



Winter Safety Tips

To help you stay safe this winter, please think about following the tips below:

lowing the tips below:
Avoid driving on ice-covered roads if possible.
Inform friends and family of your travel plans, and allow sufficient time to arrive safely.
Dress warmly, even when driving, in the event of a vehicle breakdown.
All sidewalks must be clear of snow and ice within 24 hours of accumulation and cannot be deposited on the roadway (BP Ordinance 59.50).

Did You Know?

There's a crisis among Volunteer Fire Departments in Pennsylvania! In 2018, the State Senate produced a report about the status of volunteer emergency services in Pennsylvania. According to the Pennsylvania Fire and Emergency Services Institute, the number of volunteer firefighters has shrunk from 300,000 in the 1970's to about 60,000 in the early 2000's

and to 38,000 in 2018. Of Pennsylvania's 2,462 fire companies, more than 90 percent are volunteer companies. According to a 2001 Pennsylvania Fire and Emergency Services Institute Study, the value of the service that our volunteers provide was estimated at \$6 billion. That figure may be higher than \$10 billion in today's dollars. If we lose our volunteer fire and EMS companies and volunteers, the taxpayers will face a very steep price tag.

Here in Bethel Park, we're getting close to a critical level when it comes to the lack of volunteers. We need more volunteers and soon! In 2011, we had a total of 371 calls. In 2022, we had over 600. The increasing number of calls continues to focus attention on the need for additional volunteers.

The BPVFC takes great pride in the fact that we remain 100 percent volunteer and we strive to remain that way in the future. A Message from the Fire Chief: Dave Gerber



In the last few months, our area has had some very devastating fires in apartment buildings. It's no secret that our community has seen an increase in apartment buildings and senior living apartment complexes in the last few years. Many people may be new to living in these types of buildings and not realize what to do when the fire alarms go off.

You'll find some very important and useful information below to help you be prepared. This month, I've also included some new information about medical oxygen. I'm sure most of us probably know someone who has been or is currently on medical oxygen. You can find some information and facts on how to best prevent fires when it is used in the home. Clothes dryers are often a leading cause of fires in our area. We use these on a regular basis, but do you really take the time to properly maintain them to prevent fires?

How to Reach Us

None of our three fire stations are regularly staffed with members. If you need us to respond to your emergency, you must call Police Dispatch at 412-833-2000 or call 911. If you have a non-emergency question or concern, the best and fastest way to reach us is through our "contact us" page on the website at www.bethelparkvfc.com.

If you are on Facebook, you can always send us a message there

as well.

You can also call us at 412-835-1127 and leave a message on the answering machine.

People living in an apartment building need to think ahead and be prepared in the event of a fire. It's important to know the fire safety features in your building and work together with neighbors to help keep the building as fire safe as possible.

Know the locations of all available exit stairs from your floor in case the nearest one is blocked by fire or smoke. Make sure all exit stairwell doors are clearly marked and not locked or blocked by security bars and are clear of clutter. These doors should always remain in the closed position to limit the movement of smoke if there is a fire

Remember that you won't be able to use an elevator to exit when there is a fire. If you have trouble using stairs, try to get an apartment on a lower floor if possible. If there is a fire, pull the fire alarm on your way out to notify the fire department and your neighbors. Remember to CLOSE THE DOOR to the area where the fire is located. This will prevent deadly smoke from filling the hallways and stairwells.

When the fire alarm sounds, feel the door before you open it and only open a cool door. Make sure to close all doors behind you as you leave to prevent spread of smoke and fire. If a door is hot, use another way out.

If an announcement is made throughout the building, listen carefully and follow directions. Use the stairs to get out; NEVER use the elevator unless you

are directed to do so by the fire department.

If you or someone else is trapped in the building, be sure to notify the fire department of that. If you can't get out of your apartment because of fire, smoke or a disability, stuff wet towels or sheets around the door and vents to keep smoke out. Call 911 and tell them where you are. Open a window slightly and wave a bright cloth to signal your location. Be prepared to close the window if it makes the smoke condition worse. Fire department evacuation of an apartment building can take a long time. Communicate with the fire department to monitor evacuation status.

Accidents do happen, so if you accidentally set the fire alarm off from something like burnt food, just call to let us know so that we won't have to make a

loud entrance.

Medical Oxygen

Use of portable medical oxygen in the home has grown over the past decade. Medical oxygen adds a higher percentage of oxygen to the air that a patient uses to breathe. Fire needs oxygen to burn. If a fire should start in an oxygen-enriched area, the material burning will burn more quickly. Homes where

medical oxygen is used need specific fire safety rules to keep people safe from fire and burns.

There is no safe way to smoke in the home when oxygen is in use. A patient on oxygen should not smoke. Candles, matches, wood stoves, and even safety toys, can be ignition so filtered and should not smoke. be used in the home. Keep oxygen cylinders at least 5 ft. from a heat source, open flames or electrical

Body oil, hand lotion and items containing oil and grease can easily ignite. Keep oil and grease away from areas where oxygen is in use. Never use aerosol sprays containing combustible materials near the oxygen. Oxygen saturates fabric covered furniture, clothing, hair, and bedding, making it easier for a fire to start and spread.

Smoking materials are the leading heat source resulting in medical oxygen related fires, injuries and deaths.

Clothes Dryer Safety



Do not use the dryer without a lint filter and make sure you clean it before or after each load of laundry. Also remove any lint that has collected around the drum. Make sure the air exhaust vent pipe is not restricted and the outdoor vent flap will open when the dryer is operating.

At least once a year, you'll also need to clean the lint out of the vent pipe or have a dryer lint removal service

Follow the manufacturer's operating instructions and don't overload your dryer. Another good practice is to turn off the dryer if you leave home or when you go to bed. The leading cause of home clothes dryer fires is failure to clean them.

Follow these tips and clean them on a regular basis to keep yourself and your family safe!

How We're Staffed and How We Respond

Bethel Park does not have any paid firefighters, so our stations are never regularly staffed. We recently had someone ask how our response works since our stations are not staffed. Here is an explanation of how things work for the BPVFC response.

- 1. A call is placed to either 911 or 412-833-2000 which is the BP Police Emergency Dispatch Center. Even if you call 911, you will be transferred to the BP Police Dispatch, so it is much more efficient to call them directly at 412-833-2000 if you need emergency services in Bethel Park.
- 2. Once the BP Police Dispatcher determines that you need the fire company to respond, they activate our pagers and provide a voice message telling us the emergency and location. They also send out a notification to our phones via an application called Active 911. Active 911 allows responders to click into what station they are responding to, so our officers know if we have enough responders or if we need to call for more assistance. This program also provides us with a map of the address and the hydrants nearby.
- 3. After we receive notification, available volunteers will begin to respond. Our Chief Officers may respond to the scene while other Line Officers and firefighters will respond to the station. Depending on the severity of the emergency, some volunteers may use blue courtesy lights in their vehicles to ask other cars to move to the side so they can pass and get to the station quicker.
- 4. Once at the station, firefighters will put on their gear, get in the trucks, and respond to the scene. We won't always use the lights and sirens; it just depends on the severity of the emergency.

As you can see, we rely solely on volunteers being able to respond at a moment's notice. This is why we're always looking for more volunteers. The more volunteers we have, the more likely we are to have enough volunteers able to respond.

We're also extremely grateful to any employers who allow our volunteers to leave for emergencies!

Outreach is offering QPR Training

Suicide is one of the most complex of human behaviors. It's also one of the most difficult things for people to talk about. Yet teachers, coaches, school administrators, police officers, librarians,

priests and many others may find themselves in a situation in which it's necessary to do so. In fact, it's these "front-line" personnel that may make all the difference in preventing suicide just by listening and questioning. QPR training teaches you how.

Research suggests that the survival rate of individuals experiencing a heart attack is higher in places where the general public have training in CPR (QPR Institute, 2016). That is, those who witness someone having a potentially life threatening heart attack can help save that person's life if they have been

QPR stands for *Q: Question,* P: Persuade, R: Refer. The idea is that if we intervene in a mental health crisis, just like we use CPR in a physical crisis, we can save lives!

trained in CPR. It's no accident that QPR sounds similar to CPR. The founder of the QPR Institute, Dr. Paul Quinnett, conceived the acronym as a way to draw attention to a life-saving strategy for those contemplating suicide or those who are stressed to their limit. QPR stands for Q: Question, P: Persuade, R: Refer. The idea is that if we intervene in a mental health crisis, just like we use CPR in a physical crisis, we can save lives! Importantly, QPR is not a form of treatment or a replacement for mental health counseling. Instead, it's a strategy a gatekeeper can use to help save a life. According to QPR teaching, a gatekeeper is a person who may be in a position to identify possible warning signs that someone may be considering suicide.

You may, like so many others, be concerned that talking about suicide to

someone may in fact cause a person to think about or consider it. This is a common myth that is simply not true. We cannot make someone think about suicide. QPR instructors like to say, "A person is either thinking about suicide, or they are not" (QPR Institute, 2016). Trained gatekeepers of the QPR method can make all the difference by allowing for time and creating a space for someone to talk about what they are feeling and experiencing without concern of judgement.

We offer QPR training through Outreach Teen & Family Services by a Certified QPR Instructor. Outreach is a community counseling agency offering services to young people (children, teens and emerging adults). We provide training to numerous institutions and organizations including schools, universities, libraries, and community centers. The training provides you with the language and tools you may need to help someone in distress and works to break down the barriers people often encounter when talking about suicide.

You may, like so many others, be concerned that talking about suicide to someone may in fact cause a person to think about or consider it. This is a common myth. that is simply not true.

New Community Center Policy

Beginning Wednesday, March 1, the Bethel Park Community Center will begin implementing a new waiver policy requiring all Center quests using basketball courts, the walking track or exercise rooms to sign a waiver.

Currently, all individuals who take Recreation classes sign a waiver, so the new policy is simply bringing all Center users into alignment according to Community Center Director Emily Skoczlas. Those currently registered in Recreation programs will not need to sign a new waiver.

Waivers will be available at the Community Center front desk for signature and should take less than a minute to sign," said Skoczlas. "Please be sure to bring proof of ID. Parents or legal guardians of children under the age of 18 will need to sign a waiver on their child's behalf."

For those who have a Center membership, waivers will only need to be signed once each year (this also includes SilverSneakers' participants). Resident membership fees follow:
• Youth (13-17): \$5

- Adult (18-59): \$10
- Family: \$25 • Senior: \$5

Day pass users and member guests will need to sign a waiver or have a parent/guardian sign one (depending on age) each time they use the Center facilities.

Center Day Passes are \$1 and Resident Guest Passes are \$4 for five

"Regular visitors may want to purchase a membership to eliminate

the need to sign a waiver for each visit," said Skoczlas. "We're trying to make this new process as easy as possible for everyone who enjoys our Center!"

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Bethel Park Recreation reserves the right to cancel, combine or divide classes, or to make other changes that become necessary and to do so without incurring obligations. Adjustments of fees will be made when classes are canceled by the Department.

WHEN PROGRAMS BEGIN

In almost all instances, each activity will have a schedule with a beginning date. In those cases where time or day is not available, interested individuals should call the Recreation Office.

WHEN FEES ARE DUE

All fees must be paid at the time of registration unless special arrangements have been made at the Recreation Office. If registration is made by mail, be sure to include the activity fee and all information as required.

INSURANCE INFORMATION

The Recreation Board does not carry health insurance to cover injuries incurred while participating in any activity. In most cases, hospitalization carried through your employer will cover these types of injuries. Participants are also responsible for their personal property. Valuables should never be left unattended.

RETURNED CHECKS

Any check that is returned to the Recreation Office as "NSF" will be subject to a \$35.00 replacement fee. All "NSF" checks MUST be replaced within ten (10) working days, or the person will be withdrawn from the roster.

RESIDENCY INFORMATION

All Bethel Park residents are given preference in registering for programs offered in this leaflet. Classes with limited enrollment will be open to non-residents only if space permits. The Recreation Board reserves the right to refuse admission to any person who misrepresents residency and will not give refunds to those individuals. Non-resident fees are set for each activity and should be paid accordingly upon registration.

REFUNDS: Please read...

Refunds will only be given upon written request, received in the Recreation Office prior to the beginning of the second class or practice session. Phone requests will not be accepted, nor does failure to attend a class constitute notification of intent to withdraw from a class.

Some activities will have a sign-up day, such as youth swimming lessons. For your convenience, registrations may also be dropped off at the Bethel Park Community Center front desk or mailed to Bethel Park Recreation, 5151 Park Avenue, Bethel Park, PA 15102. **Individual telephone calls** will not be made confirming registration. The only time you will be notified is if there is a change or cancellation of the class or activity.


Younger children will love the fun and excitement provided in the age 2-5 area, where they will find developmentally appropriate play activities, enticing them to







RENTAL PROCEDURES

- Requests for rentals must be submitted in writing and should include the following information: Renters' name, address, phone numbers, date requested, time requested, specific room(s) requested (if known), purpose of rental and approximate number of guests expected. Requests may be returned to the Community Center in person or via
- email to communitycenter@bethelpark.net. Within a week, you'll receive written notification if your requested space is available or not.
- If available, we'll send you a Reservation Permit along with rental Terms & Conditions and additional rental information to complete.

Payment Schedule

- Fifty percent of total rental fees is due with the signed Rental
- The remaining 50% is due 30 days prior to your event.
- A refundable security deposit and room layout is due seven days prior to your event.

Please note that while we want your event to be a success, failure to meet any payment deadlines may result in rental cancellation. Fees paid will not be refunded.

Cancellation Policy/Fees

If you need to cancel your event, your request MUST be submitted in writing to the Community Center Director. Cancellation fees

- Cancellations received in writing more than 60 days prior to the scheduled date will receive a refund of 50% of initial rental payment, less a \$5 processing fee.
- No refund will be issued if written cancellation is received less than 60 days prior to event.

Other Rental Notes

- Any use of the Community Center which requires Municipal staff to stay after the scheduled closing time shall be charged an additional \$40 per hour for any portion of an hour that may be needed.
- Should your event need an alcohol permit for 150 persons or more, as a requirement, there will be additional security personnel fee.
- Rental rate includes the set-up of tables and chairs.
 Renters will be responsible to visit the Community Center one week in advance of their event to sign-off on all seating/room arrangements. The security/damage deposit should also be paid at this time. Rate: \$100 per area rented.



Membership Fees & Renewals

A membership card is required to use the Bethel Park Community Center *Gymnasium and Walking Track*. Both residents and non-residents can purchase 12-month memberships at the Community Center during normal business hours.

All that's needed to purchase a membership is completion of a simple membership application and photo identification (such as a drivers license) to prove residency; once payment is received, an identification photo will be kept on file for each member – a process expected to take less than 10 minutes. New members will receive both a wallet size member card as well as a small key tag card.

Individual memberships will include five complimentary guest passes, and Family memberships will include 15 complimentary guest passes.

Bethel Park Adopts Its 2023-2024 School Year Calendar

In January, the Bethel Park School Board voted unanimously at its monthly voting meeting to adopt a calendar for the 2023-2024 school

The next school year will begin on **Thursday, Aug. 24, 2023,** and end on **Tuesday, June 5, 2024.** The outdoor graduation ceremony will be held at Black Hawk Stadium at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 6. That ceremony could be rescheduled for Friday, June 7 or Saturday, June 8, in the case of inclement weather.

Some other highlights include:

- Fall Break will run from November 23 to 27, 2023, with students and staff returning to school on **Tuesday,**
- Winter Break will span from Christmas Day until New Year's Day, with students and staff returning to school on Tuesday, Jan. 2.
- Spring Break will begin on March 28 and end on April 1. That will be followed by Records Day on Tuesday, April 2, with classes resuming on Wednesday, April 3, 2024.

Other days off for students and staff include **Monday, Sept. 4, 2023** (Labor Day), **Monday, Feb. 19, 2024** (Presidents Day), and **Monday, May 27** (Memorial Day).

The Staff Development/In-Service Days will be held on Aug. 21 and 22, 2023, Tuesday, Nov. 7, Monday, Jan. 15, 2024, Tuesday, Feb. 20, and Tuesday, May 14. Records Days, which also mean no school for students, are slated for Wednesday, Aug. 23, 2023, Monday, Oct. 30, Monday, Jan. 22, 2024; Tuesday, April 2; and Wednesday, June 5. Additionally, there will be three scheduled Act 80 Days, which will mean two-bour delays for students for staff development. They will be held on

two-hour delays for students for staff development. They will be held on Wednesday, Nov. 1, 2023, Monday, Jan. 29, 2024, and Thursday, May 9. In the event of an unexpected day off, the make-up days are slated for, in no particular order, Jan. 15, 2024, Feb. 20, June 5, and June 6. Bethel Park will also continue to consider its remote learning options in

an unforeseen emergency.

I can't think of a better way to express the prevailing theme to our five-year Strategic Plan and the productive year we have had working its goals. For Bethel Park, there are far better things ahead. Here are some highlights.

The Facilities and Infrastructure of the district will be "far better" in the next few years, securely positioning our buildings for the next 25 years thanks to major facilities getting much-needed attention. The Independence Middle School renovation project is moving into Phase II. The bus garage project is finished. The installation of restrooms at the practice fields is on schedule for this summer. Plans for the new elementary school are progressing very well. If you have not yet looked at the plans and architectural renderings, visit our microsite https://bpsdbestinclass.org/ to see the latest. With only a few more months of design work left, the project should be out to bid in the fall and will likely break ground by the end of this calendar year.

Here's some more great news about the **elementary project.** The School District has partnered with the Pittsburgh Children's Museum. We are excited about the possibilities they will provide to enrich the building design with educational experiences. It is through this partnership, we believe the building itself will be a "far better" learning

Beyond the physical infrastructure, we continue to make progress on other important parts of our strategic plan, including from the **curriculum and instruction** category. After three full days of in-service, I am pleased to say our massive curriculum alignment project is going really well. This has produced some very productive, long-overdue discussions among teachers about our curriculum sequence, scope and priorities

From the **student experience** category, we have directed new personnel and resources as well as offered professional development to reinforce our student support services. We recognize with concern the many challenges and pressures our students face that detract from their social and emotional health. We want our schools and our staff to be a safe, supportive place, their go-to for support and academic success.

While we are pleased and proud of this progress, and we are seeing the positive changes in Bethel Park, it is worth saying again that these goals are seismic shifts in our system. This takes time to

accomplish, and it takes even more time for it to produce the long-term growth we seek in becoming "best in class." I close by extending my appreciation for your support, your commitment and your patience and the same from our faculty and administrators doing this heavy lifting. There are far better things ahead...

Homeless Education Information for Parents/Guardians: 2022-2023

In compliance with the federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, the Bethel Park School District is attempting to identify all children within the district that may be experiencing homelessness

The term homeless children and youth is defined as individuals who lack a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence. This includes individuals who are:

- Sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship or a similar reason.
- Living in a hotel, motel, trailer park, or campground due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations.

Living in emergency or transitional shelters.

- Living in cars, parks, public places, abandoned buildings, bus or train stations, or similar settings.
- Living in substandard housing (no running water or working utilities, infestations, etc.).
- Unaccompanied homeless youth meaning any child who is not in the physical custody of a parent/guardian.

Children who are experiencing homelessness may qualify for enrollment in free breakfast and lunch programs, access to appropriate instructional and social emotional learning supports, and transportation so they can remain in their school of origin.

If you believe your child/children may qualify for these services or if your living situation changes during the school year and your children become homeless, please contact Dr. David Muench via email at muench.david@bphawks.org. The district will work with any parent/guardian so that your child/children's education suffers as little disruption as possible.

FCC Announces Affordable Connectivity Program

The Affordable Connectivity Program is a Federal Communications Commission program that helps connect families and households struggling to afford internet service. This new benefit provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward broadband service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal lands. Eligible households can also receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers.

Eligible households can enroll through a participating broadband provider or directly with the Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC) using an online or mail in application.

Understanding the Difference Between Remote Instruction and a Snow Day

Wintertime in Western Pennsylvania often means snowy weather and hazardous driving conditions. That can sometimes lead to instances where Bethel Park's schools are delayed or even closed.

When schools are closed, the district has two basic options at its disposal. It can either declare a Remote Instructional Day or an Emergency School Closure, more commonly known as a "snow day." It is important that everyone understands the differences between the two and how the school district arrives at its school delay and closure-related decisions, so that district families and staff can prepare adequately when those days

Remote Instructional Days (RIDs) were initially implemented through the Pennsylvania Department of Education at the pandemic's start as a vehicle for schools to continue to educate their students when inperson education wasn't possible. They will remain an option for PA schools through at least the end of the 2022-2023 school year. They can be used for COVID-19-related reasons and other non-pandemic-related

During RIDs, students attend school virtually, where they may be required to follow their regular daily class schedule in real-time (synchronously) or be permitted to complete their work at their own pace (asynchronously). The school district alerts families ahead of time which approach students and staff should follow.

Bethel Park School District does not provide transportation or special in-person services during a Remote Instructional Day, and district schools are closed to everyone except authorized personnel.


Teachers are expected to review and clearly articulate the assignments and class expectations on any day that requires remote instruction.

An Emergency School Closure (snow day), on the other hand, is pretty straight forward. When Bethel Park School District declares a snow day, no students or staff are to report to the building and no coursework will be assigned for that day. Unlike RIDs, however, snow days are often made up later in the year. This year's remaining make-up dates are April 6 and 10 and June 7 and 8.

That brings us to the very important question of what criteria does the district use to arrive at its decision to declare a Remote Instructional Day or a snow day?

If the district determines in advance that inclement weather is very likely or imminent, a Remote Instructional Day could be declared along with detailed instructions on the teachers' expectations and procedures. A snow day is more likely to be announced when the inclement weather is unexpected or much more voluminous or treacherous than expected. No classwork will be assigned during a snow day.

Additionally, she manages and oversees WBK's Tax Assessment and Tax Collection practice groups. In addition to Bethel Park, she also assists with Ambridge Area School District and AW Beattie Career and Technical

Megan represents public schools in all aspects of governance, operation and finance. She specializes in managing the labor and employment matters of these clients, and she serves as special counsel for investigative and reporting purposes.

'This is a very exciting time to be working with Bethel Park because there are so many wonderful things

happening here and because the commitment to success is so evident amongst the school board, administrators, teachers and the community," she said.

According to its website, WBK serves more than 20 area school districts and career centers, which, Turnbull insists, is a phenomenal asset.

"We serve so many different area schools and they are all different and have their own unique set of challenges and opportunities," she said. "That becomes a major advantage when you come across a particularly complicated or thorny issue, because that cross pollination from other areas and other school districts can really add context to our discussions.

Turnbull, a Philadelphia native, lives in Franklin Park with her husband, Amitava, and their three children. She was recently named a 2023 Pennsylvania Super Lawyer. Kindergarten Registration Now Open for 2023-2024 School Year

If your child will be old enough to start kindergarten in September, now is the time to register them for school in the Bethel Park School District.

Online registration is now available by visiting the school district's website, <u>www.bpsd.org</u>. There, under the Enrolling tab on the left-hand side of the landing page, you can begin the process of enrolling your child in Bethel Park Schools right from the comfort of your own home.

You will need to complete and submit the following documents to register your student for Kindergarten at Bethel Park:

- Proof of Child's Age That can include a birth certificate, baptismal certificate, etc.
 - 1. Please see BPSD Policy 200 on our website for additional information
- Proof of Residency One from each category is required:
 - 1. A deed, current mortgage statement or a current lease agreement
 - 2. A current utility bill, current credit card bill, property tax bill, vehicle registration, driver's license, or Dept. of Transportation-issued identification card

The website will also have downloadable documents that must be completed and submitted either by uploading them into the New Student Registration Online Portal system, by US Mail or by dropping them off in person at the school your child will attend. Those documents include:

- Health History
- **Dental Form**
- Speech/Language Form
- **Lead Testing**
- Physical Exam (includes immunization history)
- Parental Registration Form
- Earned Income Tax Form (this requirement only applies to families without children already enrolled in Bethel Park Schools)

The Dental Form, Lead Testing Form, and Physical Exam must be signed by a medical/dental professional/health care provider before you may register your student for Kindergarten in Bethel Park Schools.

In Pennsylvania, children must be five years old by Sept. 1 to enroll in kindergarten. If your child will turn five between Sept. 1 and Sept. 30, 2023, and you wish to enroll them in Bethel Park School District, please see Bethel Park School Board Policy 201 for more information regarding a waiver of age attendance requirements.

For any questions, parents are encouraged to contact the school their child will be attending.


Bethel Park Hosts Successful Blood Drive

BETHEL PARK SCHOOL DISTRICT ANNUAL PUBLIC NOTICE — 2022-2023

The Bethel Park School District uses the following procedures for locating, identifying, and evaluating specified needs of school-aged students requiring special programs or services. These procedures are described in this notice as required by law.

The District, as prescribed by Section 1402 of the School Code, routinely conducts screenings of a child's hearing acuity in grades Kindergarten, 1, 2, 3, 7, and 11. Visual acuity is screened in all grades annually. Speech and language skills are screened in Kindergarten and on a referral basis. New students are initially screened the year of admission. Gross motor and fine motor skills, academic skills, and social-emotional skills are assessed by classroom teachers on an on-going basis. Other screening activities include but are not limited to the review of cumulative group-based achievement and ability data; health and attendance records; grades; and information shared by the parents. Specified needs from all of these screening sources are noted within the child's official file.

School records are always open and available to parents, and only to school officials who have a legitimate "need to know" information about the student. Information from the records is released to other persons or agencies only with appropriate authorization that involves written signed permission by parents.

Parents with concerns regarding their child may contact building principals at any time to request a screening or evaluation of their child, or by contacting the Student Support Services. (Names and phone numbers of the appropriate contacts are listed at the end of this notice.) Communication with parents and eligible students shall be in English or the native language of the parents.

Screening information will be used by the Intervention Team or Student Assistance Team within the student's school to meet his or her specific needs, or to document the need for further evaluation. Student Assistance/Intervention Team services are provided to students in grades kindergarten through 12. The pre-referral process identifies those students at-risk for academic or behavioral needs and includes parental involvement in making determinations as to whether a student may benefit from intervention services. Individual student plans are developed and monitoring of specific goals with data to determine student progress and efficacy of interventions are put into place. If a student is not making sufficient progress, a referral for evaluation may be issued by the school district or a parent may request a multi-disciplinary evaluation at any time.

The Multidisciplinary Team consists of parents, teachers, a certified school psychologist, other related service personnel, and persons familiar with the student's educational experience and cultural background. The evaluations conducted by the Team must be sufficient in scope and depth to provide information about the student's academic functioning, adaptive and social behavior, learning problems, strengths, information obtained by the Intervention Team or Student Assistance Team, and information from the parents. After all evaluations are completed, an Evaluation Report (ER) will be compiled and include specific recommendations for the types of interventions necessary to meet the student's specific needs. This evaluation will be completed and a report sent to the parents within 60 calendar days. Parents are then invited to participate in a meeting where the results of the evaluation will

If the student meets criteria for the presence of a disability and need for specially designed instruction, an Individualized Education Program (IEP) will then be developed for specially designed instruction for the student within 30 calendar days. The IEP team must consist of: the student's parent(s), special education teacher, regular education teacher(s), and local education agency representative (LEA). Students of transition age, or younger if determined, must be invited to participate. The building principal, Director of Student Support Services, or Supervisor of Special Education will serve as the chair/LEA, and

a district psychologist, other specialists as needed, and other administrative staff when appropriate may

Prior to the initiation of services, parents will be presented with a Notice of Recommended Educational Placement, which explains the services and educational placement recommendations. Parental consent must be obtained before providing initial special education and related services. The Procedural Safeguards Notice describes the parents' rights and options if they disagree with the individualized program presented

Services for Students Who Are Mentally Gifted

When screening results suggest a student may be eligible for Gifted Education, the school district seeks parental consent to conduct a multidisciplinary evaluation. Additionally, a parent may request a multidisciplinary evaluation at any time. The initial evaluation based on a multiple criteria approach is summarized in the Gifted Written Report (GWR) and used by the Gifted Individualized Education Program (GIEP) team to develop the GIEP. After the initial evaluation, students identified as mentally gifted are reevaluated before a change in educationa placement is recommended or under recommendation of the GIEP team. The Notice of Recommended Assignment (NORA), signed by the parent, gives the school district permission to provide services. Parents can obtain further information by contacting their child's school principal or the District's Student Support Services at 412-854-8410.

Services for Eligible School-Age Students
The Bethel Park School District provides a free, appropriate, public education to eligible students. qualify as an eligible student, the child must be of school age, in need of specially-designed instruction, and meet eligibility criteria for one or more of the following physical or mental disabilities, as set forth in the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act and Pennsylvania State Regulations: Autism, Deaf-Blindness, Deafness, Emotional Disturbance, Hearing Impairment, Intellectual Disability, Multiple Disabilities, Orthopedic Impairment, Other Health Impairment, Specific Learning Disability, Speech or Language Impairment, Traumatic Brain Injury, or Visual Impairment including

The Bethel Park School District provides a full range of placement options and services to eligible students. Options in the district range from supportive intervention in the regular classroom to itinerant, supplemental, or full-time levels of intervention, depending on the student's individual needs. Inclusive intervention practices of the general education curriculum and classroom with supplementary aids and services are the first step in the continuum of placement options. Other placement options to meet the student's needs may include, but are not limited to services secured from the Intermediate Unit, another school district, an approved private school, or a private licensed academic school program. Placement options provide for a free and appropriate public education (FAPE) for all eligible students. The District also provides related services such as, but not limited to: transportation, speech and language therapy, physical therapy, occupational therapy, nursing services, psychological services, social worker services, paraeducator support, and personal care assistant services.

The following programs are currently provided within the District: Learning Support, Life Skills Support, Emotional Support, Autistic Support, Blind or Visually Impaired Support, Deaf and Hearing Impaired Support, Physical Support, Speech and Language Support, and Gifted Support. As evidence of the full continuum of services, educational placements outside of the District have included, but are not limited to: Emotional Support at Pace School. Wesley School Programs; Learning Support at ACLD Tillotson School; Life Skills Support at Mon Valley School, Pathfinder School, Education Center at the Watson Institute, and the Children's Institute; Blind or

Visually Impaired Support at Western Pennsylvania School for the Blind; Deaf and Hearing Impaired Support at the Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf and the DePaul School for Hearing and Speech; Autistic Support at Wesley School Programs, Pathfinder School, Mon Valley School, Pressley Ridge Day School for Autism; and Multiple Disabilities Support at the Children's Institute and Pathfinder School.

Services for Students Who are English Learners

The education of students whose dominant language is not English is the responsibility of every school district/charter school in Pennsylvania. English learners must be enrolled upon presentation of a local address and proof of immunization. The Home Language Survey (HLS) is administered for all students and retained in the student's permanent record. For those students whose primary home language is other than English (PHLOTE), the district must also determine the student's English language proficiency and, if appropriate, English as a Second Language instruction will be provided following all regulations, policies, and procedures. Services for Students Identified as Homeless and/or **Foster Care**

The Bethel Park School District follows all protections outlined in the McKinney Vento Act related to ensuring that any child identified as homeless or in foster care has equal access to the same free, appropriate public education as provided to other children. The District implements child find activities for other students in addition to those identified as homeless or in foster care such as wards of the state, highly mobile children, and migrant children in order to provide equal access to evaluations and services. Services for Students in Nonpublic Schools
Parents of non-public school students who suspect that their child has a disability and is need of special education may request a multidisciplinary evaluation through a written request to the District's Student Support Services. Parents can obtain further information by contacting their child's school principal or the District's Student Support Services at 412-854-8410.

Services for Preschool Age Children

Act 212, the Early Intervention System Act, entitles all preschool age children with disabilities to appropriate early intervention services. Young children experiencing developmental delays or physical or mental disabilities are eligible for early intervention services including screening, evaluation, individualized education program planning, and provision of appropriate programs and services.

The Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare is responsible for providing services to infants and toddlers, defined as children from birth through two years of age. Bethel Park School District ensures that all students transitioning from early intervention programs to kindergarten or first grade programs within the District are transitioned without disruption of services. Parents of children entering school age programs are notified of the District's transition activities, which occur before kindergarten registration of each year. The District follows the federal and state regulations pertaining to the evaluation process and based on identified needs, subsequent documentation and provision of special education and related services.

Information Regarding Signs of Developmental Delays and Other Risk Factors for Parents to Look for that May Indicate the Possibility of a Disability

If your child is less than the age of beginners (age 5 before September 1) and at least 3 years of age,

your child may be considered to have a developmental delay when difficulties exist in the areas of cognitive, communicative, physical, social/emotional and self-help development where a delay in comparison to typical development is present. Parents who have questions about their child's development or possible presence of a disability may talk with their family physician or health care provider or contact the Allegheny County Health Department at 412-687-2243.

If you have questions regarding difficulties your child may be experiencing, please contact the Student Support Services at 412-854-8410.

Potential signs of developmental delay and other risk factors that could indicate the presence of a disability may include:

By the age of 3: Not saying many words; not using 2-3 word phrases and sentences; not walking; awkward gait (walking); excessive salivation; not answering "show" or "what" questions; and/or not using utensils to feed self.

By the age of 4 (all of the above included): Not toilet trained; difficulty with directional words (in, on, under, out); not playing with other children; not able to draw a circle, cross or imitate a vertical line; not able to understand the child's speech most of the time;

and/or difficulty following simple two-step directions. By the age of 5 (all of the above included): unable to answer "where" questions; unable to recall details from a story; not drawing a person with at least 6 parts; immature speech patterns ("me" instead of "I"); and not able to hop forward on one foot without

Other warning signs at any age: Little to no eye contact; over/under sensitivities to pain, light, noise; hand flapping; no awareness of space (always bumping into other people or things); awkward hand or foot positioning; won't touch or eat certain textures; child no longer can do things he/she used to do; developed normally, then stopped; echoes what is said; and/or plays with toys inappropriately (watches wheels spin on a car toy, but does not play with the

Protected Handicapped Students/Chapter 15
The Bethel Park School District, in compliance with state and federal law, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and Chapter 15 of the Pennsylvania Public School Code, will provide to each protected handicapped student without discrimination or cost to the student or family, those related aids, services, or accommodations which are needed to provide the student equal opportunity to participate in and obtain the benefits of the school program and extracurricular activities to the maximum extent appropriate to the student's abilities. In order to qualify as a protected handicapped student, the child must be of school age with a physical or mental disability or diagnosis, which substantially limits or prohibits participation in or access to an aspect of the school program. These services and protections for "protected handicapped students" are distinct from those applicable to all eligible or exceptional students enrolled *(or seeking enrollment)* in special education programs.

Confidentiality of Student Records

Bethel Park School District and its employees are required by Federal Law and State and Federal Rules and Regulations to protect the rights of students including confidentiality of personally identifiable information for all students in accordance with state and federal law and the District's student records policy. The foundation of these rights comes from

Federal legislation entitled, Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (also known as the Buckley Amendments). There are State Rules and Regulations dealing with regular and special education students' rights and privacy. All students are covered by the State Regulations contained in Chapter 12 known as Students' Rights and Responsibilities.

The basic premise of the above-mentioned laws, rules, and regulations is that information about students cannot be disclosed without written parental consent. There are different categories of information: Educational Records, Personally Identifiable Information, and Directory Information. Education Records consist of information directly related to students which are maintained by the educational agency. Personally Identifiable Information includes the student's name, the name of the parent or other family members, a personal identifier or a list of personal characteristics that would make the

student's identity easily traceable. Education Records and Personally Identifiable Information cannot be disclosed or released without written parent consent, or if a student is over 18,

without student permission.

There is certain information that can be released without consent, which is called Directory Information. Directory Information means information contained in an educational record of a student which would not generally be considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if disclosed. The School District designates what information is labeled as Directory Information. It shall include the following: the student's name, address, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student.

Disclosure of information means to permit access

to or the release, transfer, or other communication of education records, or the personally identifiable information contained in these records, to any party, by any means, including oral, written, or electronic means. This means that information about a student cannot even be shared in conversation without permission. This also applies to other Bethel Park personnel who do not have an educationally relevant

personnel who do not have an educationally relevant reason to possess knowledge of a student.

Written parental consent is necessary for disclosure of Personally Identifiable Information and Educational Records. The consent must: (1) specify the records that may be disclosed; (2) state the purpose of the disclosure; (3) identify the party or class of parties to whom the disclosure may be made. Furthermore, the Bethel Park School District must maintain a written record of disclosure for the parents to inspect in case information has been released.

In accordance with 34 CFR §300.624, please be advised of the following retention/destruction schedule for the Pennsylvania Alternate System of Assessment (PASA), Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA), and Keystone Exam related materials:

 PSSA, Keystone Exam, and PASA test booklets will be destroyed one year after student reports are delivered for the administration associated with the test booklets.

 PSSA and Keystone Exam answer booklets and PASA media recordings will be destroyed three years after the completion of the assessment.

A parent may file a written complaint alleging that the rights described in this notice were not provided to: Pennsylvania Department of Education, Bureau of Special Education, Division of Compliance, 333 Market Street, Harrisburg, PA 17126-0333.

The Department of Education will investigate the

matter and issue a report of findings and necessary corrective action within 60 days. The Department will take necessary action to ensure compliance is achieved. Complaints alleging failures of the school district with regard to confidentiality of personally identifiable information may also be filed with: Family Policy Compliance Office, U.S. Department of Education, 400 Maryland Avenue SW, Washington, DC 20202-4605.

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Electrify Your Strings Delights Audiences and Student-Musicians

In January, Electric Cellist **Greg Byers** and more than 100 student-musicians from Bethel Park High School and Independence Middle School quite literally lit up the auditorium with some classic rock songs with a classical twist at their 2023 "Electrify Your Strings," concert.

Byers, an instructor with the nonprofit educational organization of the same name, conducted the proceedings and prepared the students

The music education phenomenon energizes students, teachers, and local communities by injecting a high-voltage dose of energy and much-needed funding into a school's music education program. This intensive experience boosts student self-esteem and motivation, increases school-wide, family and community engagement, and helps raise money for participating schools.

The concert also afforded the younger musicians the rare chance to

perform alongside their older counterparts.

"The music is obviously a blast to play, but what I love most about it is the sense of community and togetherness it brings to our students. Everyone has a role and everyone gets involved," high school orchestra director **Stephanie Glover** said prior to the show. "We had elementary kids collecting some of the tickets, and the middle schoolers were able to play on a few songs!"

The Bethel Park Music Boosters group provided support for the program by hosting Byers during his visit. They also held extra events to help fundraise for the program. And Bethel Park business Pasta Too fed

the students on the day of the performance.

Byers also had some tricks up his sleeve by introducing versions of instruments built specifically for amplification and featuring some distinctive design features. The students also surprised the crowd through a number of fun things like throwing their bows in the air, flipping their cellos around as well as dancing and marching to some songs.

Measuring and Reporting Growth

It's coming up on testing season again. PSSA, Keystone, and AP. tests are administered throughout the spring. Bethel Park is aiming for 100% participation in this year's assessments.

The PSSA exams are criterion-referenced tests administered this time every year in Pennsylvania to students in 3rd through 8th grade. The purpose is much like your annual trip to the doctor's office for a physical. The doctor checks your height, weight, eyes, reflexes and all sorts of other body systems to assess how well you have grown since your last appointment. The state assessments measure how much a student has "grown," cognitively speaking, in comparison to a pre-determined set of criteria over the last year. With regular attendance, conscious and consistent effort, robust standards-aligned curriculum, and engaging instruction, students should achieve as much success as last year, considering the assessment covers new material.

Keystone exams are end-of-course tests for students in Algebra, Literature and Biology. These are not PSSAs; these are more like final, end-of-course exams. The state requires a passing score to graduate. Without a passing score, students must demonstrate proficiency in the course through other measures or pathways.

AP. tests are exams to measure the achievement of students who are completing an AP. course. Designed by the College Board, Advanced Placement (AP.) courses and exams are designed to measure college-level material for students taking a college course while still in high school. Many colleges will award a student credit for earning a qualifying score on the AP. test.

We are always proud of our students' efforts on these assessments, and we appreciate how seriously students take them. That conscientious participation helps us be sure we have reliable information to keep tabs on individual student growth as well as benchmark any problematic areas for which we should be adjusting.

Students in Mr. Brad Kszastowski's Computer Integrated Manufacturing (CIM) class used a digital torque adaptor purchased thanks to a generous donation from Harbor Freight as part of its Tools for Schools program. The adapter measured the relative strength of wrenches designed by the students on software called Fusion 360 and created through the school's Creality Ender 3D Printer.

Introduction to Transportation Class

Students in Mr. Art Smock's Introduction to Transportation class recently designed, built, and tested the aerodynamics of cars they created out of wedge-shaped wood blocks. According to Smock, the designs were as creative as they were innovative and included a tank, a French fry car, a BPSD school bus, and a pink eraser, among others.

"I have taught this unit for a long time, and this is the most dedicated group of students I've ever had," said Smock. "They all worked very hard on their designs, and you could tell.

Bethel Park Athletic Hall of Fame Welcomes Newest Members

The Bethel Park Athletic Hall of Fame, sponsored by Allegheny Health Network, has welcomed six former Bethel Park sports standouts.

The induction ceremony was held in the Bethel Park High School cafeteria and later at halftime of the Hawks boys basketball game versus Canon-McMillan. It included Glenn Nordstrom (football and basketball) '45 and his son Carl (baseball and football) '83.

The Nordstroms are just the second father-son combination to be selected for the BPAHOF. The other honorees included Eric Morrison (baseball and soccer) '04, Kellie Schmitt (tennis) '05, and Megan Marecic (basketball) '14.

James Moore, the founder of the boys basketball and football programs, was posthumously given the Distinguished Contribution Award.

More about this year's inductees:

 James Moore was recognized for **Outstanding Contributions and** Remarkable Service to Bethel Park Athletics for creating both the Bethel Park Boys' Basketball program (1927)



and the Bethel Park Football program (1929). He served as the boys' varsity basketball coach from the 1928-1933 seasons, but it was on the gridiron where he made his most significant contribution as a coach. He served as the head varsity football coach from 1929-1940, amassing a career record of 46-41-8, which still positions him at number 3 on our football program's alltime wins list. His Bethel Bees finished in second place in the conference three times (1932, 1937, 1939), guiding them to a conference title in 1934, earning them an opportunity to play in the 1934 WPIAL Championship Game, where Bethel earned the silver medal. James Moore is the recipient of the 2022 Distinguished Contribution Award for his contributions to the football and basketball programs.

 Glenn Nordstrom '45 – The athletes from the 1930s, 40s & 50s, were the pioneers of Bethel Park athletics. They are the ones who laid the foundation and paved the way for future Black Hawks, and Glenn was one of those

pioneers. A four-year member of the varsity football team (1941-1944), and a three-year member of the varsity basketball team (1943-1945). Glenn Nordstrom was one of the most prolific linemen of the 1940s, helping the Bees to a 6-1-1 season in 1943. However, perhaps his best sport was basketball, where Glenn helped the Bees chalk up 33 wins in his three varsity seasons, including serving as team captain and leading scorer on the 1945 squad. Glen played Division I basketball at the University of Pittsburgh.

• Carl Nordstrom '83 - A three-year member of the varsity baseball team (1981-1983) and two-year member of the varsity football team (1981-1982), he helped guide the Black Hawks to a section crown in baseball in 1982. He emerged as one of the supreme pitchers in the South Hills in 1983, when he fanned 50 batters while hitting at a .443 clip as a middle infielder. He was drafted by the Cincinnati Reds in 1987, and spent the next three seasons in their system, where he earned 14 wins on the mound, struck out nearly 200 batters, and helped the Cedar Rapids Reds capture the Midwest League Championship.

• Eric Morrison '04 - A two-year varsity letterman in baseball (2003-2004), and three-year varsity letterman in soccer (2001-2003), Eric Morrison steered the Black Hawks baseball team to the 2003 state championship game. He was a member of the 2004 Post-Gazette All-WPIAL Team, 2X member of the Post-Gazette All-South Area Team (2003 & 2004), 2X member of the Almanac Diamond Dozen (2003 & 2004), 2X All-Section Selection (2003 & 2004), as well as being named the 2003 Post-Gazette All-South Player of the Year. He went on to play collegiately at Division I Duquesne University, where he was a fouryear starter in centerfield, played professionally in the Independent Continental Baseball League, and was inducted into the Semi-Pro Baseball Hall of Fame in 2018.

• Kellie Schmitt '05 - Three-Year Varsity Letter Winner on the Girls' Tennis Team, who anchored the #1 Singles Position (2001-2003). She was the first tennis player in school history to capture a WPIAL singles championship, which she did so in 2002. She also added a WPIAL Bronze Medal (2001) and three Section Championships to her hardware collection. The 2002 Almanac Player of the Year played her college tennis at Division I Marshall University (2005-2009), where she rewrote the record book. Kellie concluded her career with the Thundering

Herd as the All-Time leader in Career Wins (236), Singles Wins in a Career (127), Single Season Wins (35), Singles Win% (.779), and 2nd All-Time in Doubles Wins (109). She was a 3X NCAA Singles Tournament Qualifier, the 2008 ITA East Regional Singles Silver Medalist & Doubles Champion, and a 2X Recipient of the Dot Hicks Award (2008 & 2009), which is awarded to Marshall's Female Athlete of the Year. Additionally, she was a 5X All-Conference 1st Team Selection, 3X Conference USA Player of the Year (2007-2009), 2X Conference USA Doubles Champion (2006 & 2007), and in 2020 was inducted into the Marshall University Athletic Hall of Fame.

• Megan Marecic '14 - A three-year varsity starter on the Girls' Basketball Team (2011-2013), where she was an offensive catalyst, amassing 1,063 career points, and guided the Lady Hawks to their only WPIAL Championship (2013) in school history. Her decorated high school career includes being a 3X All-Section Selection, a 3X Almanac All-Star & Observer-Reporter Elite 11, a 2X member of the Post-Gazette All-WPIAL Team (2012-2013), a member 2013 Post-Gazette All-South Area Fab 5, and honored as a 2013 PIAA 2nd Team All-State Selection. She went on to play collegiately at Division I Drexel University (2015-2018), directing the Lady Dragons to the conference finals while leading the team in three-point field goals and free throw percentage in 2018. She wrapped up her illustrious career at Seton Hill University in 2019, setting the school single-season record for three-pointers (96) and foul shot percentage (92.2%). She was selected 1st Team All-PSAC and an NCAA Division II All-American.

In January, four Bethel Park hockey players - all seniors - were selected to participate in the 2023 Class 3A PIHL All-Star Game at Robert Morris University's Island Sports Center. Forwards Aaron All, Colin Nebel and **Christian Strang** were joined by defenseman Luke Henderson.

All centers the team's first line

with Strang on his left side and Nebel roaming the right-wing. After a very slow start, the talented but banged up Hawks team (5-7-1) that had been ravaged by the flu bug, had begun to find its footing at press time and was in contention for a playoff berth after shutting out Mt. Lebanon, 2-0.

Strang, the team's captain, was named the Class 3A November Player of the Month. His coach, Mike Schall credits his captain's leadership as a big reason for the turnaround.

'Christian is hard working, strong on the puck and has a great compete level," said Schall. "We have a lot of good players and we just needed to get healthy and compete a little harder and the positive results have come with that.'



Moul Named All-State Football Player

Bethel Park senior Gavin Moul (6-1/217) had an outstanding senior season for the Hawks football team. The intense and rugged two-way player led Bethel Park to a 10-2 season and an appearance in the WPIAL Class 5A semifinals.

As a running back, Moul rushed for 649 yards on 113 attempts and caught 18 passes. He also scored eight

It was on the defensive side, however, that he made his most significant impact. The Delaware linebacker recruit was a force on defense with 45 unassisted tackles and 16 tackles for loss. At the end of the season, Moul was named to the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette's prestigious Fabulous 22 All-Star Team and was also an All-State football selection. He was also named to the Almanac's Football All-Star Team.



Some other accolades for Fall Sports student-athletes included:

- Joining Moul on the Almanac's Football All-Star team were **Austin Caye** (running back), **Dinari Clacks** (defensive back), **Braedon Del Duca** (offensive lineman), Ryan Petras (athlete), and Aidan Currie (linebacker).
- Senior Coby Goelz (football) was named an Academic All-American by the Great American Rivalry Series website. Coby has a 4.56 GPA and is an active member of the National Honor Society. He has lettered on both the football and two-time state championship baseball teams. Following graduation, Coby plans to study molecular biology and continue to medical school to become an orthopedic surgeon.
- The 2022 WPIAL boys soccer all-section teams were announced. Bethel Park had three representatives: Seniors **Miles Jackson** (forward/midfielder) and Jaycob Zeminski (midfielder); and junior Henry Gaston (midfielder/defense).
- Girls soccer standout Eva Blatz was an All-WPIAL selection. She was also first-team all-Big 56 and was also a Coaches Association first-team selection. Blatz will play collegiately at Buffalo.
- Girls volleyball players Grace Lejeck (outside hitter) and Sophie Puzausky (right-side hitter) were each chosen as second-team all-WPIAL and firstteam all-section selections.

Peckich to Replace DeLallo as Bethel Park Football Coach

In January, Phil Peckich became the 15th head football coach in Bethel Park history and just the program's third coach in the past three decades. Peckich succeeds Brian DeLallo, who surprised everyone in December by retiring as coach just days after the team's 10-2 season came

to a heartbreaking end in a monsoon in the WPIAL Class 5A semifinals against Upper St. Clair.

This is the first head coaching job for the 31 year-old Montour High School alum, but he already has eight years of coaching experience, including the past three as an offensive assistant at Bethel Park. This past season, Peckich served as the offensive coordinator for a team that averaged nearly 25 points per game and earned the top seed in the WPIAL Class 5A playoffs for the first time in school history.

Peckich will not work in the district in any capacity besides as head football coach. Still, he said he already feels well acquainted with the

community.

"There is a clear alignment from the administration down all the way through the community," he said. "Friday nights are community events, and football matters here, and that means a lot to me.

DeLallo, who also teaches at the school and is not retiring from that position, was a longtime assistant coach before taking over the program reins in March 2019. In four seasons as the Hawks' head coach, DeLallo's teams had a record of 22-19 overall and went 13-9 in league play.

This year, just two seasons removed from a winless pandemic-shortened 2020 campaign, Bethel Park shocked many WPIAL fans and writers with a 10-2 record en route to a section championship and a WPIAL Class 5A semifinals appearance.

Under DeLallo, 19 Bethel Park football players earned First Team All-Conference honors. He was also named the 2022 Allegheny Six Coach of the Year in a vote of his coaching peers.

The football team also made national headlines last winter when DeLallo tweeted out to his players to eschew that day's scheduled weight-training session to shovel the neighbors' sidewalks and driveways instead. That simple gesture, and his players' fantastic response to it, landed Bethel Park in the spotlight as an example of good people doing good things for others. The story appeared on the Today Show, Inside Edition, the Washington Post, and Fox & Friends, among others.

Athletic director Dan Sloan said maintaining continuity played a significant role in the school's

decision to elevate Peckich.

Sloan explained that the football program had been trending in the right direction for a few years on and off the field, and he was gratified to see it pay off this past season in the form of wins. That's why he was so disappointed in December when DeLallo informed him of his decision to retire to focus on his health.

"We were all shocked and disappointed when Coach DeLallo announced his retirement," said Sloan. "But we also care much more about Brian, the person, than Brian, the coach, and we fully support his decision."

Sloan said his subsequent conversations with DeLallo, his staff, and the student-athletes factored heavily into the school's decision to hire Peckich. "As the process evolved, it became clear to everyone involved that Phil Peckich was the best choice to usher in the next era of Black Hawks football," he said.

In a January press conference held at the Senator John Heinz History Center and Western Pennsylvania Sports Museum, the Western Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic League (WPIAL) introduced its 2023 Hall of Fame class, which featured 15 inductees across seven different categories, including two with strong ties to Bethel Park athletics.

Emily Carter '01 was a standout swimmer for the Hawks. She won

seven WPIAL and five PIAA gold medals during her illustrious career. She also led Bethel Park to three WPIAL titles from 1998 to 2000 and backto-back PIAA crowns in 1998 and 1999 under legendary coach Bill Kennedy. Carter earned 11 All-American nods over her high school career and set WPIAL records in the 200 medley relay and 100 breaststroke, as well as the PIAA record in the 200 medley relay. Her WPIAL record in the 100 breaststroke stood for 15 years. She was inducted into the Bethel Park Athletic Hall of Fame in 2007. Carter was also an outstanding student, a

graduated from high school with a 4.3 GPA. She would go on to swim collegiately at Stanford University, one of the nation's most prestigious universities and one of her sport's most elite programs.

three-time Scholastic All-American, and a

member of the National Honor Society who

Carter gives credit to her old coach, Bill Kennedy, for being instrumental in helping her to achieve her athletic goals and to get recognized by the top NCAA Division 1 swimming program in the country.

According to Carter, after competing in the Olympic Trials the summer after her junior year at Bethel Park, she returned home and told her coach that she wanted to swim at Stanford, a wildly ambitious goal for anyone, much less a young lady from Western Pennsylvania. He immediately picked up the phone

and called them and really talked me up to them," she said. "Before I knew it, I was on their radar and eventually went on to gain a swimming scholarship to the program.

Emily began swimming competitively as an eight year-old in the old Bethel Park swimming pool and says the sport was a significant part of her early life.

"I really feel like I've had two lives - my swimming life and my postswimming life," she said. "There's no question, however, that many of the lessons I learned in the pool - being dedicated and persistently working towards my goals - have helped to launch me into where I am

Since graduating from college, Carter has remained in the Bay area. She now lives in San Francisco, where she is the Senior Director of People Analytics & Workforce Strategy for Visa. Despite remaining in California for more than 20 years now, Carter insists that she is a Pittsburgh girl at heart, and she's looking forward to coming home for the induction ceremony.

Western Pennsylvania has an incredible athletic tradition and has produced many legendary athletes and coaches," she said. "It is an amazing honor to be a part of that legacy and recognized among them."

Carter is not the only Bethel Park connection to this year's induction class. Assistant athletic director Laura Grimm is also among this year's honorees.

The 2006 Serra Catholic alumna compiled career marks of 1,940 points, 497 assists, 391 steals, and 283 three-pointers over her varsity career, leading the Eagles girls basketball team to an incredible 103-12 record in her four seasons at the school. The Maroon and Gold made four consecutive WPIAL Championship Games appearances, winning in 2003 and 2005. They also won the 2005 PIAA championship. The slick shooting southpaw was named the Associated Press Pennsylvania State Player of the Year in 2005. She also collected Player of the Year

accolades from the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette and Pittsburgh Tribune-Review in 2005 and 2006 respectively and was named All-State First Team in those seasons. Grimm played collegiately at Colgate University.

"It's an incredibly humbling honor to be included in this group with so many WPIAL legends," said Grimm. "I am sincerely at a loss for words to describe my emotions at this recognition.'

Grimm is especially thankful to be joined in this honor by her former coach and athletic director, Bill Cleary. "Bill meant so much to my development as a player, and he has continued to mentor me in my career as an athletic administrator," she said. "I cannot tell you how much pride it gives me to receive this honor and share it with someone I hold so dear to my heart.'

Carter and Grimm were among the three female student-athletes inducted. The other female student-athlete inductee was Sarah Riske McGlamery, a tennis standout from Peters Township.
