

5 Geocaching for tweens and teens on
6 Saturday, October 14th from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.
7 This is presented by Venture Outdoors, and is
8 sponsored in part by the Allegheny Trust Fund.
9 Geocaching is like a target hunting game where
10 you use a GPS or GPS app on your phone to find
11 containers that other people have hidden. That
12 program is for grades 5 and up, again, we ask
13 that you register.

14 Suffrage and Sappho, 75 years of Wonder
15 Woman on Thursday, October 19th at 7:00 p.m.
16 This is presented by Wayne Wise, who is a writer,
17 artist and scholar here in Pittsburgh. Join us
18 for a presentation on the history of Wonder
19 Woman, the background story of her creation and
20 the ongoing story of her influence in comics and
21 in real world.

22 Affordable Care Act, are you eligible,
23 seminar will be on Saturday, October 21st at
24 2:00 p.m. Open enrollment for the Affordable
25 Care Act marketplace is November 1st through

1 December 15th. If you come to this seminar, you
2 will learn about eligibility, documents you may
3 need, how to fill out an application and how to
4 compare health plans. This seminar will be
5 presented by a certified ACA navigator.

6 We have a seminar on Urgent Care versus
7 Emergency Room on Tuesday, October 24th at
8 7:00 p.m. This is presented by MedExpress, where
9 you will learn about the different levels of care
10 that each facility is capable of providing to
11 help you determine when you should visit an
12 urgent care center and when you really need to go
13 to the emergency room.

14 One of my favorite programs for the year is
15 the Haunted Hat Tea for adults. This will take
16 place on Friday, October 27th at 11:00 a.m.
17 Experience the spirit of Halloween while enjoying
18 tea and finger sandwiches. Wear your craziest
19 hat. We will have some live musical
20 entertainment this year, and we will award a
21 prize for the most unusual Halloween hat. We do
22 ask that you register, and we ask for a \$5.00
23 donation to help offset the cost of the lunch.

24 The library will close at 5:00 p.m. on
25 Halloween, Tuesday the 31st, so enjoy trick or

1 treating with your little ones.

2 And that is all I have.

3 MR. MOURY: Any questions? Thank you, very
4 much.

5 We will turn to the police chief's report,
6 Chief O'Connor?

7 MR. O'CONNOR: Good evening, Mr. Mayor,
8 council. Hello everyone, chief here. I just
9 have one announcement real quick. Our crime
10 watch, as you know, is the first Monday of the
11 month. Next month is November 6th. We are going
12 to a 7:00 p.m. start time, from 6:30 to 7:00 p.m.
13 So give up the news, give up watching Jeopardy,
14 come to crime watch. Okay?

15 We now have -- we are going to have a
16 special ceremony. As you know, the police and
17 the medics and fire, we are a team here, and we
18 work together to try and keep everyone safe, our
19 residents and our shoppers and our visitors. But
20 we can't do it alone, and in August of this year,
21 we had a medical emergency up at Market District
22 Giant Eagle, and due to the swift actions of the
23 employees, we had a life save, and we want to
24 acknowledge that tonight in this special ceremony
25 for the first responders, the employees and a

1 very special person that we would like to have
2 come up now, Mr. Barozzini, come on up.

3 We are going to have Officer Sean McGrail
4 come up, because he was on the call, and we are
5 going to have Chief Nora come up. Chief Nora,
6 and we have Cheryl Rickens here, from Sudden
7 Cardiac Arrest Foundation.

8 MS. HELFRICH: Chuck and Todd.

9 MR. O'CONNOR: Whoever else you want to
10 come up, go on down there next to Sean McGrail.
11 And lastly, we would like to have come up
12 Mr. Christopher Adams, just stand over here next
13 to Cheryl. Thank you.

14 We are going to present awards from Bethel
15 Park Police Department to Mr. Adams, Patty
16 Oravetz and Josh Czemerda, who could not be here
17 tonight. What we are going to do is I will read
18 this citation off.

19 On Sunday, August 27th, Bethel Park Police
20 responded Giant Eagle Market District for reports
21 of unresponsive male. Upon arrival of officers,
22 Giant Eagle employees Christopher Adams, Josh
23 Czemerda and Patty Oravetz had already removed
24 the patient from his vehicle, began CPR and had
25 shocked him multiple times with the store's AED.

1 Upon arrival and treatment by Tri-Community
2 South Medics, a pulse was obtained and the
3 patient survived. Our department shift
4 supervisor reported he had never seen a more --
5 or been more impressed with a civilian response
6 to a medical emergency. Your heroic actions did
7 not go unnoticed, and Bethel Park Police
8 Department cannot succeed without the continued
9 assistance and support of citizens such as you.
10 So I would like to present this certificate to
11 you.

12 (Applause.)

13 MR. O'CONNOR: And then, I am going to hand
14 this over to Chief Nora.

15 MS. HELFRICH: Did you notice I got
16 promoted? Well, we are very honored to have you
17 here this evening, and for your efforts. The
18 other thing I would like everybody to know,
19 Cheryl and I serve on Sudden Cardiac Arrest
20 Association, and she came this evening to help
21 with the presentations, but the vice president of
22 Giant Eagle contacted me, he was going to try and
23 be here this evening also, because he is very
24 active and on the board of directors for the
25 American Heart Association.

1 I don't know if you know that, and he is
2 very proud of the employees of Giant Eagle, and
3 they take that very seriously. So
4 congratulations.

5 The other little tid bit was we had an off
6 duty EMT there that day who was shopping, and he
7 went out to offer the three Giant Eagle employees
8 some assistance, and they told him no, and he
9 said they were doing such a great job, I said oh,
10 keep going. So you had it all going on there,
11 buddy. That's why you're here today. As the
12 chief said, we couldn't do this if we all didn't
13 work together.

14 In 1992 is when we started this program
15 with the police department, and they were the
16 first, as I have told you before, trained in the
17 use of the AED, CPR and oxygen. So see? And
18 hopefully next month -- we another save, in case
19 you don't know that, we are very proud of.
20 Cheryl, do you want to do the presentations, and
21 I will hand out the pins?

22 MS. RICKENS: Thank you, everybody, for
23 your time, and thank you for having us. Just
24 real quickly, this award award is from the
25 Suddenaward Cardiac Arrest Association. So the

1 Sudden Cardiac Arrest Association, this is a
2 certificate of heroism, little hard for me to say
3 this late in the day, to Christopher and your two
4 fellow employees.

5 And on the certificate, it has the chain of
6 survival, and that's kind of how you think about
7 the team work that was done. They have to
8 recognize that there was an event, and they had
9 to take action, and that's what you did.
10 Sometimes that's the hardest thing to do. And
11 they weren't bystanders, they were responders.
12 They recognized an event and they responded to
13 it, they took action, and that's what we hope
14 everybody is willing to do.

15 So called 911, started early CPR and used
16 their AED, their defibrillator, early
17 defibrillation. Early CPR, early defibrillation
18 makes a difference, and anybody can do that. So
19 I do advocate taking a CPR class, chest
20 compression only CPR, it's easy, so take a class
21 and learn how easy that is to do. And then
22 because they called 911, the professionals came,
23 first responders, your police officers, your fire
24 department, trained in first aid CPR, use of an
25 AED, they carry an AED. And of course, your EMS

1 came, EMTs, paramedics, and because of all that
2 team work, we have a patient that's viable, that
3 can get to the hospital and get the appropriate
4 care with urgent care, and then recovery and
5 rehab.

6 And I know it seems silly to celebrate a
7 survivor, but you are in a very elite club,
8 because there is not many percentage of survivors
9 of sudden cardiac arrest that get to be here to
10 be celebrated.

11 So it's because of team work, team work of
12 everybody, not just the ones up here, but
13 everybody behind the scenes, too, everybody
14 sitting here that we get to be here to do this.
15 So we have a certificate.

16 MS. HELFRICH: And, your honorary
17 Lifesaver. We give this to everyone. Thank you,
18 very much.

19 MS. RICKENS: There is a pin that we hand
20 out, and I would like to wear it.

21 MS. HELFRICH: This is Mr. Barozzini's.

22 MS. RICKENS: For the police officer, this
23 is a nationally approved, as long as your
24 supervisor also approves, uniform pin, it's a bar
25 pin.

1 And yours says survivor.

2 (Applause.)

3 MR. BAROZZINI: I would like to thank Chris
4 and fellow employees and the police officers and
5 all the EMT personnel involved. I wouldn't be
6 here today if they hadn't been so quick and
7 knowledgeable and took this action to help me,
8 and I will always be sincerely grateful to them,
9 and anything I can do for them, I will.

10 I would like to thank the president and the
11 mayor and all the council members for allowing me
12 to make this congratulatory note to everybody,
13 and thank you, very much.

14 (Applause.)

15 MS. HELFRICH: Chuck and Todd were the
16 medics on the cardiac arrest, so we are going to
17 give you Patty's, don't eat her Lifesaver. We
18 gave everybody a little Lifesaver. Cheryl came
19 up with that idea years ago, but they fight over
20 the Lifesavers.

21 Thank you, again.

22 MR. O'CONNOR: Thank you all.

23 (Applause.)

24 MR. MOURY: Thank you, very much. That's a
25 tough act to follow.

1 Mr. Harrison?

2 MR. HARRISON: I would like to -- I wanted
3 to say -- hey, Nora, I want to thank you for your
4 organization, the one about the -- I read a very
5 good article and recognized and wanted to thank
6 you.

7 MS. HELFRICH: What Mr. Harrison is
8 referring to is we participate in a lot of
9 studies, and I was asked by the University of
10 Pittsburgh to research lifting and lifting
11 techniques and equipment. And the medic that was
12 also on this call that was off duty is off on his
13 honeymoon right now, Steve Britton, and he was
14 put in charge of that for me. And Gem's
15 magazine, which is published all over the world,
16 featured Tri-Community for it being innovative,
17 for the equipment that we purchased to make their
18 job easier, and we were recognized for that. So
19 thank you for bringing that up.

20 And don't forget, we have free flu shots on
21 the 18th at our EMS base from 12:00 until noon
22 for the residents of Bethel Park. 12:00 to 4:00.
23 Okay. I am having a bad day today. Thank you,
24 very much.

25 MR. MOURY: Thank you. Now, the fire chief

1 report.

2 MR. KELTON: Hello. Good evening,
3 everybody. My name is Captain Tom Kelton with
4 the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company. I'll
5 read off the calls for September 2017, the month,
6 we had 43 calls. That includes two fires, one
7 fully active, four smoke investigations, two
8 excessive heat conditions, seven electrical
9 conditions, three gas leaks, one water condition,
10 one hazmat investigation, one call with people
11 trapped in an elevator, four calls to assist the
12 police department, 12 fire alarms and two field
13 alarms.

14 I want to thank everybody, yesterday was
15 our annual open house at the fire station. We
16 would like to thank the public for coming out and
17 supporting us, as well as council members we
18 noticed there, as well. Special thanks to True
19 Value Hardware, they put out a display showing
20 off fire sensors, smoke detectors. Shop 'n Save
21 donated hot dog buns for us, Bethel Bakery passed
22 out cookies, 1-800-BOARDUP brought down a door
23 simulator to help us simulate how we force open
24 doors. Columbia Gas and the Bethel Park
25 Community Foundation worked together and got 300

1 smoke detectors, we passed out actually 330, and
2 they were gone by 1:30. We had such a strong
3 turn out for that, we are going to try to get
4 some more in the future, as well.

5 The police department came down,
6 Tri-Community EMS, Upper Saint Clair Fire
7 Department donated some things for us to use for
8 fire extinguisher safety, and we had MedFirst
9 down there as well passing out some information.
10 Thank you for everybody that helped out, you made
11 the day a big success.

12 Over the last couple months, last month and
13 a half or so, we have had a lot of people closing
14 up their pools. With that, we have had a couple
15 calls about chlorine, people mixing chemicals
16 improperly. Make sure you always read the labels
17 on your pool chemicals and do as the label tells
18 you. Mixing pool chemicals can cause a violent
19 explosion and give serious burns to the person
20 and to their lungs and body. If you're going to
21 mix it up ahead of time, dissolve any pool shock
22 chemicals. You need to fill a five gallon bucket
23 with water from the pool, and slowly pour the
24 granular pool shock in the bucket of water. You
25 never want to add the water to the chemical,

1 always add the chemical to the water. So make
2 sure you always read the labels ahead of time and
3 do as the labels tell you to.

4 With that, that is the end of the fire
5 report.

6 MR. MOURY: Any questions? Can we turn to
7 the mayor's report? Mayor Allen.

8 MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you. Tom, before you
9 leave, as many of you know or you don't know,
10 this is the 90th birthday of the fire department,
11 the Bethel Park Fire Department, so I have a
12 proclamation for them, let me read this.

13 Whereas, the Bethel Park Fire Company was
14 incorporated and opened its doors and started
15 providing fire and rescue protection to the
16 residents of Bethel Park, previously named Bethel
17 Township, on July 27, 1927.

18 Whereas, the population of Bethel Township
19 in 1927 was approximately 5,400 people. At the
20 time, Bethel Township was made up of mainly coal
21 mines and farm lands. Then, the fire department
22 had 11 members, and their first truck was a not
23 quite fully equipped Model T.

24 And whereas, by 1950, Bethel Township had
25 become Bethel Park, and the population was a

1 little more than 11,000.

2 And whereas, the Bethel Park Fire Company
3 expanded to two stations in the mid 1960s, and
4 then to three stations by the early 1970s.

5 Whereas, the Bethel Park Fire Company now
6 protects 32,000 residents of Bethel Park and has
7 three stations and 70 members.

8 And whereas, the Bethel Park Fire Company
9 has remained 100 percent volunteer for 90 years.

10 And whereas, the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire
11 Company now protects several shopping districts,
12 the largest includes South Hills Village Mall and
13 Village Square Mall, several strip malls, 77
14 eight story apartment/office buildings, several
15 large medical office complexes and industrial
16 complex and the Port Authority Light Rail transit
17 hub.

18 And whereas, it's appropriate to recognize
19 the value of the accomplishments of the Bethel
20 Park Volunteer Fire Company by designating Bethel
21 Park Volunteer Fire Company Day.

22 Now, therefore, I, mayor Jack Allen,
23 Municipality of Bethel Park, hereby declare this
24 day as the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Department
25 Day. So thank you, very much.

1 (Applause.)

2 MAYOR ALLEN: Pass that on to your chief.
3 I just had a couple items. First, I wanted to
4 thank all the people that helped last Friday with
5 our 90 plus luncheon for the residents that are
6 90 years of age and older. We had about 80
7 people there, with probably 20, 25 care givers,
8 but there were a lot of people who showed up that
9 are 90. In fact, the oldest person will turn 100
10 in February, so she gets a special luncheon next
11 year.

12 We also have our annual fall clean-up
13 program, which is October 21st. If you're
14 interested, contact Janet Davin at extension 211
15 at the municipal building, and she will give you
16 the details on the areas and so on.

17 The last thing I had, I wanted to bring up
18 a person that spearheaded a program last year,
19 Diane Ford, and it was for collecting -- she will
20 tell you about the program, and how many people
21 and households that this young lady took care of
22 last year. So she will give you the details.

23 MS. FORD: Good evening, everybody. So
24 last year, we found out about two families who
25 needed food, and so I told my sister about it,

1 who is a nurse at the high school, and I said
2 there has to be more people who need some food.
3 We wanted to do something to help people with
4 that. So the nurses throughout the school
5 district came up with 17 other families that
6 needed assistance with food, and so we began to
7 collect up names and -- well, I didn't get
8 information about names, but they did, because
9 that's private, but we began to reach out to the
10 community and people started coming in droves,
11 just bringing donated food, goods and items
12 down at the church on Cherry Street, Bethel
13 Baptist.

14 And so we were able to be a blessing to 19
15 families and feed 19 families who -- we know that
16 there are other organizations in the community
17 that exist, but for whatever reason, they did not
18 want their information out there. There is a lot
19 of privacy associated with that. Sometimes
20 people feel ashamed to be in a position of need.
21 So we were able to be a blessing to them, and we
22 got donated items from a number of different
23 businesses, and a whole bunch of families, like
24 kids, like school kids and their parents came
25 down and gave donated goods. It was such a

1 blessing.

2 So this year, for our second year, we want
3 to do the same thing, but we know that there are
4 other families, that there may be more families,
5 and we want the community to come out like we
6 have for all the disasters all across the
7 country, but we want the community to come out to
8 take care of our own and make sure that there is
9 nobody in Bethel Park that is going to go hungry
10 for Thanksgiving.

11 The blessing is, and I know that we can
12 already count on everybody, and we just want to
13 tell you on November 18th, that is the Saturday
14 before Thanksgiving, we are going to collect
15 donations again at Bethel Baptist Church, 2899
16 Cherry Street, right here in Bethel Park, it's in
17 Cloverdale, for those who play softball, and
18 bring your food down there between 10:00 and
19 2:00, and on Sunday, we have a group of people
20 who will distribute to the families. And it's
21 all private, so it's nobody's business who needs,
22 just know that there is a need.

23 Oh, and if you want to help, feel free to
24 contact me, and how can I give them -- just say
25 my -- call Jack.

1 (Applause.)

2 MAYOR ALLEN: Actually, I will tell her
3 call Janet Davin at 412-831-6800, extension 211,
4 and it was a great time last year and we helped a
5 lot of people, and we are looking forward to
6 doing it again.

7 And by the way, since the drop off date is
8 November 18th, I will remind everyone again next
9 month at the meeting. So -- and that's all.
10 Thank you.

11 MR. MOURY: Thank you, very much, Mayor.
12 At this time, I would like to turn to the
13 municipal manager's report, Mr. Arbaugh.

14 MR. ARBAUGH: Thank you. Good evening. I
15 am Sean Arbaugh, municipal manager, just want to
16 go over a few things real quickly. Columbia Gas,
17 they are starting to wrap up, I know there has
18 been a bunch of different rumors out there, but
19 the two projects they have going on are the large
20 project and small project. The large project is
21 from the Washington Junction regulator station
22 down through Bethel Church Road, which is
23 contributing to the Bethel Church Road being
24 closed. They did have a piping issue there, they
25 had to re-bury about 300 foot of pipe that was

1 too shallow, we had to dig down a little deeper.
2 That has been completed. They have almost
3 completed milling operations out there, so that
4 should be completed here this week. Paving
5 operations should begin maybe starting tomorrow.
6 So that road should definitely be open between
7 October 25th and 30th. So that we did confirm
8 that with the paving contractor and that is a
9 good time frame.

10 For the small project, they are still --
11 they still have some work to go on Hillcrest and
12 Marshall, so they will still be doing some work
13 on those streets. They need to replace about
14 3,000 foot of pipe, they will be contacting those
15 residents once they get a plan in place for that.

16 So thank you for your patience through this
17 operation. I hope this is the last time I have
18 to update anybody on Columbia Gas, as they should
19 be done prior to the next meeting. Also, as far
20 as paving goes, we are wrapping up our paving
21 program. We are currently finishing the last few
22 streets on Milford Drive, Maryland Drive, 2nd
23 Street, Mesta Street and Cork Street, so we are
24 hoping the operations are going on there, and
25 after they have finished the milling and paving

1 operations, they are going to come back and do
2 the restoration work which will include
3 backfilling behind the curb, replanting some
4 grass seed and fixing any driveways that may have
5 damage.

6 Also, just a reminder that leaf collection
7 starts next Monday, October 16th, and will be on
8 your regular trash day. That will go for six
9 weeks. Make sure you fill up the leaf bags that
10 they sell at some of the local stores and put
11 them out with your regular trash for the next six
12 weeks, excluding Thanksgiving.

13 Any questions? Thank you.

14 MR. MOURY: Hearing none, let's turn to the
15 agenda. For those here this evening, approving
16 the minutes has been removed for the September
17 11th meeting, will be hopefully put back on at
18 the next month.

19 At this time, I would like to turn to the
20 approval of the bills and pay rolls. Mr. Hannan?

21 MR. HANNAN: I move that we approve the
22 bills and pay rolls for the municipality per Bill
23 List No. 100917, in the amount of \$4,075,809.80.

24 MS. GIBBONS: Second.

25 MR. MOURY: There is a motion and second

1 that we approve the bills and pay rolls for the
2 municipality per Bill List No. 100917 in the
3 amount of \$4,075,809.80. Any discussion of this
4 item?

5 Mr. Arbaugh, would you please call a roll?

6 MR. ARBAUGH: Colella?

7 MR. COLELLA: Yes.

8 MR. ARBAUGH: Consolmagno?

9 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Yes.

10 MR. ARBAUGH: Dixon?

11 MR. DIXON: Yes.

12 MR. ARBAUGH: Gibbons?

13 MS. GIBBONS: Yes.

14 MR. ARBAUGH: Hannan?

15 MR. HANNAN: Yes.

16 MR. ARBAUGH: Harrison?

17 MR. HARRISON: Yes.

18 MR. ARBAUGH: McLean?

19 MR. MCLEAN: Yes.

20 MR. ARBAUGH: Moury?

21 MR. MOURY: Yes.

22 MR. ARBAUGH: O'Brien?

23 MR. O'BRIEN: Yes.

24 MR. MOURY: Motion passes. Is there anyone
25 here for the resident comment section for

1 non-agenda items? Hearing none, can we turn to
2 general policy and finance, Mr. McLean, and we
3 have no residents signed up to speak.

4 MR. MCLEAN: Thank you, Mr. President. The

6 registration of foreclosed properties. I move
7 that we approve Ordinance No. 10-9-17A,

9 the purpose, intent and applicability, requiring
10 the registration and maintenance of certain real
11 property by mortgagees, providing for penalties
12 and enforcements, as well as the regulation
13 limitation and reduction of registerable property
14 within the Municipality of Bethel Park.

19 and administration departments. Any discussion
20 of this item?

18 MR. MOURY: Are there any additional items.
19 MR. HARRISON: Mr. Moury?
20 MR. MOURY: Mr. Harrison?
21 MR. HARRISON: Council members continue to
22 unsuccessfully campaign to besmirch my character.
23 At the September 12th meeting, I spoke about the
24 treatment, maybe I should refer to as
25 mistreatment, I have been subjected to, to this

1 day, from over 44 years as a council member.

2 Last month, I spoke about being removed as
3 the chairman of the council safety committee
4 after two months of service, and being sued by
5 council, who claimed that I stole information
6 from the police department. The lawsuit lasted
7 seven years and had an adverse effect on my
8 wife's health. The case made its way through
9 Common Pleas Court and Commonwealth Court, and
10 council lost in both courts. The -- both courts
11 recognized the action to be petty politics.

12 Unfortunately, the politically motivated
13 lawsuit cost the Bethel Park taxpayers
14 approximately \$200,000. A more recent incident
15 is my being incorrectly referred to as a law
16 violator by O'Brien for parking at the veteran's
17 plaza. That resulted in me getting a parking
18 violation ticket. My parking there is not a
19 violation. O'Brien should do his homework before
20 making incorrect claims. After being exonerated
21 of the parking ticket, a Bethel Park Police
22 sergeant left a handwritten note under my
23 windshield wiper directing me to contact him.

24 The sergeant showed up at my door sometime
25 later and asked if I received the note. My

1 answer was yes. He asked me why I ignored the
2 note. My response was, who is your boss? He
3 said, I don't understand the question. After
4 reciting that conversation a couple times, I told
5 him that everybody has a boss. He became
6 extremely agitated and started off the porch.
7 That ended that bit of political harassment.

8 Did I mention petty politics earlier?
9 These actions are intended to besmirch my
10 reputation. I welcome these comments, and I
11 often thank council for the comments. My few
12 friends from the public after these comments have
13 fabled me, and infer to council members as being
14 petty and nasty.

15 After I spoke on the September 12th
16 meeting, Moury could hardly wait to pass the
17 gavel, which he routinely does after I speak.
18 After he speaks his toxic opinion about me, some
19 of his minions pile on with supporting comments.
20 O'Brien ended the discussion -- the discussion at
21 the September meeting by stating that I had no
22 friends among the elected officials. I didn't
23 have the opportunity to respond to this comment
24 at that time because of the Robert's Rules of
25 Order that we attempt to abide by.

1 My response is that I was elected to
2 represent the public based on the law, and not on
3 developing friendships among the elected
4 officials by going along to get along. I have
5 spoken many times of the fact that my mother
6 employed adages and folklore to develop my moral
7 compass. One of the sayings is don't befriend
8 people who violate the law because it may lead to
9 trouble.

10 My fellow council members violated the
11 constitution of Bethel Park and the Home Rule
12 Charter by casting an affirmative vote to put the
13 Bethel Park Fire Company argument on the primary
14 ballot a couple years ago. The timing of the
15 vote was a violation, therefore, these council
16 members did it to the proof that my mother warned
17 me about. Their illegal vote was not from lack
18 of knowledge of the Home Rule Charter
19 restrictions, it was a matter of record that I
20 recited at the time of the vote that the section
21 of the Home Rule Charter was being violated by
22 the inappropriate vote. It was a blatant act of
23 disrespect of the Home Rule Charter on their
24 part.

25 Even Moury and his minions claim that their

1 vote was okay based on a flukey ruling by
2 McTiernan. McTiernan's opinion was issued
3 several weeks after the voting. How could the
4 council members know the separate ruling would be
5 issued by McTiernan unless the back room gang was
6 informed that he would provide cover for them if
7 the illegal vote was questioned? Which I did.

8 I will continue to conduct my actions in
9 accordance with the excellent guidance provided
10 by my mother. I believe my mother is looking
11 down from heaven right now and saying, that's my
12 boy. Thank you, mom.

13 Now that I have the floor, I want to
14 address one issue. Before I yield the floor, I
15 want to remind you that on November the 7th, on
16 your ballots, the Home Rule Charter will be on
17 the ballot. You'll have a chance to vote on it.
18 These changes are what I call housekeeping, and I
19 recommend that you cast a yes vote on all the
20 changes.

21 Council discussed including another change
22 to the Home Rule Charter, but decided to wait
23 until later to put the change on the ballot, on a
24 future ballot. The proposed change will modify
25 the section of Home Rule Charter that council

1 violated, as discussed above. The proposed
2 change will destroy the effectiveness of that
3 section of the Home Rule Charter. The section of
4 the Home Rule Charter being discussed has been
5 effectively used six times to overturn several
6 council actions that was judged to be deleterious
7 to the Bethel Park citizens.

8 That history is an adequate reason of
9 support for the intent of the section of the Home
10 Rule Charter as it has existed from the origin of
11 the Home Rule Charter. I allege that council
12 chose to not put the question on that primary
13 ballot because of my stated objection of the
14 adverse effect to the public. I allege that the
15 hope of council members was that I would not be
16 around in the future to alert the public of the
17 adverse effects.

18 As long as the powers above allow me to
19 stay on, I will continue to keep the public
20 informed of any such adverse council -- adverse
21 actions by council. Thank you.

22 MR. HANNAN: Mr. Moury?

23 MR. MOURY: I am not going to get into most
24 of what he said, it's simply not true. The
25 lawsuits, none of us were on council. Why we go

1 back 40, 50 years is beyond me, but I would like
2 to provide a copy of an e-mail that was sent out.
3 I don't normally like to do this, but I feel it
4 important to correct the record.

5 Last month, Mr. Harrison made accusations
6 about an e-mail he sent out and that nobody
7 talked to him, and potentially his illegal
8 actions. His comment, it says to my knowledge,
9 McTiernan never saw my e-mail, inferring that I,
10 or a member of council, chose to distribute it to
11 the solicitor. I will share with Mr. Harrison a
12 comment of the e-mail that he sent, and I will be
13 awaiting your apology next month, because you,
14 Mr. Harrison, actually sent the e-mail that -- to
15 the solicitor.

16 When you responded, you copied him. You
17 sat up here and told everybody that you don't
18 know how it happened. That is a copy of the
19 e-mail, so I will certainly be awaiting my
20 response, and I am sure it will be a long time,
21 of his apology. Thank you.

22 MR. HANNAN: Mr. O'Brien?

23 MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Chairman?

24 MR. MOURY: Mr. O'Brien?

25 MR. O'BRIEN: I also commented last month

1 that I asked Mr. Harrison to help us, to help
2 this community, to help this country, and help
3 this state. There are many, many things, he can
4 take his energy and his passion and his ability,
5 because he is a very able man, a very bright man,
6 to take this passion and dig in and try and help.
7 Some of those issues in our country today are
8 heroin and opiates, climate change, how it would
9 effect Bethel Park, what would we do and what
10 should we be prepared for?

11 Our recreation initiative that we have in
12 front of us, it's millions of dollars, how do we
13 fund it? Can we find a way? Our storm sewers
14 and our sewer programs, the problems we are
15 having within our infrastructure, how about the
16 sidewalk program again, Don, you were so
17 passionate about it once a long time ago, how
18 about digging into that again? How about the
19 recreation donation fund, how about that
20 wonderful project the school has, arts, so many
21 wonderful things you could spend your time
22 instead of reminiscing through history.

23 This is not past, Don, this is present and
24 the future. You need to get along with the
25 program, or move aside.

1 Thank you, Chairman.

2 MR. MOURY: Hearing none, I would like
3 to --

4 MR. MCLEAN: Sorry, I have one additional
5 item. I just wanted to -- for the benefit of the
6 residents and voters in the upcoming election, on
7 November 7th, there will actually be five
8 questions on the ballot, in addition to the votes
9 for the offices that are up for election. One of
10 those is a proposed amendment to the Pennsylvania
11 Constitution, but the four other questions that
12 will be on the ballot in Bethel Park relate to
13 amendments of proposed amendments to the Bethel
14 Park Charter.

15 I just wanted to give folks an overview of
16 what they are so they have some idea before they
17 get into the voting booth as to what those
18 questions are. The first is the Charter
19 currently says that when we have our
20 organizational meeting every two years, it has to
21 start at 8:00, which was the time that meetings
22 did begin when the Charter was originally adopted
23 in the mid '70s. And so we are proposing that
24 the Charter be amended to allow the time for the
25 meeting to be set more consistently with the time

1 that we begin meetings now.

2 We also want to provide for the fact that
3 sometimes that first Monday, when we have the
4 organizational meeting is a holiday, and we just
5 wanted to clarify that the Charter should
6 automatically provide that that meeting will take
7 place on the next business day.

8 The second proposed amendment is there is a
9 comprehensive plan that the municipality is
10 supposed to review, currently, the Charter says
11 every five years. That has turned out to be a
12 relatively short period of time and a little
13 expensive, because we have to pay every five
14 years to look at a comprehensive plan. It's
15 proven unnecessary. State law says we have to do
16 it every ten years, so the second proposal is to
17 change the Charter to provide that we can do the
18 comprehensive plan every ten years instead of
19 five.

20 The third change is that budgets are
21 currently required under the Charter to be
22 provided to council by September 1st. Experience
23 is showing that's pretty early in the year, and
24 we have to make changes to the budget before it's
25 adopted. So the change is simply to allow the

1 manager to present us with the budget by
2 September 30th, which allows more of the events
3 to occur during the year.

4 The final question is related, and that has
5 to do with the capital program, currently it says
6 that has to be submitted two months before the
7 budget. Again, that's very early in the year
8 when things are still being developed, so the
9 proposed change is to change it from two months
10 to one month.

11 We have placed on the website for folks who
12 are interested a summary of the questions that
13 will be on the ballot, with the backgrounds, and
14 you're welcome to review it so that you're
15 informed before you go into the voting booth on
16 November 7th. Those are the four questions.
17 There may be some other amendments that will be
18 proposed, but it was council's determination that
19 four is enough, four is enough questions for the
20 voters to consider when they go into the voting
21 booth at one time.

22 I urge everyone, don't give up on the
23 ballot before you get to the end. Stick with the
24 ballot and get to the questions, and if you agree
25 with those changes, then you should vote yes.

1 Thank you.

2 MR. MOURY: Thank you, Mr. McLean. At this
3 time, can we turn to planning and zoning.
4 Mr. Dixon? We have no residents signed up to
5 speak.

6 MR. DIXON: Thank you, Mr. President. I
7 have several items tonight for the planning and
8 zoning. The first is Ordinance No. 10-9-17C,

12 MR. MOURY: Thank you, Mr. O'Brien.

13 MR. COLELLA: Mr. Moury, if I may,
14 Mr. O'Brien, just to echo what Mr. O'Brien said
15 earlier, when we have this opportunity as council
16 members to do good and positive things for the
17 community, I would like to mention a program that
18 not only I was a part of, but my wife had helped
19 run and orchestrate, it's called Adopt a Family
20 South Hills.

21 And just a brief overview, it's a totally
22 anonymous program, similar to what the lady had
23 spoken about earlier as far as the Thanksgiving.
24 What it is, it pairs needy families in the South
25 Hills Area with individuals or families that are

1 looking to help someone fulfill their family's,
2 kids' Christmas lists that may be in need.

3 Last year, we were able to help 47
4 families, totaling 96 individuals. And it's a
5 wonderful program, totally anonymous, there is
6 really no requirements, anything that any
7 individual or family can do is greatly
8 appreciated. I will just give you a little bit
9 of contact information for those of you that
10 would be interested in participating, it's Adopt
11 a Family South Hills, there is -- the program is
12 on Facebook, Adopt a Family South Hills, there is
13 a website, adoptafamilysouthhills@outlook.com,
14 and for those of you that that would like to
15 contact Pam, my wife, who runs the program, her
16 number is 412-360-9658.

17 It's a wonderful program, and for those of
18 you that have actively participated, not only
19 last year, in the years past, it really does
20 bring a lot of joy to those that need some help
21 at Christmas Time and the holidays.

22 Thank you.

23 MR. MOURY: Thank you, Mr. Colella. Any
24 other discussion?

25 MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Chairman?

1 MR. MOURY: Mr. O'Brien?

2 MR. O'BRIEN: I would just like to take a
3 few moments to talk about yesterday. October 8,
4 2017, I went to the grand opening of the
5 Schoolhouse Arts & History Center, and as I heard
6 the information, I forgot a lot of it, and some I
7 didn't really even know, but in 1905, that was
8 the first school, and it grew from there, all the
9 way to a point where the school district wanted
10 to demolish it, and that brought a little bit of
11 heartache.

12 It's such a beautiful building. To see --
13 I was here when it became given to the historical
14 society, but it kind of stayed the same for so
15 many years and it struggled, but it still
16 survived. So that's a wonderful thing.

17 Yesterday was a rebirth to watch Bethel
18 Park rally around this old girl and make her new
19 again, it's going to be just absolutely
20 beautiful. As much as they have done since the
21 time that I walked in here when Mr. Moury had
22 this idea, and frankly, I'm just absolutely
23 amazed at his vision, to bring it where it is
24 today. And he went back to some old friends, you
25 know, John Marr, he has also been a friend of

1 Bethel Park, very quiet, behind the scenes, he
2 brought a tremendous amount of money to help
3 kick start this, and we always want to say thank
4 you to him.

5 And then the fundraising and then the
6 donors, the people of Bethel Park that always
7 come through in a pinch, and then there is the
8 people with Tim, Bill and Suzie and Skip and all
9 this group of volunteers that just put this thing
10 together. And I have got -- a special day is I
11 got to meet John and Maggie Schmotzer, I hear the
12 jingle on the radio all the time about Maggie,
13 and they are the ones that helped bring the
14 wonderful -- the windows at a great price to the
15 building. And just the excitement, the joy that
16 people had there, and there was people that
17 weren't even from Bethel, just to save a little
18 bit of history.

19 As you walk through the place, there is all
20 these yearbooks from the day of Bethel Park's
21 beginning all the way up until today, and through
22 a little bit of investigating, I found a picture
23 of a young man, Timothy Moury, in one of those
24 yearbooks.

25 MR. MOURY: That was the 1990 yearbook.

1 MR. O'BRIEN: That's Mr. and Mrs. Moury's
2 baby boy. He was kind of a cute kid. I just
3 wanted to say thanks again, and thanks to this
4 group, and thanks for the day. I was surely
5 honored to be a part of it and to be there and
6 watch people come in and out for a period of a
7 couple hours just amazed and wanting to help, and
8 yeah, it is truly, really a great thing.

9 Thank you, Mr. Moury.

10 MR. MOURY: Thank you, Mr. O'Brien. I just
11 want to thank the community for all the support
12 they have given the historical society. Many
13 people up here have been a big part of it, but
14 most of all, the people in the historical
15 society. We are over 80 members right now,
16 Tuesday and Thursday nights and Saturday
17 mornings, if you're looking for something to do,
18 there is still a lot of work. Please show up, we
19 have a lot of work to do, but we really do have
20 just a great start.

21 If you want to check us out on Facebook,
22 look up Bethel Park Historical Society. A lot of
23 our members go post there, does a lot in keeping
24 it up to date. There is new pictures practically
25 every day. We have the former president of the

1 historical society here, Jay Wells, and there was
2 a lot of people over the years that had a vision
3 for the building in 1996 when it was deeded over
4 to the historical society, that really kept it
5 going.

6 And this is just going towards the next
7 generation of people, and it truly is a wonderful
8 project. It's going to continue. We are
9 starting a paver campaign to re-pave the
10 governor's driveway, they are selling pavers for
11 \$100 that will be engraved. But check us out on
12 Facebook, it truly is a great project, and I
13 encourage you to stop by Tuesdays and Thursday
14 nights from 6:00 to 8:00, and Saturdays from 8:00
15 to 1:00 if you're looking for something to do.

16 Thank you, very much.

17 Mr. Consolmagno?

18 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: As I sit here tonight,
19 and this whole time I was on the council, I think
20 of all the good, positive things that was just
21 said tonight in our community, Mark bringing up
22 about the historical society and the building
23 that Tim is working on with Bill and Susan, and
24 what the chief and the EMS people handed out
25 tonight, what Diane Ford is doing for

1 Thanksgiving, you talk about all the trouble
2 that's in this country, just look at what we got
3 going on in Bethel Park.

4 A lot more positive things are happening in
5 this community than anywhere else, and I am proud
6 to be on this council and working with these
7 individuals up here, and continuing to do the
8 work that we need to do to make our community
9 proud, and I am proud to be a part of it.
