

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# Retiring from Council in December, President Tim Moury leaves a positive, lasting legacy in Bethel Park

Back in 1995, **Tim Moury** had no intention of running for office let alone be Bethel Park's Municipal Council President; however, fate intervened and his attendance at a Council meeting back then put forth the momentum to drive him to run for Council (*Ward 8*) and soon become Council president serving the Bethel Park community for the last 27 years.

"I had an interest in politics early on," said Moury. "I was interested, but I didn't ever think that I would run for an office. However, in 1994, I attended a Council public hearing where they were deciding whether to light Village Green Park or not. I went to the meeting because it impacted

my home."

However, after sitting patiently waiting while the council argued for 25-minutes as to who can call the meeting to order and only letting a few residents speak because the allotted meeting time ran out, Moury's interest was piqued, and he began to attend regular Council meetings.

"At that time, there was a lot of partisan bickering back and forth on recreation and nothing

happening. When my ward election came up, it was going to be a contested race. But the person who was running called and said he was no longer going to run, two weeks before the filing date, and asked me to and that's how it all began," he said. "That was in 1995 and I took office in January 1996."



commitment to the community to pay off the 10-year loan debt from the Millennium Park purchase and then build phase 2 of the Community Center, recreation addition. "Community Center construction began in 1998 and the Center opened in 1999.

Then, 10 years later when the Millennium Park debt was paid, we began the planning process to add the recreation addition to the Center which is the current gym, classroom space and walking track that we have today...all without raising taxes," said Moury.

From there, Council went on to upgrade the neighborhood parks and Moury credits working with the Bethel Park Community Foundation as a big part of their success with these projects.

efforts and brick campaign," said Moury. "Once the Center was built, there was still a demand for additional bricks, and we raised another \$100,000."

Other accomplishments Moury looks back on

included updating the community infrastructure committing to over \$150 million in upgrades for the sanitary sewer system and Treatment Plant; the Fire Company dedicated Fire Tax (voted on by referendum) to maintain all three fire stations and build a state-of-the-art fire station on Brightwood Road; continued upgrades of all the parks giving each neighborhood park it's own special amenity; the new Splash Park opening Memorial Day 2024; 10 Pickleball courts at Millennium park; and most recently his work with the Bethel Park School District for the Municipality to obtain Washington and Ben Franklin Elementary Schools when they close in 2026, and turning the old Drake Loop Trolley Line into a \$1 million walking trail in cooperation with the Township of Upper St. Clair. In general, over the last 28 years, Bethel Park has been able to expand greenspace and parks by over 150 acres, including the two schools.

In all these projects, building trust and consensus was paramount to the process.

"We met with the Fire Company for over years to develop a plan for the Volunteer Fire Department to meet their current and future needs. From these meetings, we came up with the plan to offer a referendum for a dedicated tax to be created for the Fire Department enabling the Municipality to be responsible for the buildings and letting the firefighters focus on their extremely important work of protecting our community. The referendum was approved by a 2 to 1 vote." said Moury. "And, through all of these projects, we have and continue to work with state legislators to seek grant funding to help offset project costs and we're grateful for their assistance."

An important component to all these projects goes back to a 10-year plan early on that set the direction and goals for the community.

Moury fondly recalls how his parents supported him back then.

"My mom would stand at the polls and say, 'vote for my son!' My parents worked the entire day at the polls and by the end of the day were sunburned," he said.


Moury, who was born and raised in Bethel Park, has seen the community grow and thrive over the years. But he really feels that knowing the area's history has been significant during his time on Council.

"A lot of times, you need to understand how we got to where we are so that you can make a better decision moving forward," said Moury. "Maybe there was a pond somewhere that's now a housing development that may be experiencing water problems; having a history and knowing the background is quite significant. And, growing up here has given me a different perspective on how we got to where we are so that we can make better decisions for the community."

Initially, Moury ran for Council to raise the level of professionalism of the group. And, when Council reorganized in November 1996, he was asked by his colleagues to serve as Council President, and he hit the ground running first working with his collogues to follow the results of a resident home survey regarding recreation and a Community Center.

"We tabulated the survey results and in August of 1996, we acquired the 40-acre Millennium Park site," he said. "In early 1997, we established a budget that we felt we could afford within our tax base and allocated money for the demo of Park Avenue School, building the Community Center (phase 1) and the development of Millennium Park."

Knowing that they couldn't initially get everything they wanted at the Community Center, Council moved forward to build phase I of the Center and made a

I have been working in the eastern part of the State as a Municipal Manager for the last ten

years, but always hoped to move back to Pittsburgh if the right opportunity presented itself. Bethel Park ended up being that opportunity! I am truly grateful and humbled to be chosen for this position.

As 2023 comes to a close, I'd like to offer a few updates. Unfortunately, we'll be losing some of our longtime Council statesmen, **President Tim Moury, Vice President Mark O'Brien**, and **Councilman Dr. Tim Campbell**, as they retire from local government and move on to other endeavors. We wish them all the best and truly thank them for all that they've done to guide us and bring us to where we are today. I have been fortunate to work with these fine gentlemen over the last few months and consider myself very lucky to be blessed with their wisdom, knowledge, and sense of community. With their departure comes three new Council members, **Kimberly Kamenicky**, **Jim Jenkins**, and **Viola Garis**, who will be bringing new ideas to the table. We're looking forward to working with them on the future of Bethel Park and setting the course for the future of Bethel Park. Watch for an informal gathering with the new Council members in early 2024. I've also been busy assessing each of our Municipal Departments to ensure that we're working with the best technology, equipment and proper staff sizing to serve our residents in the best way possible.

We had a very difficult budget this season, due to unforeseen circumstances the refuse collection contract with Waste Management increased by over \$1.1 Million. This contract along with increases in insurances, and capital material increases led to a shortfall in budgetary reserves that will need to be replenished in upcoming years. The Council deliberated for many sessions on how to balance the budget, while planning for the future needs of community. It was decided that there would be a .75 Mill Tax increase and to increase the local municipal earned income tax to 1%. Even

with these increases, Bethel Park still enjoys one of the lowest tax millages in the South Hills of Pittsburgh.

Looking ahead to spring, we'll be opening our new Park Avenue Splash Park and new Pickleball Courts in Millennium Park. Everyone can look forward to the Grand Opening details on both projects to be announced this spring! To accommodate the expected larger number of visitors, we've acquired new parking areas near the facility for both the Splash Park and Community Center to provide additional parking spaces.

Again, thank you for giving me such a warm welcome and I am very proud to call Bethel Park home!

# Bethel Park Receives "WalkWorks" Grant!


Thanks to input from the Bethel Park community, the Municipality was just notified that it's one of nine communities in the Commonwealth receiving a "WalkWorks Active Transportation Planning Grant."

"We received \$25,000, the maximum grant request," said Bethel Park Grant Writer & Redevelopment Coordinator **Diana Alberter**. "We're appreciative of the community's input and look forward to working with all stakeholders to develop a plan that provides active transportation options for all."

The WalkWorks grant offers funds to not only develop Active Transportation Plans, but to increase physical activity by connecting local destinations with improved pedestrian, bicycle and transit networks.

The WalkWorks program benefits from its partnership with the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) and its funding of two of the grant recipients.

"Moving our bodies is important to improving our overall health, helping to prevent stress and diseases, such as diabetes and high blood pressure. Walking is one of the easiest and most accessible ways to do that, and walking outside has the extra benefits of sunshine, fresh air, and taking in the beauty of nature—all of which are good for our physical and mental health," said Acting Secretary of Health **Dr. Debra Bogen**. "WalkWorks supports healthy communities by enabling more people to have the option of walking or biking to places they go every day."



# Municipality Receives Grant for Simmons Park Trail System

The Municipality received a \$25,300 grant from the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources to prepare a Master Site Development Plan for a multiuse trail system within Simmons Park.

The planning process for the Site Plans will include key person interviews, public meetings and a study committee to assess community needs such as ADA access, close-to-home recreation options (are nearby residents within a 10-minute walk?), and desired trail features. This information will guide the design of the proposed trail system and result in shovel-ready plans.

Green and sustainable design elements will be implemented in trail construction as the existing topography will be utilized to build the pathways; no manmade material will be used. Other features will include benches made from recycled materials, trail markers and informational signs, a nature play area and LED lighting.






# **First National Bank Supports the Foundation!**

## **Protect Yourself from Fraud**

Millions of people are defrauded every year. Keep these tips in mind to prevent vourself from becoming a victim:

- Identify imposters: Scammers often pretend to be a family member, charity or someone you trust. Don't send money or give out personal information in response to an unexpected request.
- Do your research: Conduct online reviews of any companies before hiring to ensure their legitimacy.
- Verify Caller ID: Caller ID's can be spoofed. If someone calls asking for money or personal information, hang up. If you think the caller might be telling the truth, call back to a number you know is genuine.

  • Don't pre-pay: Don't believe the promise of a prize or item if they request you
- make a payment beforehand for taxes, fees or delivery.
- Payment Methods: Legitimate companies won't require you to pay by money wiring services or by purchasing and relaying gift card numbers.
- Talk to someone: Before you give up your money or personal information, talk to someone you trust. Scammers want you to make decisions in a hurry. Don't be rushed, talk to a friend.
- Hang up on robocalls: These calls are illegal, and often the products are bogus. Don't press 1 to speak to a person or to be taken off the list. That could lead to

# BP VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY

## A MESSAGE FROM THE FIRE CHIEF: Dave Gerber

Last year we didn't experience many heavy snowstorms, but I would like to thank the residents who took it upon themselves to shovel out their neighborhood fire hydrants. I would also like to ask that other residents do the same this year as it will save firefighters a drastic amount of time searching for hydrants that may be needed if your house is on fire.

In November everyone changed their clocks, so you should have also changed the batteries in your smoke and CO detectors. If you haven't done so, be sure to

take the time to take care of that now! As you are changing the batteries, check to see if there's a sticker on your detector stating the date of manufacture. Smoke detectors are typically good for 10 years and CO detectors are usually good for 7 years. A detector older than that may still work, but it should be changed to be more efficient. Below I've also included several safety tips to help keep you safe this winter. Many of these are issues that we encounter in Bethel Park every year.

#### **WINTER FIRE SAFETY TIPS**

Candles may be pretty to look at and smell, but they are a leading cause of home fires - and home fire deaths. Three of every five candle fires start because the candle is too close to something that will burn. And, more than one in three candle fires begin in the bedroom. Therefore, avoid using them in the bedroom or other areas where people may fall asleep.

December is the peak month for candle fires with Christmas being the peak day. The majority of candle fires result from human error and negligence.

By adhering to the following simple tips, it could help save your life:

• Use candle holders that are sturdy and won't tip over easily.

- Put candle holders on a sturdy, uncluttered surface.
- Keep candles out of the reach of children and pets.
- Don't burn a candle all the way down put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container.
- Never use a candle if oxygen is used in the home.
  Have flashlights and battery-powered lighting ready to use during a power outage. Never use candles.
- Never leave the house with candles burning.
- · Extinguish candles after use.
- And NEVER leave burning candles unattended!

#### Carbon Monoxide

Often called the silent killer, carbon monoxide (CO) is an invisible, odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. A person can be poisoned by a small amount of CO over a longer period of time or by a large amount of CO over a shorter amount of time. Fire departments in the U.S. respond to an estimated nine calls every hour in which carbon monoxide was found.

In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel can be sources of carbon monoxide. CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. Test CO alarms at least once a month and replace them according to the manufacturer's instructions. If the CO alarm sounds, immediately go outside to fresh air, and keep your windows and doors in the house closed. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for call 911 and wait outside for them to arrive. During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.

If you need to warm a vehicle, be sure to remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor indoors, even if garage doors are open.

Gas or charcoal grills can produce CO also so they can only be used outside. Other ways to prevent CO conditions from occurring are to have your heating equipment and chimneys inspected by a professional every year before cold weather sets in.



#### **Did You Know?**

The Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company has its own group of fire police. The Fire Police are members of the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company who receive sworn police powers and special training to support firefighting efforts by performing traffic and crowd control at fire scenes. On occasion, Fire Police also assist the Bethel Park Police by handling road closures, traffic control, crowd control at public events, and other miscellaneous tasks as requested.

Pennsylvania Fire Police have limited police powers, and although they have no authority to make arrests, they do have the right to detain someone within reason. Fire Police may control the flow of traffic to ensure emergency vehicles have a quick, safe entrance and egress to an incident. They may halt traffic or detour traffic because of the situation and the dangers involved. They take orders from the police officer in charge or fire incident commander.

All Fire Police Officers are sworn officers of the law and when on duty, display a badge of authority and are subject to control of the chief of police, or a member of the Pennsylvania State Police. Disobeying a Fire Police Officer is the same as disobeying a Police Officer, Sheriff's Deputy, State Constable or State Trooper and assaulting one is a felony. For more information on the law regarding Fire Police, please check out the PA Consolidated Statutes: Title 35, Subchapter D.

#### From the President's Desk: Jim Thomas

I'd like to take a moment to clarify why we still ask for donations, even after the Municipality of Bethel Park implemented a dedicated fire tax. The Municipality owns the three stations from which we operate -- Brightwood Station, Clifton Station and Milford Station. The fire tax revenues are used to pay for these stations, including any debt service, utilities, repairs, maintenance, and upkeep. On the other hand, your donations are used to pay for and maintain everything else that we need to provide fire and rescue services, including fire trucks, firefighter turnout gear, rescue equipment, self-contained breathing apparatus, and many,

many other things. To put things in perspective, in the next 10 years we will need to replace three fire trucks that are currently over 20 years old. The average cost of a basic new fire truck is over \$750,000! We are also constantly in need of replacing worn out turnout gear, tools, and rescue equipment. The cost of replacing turnout gear for just one firefighter is over \$4,000.

We'd also like to point out that because we are an all-volunteer fire department, the Municipality does not have to pay the salaries and other benefits associated with a paid department. A conservative estimate is that we are saving the taxpayers an estimated \$4 million a year by being completely volunteer!

We take great pride in remaining a completely volunteer department and hope to remain that way. But, to do so, we need more volunteers and a steady supply of donations to fund the costs that aren't covered by the fire tax. We would appreciate any and all help you can give us, so that we can continue to help you in your time of need.

Finally, we'd like to thank all of you for the support that you have given us over the years. We truly

appreciate it and look forward to continuing to

#### **Holiday Decorating**

CHIEF MESSAGE

Winter holidays are a time for families and friends to get together, but that also means it's a time for a greater risk for fire. Have a safe and happy holiday season by following these safety tips:

- When purchasing an artificial tree, look for the label "Fire Resistant." Although this label does not mean the tree won't catch fire, it does indicate the tree will resist burning and should extinguish guickly.
- When purchasing a live tree, check for freshness. A fresh tree is green; needles are hard to pull from branches and when bent between your fingers, needles do not break. The trunk butt of a fresh tree is sticky with resin, and when tapped on the ground, the tree should not lose many needles.
- When setting up a tree at home, place it away from fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents, and lights. Because heated rooms dry live trees out rapidly, be sure to check the stand daily to ensure it is filled with water. Place the tree out of the way of traffic and do not block doorways.

- Indoors or outside, use only lights that have been tested for safety by a recognized testing laboratory.
- Check each set of lights, new or old, for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections, and throw out damaged sets.
- Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, house walls, or other firm supports to protect the lights from wind damage. Use only insulated staples, not nails or tacks, to hold strings in place. Or, run strings of lights through hooks or clips (available at hardware stores).
- Turn off all lights when you go to bed or leave the house. The lights could short out and start a fire.
- For added electric-shock protection, plug outdoor electric lights and decorations into circuits protected by ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs). Portable outdoor GFCIs can be purchased where electrical supplies are sold. GFCIs can be installed permanently to household circuits by a qualified electrician.

- Use only non-combustible or flame-resistant materials to trim a tree. Choose tinsel or artificial icicles of plastic or nonleaded metals. Leaded materials are hazardous if ingested by children.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near other evergreens. Always use non-flammable holders, and place candles where they will not be knocked down.
- In homes with small children, take special care to avoid decorations that are sharp or breakable, keep trimmings with small removable parts out of the reach of children to avoid the child swallowing or inhaling small pieces, and avoid trimmings that resemble candy or food that may tempt a child to eat them.

Did you know that heating equipment is a leading cause of home fire deaths? With a few simple safety tips and precautions, you can prevent most heating fires from

Chimneys and vents should be cleaned and inspected by a qualified professional every year.

Keep anything that can burn at least 3 ft. away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater. Never use your oven to heat your home! Portable space heaters should be plugged directly into an outlet and not an extension cord or power **strip.** Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.

Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.

And finally, TEST YOUR SMOKE ALARMS MONTHLY!!!

"Strategic planning offers us stability to move ahead with our work and obtain grant funding to assist with costs," said Moury. "Our long-range Recreation study has helped guide us to make Millennium our "Diamond' park, overhaul Village Green Park to become a soccer and sports field complex, to create our new Splash Park at Park Avenue and Pickleball courts at Millennium Park. It will also help guide the Municipality in developing a plan for the two new school facilities as well.'

To go along with the new Splash Park and the expected increase in parking

needs, Moury said that the Municipality was able to acquire two lots near the Splash Park and Community Center that will offer about 100 extra parking spots.

"This is tied into our long range 'Blueprint Bethel Park' plan," said Moury. "And the Splash Park will be a centerpiece for our recreational offerings. The final project cost is about \$3.5 million of which we received \$950,000 in grants and about \$1.5 million in COVID funds. The facility will truly be a destination for children and families.'

When thinking about what he'll miss most after leaving council, Moury said it will be the interaction with residents and helping them with

their needs.

'Overall, what I'll miss is the people that I meet and the relationships that I've built over the years," said Moury. "I've always tried to make everyone feel comfortable reaching out with questions or concerns and I've always tried to over communicate in my Ward to keep residents there aware of anything that may impact them."

Regarding advice for those who will be newly starting Council, Moury said the key is relationships.

"You need to develop relationships and trust one another. I've been successful in building consensus, and you do that by building trust," he said. "Everyone may have ideas, but the success of them coming to fruition is by building a working relationship with the people you serve with. It goes back to staying in your lane; people get into problems when they bring in issues that don't pertain to local government.

Mayor Jack Allen credited Moury's leadership not only on Council but also in

"I've worked with Tim ever since I joined Council. He was a good leader and Council President for 27 years and whoever takes that position is going to have big shoes to fill," said Mayor Allen. "His leadership wasn't just on Council but also in the community. He shows up to almost every function, he's involved in committees, community organizations such as the Schoolhouse Arts & History Center and the Veterans Memorial Committee, and more. I think his work on the Community Center taking it from an idea to fruition is one of his biggest accomplishments as well as the acquisition and development of Millennium Park. And his work at the Schoolhouse Arts & History Center should also be mentioned. There he's taking a building that was in very bad shape and developing it to become a centerpiece in our community."

Moury appreciated his time with Council and thanked everyone he's worked with over the years.

"I've worked with 25 different Council members during my tenure, and I've learned from all of them," said Moury. "I served with Mark O'Brien the longest and he was always my voice of reason. There are also a lot of people who've been important to me and friendships I've made on Council, with staff, other elected officials, John Maher and Natalie Mihalek, and I've learned from all of them."

Councilman Mark O'Brien reflected on his work with Moury over the years. "He's a man of great character, vision, compromise and destiny," said O'Brien. "From the day he was elected, Bethel Park was his first priority and will remain that way until the last day of his tenure. I will profoundly miss serving with him."

Following his departure from Council, Moury will continue working with organizations that he's been involved with such as the Bethel Park Historical Society, where he serves as President, and look for new volunteer opportunities.



# **Outreach Turning the Big 5-0!**

Pat had a difficult family life, with parents showing little interest in how he spent his days. Morris had a great family, but just didn't fit in with his peers. Anna was off the charts gifted but didn't engage with her classes.

To escape the daily grind, these teens turned to drugs and became part of a group that skipped school to hang out at Mt. Lebanon Park. It was during one of these afternoons that a counselor from Outreach approached them. He had a genuine interest in what they were experiencing and showed up consistently, without judgment, to listen and learn from the teens who were spending their days at the park. Eventually, he suggested they visit Outreach's office in Uptown Mt. Lebanon.

There, they formed groups, talked about their lives and the challenges that they faced with difficult families, disinterested or absent parents and complicated sibling relationships. The counselors who ran the groups understood that the drug use was masking emotional and psychological stressors; they encouraged the teens to explore these emotions and issues so that they could create new coping skills and healthy habits.

That's how it all started in 1974 - a group of caring, nonjudgmental adults making meaningful connections with teens in need of support, counsel and guidance as they navigated their complicated worlds. It's why Outreach mattered back then... and it's why we still matter today, nearly 50 years later.

Outreach Teen & Family Services' origins date back to the 1960s as a grassroots concept between the Mt. Lebanon Police Department and Community Relations Board. The organization was officially formed in 1974 under a grant from the Pennsylvania State Law Enforcement Assistance Administration. In 1981, the organization incorporated as a non-profit agency with the name Outreach South, later changed to Outreach Teen & Family Services.

For five decades, Outreach has been a community resource to help youth and families thrive by providing counseling and educational programs in a welcoming and supportive environment. While we've evolved with the times, our primary purpose remains to be a place of comfort and compassion, where kids and families can find professional counselors ready to guide them along their journeys.

Our core group of clients is still mainly teens, ages 13-17, but the agency has expanded over the years, and we now also work with clients as young as 5 and as old as 21. Issues our counselors focus on have moved from predominantly drug and alcohol to a broader range of topics that includes anxiety, depression, stress, adjustment, and family/school issues.

#### SPECIAL NOTICE

Bethel Park Recreation reserves the right to cancel, combine or divide classes, or to make other changes that become necessary and to do so without incurring obligations. Adjustments of fees will be made when classes are canceled by the Department.

#### WHEN PROGRAMS BEGIN

In almost all instances, each activity will have a schedule with a beginning date. In those cases where time or day is not available, interested individuals should call the Recreation Office.

#### WHEN FEES ARE DUE

All fees must be paid at the time of registration unless special arrangements have been made at the Recreation Office.

#### INSURANCE INFORMATION

The Recreation Board does not carry health insurance to cover injuries incurred while participating in any activity. In most cases, hospitalization carried through your employer will cover these types of injuries. Participants are also responsible for their personal property. Valuables should never be left unattended.

#### **RETURNED CHECKS**

Any check that is returned to the Recreation Office as "NSF" will be subject to a \$35 replacement fee. All "NSF" checks MUST be replaced within ten (10) working days, or the person will be withdrawn from the roster.

#### RESIDENCY INFORMATION

All Bethel Park residents are given preference in registering for programs offered in this leaflet. Classes with limited enrollment will be open to nonresidents only if space permits. The Recreation Board reserves the right to refuse admission to any person who misrepresents residency and will not give refunds to those individuals. Non-resident fees are set for each activity and should be paid accordingly upon registration.

#### REFUNDS: Please read...

Refunds will only be given upon written requests received in the Recreation Office prior to the beginning of the second class or practice session for a grouped session. For a one-time class or session, a 24-hour written request will be required. Phone requests will not be accepted, nor does failure to attend a class constitute notification of intent to withdraw from a class.

#### **USE OF PHOTOS**

Bethel Park Recreation provides opportunities for positive publicity by photographing/videotaping patrons at programs for use in local publications, newspapers, and/or television.

If you prefer that you and/or your child not be photographed for publicity purposes, please notify Bethel Park Recreation in writing upon registration.

#### **CLASS ATTENDANCE**

Attendance at class offerings is not mandatory. The Recreation Department recommends that an attempt be made to attend as many classes as possible. The Gold Card Club, a social and fellowship organization for seniors, was organized by the Bethel Park Recreation Department for the benefit of Bethel Park residents who are 60 years of age and over, or a resident on disability retirement and not less than 50 years of age. A spouse not less than 55 years of age may join with his/her spouse if he/she meets the 60-year age minimum. The title of the GOLD CARD CLUB came from the color of the membership card, not for playing card games.

Annual membership dues are \$6 per person per calendar vear, Jan. 1 - Dec. 31. Annual dues shall be paid beginning at the January general meeting. Renewals paid after March 31 incur a late penalty. New members will be accepted at any time during the calendar year. You MUST be a current Bethel Park resident in order to join the Gold Card Club.


#### **BETHEL PARK BASEBALL**

#### **PAVILION PERMITS**



### **RENTAL PROCEDURES**



**RENTAL PROCEDURES**Reserving a room at the Bethel Park Community Center for your next event is a simple, straightforward process and may be done up to a six months in advance. However, it is recommended that you reserve your space early as dates fill up quickly!

- Requests for rentals must be requested through our RecDesk software. The RecDesk portal can be found on www.bethelpark.net. There will be a requirement of an electronic signature required for all forms necessary.

  • Within five business days, you'll be able to see if your request was
- approved via the RecDesk online portal.
- If the space is available and approved, you'll be sent an invoice for the amount that is due via the RecDesk online portal.

#### PAYMENT SCHEDULE

- Fifty percent of total rental fees is due as soon as the rental is approved and first invoice is provided.
- The remaining 50% is due 30 days prior to your event.
  A refundable security deposit (cash or check only) and room layout is due ten days prior to your event.

\*\*Please note that while we want your event to be a success, failure to meet any payment or layout deadlines may result in rental cancellation. Fees paid will not be refunded.

#### **CANCELLATION POLICY/FEES**

If you need to cancel your event, your request MUST be submitted in writing to the Community Center Director. Cancellation fees follow:

- Cancellations received in writing more than 60 days prior to the scheduled date will receive a refund of 50% of initial rental payment, less a \$5 processing fee.
- No refund will be issued if written cancellation is received less than 60 days prior to event.

#### OTHER RENTAL NOTES

- Any use of the Community Center which requires Municipal staff to stay after the scheduled closing time shall be charged an additional \$40 per hour for any portion of an hour that may be needed.

  • Should your event need an alcohol permit for 150 persons or more,
- as a requirement, there will be additional security personnel fee.
- Rental rate includes the set-up of tables and chairs.
  Renters will be responsible to visit the Community Center ten days in advance of their event to sign-off on all seating/room arrangements. The security/damage deposit should also be paid at this time. Rate: \$100 per area rented.

Multipurpose Room This exceptional room can be divided into three separate sections to accommodate small and medium groups. With dividers open, the room can accommodate large group functions. The Multipurpose Room is perfect for wedding receptions, showers, banquets, parties, meetings or other special events.

Catering Kitchen Add this room to your rental when meals will be served at your event. Kitchen includes commercial ovens, grill, refrigerator, freezer, coffee makers, microwave and dishwasher.

Theatrical Stage Does your event need a stage? The Stage may be rented in conjunction with the rental of Room B.

Lobby Bookshelves are located in the lobby, across from the main desk containing a lending library of puzzles and books available for residents of all ages to borrow.

Lounge Equipped with a kitchenette, chairs, TV, magazines and game tables, the lounge provides a comfortable atmosphere to relax, read, enjoy a card game with friends or watch television. An adult or quardian must accompany quests under age 13.

Classroom This room includes couches, TV, sink and counter area, restroom, along with tables and chairs. The Classroom may be used for small group rentals, youth and adult Recreation classes or meetings.

Gymnasium Includes one full-length and one ½ basketball court; can also be converted to three ½ sized courts. It has a total of eight basketball hoops. Also features three ½ size volleyball courts.

Exercise Studio A bright and open mirrored area to accommodate a variety of fitness and dance classes.

Elevated Walking Track Features a 1/12 mile cushioned walking track that overlooks the gymnasium.



# A Message From... DR. JAMES WALSH Superintendent

#### The Power of a Good Struggle

"Sail forth, Steer for the Deep Waters Only" - Walt Whitman

In **Scott McLeod** and **Dean Shareski's** book, "Different Schools for a Different World," they discuss four shifts upon which we should place our focus to stay relevant in this 21st century world. To that better future, here are the shifts we are taking as we remake learning in Bethel Park.

The first necessary shift is away from an emphasis on lower-level-thinking tasks, such as factual recall and procedural tasks, to tasks of greater cognitive complexity, such as creativity, critical thinking, and problem-solving. This also requires effective communication and collaboration skills. Evidence suggests a shift away from lower-level thinking helps foster citizenship skills, as well as economic and college success.

Next is a shift in control. We want to transition from classrooms in which the teachers overwhelmingly control the time and discussion to classrooms that empowers student agency *(control)* over how they learn. Student agency builds ownership and allows teachers to differentiate the learning process. As a result, student engagement increases, because students are more connected and invested.

The third shift is a move from independent work classrooms, which provide students opportunities to engage with and contribute to a learning community. This could be the classroom, or more broad interdisciplinary learning communities. This change supports students' motivation by helping them see direct connections between their learning and the world around them. It also connects students' learning activities to the innovation that surrounds them. This is more "real world."

The fourth shift is a transformation in local classrooms from pens and pencils, notebooks and textbooks to connected learning spaces that are freely and richly technology driven. Mobile computing devices and online environments allow the first three shifts mentioned here to move into high gear. Robust technology integration efforts also combat equity concerns.

Most would agree on the importance of these skills, but we struggle in how these skills should be assessed. We ask for students to think critically and creatively, yet move our learners to all think the same on the test. This is where we need to go next: rethinking assessment or measurement of learning in general.

Come aboard! We are sailing into the "deep waters" of the school year. We will continue to remake learning, aiming our sails to these evershifting winds.

#### Special Education at Bethel Park

Bethel Park Schools have a long history of being best-in-class for special education. Many families have moved here to benefit from the excellent education and services that we provide. We are proud to support our students, parents and administration in continuing to deliver exceptional education for our exceptional students. Here is a summary of the approach that the Bethel Park School District has taken with our support to address the needs of special education programs.

The school district institutes its behavioral health services with a tiered approach. Our five elementary buildings are staffed by a social worker at each elementary school as well as one site-based therapist that handles the student cases for all locations. The Student Assistance Program (SAP) operates at each elementary building and consists of the social worker, an instructional support teacher, the building administrator, and the Director of Student Support Services. At many elementary buildings there are other teachers and paraprofessionals that are a part of the team as well.

This tiered approach is also used at the middle schools and high school and includes school counselors and TEAMS room staff. Additional support is supplied through a partnership with Auberle, a local SAP provider. There is one liaison at the K-4 level and one liaison at the 5th-12th grade level. Auberle also provides two site based therapists that are a part of the program as well.

In addition to the support discussed above, the Tier 1 strategy at the elementary buildings includes the inclusion of the Second Step Program, a social and emotional learning program that is research-based. This program is implemented by the social workers with their regular and special education teaching colleagues and is meant to teach students about themselves and others and how they interact across the five competencies of the CASEL (Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning) framework. Social workers push into the classrooms to implement this research-based model. The frequency of this push in varies, but is typically between once per week to once every other week.

Bethel Park School District has a history of inclusion. Over the last four years, our inclusive itinerant number (more than 80-percent included) has been greater than the state average. Based on the 2021-2022 Special Education Data Report, most recently, 65.8-percent of special education students are included for at least 80-percent of their school day, higher than the state average. That is another clear demonstration that we are striving for inclusion within our school district while continuing to meet the state's

Bethel Park School District ensures that services are provided to children with exceptional needs in the least restrictive environment including opportunities for interaction with the rest of their schoolmates during the school day and in extracurricular school activities. IEP teams follow the special education process outlined in the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and Chapter 14 of the Pennsylvania State Code. The Individualized Education Program (IEP) is developed to address the individualized needs of the student, including special considerations and present education levels. Annual goals and objectives, individually tailored instruction, and all supports and related services are designed to meet the individual students' respective needs. Lastly, appropriate educational placement is discussed and offered through the Notice of Recommended Educational Placement (NOREP).

The district also provides the needed support and resources including specialized transportation, if necessary, to support the participation of children with special needs in nonacademic and extracurricular activities. Students with special needs are also afforded the opportunities to participate in nonacademic and extracurricular activities in the same manner as the rest of their classmates. As services are provided to children with special needs in the least restrictive environment, the majority of students with special needs in the district attend the same school as their neighborhood peers.

## **Sloan Named Supervisor of Facilities & Operations**

This fall, **Dan Sloan**, Bethel Park's former Athletic Director, transitioned to a new role within the district where he helps supervise facilities and operations.

As athletic director, Sloan oversaw a mammoth department that featured 27 varsity, 14 junior varsity, four junior high, and 15 middle school teams. He also oversaw one of the most significant individual budgets in the school district. He will lean on that experience in his new role as he oversees district facility rentals and reservations and helps to coordinate transportation efforts.

In May, **Dr. Mark Korcinsky** was elevated to his newly created role as Assistant Superintendent for Facilities and Operations. The veteran administrator, with an extensive background in logistics, soon realized that he needed a strong manager to help facilitate some of the changes that continue to be made. He quickly identified Sloan as the ideal candidate to fill that role.



"For this role, we needed someone who understands the school district and the key role logistics and planning plays in ensuring everything is functioning properly," said Korcinsky. "I can't think of a more well-suited

Korcinsky. "I can't think of a more well-suited person for that responsibility than someone who has spent almost every day for most of the past decade doing just that for our student-athletes."

During Sloan's seven-year tenure as athletic director, Bethel Park teams claimed five team or individual state championships, eight team or individual WPIAL championships, and dozens of other team and individual WPIAL and state playoff appearances.

## PA Law Allows for Free Breakfasts for All Students

The 2023-2024 Pennsylvania state budget, passed in August and championed by **Gov. Josh Shapiro**, allocates funds for universal free breakfast at public schools across the Commonwealth.

"Students can't learn on an empty stomach," Shapiro said. "That is why, in my budget address just about three or four months ago, I called for universal free breakfast for every one of Pennsylvania's school children."

The 2023-24 budget includes \$46.5 million to provide universal free breakfast to Pennsylvania's 1.7 million public school students, according to the Shapiro administration.

Shapiro also noted that a statewide universal breakfast program will help reduce the stigma felt by children who currently receive free- or reduced-cost school meals by putting "every kid on the same playing field."

So far this year, six states have adopted a variation of programs to provide students with free universal school meals, including Minnesota, New Mexico, Maine, California, Colorado and Vermont. Another 20 states, including Pennsylvania, are in the process of planning, drafting, or considering legislative efforts to expand free school meal programs.

In Allegheny County, more than 146,000 public school students are eligible for free breakfast.

The administration provided a breakdown of the number of students eligible for free breakfast in each of Pennsylvania's 67 counties based on 2022 school enrollment data.

# Bethel Park Paraprofessionals Participate in Dept. of Education's Attract-Prepare-Retain Program

Three Bethel Park School District paraprofessionals are taking advantage of a collaborative grant between the school district, the Pennsylvania Department of Education and Slippery Rock University called "Attract-Prepare-Retain" (APR). As part of the program, the aspiring teachers will earn their Masters degrees in Special Education, with little to no tuition costs.

## **School Bus Safety Tips**

School bus transportation plays a critical role in the education of our nation's students, and is the direct link between a neighborhood and the classroom. More than 25 million children ride the yellow bus every school day, and National School Bus Safety Week serves as a reminder for students,

parents/guardians, teachers, and the community to keep school bus safety in the forefront. Here are tips to keep our children safe at the bus stop.

#### **Getting Ready for School**

- Have your children put everything they carry in a backpack or school bag so that they won't drop things along the way.
- Encourage them to wear bright, contrasting colors so they will be more easily seen by drivers.
- Make sure children leave home on time so they can arrive at the bus stop before it is due, ideally at least five minutes early. Running after or in front of a bus is



after or in front of a bus is dangerous.

#### Walking to the Bus Stop

- Walk young children to the bus stop or encourage children to walk in groups. There is safety in numbers; groups are easier for drivers to see.
- Practice good pedestrian behavior: walk on the sidewalk, and if there is no sidewalk stay out of the street. If you must walk in the street, walk single file, face traffic and stay as close to the edge of the road as you can.
- Stop and look left, right and then left again if you must cross the street.
   Do the same thing at drive -ways and alleys. Exaggerate your head turns and narrate your actions so your child knows you are looking left, right and left.

#### At the Bus Stop

- Have children wait in a location where the driver can see them while driving down the street. Try to avoid waiting in a house or car.
- Do not let children play in the street. Playing with balls or other toys that could roll into the street is also dangerous.

#### Getting On and Off the Bus

- Warn children that if they drop something getting on and off the bus, they should never pick it up. Instead, they should tell the driver and follow the driver's instructions.
- Remind children to look to the right before they step off the bus.
- If you meet your child at the bus stop after school, wait on the side where
  the child will be dropped off, not across the street. Children can be so
  excited to see you after school that they dash across the street and
  forget the safety rules.

#### **Mobile Devices**

Cell phones and other electronic devices are often permitted on the school bus as long as:

- They are in backpacks or other holders, keeping hands free to use handrails while boarding and departing the bus.
- Sound is muted or headphones, ear buds or similar devices are used.
- Content does not violate the law or school district policy and procedures.
- Use does not create a distraction for the driver.

To do that, they'll need help from the community. That is why they are kindly asking for donations from the public of water, Gatorade, and snacks to keep the firefighters hydrated and


energized during their heroic efforts.

Ryan Rydzewski, co-author of the book

rewarded. But we're so excited to have thousands of students and hundreds of
teachers answering Fred's call and taking up that assignment to be kind to one
another," he said.

Bethel Park School District is actively participating in the "Be the Kind Kid: Kindness in Action" campaign. The challenge is simple yet profound: design, build, and share kindness initiatives, maker projects, or art installations that cater to the unique needs of our community.

At Neil Armstrong Middle School, dedicated teachers **Mrs. Sonja Kubinec** and **Mrs. Lori Mates** helped guide students in crafting poems about kindness and recorded themselves reciting these heartfelt verses. In October, **Christine** 

**Sorenson** featured the project as part of her "Kidburgh" series during the KDKA-TV evening news.

One student enthusiastically shared, "Being kind is cool. Kindness starts with you and me," as he read his kindness poem aloud. These poems were recorded and linked to a QR code,

which were then placed on hand-painted bookmarks. The students also created friendship bracelets, which double as tassels on the bookmarks.

Mates explained their approach, saying, "We asked the students, 'What is kindness?' And everyone agreed it's helping someone else. It's being kind. It's giving a compliment, opening the door. And then we said, 'What does that look like? Why does it matter?' And everyone agreed it makes the world a happier place," she said.

The veteran educators recognize that academic and sports achievements are often rewarded in school, but they emphasize that teaching and rewarding kindness can have a profound and lasting impact on the community.

Kubinec added, "Everybody comes in with different

abilities, different talents, and this is a way for each of them to shine and show that they are kind, that this intrinsic reward, this feeling they

get, it doesn't always have to be extrinsic in some physical way, but the intrinsic feeling of giving something and saying, 'Okay, I made them smile,'" she said.


**Girls Soccer:** The girls soccer team had an up-and-down season, narrowly missing out on the postseason. Senior **Artemis**

In October, the deep and talented Bethel Park girls tennis team secured their first-ever WPIAL championship at Washington and Jefferson College's Janet L. Swanson Tennis Center. Senior **Lily Sierka** and freshman **Cami Fisher** also took the top spot in WPIAL Class 3A girls tennis doubles. The team's triumph was a culmination of years of hard work, dedication, and unwavering camaraderie among the team.

Senior **Emma Smith** insisted that the team's unity and shared history helped propel the Hawks to the title. "Going down our team, we are all pretty similar skill-wise and we are super close," she said. "We are really tight because we have known each other and have been playing together since we were 2 and 3 years-old."



Bethel Park entered the WPIAL championship as the No. 1 seed in the Class 3A tournament after an undefeated regular season and a section title. Their journey to the finals included convincing wins against Norwin (5-0) and Upper St. Clair (4-1), before edging Shady Side Academy (3-2) in the semifinals.

They swept past North Allegheny (5-0) in the championship match.

Smith and **Mackenzie Smock** set the tone by securing a win at No. 1 doubles against **Audrey Zheng** and **Tia Soussou** with a score of 6-1. 6-3.

Katie Peterson was similarly dominant in No. 3 singles, besting Peyton Mauser, 6-2, 6-2.

The match's biggest surprise may have been freshman sensation **Cami Fisher's** straight sets dismantling NA's top player, **Sara Fernandez**, 6-4, 6-2.

Afterwards, the visibly emotional Fisher could only smile through the tears. "This is absolutely the coolest thing ever...I can't stop

crying. It's awesome," she gushed.
No. 2 doubles tandem **Julia Gobbie** and **Cassie Sierka** had a tougher time of it, winning 7-6 (3), 6-4, against **Siya Jain** and **Rebecca Murphy. Lily Sierka's** victory at No. 2 singles capped off the suffocating team performance, after her opponent, **Laetitia Wessel**, was forced to retire due to injury in the second set.

The Hawks would advance all the way to the PIAA semifinals, where they lost to state eventual runner-up, Conestoga, 3-2. Their tight-knit team, characterized by unwavering support, chemistry, and friendship on and off the court, served them very well.

As Smith noted, "You need a solid seven players who have chemistry and who are friends on and off the court to win," she said. "If you aren't tight like that, then you are not going to have chemistry on the court."

"Laura was a tremendous student-athlete herself, and she was also an experienced athletic administrator when we first hired her two years ago. In her time here, she has leaned on that experience and has been instrumental in helping to guide the Athletics

Department through some very challenging issues.

"We are very fortunate to have the ideal candidate for the job already on staff and fully immersed in our programs and student-athletes."

Grimm is a 2010 graduate of Colgate University, where she also played basketball. A Pittsburgh native and Serra Catholic alum, Grimm holds the Eagles' career records for points (1,940), 3-point field goals (283), steals (391), and assists (497). She also led Serra Catholic to the 2005 Class A girls basketball state championship. Grimm was named first-team all-state honors in 2005 and 2006 and the 2005 Associated Press Pennsylvania State Player of the Year. In June, Grimm was inducted into the WPIAL Hall of Fame.

## **Zoo in the Classroom Collaborative**



These instruments are played in concert halls and exhibited in museums and serve as educational tools for people of all faiths worldwide.

The Clarion Quartet, founded by members of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, has dedicated itself to playing works banned during the Nazi regime and compositions by Holocaust-era composers. Their presence on the stage added depth to the evening's poignant performances.

The violin has a unique place in history, providing solace and salvation to many during the Holocaust. For some, the ability to play the violin spared their lives in concentration camps and ghettos or helped their families escape Nazi tyranny. For others, music offered comfort in the face of unimaginable loss and suffering.

The event featured touching readings, including one focused on the Warsaw ghetto by **Quinlan Reynolds**, a junior at Bethel Park who has been researching Holocaust-era music. **Riley Smith**, a sophomore, shared her piece on the role of music during the Holocaust,

"Going through so much adversity from such a young age has definitely made me a stronger person," he said. "It has taught me the value of patience and perseverance.'

Neither Madelyn or Ethan has yet made their final college decision.

Bethel Park School District began its expanded partnership with Baldwin-based eServices Technology this fall to develop a more convenient way for quests to purchase tickets to the school district's live events.

Athletic director Laura Grimm says the new ticket-selling process came in response to fan opinion. "We are constantly communicating with our fans on ways to improve their game day experience, and much of the feedback we have received in recent years has centered around our fans' frustrations with getting into our games in a timely fashion," she said. "This new ticketselling system will help alleviate some of that congestion."

Grimm anticipated an adjustment period for some fans and had on-site ticket concierges to help guide fans through the ticket reservation process. She also pointed out that many other ticket-selling entities have already shifted to the online model, and noted that most fans were already

"Many of the people attending our games also regularly attend other sporting events like Pirates, Steelers, and Penguins games, and our process mirrors theirs, which allowed our fans to adjust to the new system rather quickly," said Grimm.

Online ticket sales are familiar to Bethel Park. For the past several years, fans have had the opportunity to buy tickets to all Hawks sporting events through various ticket-selling websites. Also, tickets to last spring's high school musical, "The Addams Family," were sold exclusively through eServices Technology. Tickets to this year's spring musical will also be sold exclusively online through eServices Technology.

## Four BPHS Students Recognized by National Merit Scholarship Program


Four Bethel Park High School seniors have been recognized for academic excellence by one of the country's best-known and longest-running scholarship programs.

The National Merit Scholarship (NMS) Corporation has designated Bryce Clancy, Henry Gaston, Lucas Hertzel and Lupe McElvenny as 2024 NMS commended students. Clancy and Gaston have also been named 2024 NMS semifinalists.

The students join an elite cohort among their peers throughout the country. Clancy and Gaston are among 16,000 NMS semifinalists eligible to compete for one of 7,250 NMS scholarships worth more than \$30 million. The nationwide pool of semifinalists represents less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors.

NMS formally commends some 34,000 students eligible as candidates for special NMS scholarships sponsored by various corporations and businesses.

Students enter the competition by taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) during their junior year.

Of the 1.5 million entrants each year, some 50,000 with the highest PSAT/NMSQT Selection Index scores — (which are calculated by doubling the sum of scores in reading, writing, language and mathematics tests) — qualify for NMS recognition as either commended students or semifinalists.

The National Merit Scholarship Program is an academic competition for recognition scholarships that began in 1955. Approximately 1.5 million high school students from more than 21,000 high schools enter the program annually.

"We are very proud of the students who achieved this national recognition," Mr. Joseph Villani, Bethel Park High School Principal, said. "It is reflective of their hard work and dedication to learning."



## **Hawk Passes Replace Senior Citizens Cards**

Bethel Park School District offers FREE general admission to community seniors with the Hawk Pass.

The permanent orange plastic pass is the size of a credit card and grants Bethel Park residents aged 62 and older entry into nearly all school-sponsored events, including all regular-season home athletic events, as well as all choral and band concerts.

To obtain your Hawk Pass, go to the Administration Building [301 Church Street, Bethel Park, PA 15102] during normal business hours and show your identification. We'll provide you with your pass, which you'll present at the gate of nearly any school-sponsored event for FREE admission. Best of all, once you have your pass, you have it forever. There is never any need to replace it unless you lose or damage your pass.

The Hawk Pass replaces the Senior Citizens Card, which was a small business card-like pass that had to be re-issued at the start of each school year. If you already have a Senior Citizens Card, it will be honored for the rest of this year, but we strongly encourage everyone to upgrade their temporary cards for the more permanent versions. You can exchange your card for a new Hawk Pass at the gate of most district-sponsored events.
