

At the July 10 Bethel Park Municipal Council Meeting, Kristen Denne was approved as the new

Bethel Park municipal manager with a start date of Monday, Aug. 28. "Kristen is very well qualified with substantial local government managerial experience," said Bethel Park Municipal Council President Tim Moury. "We're excited to have her on board and look forward to

what she'll bring to our residents.' Prior to accepting this position, Denne was manager of Caln Township in Chester County, PA. There she managed day to day township activities including police, administration, public works, their golf course, and municipal authority operations. Prior to that, she was manager of Springettsbury Township, manager of the City of Johnstown, manager of Ambridge Borough, and manager of Dormont

Denne, who's originally from West Mifflin, PA, is now looking forward to her new role with Bethel Park and moving back to the South Hills region of Pittsburgh to be with family and reconnect with

"Bethel Park has always been an amazing community with a great quality of life and good services for residents," she said. "Having the ability to come back to Pittsburgh and particularly the South Hills area where my connections are active was a unique opportunity!'

Denne also serves on the Pennsylvania Municipal Police Officer Education and Training Commission (MPOETC) as a commissioner and

plans to continue her work there after joining Bethel Park. MPOETC was created in 1974 to establish

minimum training and certification standards for municipal police officers in Pennsylvania.

Denne holds both a bachelor's in political science and a master's in public administration from the University of Pittsburgh. She's also participated in the Credentialed Manager Program from the International City/County Management Association, has completed the Capstone Seminar with the Association of Pennsylvania Municipal Management and completed a Public Entity Leadership Certificate from Pennsylvania State University. In addition to her professional activities, Denne serves as a eucharistic minister and lector at her local parish and has been a quest lecturer at local colleges, public sector professional organizations and non-profits involved in local government.

Bethel Park residents will have the opportunity to meet Denne at an informal introductory event that will be held this fall.

Bethel Park Councilmembers Receive Prestigious Awards at State Conference

Bethel Park Council Vice President Mark O'Brien has been named "Outstanding Council Member of the Year" by the Pennsylvania State Association of Boroughs (PSAB). O'Brien was the sole recipient of this award in the state and received his award Tuesday, June 5 at the organization's annual conference in Hershey, PA.

Both O'Brien and Councilman **Dr. Tim Campbell** received the organization's "**Distinguished Service Award**" as well. This award is presented to individuals performing "distinguished, meritorious and exceptionally outstanding service to the citizens of his or her borough and to promote better borough government," according to PSAB.

"I'm so appreciative of these awards. I'm truly humbled by them," said O'Brien, Ward 6 representative. "I see these as an honor for not only me, but for all of the individuals who've helped me along the way including Municipal staff, my fellow Councilmembers, my family, and so many more who've worked with me over the years. I need to emphasize that this would not have been possible without the decades of outstanding leadership, dedication and the hard work of Council President **Tim Moury**."

Dr. Campbell, a member of Bethel Park Council representing Ward 2 for close to six years, was also appreciative of the recognition.

"I'm so humbled by this award," said Dr. Campbell. "This was 100 percent unanticipated, but 100 percent appreciated."

This year, there were many excellent submissions for the Outstanding Council Member of the Year award according to **John Ehrman**, deputy executive director/director of education and training for the Pennsylvania State Association of Boroughs.

"Congratulations to Mr. O'Brien on this well-deserved honor and over 30 years of dedicated service to Bethel Park," said Ehrman. Bethel Park Council President Tim

Moury agrees.

"Mark is very dedicated and thrives on helping people and addressing residents' concerns," said Moury.
And, when speaking about Dr.

Campbell's honor, he said, "I believe it's Dr. Campbell's dedication to the community that brought him this honor. This was especially demonstrated during the pandemic when he was willing to donate his knowledge and expertise to help the community and direct the Municipality through that period. He was and continues to always be available to help and answer questions, and he was instrumental in setting up covid vaccine clinics a few years ago at the Community Center. He's very much a humanitarian.'

Connections are Key

As the Clinical Director at Outreach, I am the first point of contact when an individual reaches out for support. Since stepping into this role, I have witnessed a significant increase in mental health concerns for children and adolescents in our communities. I am also learning that most families are connecting to mental health resources for the first time. While reaching out for help can feel intimidating, we want to decrease this fear by educating our communities on what to expect when connecting with mental health support.

If anyone in your family is experiencing a decline in their mental health, Outreach can help. We offer a variety of services for children and young adults ages 5-21, along with their parents and families, including individual, group, family, and parenting sessions. There are two ways to initiate our services:

1) Visit our website,

www.outreachteen.org, and complete our online inquiry form for individual or group services by clicking the "Contact" tab.

2) Call our main office at 412-561-5405 and leave a message on our intake

From there, I will contact you for more information related to current needs, past mental health treatment and risk factors. Please keep in mind, Outreach is a low level of care outpatient center, which means we do not offer crisis support. If you or your child is experiencing active suicidal thoughts or thoughts of harm, I will connect you to appropriate crisis services to ensure safety. Otherwise, I will share information about our current availability. And if Outreach doesn't fit your needs, I will provide you with other community resources that would be a better fit.

There are a few other things I encourage you to consider before connecting with us. First, what are the goals for your family that you want to achieve? This will help during the intake process to identify the best fit for services. Next, if you are planning to use insurance, connect with them first to ensure a provider is accepted under your plan. At Outreach, we believe in supporting our local communities and never allow payment to be an obstacle for care,

but if insurance is important to you, it is helpful to be proactive. Finally, if

you are calling for your children, having conversations with them beforehand can aid in identifying the current needs from their perspective.

The most difficult part of getting help is taking that first step to reach out. Outreach is here for all our communities and it's our goal to make a positive impact on the mental health of our neighborhoods. I look forward to working with you. Please know you can reach out even if you are not sure about beginning services. *We are here to help.*

A MESSAGE FROM THE FIRE CHIEF: Dave Gerber

I hope everyone has stayed safe this summer! Your volunteer firefighters have continued to be extremely busy responding to a record number of emergencies each month. We've also participated in dozens of community events. Thank you for showing your appreciation for what our Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company and its members do for the community!

I want to share some safety tips on ways to prevent fires and hazards in our local area. Each of these issues has caused numerous fires in Bethel Park. I invite each one of you to become educated on ways to keep yourself, your

family and your neighbors safe.

Hoarding

Hoarding is defined as collecting or keeping large amounts of various items in the home due to strong urges to save them or

feeling distressed when discarding them.

Sometimes many rooms in the home are so filled with possessions that residents can no longer use the room as designed. The home can also become so overloaded with things that everyday living is compromised. Many fire departments are experiencing serious fires, injuries and deaths as the result of compulsive hoarding behavior. Many occupants die in fires in these homes. Often, blocked exits prevent escape from the home. In addition, many people who are hoarding are injured when they trip over things or when materials fall on them. Responding emergency personnel are also put at risk due to obstructed exits, falling objects and excessive fire loading that can lead to collapse. Hoarding makes fighting fires and searching for occupants far more difficult. Those living next to one of these houses can also be quickly affected when a fire occurs due to excessive smoke and fire conditions. Hoarding is a mental disorder that can be genetic in nature, triggered by traumatic events, or a symptom of another disorder.

If you or someone you know needs assistance to overcome a hoarding disorder, we ask that you visit www.Hoardingcleanup.com/pennsylvania for more information on how to get help.

Cooking brings family and friends together, provides an outlet for creativity and can be relaxing. But did you know that cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries? When cooking, you need to cook with caution!

If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol, don't use the stove or stovetop. Stav in the kitchen while frying, grilling or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen even for a short period of time, turn off the stove. If you are simmering, baking, roasting, or broiling food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking. Keep anything that can catch fire (oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains) away from your stovetop. Remember also to check your oven for anything stored inside before you turn it on to warm up.

Keep a lid nearby when you're cooking to smother small grease fires. Smother the fire by sliding the lid over the pan and turn off the stovetop. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled. For an oven fire turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

If you do have a cooking fire, get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire. Call 412-833-2000 or 911 after you leave.

Electrical

Electricity is what makes our lives easier. However, we need to be cautious and keep safety in mind! Be sure to have all electrical work done by a qualified electrician. Only plug one heat-producing appliance (such as a coffee maker, toaster, space heater, etc.) into a receptacle outlet at a time. Major appliances should be plugged directly into a wall receptacle outlet. Extension

Get to Know Your Fire Fighters!





cords and power strips should not be used. Check electrical cords to make sure that they are not running across doorways or under carpets. Extension cords are intended for temporary use. Have a qualified electrician add more receptacle outlets so you don't have to use extension cords. Use light bulbs that match the recommended wattage on the lamp or fixture. There should be a sticker that indicates the maximum wattage light bulb to use.

Lately we've responded to fire alarms at many apartment complexes within the area. One thing we've noticed is that these signs are being ignored and doors are being propped open. This is a major safety concern which could allow smoke and fire to travel quickly within the entire facility preventing evacuation. We're asking all residents in apartment buildings to close any fire doors that they see propped open and to ask maintenance to repair any doors not closing completely or on their own. The simple action of allowing these doors to close could save many lives, including your own! cords and power strips should not be used. Check

electrical cords to make sure that they are not running across doorways or under carpets. Extension cords are intended for temporary use. Have a qualified electrician add more receptacle outlets so you don't have to use extension cords. Use light bulbs that match the recommended wattage on the lamp or fixture. Ward 2 Councilman Dr. Timothy Campbell to Retire in December but Plans to Continue His Work Serving Others



Recent "Distinguished Service Award" recipient Dr. Timothy Campbell will be leaving his post on Bethel Park Municipal Council in December.

"I served on Council for the same reason that I do a lot of things; mom and dad drove home the lesson that each of us should look for ways to give back," said Dr. Campbell. "Decades later I still feel we need to get out of our comfort zones to serve others."

During Dr. Campbell's six-year Council tenure, he's been especially committed to the "Live Well Bethel Park" speaker series.

He is also focused on ensuring that rail-trails, green space preservation, and park development all continue to flourish in the community. Education has also been a priority; he was instrumental during the pandemic speaking on several of the Live Well programs. He also oversaw the organization of several vaccine clinics at the Bethel Park Community Center. Working with Spartan Pharmacy, almost 60,000 people were vaccinated and more than 26,000 received monoclonal antibodies under his medical supervision.

Dr. Campbell is involved in various state and federal health/disaster teams and initiatives. He serves as a medical officer on the Regional Urban Search and Rescue Team (PA-1 Strike Team), Pennsylvania Special Medical Response Team and State Medical Assistance Teams (SMRT and SMAT Teams), the regional Hazmat Materials Medical Response Teams (HAZMAT 450 Team and HMMR), and the federal PA-1 Disaster Medical Assistance Team (PA-1 DMAT).

"The disaster response teams are composed of people who fly into the disasters instead of running the other way," said Dr. Campbell. "I am impressed with the dedicated, self-less volunteers who donate so much of their time. Their car trunks are always packed with deployment gear and rescue equipment." He reports having more than 30 national and international disaster/emergency deployments over the last 20 years and is ready for more!

Dr. Campbell has also served on numerous international humanitarian missions in more than 20

countries over the past two decades.

After retiring six years ago from a private internal medical practice (having worked about three decades at UPMC Mercy), he is now the Chief Medical Officer for Gallagher Home Health Services and Gallagher Hospice.


I specifically left my practice to do humanitarian work," said Dr. Campbell. "I felt it was my time to give back. I worked my last day in my private practice on a Friday in March 2015; the following Monday, I was on a U.S. Navy hospital ship volunteering for a medical mission for six and a half

months. My church later contacted me and asked if I could do medical missions in other countries. Since then, I've served in many of the countries in the Caribbean, Central America, South America, and in the South Pacific."

On his trips, he taught host country physicians new and emerging medical techniques and strategies in infectious diseases, austere medicine and general medicine. Dr Campbell treated thousands of patients on his humanitarian trips for a variety of ailments such as hypertension, diabetes, anxiety/depression, heart disease, trauma, cancer, infections, and more.

Yet his mission work didn't end there.

"Each November I go to Guatemala with my wife Patti. We work with migrant coffee workers in the mountains; some of my favorite and most enduring friendships have sprung from those medical trips. I'm so proud of my wife. She has served way outside of her comfort zone. We have even served together during a major earthquake," said Dr. Campbell





In order to find yourself, you've got to lose yourself. I genuinely believe that when we lose ourselves in service to others, we truly find out so much more about ourselves. And that's why it has always been my credo to simply give back.

When rain or snow events cause water to flow over the ground, it's 'storm water'. Stormwater washes over backyards and driveways, picks up any loose items, and carries them to nearby streams and rivers. When these items enter a waterbody, they break down from erosion and release chemical 'pollutants'. Not only do pollutants harm local environments, but they also negatively impact human health! Below are some methods to avoid common stormwater pollutants this season:

AVOID COMMON

STORMWATER POLLUTANTS

THIS SEASON

PUT WASTE IN A BIN

Remove any loose trash and debris near storm drains before storm events. Not only do these items pollute natural waterways, but these clog storm pipes and cause flooding near your



COMPOST LEAVES & YARD WASTE

Avoid clogging storm drains with dead leaves, broken sticks, lawn clippings and other yard waste. These materials make great compost for gardens and can be collected curbside during the fall.



DRAIN POOLS TO SANITARY

Pool water CANNOT drain to the storm system in Bethel Park due to environmental harm. Instead, drain pool water through the sanitary system via fresh air vents.



WIPE UP GREASE Reduce harm to local water quality by soaking up spilled motor oil, grease, or paint with absorbent materials. Once absorbed, place all materials into a trash can.

RESIDENCY INFORMATION

All Bethel Park residents are given preference in registering for programs offered in this newsletter. Classes with limited enrollment will be open to non-residents only if space permits. The Recreation Board reserves the right to refuse admission to any person who misrepresents residency and will not give refunds to those individuals. Non-resident fees are set for each activity and should be paid accordingly upon registration.





RENTAL PROCEDURES

Reserving a room at the Bethel Park Community Center for your next event is a simple, straightforward process and may be done up to a six months in advance. However, it is recommended that you reserve your space early as dates fill up quickly!

- Requests for rentals must be requested through our RecDesk software. The RecDesk portal can be found on <u>www.bethelpark.net</u>. There will be a requirement of an electronic signature required for all forms necessary.
- Within a 5 business days, you'll be able to see if your request was approved via the RecDesk online portal.
- If the space is available and approved, you'll be sent an invoice for the amount that is due via the RecDesk online portal.

PAYMENT SCHEDULE

- Fifty percent of total rental fees is due as soon as the rental is approved and first invoice is provided.
- The remaining 50% is due 30 days prior to your event.
 A refundable security deposit (cash or check only) and room layout is due ten days prior to your event.

**Please note that while we want your event to be a success, failure to meet any payment or layout deadlines may result in rental cancellation. Fees paid will not be refunded.

CANCELLATION POLICY/FEES

If you need to cancel your event, your request MUST be submitted in writing to the Community Center Director. Cancellation fees follow:

- Cancellations received in writing more than 60 days prior to the scheduled date will receive a refund of 50% of initial rental payment, less a \$5 processing fee.
- No refund will be issued if written cancellation is received less than 60 days prior to event.

OTHER RENTAL NOTES

- Any use of the Community Center which requires Municipal staff to stay after the scheduled closing time shall be charged an additional \$40 per hour for any portion of an hour that may be needed.

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


A Message From...

DR. JAMES WALSH Superintendent

The school district is nearly two years into our 5-year Strategic Plan. This is a good time to take a step back, or up to a 10,000-foot view, to be reflective and ask ourselves some broader questions, like "Is this a good plan," and "Are we moving the needle?" From a broader vantage point, it is easier to notice the indicators of those broader questions by looking at subtle moves

and tectonic shifts in the system. The district administration will soon be convening a committee to more formally evaluate our progress and recommend mid-point revisions to the plan. Let's

look more globally at the efficacy of the plan.



First, the plan was formed by many stakeholders: students, teachers, administrators, parents, legal guardians, board members, and business leaders, each bringing their hopes and aspirations for a better future in Bethel Park. The stakeholders' process of developing the goals was not a free-for-all or like throwing darts. It was a deliberative process that took months. We laid bare all our warts and problems, we were exposed and vulnerable. Then we culled the relevant data, consumed educational research, and even examined our benchmarking schools to find the ideas, programs, and services that would lead Bethel Park to a better future. This is a good plan because of our open-minded approach, the stakeholders' investment in the process,

and the deliberative process through which they worked.

Our ambition is another reason it is a good plan. We dreamt big, and we made big plans. We aim to re-examine just about everything in the school district. We seek to move our people toward a learner-centered school infused with engaging, 21st-century skill-based experiences, where we care as much about academic achievements as we do personal well-being. We want to live up to our age-old beliefs and values statements. Where all children can learn, and everyone is entitled to be treated with dignity and respect. That the student's educational journey is to be shared by the school, the home, and the community. Where our teachers and administrators are professionals, who facilitate learning while continually learning themselves, and where learning is something a child does, not something that is done to a child. The second question from 10,000 feet is, "Are we moving the needle?" In other words, "Is this plan working?" Yes, without question. Every direction and decision can be traced back to one of the goals in the plan. Nothing is done by happenstance, nor are we jumping on any fad bandwagon of change. With this plan, we laid a plan for a better future for Bethel Park, so each action, each change, each new hire, each budget cut, or whatever metric you want to use points toward the strategic plan. 

Bethel Park Cafeterias Earns Praise from ACHD

Bethel Park School District's cafeterias were recently recognized by the Allegheny County Health Department for exceptional sanitation and food handling practices during the department's unannounced inspections.

Cafeteria Prices for the **2023-2024 School Year**

Rising food costs have impacted restaurants, households—and

schools, too. School cafeterias across the country are battling soaring inflation, staffing shortages, and supply chain disruptions, forcing many of the nation's school districts, including Bethel Park, to wrestle with the idea of raising their prices as students head back to classrooms this fall.

Bethel Park will not raise prices on its base meals, but there will be a \$0.20 across-the-board increase on tiered lunches, which are considered enhanced meals and include things like deli sandwiches, chicken wings, and other made-to-order type meals that



require individual preparation. The cost of a tiered meal will now cost one dollar more than a standard school lunch.

The cafeteria prices for the 2023-2024 school year are as follows:

- Elementary--\$2.75
- Middle School--\$2.90
- High School--\$3.05
- Elementary Tiered--\$3.75 NAMS/IMS Tiered -- \$3.90
- BPHS Tiered--\$4.05

In the spring, the commonwealth made headlines by including the Free Breakfast Initiative in the state budget. That program would guarantee free breakfasts for all students, regardless of their socioeconomic status. Still, at press time, that measure had yet to be officially voted on, making the timetable for its implementation impossible to forecast at this time.

Breakfast will be served at all Bethel Park schools for \$1.95. Parents/guardians can place money in their account for their child's meals and track their child's purchases via the QSP Program, available in all Bethel Park cafeterias.

To learn more about QSP and PayForlt.net, visit our website under Food Services. The cafeteria operates under a cashless system to help students move through the cashier line more quickly. Students who pay for their meals with cash will not receive change. Any change will be deposited into their QSP account.

Forms for free/reduced meals can be accessed on our Food Services page. They can also be picked up at the district's Business Office in the Administration Building. Families must reapply annually to the federal program.

Volunteer Requirements

The Bethel Park School District encourages the involvement of parents and guardians in our schools. Pennsylvania State Law requires that EVERY volunteer with direct contact with students must have the necessary clearances on file with the school district. The required clearances are the Pennsylvania Child Abuse History Clearance (Act 151), Pennsylvania State Police Criminal Record Check (Act 34), and the FBI Federal Criminal History Record (Act 114). PA Clearances are free to volunteers, and the FBI Clearance is \$23.25. Volunteers who have resided in Pennsylvania for THE ENTIRETY OF THE PAST 10 YEARS and have never been convicted of a Disqualifying Offense can sign a waiver that would eliminate the need for FBI Clearance.

No one will be permitted to volunteer in our schools until they have successfully submitted the following information, all of which can be found on our website, www.bpsd.org:

1. Pennsylvania Child Abuse History Clearance (Act 151)

Pennsylvania State Police Criminal Record Check (Act 34)

FBI Federal Criminal History Record (Act 114); OR Waiver of the FBI

Signed Acknowledgement of Volunteer Obligations Form

Current Pennsylvania Driver's License (and temporary card if you have recently moved)

Current Photo for the ID Badge

Complete Google Form Titled: Qualified Volunteer Clearance ID

Item No. 7 can be submitted electronically directly from the website. Item No. 8 can also be found on our website. You will receive an email informing you that your information has been received and your volunteer card has been processed. That card will be sent to your child's school.

Once volunteers have satisfied all the requirements listed above, they will be issued a Qualified Volunteer ID Card that must be worn every time they volunteer in our schools or with Bethel Park students on a field trip or other outings, not on school property. To learn more about what individuals must do to volunteer in our schools successfully, please visit the Volunteer Clearances section of our website.

Procedures for Administering Medication at School

Parents and legal guardians should ask the doctor to schedule medication doses other than during school hours. When this is not possible, the school will cooperate with

parents/guardians to see that the medication is given as prescribed. Suppose your student needs to

have medications (prescription or overthe-counter) administered at school. In that case, the following criteria must

A physician order including a signature from the physician and the parent or guardian.

All prescription medications must be in a pharmacy-labeled container that must include the name and phone number of the pharmacy, the name of the student, the physician's name, the name of the medication, the currently prescribed dose, the time of administration, and the RX number.

All "over-the-counter" medications must be in the original manufacturer's container with the student's name written on the container.

Prescription medication in a pharmacy label container dated within the last two weeks and to be administered for NO MORE THAN 10 SCHOOL DAYS require a parent's/guardian's signature and a completed medication form.

Medication prescribed for longer than two weeks also requires a physician's signature.

Only a 30-day supply of medication will be accepted.
ALL MEDICATIONS MUST BE DROPPED AT THE HEALTH
OFFICE BY A PARENT/GUARDIAN. THE PARENT/GUARDIAN WILL ALSO HAVE TO COUNT THE MEDICATIONS WITH THE

Bethel Park Education Foundation

The Bethel Park Education Foundation closed out another great year of supporting excellence and innovation in our schools in 2022-2023. Five grants were awarded last school year, totaling over \$10,000.

• Mrs. Lisa Cusick was awarded \$1,500 to furnish and supply the new Therapeutic, Emotional support, Avoidance Monitoring, and Support (T.E.A.M.S.) room at the high school with sensory materials, furniture, and décor to create a welcoming and calming space. These funds support the T.E.A.M.S. initiative being implemented there.

• Mrs. K.D. Meucci was awarded \$498 to pilot an "in-classroom"

T.E.A.M.S. space like the high school space, except it would be in the regular elementary classroom.

 Independence Middle School's music department, under the auspices of Mr. Keith Born, was awarded \$5,763.30 for implementing a pilot unit of guitar playing in the seventh grade general music program. All seventh grade students get to participate in this program.

 Mrs. Patricia Heasley, Department Facilitator, and the school district librarians were awarded a \$1,200 matching grant to supply the

libraries with social and emotional learning (S.E.L.) books. S.E.L. refers to the process of learning and applying the skills of self-awareness, self-management, social skills, relationship skills, and responsible decision-making.

• Mr. Tom Kelton, the technology education teacher at Pathfinder School, was awarded \$1,250 for purchasing new household power tools and lawn maintenance equipment. His project supports the life skills students' home repair and maintenance skills development.

Funding for these awards comes from donations, such as \$1,000 from the BPHS Class of 1971 and from the annual "Fantastic Four" charities golf outing in the fall. District Recognized for its Outstanding Music Education Program

The Bethel Park School District has once again received the "Best Communities for Music Education" designation by the NAMM (National Association of Music Merchants) Foundation for its commitment to music education. Now in its 24th year, the Best Communities for Music Education recognition is awarded to districts that demonstrate outstanding achievement in providing music access and education to all students.

To earn this recognition, the school district submitted data about funding, graduation requirements, music class participation, instruction time, facilities, support for the music program, and community music-making programs. The Music Research Institute at the University of Kansas then reviewed that information.

"We are so proud of this honor. This recognition is most welcomed and very affirming for Bethel Park," said Superintendent **Dr. James Walsh**. "The entire department has maintained high standards of excellence for the music program, evident in every magnificent student performance and by accolades like this NAMM recognition. The faculty deserve a standing ovation for another year of excellence."

The Bethel Park School District is one of just 830 school districts nationwide to receive the Best Communities for Music Education distinction.

Music is a central tenet of the district's whole-child educational approach in Bethel Park. Beginning at the elementary level and continuing through high school, students can explore their creativity, work collaboratively with peers, and build upon skills needed in all

Bethel Park students can participate in elective instrumental music programs, such as band and strings, beginning in fourth grade.



The period represented by grades 5-8 is especially critical in students' musical development. The music they perform or study often becomes integral to their personal music repertoire. Composing and improvising provide students with unique insight into the form and structure of music and, at the same time, help them to develop their creativity. Broad experience with various music is necessary if students are to make informed judgments. Similarly, this background breadth enables them to understand the connections and relationships between music and other disciplines. By understanding the cultural and historical forces that shape social attitudes and behaviors, students are better prepared to live and work in increasingly multicultural communities. Music's role in students' lives depends mainly on their skills in creating, performing, and listening to music.

All Bethel Park students at Neil Armstrong and Independence Middle Schools (grades 5-8) can sing in the choir or play in the school's orchestra or band. Middle-level students continue participating in a required general music curriculum meeting these objectives. Fifth through eighth grade students also have the option to continue to pursue musical studies within the Orchestra

At Bethel Park High School, the music education choices continue to expand. Students can take music electives, such as Music Technology, Songwriting, or AP Music Theory, in addition to performing ensembles such as Orchestra, Band, or Choir, including auditioned groups such as Top 21, Symphonic Band and Chamber

The NAMM Foundation is a nonprofit supported partly by the National Association of Music Merchants and its 15,000 member companies and individual professionals. The foundation advances active participation in music-making across the lifespan by supporting scientific research, philanthropic giving, and public service programs.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PROJECT

The new Bethel Park Elementary School will be a 3-story building with 280,000 square feet neatly built into the hillside of the Neil Armstrong campus.





Grade levels are housed on each floor. Kindergarten and first grade occupy the ground floor. Second and third grade occupy the middle floor, which is the main floor, and the fourth and fifth grade are on the top floor. All the shared spaces, like the cafeteria and L.G.I. are on the main floor.





Facilities are designed with intentional distinctions between primary and intermediate-aged students. For instance, there is a K-2 playground, with age-appropriate equipment and a 3-5 playground with age-appropriate equipment. There are separate gym facilities, too: a main gym and a "slim" gym.





- There will be two libraries, one is an early literacy center for emerging readers and the other is a main library with integrated technologies and an outdoor patio.
- There will be three S.T.E.A.M. labs for this type of technology-infused, multi-disciplinary curriculum.
- The building will also feature a Large Group Instruction space with a stage / performance space and seating for over 300 students.





- The building has enhanced security systems and intentional features designed with safety in mind.
- There are fully equipped health room facilities and health staff on each floor of the building.

children's museum

We are extremely pleased to be partnering with the Children's Museum of Pittsburgh for this elementary project.

Their 40-year history and expertise with engaging learning spaces has enriched our designs for the new school beyond our expectations. Senior Director of Educational Experiences, Anne Fullenkamp, is an architect by training but thinks like an educator. She masterfully added creative and engaging aspects to the building design, as well as forcing us to think differently about the ordinary, such as the potential use of nooks and normally unused spaces, walls, and views. We are confident our building will be much more engaging and useful for students and staff.



More About The New Bethel Park Elementary School

The infrastructure of the Bethel Park School District has been under evaluation for the past two-plus years. During this time, we obtained a demographer's study of our school age population and commissioned a feasibility study from an architectural firm to provide informed direction for the Bethel Park school board to steer their short- and long-term decision making for the future of Bethel Park School District. The driving questions were:

- What do we need to do to our facilities to deliver a "best in class" 21st century education in a safe, functional, and stimulating learning environments for the students and the teachers?
- 2 How do we achieve more equity within the students' educational experience, especially in Grades K through 4 and within the special education program?
- 3 To what do we need to attend in order to increase school and campus safety and security?

The direction we received from the studies, the surveys and a strategic planning steering committee was quite clear: our five elementary buildings and two middle schools are aging, out-of-date in this 21st century learning environment, limited by their size and footprint, and need significant renovations to last another 20+ years.

The price tag on all this work was estimated in 2021 dollars to be over \$150 million, \$42 of which would take care of the much-needed work at Independence Middle School, work we started in May of last year. The rest would renovate NAMS and the five elementary schools. Alternatively, we could spend the same dollars for a new, modern, safe, and sophisticated building for less than the cost of the renovations to 50-, 60- and 70-year-old buildings.

It was clear to the board, as the good stewards of the taxpayers' investments, the district needs to do the most fiscally responsible thing today and for long term by consolidating the Kindergarten through fifth grade students into one new school. The Neil Armstrong campus off of Murray Road was deemed the best site for this new building.

We gave our design team four broad goals to guide the overall design:

- We desire a modern, safe, sophisticated, and stimulating learning environment that will accommodate our evolving educational program and our need for equity within the students' educational experience, especially with class size and in the special education program.
- 2 The building will maximize school and campus safety and security.
- 3 The project will minimize disruption during construction, that is, allow NAMS & the elementary schools to remain in operation.
- The project will maximize the utilization of the NAMS site & maintain as much open greenspace as possible, working it into the educational program, if possible.

We readily acknowledge the major change this will make to the community, but we also believe this is the best investment we can make for our children today and for the next 50 years. This truly is the school that prepare our students today for the future.

playoff wins is one of the longest postseason winning streaks in Pennsylvania high school baseball history.


According to the head coach Patrick Zehnder, his team's internal leadership played a big role in his team's success.

Army War College Representatives Hold Panel Discussion on Global Affairs at **Bethel Park High School**

A panel discussion held in May between officials from the US Army War College and BPHS AP History students delved into a

range of crucial national securityrelated topics. The panelists engaged in an informative and thoughtprovoking conversation, addressing the potential perils and opportunities of Artificial Intelligence (AI), the



historical implications of complex global alliances, effective planning strategies, and the military's efforts to engage with today's students.

The panelists extensively explored the multifaceted aspects of Al, considering its potential risks, opportunities, and realities. As Al continues to advance, its impact on national security cannot be ignored. The panel highlighted the importance of understanding Al's ethical, strategic, and practical implications in order to make informed decisions about its incorporation into military operations.

The discussion also focused on the historical significance of complex global alliances. By examining past alliances, the panelists shed light on how these relationships shape the geopolitical landscape. Understanding the lessons from history provides invaluable insights for strategic decision-making and promotes a nuanced understanding of the complexities inherent in global affairs.

Emphasizing the fundamental tenets of planning and adaptability, the panelists highlighted the need for flexibility in the face of evolving challenges. They stressed the importance of being prepared to adjust plans as necessary, acknowledging the reality that no plan survives unchanged after initial contact. Adaptable planning ensures that military strategies remain effective and responsive to dynamic situations.

Recognizing the need to engage with today's students, the panelists explored ways in which the military can connect more effectively with the younger generation. COL Dena Goble, one of the panelists, emphasized that the military's mission is not to initiate wars but to preserve peace. "By fostering understanding and communication, the military can bridge the gap between its activities and the perceptions of contemporary students, thereby building meaningful connections and facilitating a deeper appreciation for national security issues," she said.

Dr. Mike Neiberg, a history professor at the US Army War College and a Pittsburgh native, provided valuable perspectives during the discussion. His expertise added depth to the examination of historical contexts, enriching the understanding of how historical events influence present-day national security considerations.

Atul Bhat, a Brigadier General in the Indian Army and a current student at the US Army War College, also shared his nation's perspective on the discussed issues. This contribution provided a broader understanding of international viewpoints and their implications. The panelists recognized the importance of diverse perspectives in shaping comprehensive strategies and fostering collaboration in the global arena.

The discussion was skillfully led by COL Lance Oskey, Chief of Staff at the US Army War College, and a notable BPHS alumnus '89. His leadership ensured that the panel addressed relevant and significant topics, allowing for a comprehensive exploration of

BPHS Students Excel in National French Contest

NAMS's Hydroponics Club Cultivating More than Fresh Vegetables

At Neil Armstrong Middle School, an exciting and innovative initiative is taking root through the Hydroponics Club.

Led by veteran health and physical education teacher **Mr. David Espinar**, the club provides students with a unique opportunity to explore the world of hydroponic gardening, nurturing plants from seed to harvest.

"We have so many wonderful, curious students who want to learn new skills while making a difference in their backyard, and this club affords those kids that opportunity," he said.

With a focus on organic, pesticide-free cultivation, the club aims to promote a farm-to-table experience that exposes students to the joys of harvesting fresh

Seeds, Growth, and Harvest: The Hydroponics Club members start their journey by mastering the art of seed germination. Seeds are carefully planted in Rockwool, a growing medium, and within 4-6 days, they sprout into seedlings. The seedlings are then nurtured for an additional 28-30 days until they reach full maturity, ready for harvest. Timing is crucial as lettuce, one of the club's primary crops tends to turn bitter if harvested late. Other crops cultivated include cucumbers, green beans, chard, and tomatoes, broadening the students' vegetable exposure.

NAMS's Volume Zoo Measures Up

Neil Armstrong Middle School's second annual Volume Zoo project was held in May and June, and brought together fifth graders from Teams Ranger and Atlantis. The project involved a series of engaging activities and culminated in a vibrant display of creativity in the school's lobby.

According to **Ms. Leanne Cupp**, who led Team Ranger, her students began working on their projects before the Pennsylvania

System of School Assessment (PSSA) exams in mid-May. "We divided them into groups, where they embarked on designing, researching, and measuring their projects," she said. As part of the preparation, students, staff, and community members generously donated boxes to support the teams' creations.

Ms. Kristen Rylander headed Team Ranger. She explained that by measuring the dimensions of the donated boxes, the students diligently calculated the total volume of their projects. "That part provided the students with valuable hands-on experience in applying mathematical concepts and spatial reasoning," she said.



In addition to the construction aspect, the students extensively researched their chosen animals. They explored different species, adaptations, habitats, and other fascinating facts. Each student maintained a research folder documenting the animal's name and the number of cubic inches allocated to represent it in their project.

With the groundwork complete, it was time for the students to unleash their creativity. They enthusiastically wrapped each box in vibrant, colorful paper and unleashed their artistic skills to transform them into eye-catching displays. The transformed creations showcased the students' imagination and attention to detail.

The artwork-filled lobby became a lively menagerie, captivating all who entered. The exhibits not only showcased the students' artistic talents but also served as a visual representation of their knowledge and understanding of the animal kingdom and how to calculate volume.

The Volume Zoo project provided the students with a multifaceted learning experience. It fostered teamwork, research skills, mathematical understanding, and artistic expression. Moreover, the project engaged the entire school community, creating a sense of pride and accomplishment —a fitting culmination to a successful academic year.

As the final few weeks of school unfolded, students, staff, and visitors were delighted to admire the imaginative and well-crafted displays that adorned the NAMS lobby. The Volume Zoo project stands as a testament to the creativity and dedication of the students, highlighting their ability to learn and shine beyond traditional classroom settings.

The Hydroponic Advantage:

Hydroponics, a soil-less cultivation method, offers numerous advantages over traditional farming. By controlling factors such as pH levels, water, and nutrients, the club tries to mimic optimal soil conditions for plant growth. Lettuce, for instance, thrives in a pH range of 5.5. Despite using substantial amounts of water, hydroponics utilizes 90-95% less water than conventional farming methods,

conventional farming methods, contributing to water conservation efforts. Support and Funding: The Neil

Armstrong Middle School Hydroponics Club has received support from various organizations. The non-profit Whole Kids Foundation provided \$3,000 in funding, while the PA Ag and Youth Grant offered a generous sum of \$7,500. Metz, the district's food service provider, also contributed \$500 towards the project. Additionally, the club is primarily self-funded through student initiatives, showcasing their dedication and passion for the project.

Environmental Impact and Workforce Development: The Hydroponics Club is not just about growing vegetables; it also has a broader impact.

The hands-on experience with hydroponics teaches students about sustainability and environmental stewardship.

"It may surprise people that 60% of students do not consume fresh food or vegetables throughout their day," said Espinar. "This program helps to ensure that number is lower in Bethel Park."

Espinar believes that programs like this are helpful in that regard because kids are more likely to choose healthy foods they have helped to cultivate.

"It was a little disheartening at first when some students confessed that they had never eaten a salad because it was too bitter and didn't taste very good," he said. "I tried to explain to them that the bitterness they were tasting was more of a result of packaging and processing than anything else. Projects like this one help demonstrate to our students that healthy food can also be delicious food."

Espinar added that the club not only increases accessibility to nutritious options but also imparts valuable skills for workforce development.

"This project is so comprehensive that that forces the students to develop workforce skills like communication, collaboration, problem-solving and critical thinking," he said.

According to Espinar, each team works independently with a tower manager and assistants to measure and record readings of pH and water depth. The team then brainstorms whether to add or reduce the pH. Once the individual teams of 2-4 students per tower have their readings, they have what they call a "family meeting" to discuss their findings and plot their course of action.

to discuss their findings and plot their course of action.

"It really is similar to hospital rounds," said Espinar. "We all share our findings with each other, think critically and collaborate on what our next steps might be. It's a very powerful process that teaches students an array of skills that they'll use throughout their lives."

Innovation and Student Involvement: Hydroponics opens up new possibilities, with vertical farms becoming a real phenomenon. The integration of LED lights has revolutionized indoor farming, making it possible to grow crops efficiently year-round. Furthermore, hydroponics reduces runoff, preventing harmful substances from entering the ecosystem. The benefits of hydroponics are clear, making it a no-brainer for the Neil Armstrong Middle School Hydroponics Club.

The Hydroponics Club at Neil Armstrong Middle School provides a platform for students to engage with agriculture, sustainability, and nutrition. Through hands-on experience, the club cultivates fresh produce, promotes environmental awareness, and imparts valuable skills. It has also allowed them to make a difference in their community. In May, the club delivered its spring harvest to the South Hills Interfaith Movement (SHIM), one of the area's premier food distribution centers for underprivileged families.

With support from the school, colleagues, and various organizations – like SHIM – the club is thriving as an outlet for students during the winter and spring. As the club gains recognition and expands its impact, it is clear that the Hydroponics Club has created a fruitful journey for its members and the community.

BETHEL PARK SCHOOL DISTRICT ANNUAL PUBLIC NOTICE — 2023-2024

The Bethel Park School District uses the following procedures for locating, identifying, and evaluating specified needs of school-aged students requiring special programs or services. These procedures are

described in this notice as required by law.

As prescribed by Section 1402 of the School

Code, the District routinely conducts screenings of a child's hearing acuity in Kindergarten, 1, 2, 3, 7, and 11 grades. Visual acuity is screened in all grades annually. Speech and language skills are screened in Kindergarten and on a referral basis. New students are initially screened during the year of admission. Gross motor and fine motor skills, academic skills, and social-emotional skills are assessed by classroom teachers on an ongoing basis. Other screening activities include but are not limited to the review of cumulative group-based achievement and ability data; health and attendance records; grades; and information shared by the parents/guardians. Specified needs from these screening sources are noted in the child's official file.

School records are always open and available to parents/guardians and only to school officials with legitimate "need to know" information about the student. Information from the records is released to other persons or agencies only with appropriate authorization involving parents' or legal guardians' written signed permission.

Parents/guardians with concerns regarding their child may contact building principals anytime to request a screening or evaluation of their child or by contacting the Student Support Services Department. (Names and phone numbers of the appropriate contacts are listed at the end of this notice.) Communication with parents/guardians and eligible students shall be in English or the native language of the parents/guardians.

Screening information will be used by the Intervention Team or Student Assistance Team within the student's school to meet his or her specific needs or to document the need for further evaluation. Student Assistance/Intervention Team services are provided to students in grades kindergarten through 12. The pre-referral process identifies those students at risk for academic or behavioral needs and includes parental involvement in determining whether a student may benefit from intervention services. Individual student plans are developed, and monitoring of specific goals with data to determine student progress and efficacy of interventions are put into place. Suppose a student is not making sufficient progress In that case, the school district may issue a referral for evaluation, or a parent may request a multi-disciplinary evaluation at any time. The Multidisciplinary Team comprises parents,

legal guardians, teachers, certified school psychologists, related service personnel, and persons familiar with the student's educational experience and cultural background. The evaluations conducted by the Team must be sufficient in scope and depth to provide information about the student's academic functioning, adaptive and social behavior, learning problems, strengths, information obtained by the Intervention Team or Student Assistance Team, and information from the parents/guardians. After evaluations are completed, an Evaluation Report (ER) will be compiled, including specific recommendations for the interventions necessary to meet the student's needs. This evaluation will be completed, and a report will be sent to the parents/guardians within 60 calendar days. Parents/guardians are then invited to participate in a meeting to discuss the evaluation results

Suppose the student meets the criteria for the presence of a disability and needs specially designed instruction. In that case, an Individualized Education Program (IEP) will then be developed for specially designed instruction for the student within 30 calendar days. The IEP team must consist of the student's parent(s), special education teacher, regular education teacher(s), and local education agency representative (LEA). If determined, students of transition age or younger must be invited to participate. The building principal, Director of the Student Support Services Department, or Supervisor of Special Education will serve as the chair/LEA, and a district psychologist, other specialists as needed, and other administrative staff, when appropriate, may attend.

Before initiating services, parents/guardians will be presented with a Notice of Recommended Educational Placement, which explains the services and educational placement recommendations Parental consent must be obtained before providing initial special education and related services. The Procedural Safeguards Notice describes the parents'/guardians' rights and options if they disagree with the individualized program presented.

Services for Mentally Gifted Students
When screening results suggest a student may be eligible for Gifted Education, the school district seeks parental consent to conduct a multidisciplinary evaluation. Additionally, a parent may request a multidisciplinary evaluation at any time. The initial evaluation based on a multiple criteria approach is summarized in the Gifted Written Report (GWR) and used by the Gifted Individualized Education Program (GIEP) team to develop the GIEP. After the initial evaluation, students identified as mentally gifted are reevaluated before a change in educational placement is recommended or under the recommendation of the GIEP team. The Notice of Recommended Assignment (NORA), signed by the parent, gives the school district permission to provide services. Parents can obtain further information by contacting their child's school principal or the district's Student Support Services at 412-854-8410.

Services for Eligible School-Age Students
The Bethel Park School District provides eligible students with a free, appropriate public education. To qualify as an eligible student, the child must be of school age, in need of specially-designed instruction, and meet eligibility criteria for one or more of the following physical or mental disabilities, as outlined in the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act and Pennsylvania State Regulations: Autism, Deaf-Blindness, Deafness, Emotional Disturbance, Hearing Impairment, Intellectual Disability, Multiple Disabilities, Orthopedic Impairment, Other Health Impairment, Specific Learning Disability, Speech or Language Impairment, Traumatic Brain Injury, or Visual Impairment including

The Bethel Park School District provides eligible students various placement options and services. Options in the district range from supportive intervention in the regular classroom to itinerant supplemental, or full-time levels of intervention, depending on the student's individual needs. Inclusive intervention practices of the general education curriculum and classroom with supplementary aids and services are the first step in the continuum of placement options. Other placement options to meet the student's needs may include but are not limited to, services secured from the Intermediate Unit, another school district, an approved private school, or a private licensed academic school program. Placement options provide all eligible students with free and appropriate public education (FAPE). The district also provides related services such as, but not limited to, transportation, speech and language therapy, physical therapy, occupational therapy, nursing services psychological services, social worker services, paraeducator support, and personal care assistant

The following programs are currently provided within the district: Learning Support, Life Skills Support, Emotional Support, Autistic Support, Blind or Visually Impaired Support, Deaf and Hearing Impaired Support, Physical Support, Speech and Language Support, and Gifted Support. As evidence of the full continuum of services, educational placements outside of the district have included, but are not limited to, Emotional Support at Pace School, Wesley School Programs; Learning Support at ACLD Tillotson School; Life Skills Support at Mon Valley School, Pathfinder School, Education Center at the Watson Institute, and the Children's Institute; Blind or Visually Impaired Support at Western Pennsylvania School for the Blind; Deaf and Hearing Impaired Support at the Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf and the DePaul School for Hearing and Speech; Autistic Support at Wesley School Programs, Pathfinder School, Mon Valley School, Pressley Ridge Day School for Autism; and Multiple Disabilities Support at

the Children's Institute and Pathfinder School.

Services for Students Who are English Learners

The education of students whose dominant language is not English is the responsibility of every school district/charter school in Pennsylvania. English learners must be enrolled upon presentation of a local address and proof of immunization. The Home Language Survey (HLS) is administered to all students and retained in the student's permanent record. For those students whose primary home language is other than English (PHLOTE), the district must also determine the student's English language proficiency, and, if appropriate, English as a Second Language instruction will be provided following all regulations, policies, and procedures. Parents/guardians can obtain further information by contacting their child's school principal or the district's Student Support Services Department at 412-854-8410.

Services for Students Identified as Homeless and/or Foster Care

In compliance with the federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, the Bethel Park School District is attempting to identify all children within the district that may be experiencing homelessness. The district implements child find activities for other students in addition to those identified as homeless or in foster care, such as wards of the state, highly mobile children, and migrant children, to provide equal access to evaluations and services.

Homeless children and youth lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence. This includes individuals who are:

- Sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason.
 Living in a hotel, motel, trailer park, or campground
- due to inadequate alternative accommodations.
- Living in emergency or transitional shelters.
- Living in cars, parks, public places, abandoned
- buildings, bus or train stations, or similar settings.
 Living in substandard housing (no running water, working utilities, infestations, etc.).
- Unaccompanied homeless youth means any child not in the physical custody of a parent/guardian. Children who are experiencing homelessness may qualify for enrollment in free breakfast and lunch

programs, access to appropriate instructional and socialemotional learning supports, and transportation so they can remain in their school of origin. If you believe your child/children may qualify for

these services or your living situation changes during the school year and your children become homeless, please contact **Dr. David Muench** via email at muench.david@bphawks.org. The district will work with any parent/guardian so your child/children's education suffers as little disruption as possible.

Services for Preschool Age Children

Act 212, the Early Intervention System Act, entitles all preschool-age children with disabilities to appropriate early intervention services. Young children experiencing developmental delays or physical or mental disabilities are oligible for early intervention services. are eligible for early intervention services, including screening, evaluation, individualized education program planning, and provision of appropriate programs and

Bethel Park School District ensures that all students transitioning from early intervention programs to kindergarten or first grade programs within the district are transitioned without disruption of services. Parents/guardians of children entering school-age programs are notified of the district's transition activities, which occur before kindergarten registration each year. The district follows the federal and state regulations on the evaluation process based on identified needs, subsequent documentation, and provision of special education and related services.

Information Regarding Signs of
Developmental Delays and Other Risk Factors
for Parents/Guardians to Look for that May
Indicate the Possibility of a Disability
Suppose your child is less than the age of
beginners (age 5 before September 1) and at least 3
years of age. In that case, your child may be
considered to have a developmental delay when
difficulties exist in cognitive, communicative, physical,
social/emotional, and self-help development where a
delay in comparison to typical development is present.
Parents/guardians who have questions about their
child's development or the possible presence of a child's development or the possible presence of a disability may talk with their family physician or healthcare provider or contact the Allegheny County Health Department at 412-687-2243.

Potential signs of developmental delay and other risk factors that could indicate the presence of a disability may include:

ability may include:
By the age of 3: Not saying many words; not using 2-3 word phrases and sentences; not walking; awkward gait (walking); excessive salivation; not answering "show" or "what" questions; and/or not using utensils to feed self.
By the age of 4 (all of the above included): Not toilet trained; difficulty with directional words (in, on, under, out); not playing with other children; not able to draw a circle cross or imitate a

not able to draw a circle, cross, or imitate a vertical line; not able to understand the child's speech most of the time; and/or difficulty following simple two-step directions.

• By the age of 5 (all of the above included): unable

to answer "where" questions; unable to récall details from a story; not drawing a person with at least 6 parts; immature speech patterns ("me" instead of "!"); and not able to hop forward on one foot without support.

Other warning signs at any age: Little to no eye contact; over/under sensitivities to pain, light, and poises hand flapping: no awareness of speech.

noise; hand flapping; no awareness of space (always bumping into other people or things); awkward hand or foot positioning; won't touch or eat certain textures; child no longer can do things he/she used to do; developed normally, then stopped; echoes what is said; and/or plays with the company proprietaly (watches wheels en on a toys inappropriately (watches wheels spin on a car toy, but does not play with the car).

Protected Handicapped Students/Chapter 15
The Bethel Park School District, in compliance with state and federal law, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and Chapter 15 of the Pennsylvania.

Act of 1973, and Chapter 15 of the Pennsylvania Public School Code, will provide to each protected handicapped student without discrimination or cost to the student or family, those related aids, services, or accommodations which are needed to provide the student equal opportunity to participate in and obtain the benefits of the school program and extracurricular activities to the maximum extent appropriate to the student's abilities. To qualify as a protected handicapped student, the child must be of school age with a physical or mental disability or diagnosis which

substantially limits or prohibits participation in or access to an aspect of the school program. These services and protections for "protected handicapped students" are distinct from those applicable to all eligible or exceptional students enrolled (or seeking enrollment) in special education programs.

Confidentiality of Student Records
Bethel Park School District and its employees are required by Federal Law and State and Federal Rules and Regulations to protect the rights of students, including confidentiality of personally identifiable information for all students under state and federal law and the district's student records policy. The foundation of these rights comes from Federal legislation entitled the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (also known as the Buckley Amendments). State Rules and Regulations deal with regular and special education students' rights and privacy. The State Regulations cover all students in Chapter 12, Students' Rights and Responsibilities.

Rights and Responsibilities.

The basic premise of the abovementioned laws, rules, and regulations is that information about students cannot be disclosed without written parental consent. There are different categories of information: Educational Records, Personally Identifiable Information, and Directory Information. Education Records consist of information directly related to students maintained by the educational agency. Personally Identifiable Information includes the student's name, the name of the parent or other family members, a personal identifier, or a list of personal characteristics that would make the student's identity easily traceable.

Education Records and Personally Identifiable

Information cannot be disclosed or released without written parental/guardian consent or if a student is over

18 without the student's permission.

There is certain information that can be released without consent, which is called Directory Information. Directory Information means information contained in an educational record of a student which would not generally be considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if disclosed. The school district designates what information is labeled as Directory Information. It shall include the following: the student's name, address, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees, and awards received, and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student.

Disclosure of information means to permit access

to or the release, transfer, or other communication of education records or the personally identifiable information contained in these records, to any party, by any means, including oral, written, or electronic means. This means that information about a student cannot even be shared in conversation without permission. This also applies to other Bethel Park personnel who need an educationally relevant reason to possess a

student's knowledge.

Written parental consent is necessary to disclose Personally Identifiable Information and Educational Records. The consent must: (1) specify the records that may be disclosed; (2) state the purpose of the disclosure; (3) identify the party or class of parties to whom the disclosure may be made. Furthermore, the Rethel Park School District must maintain a written Bethel Park School District must maintain a written disclosure record for the parents/guardians to inspect in case information has been released.

Under 34 CFR §300.624, please be advised of the following retention/destruction schedule for the Pennsylvania Alternate System of Assessment (PASA), Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA), and Keystone Exam-related materials:

 PSSA, Keystone Exam, and PASA test booklets will be destroyed one year after student reports are delivered for the administration associated with the test booklets.

PSSA and Keystone Exam answer booklets and PASA media recordings will be destroyed three years after the completion of the assessment.



Bethel Park High School's Class of 2023 Commencement



Bethel Park High School held its 114th annual Commencement at Black Hawk Stadium on **Thursday, June 8, 2023**, on an unseasonably cool summer night that featured a brief shower beforehand, and a poor air quality alert throughout the week, the result of wildfires that have raged across Canada.

Those proved to be little more than minor distractions for a group that has already overcome so much adversity in their young lives, including navigating through a global pandemic and completely reinventing how education was delivered and received during their brief but memorable high school careers.

Among its 352 members, the Bethel Park High School Class of 2023 included 116 students who graduated with the Highest Honors (QPA higher than 4.0), 60 students who graduated with High Honors (QPA of 3.75 to 4.0), and 36 students who graduated with Honors (QPA of 3.50 to 3.749).

One hundred and eighteen of this year's graduates were members of the

One hundred and eighteen of this year's graduates were members of the National Honor Society. Seventy-three percent will attend a four-year institution, and eight percent will attend a two-year institution. Approximately one percent of the Class of '23 will enter the military, while 18 percent is unknown, undecided, or will enter the workforce.

This year's Valedictorian, **Carter Kicinski**, praised his classmates' persistence and adaptability during a very difficult period and urged them to maintain that growth mindset in the future. "I am proud to say that we overcame COVID-19 as a group. We did not let it ruin our high school experience, but rather we made the most out of it," he said. "We can't shy away from the major changes in our lives. While it may seem like a lot right now, we must know that it is just another step toward the success we seek."

Salutatorian **Mira Weston** spoke wistfully about the letter she recently received from her third grade self and laughed at how drastically different her priorities are now. She also surmised that years from now, she and her classmates will undoubtedly be similarly nostalgic about the innocence of their current plight.

With that in mind, Weston echoed Kincinski's call for their classmates to embrace change. "Change is not only an inevitable part of life, but it is also a necessary part of life," she cautioned. "Within change environments, we can better flourish and propel ourselves towards higher and greater goals. Change is not something to be feared, but rather something to welcome, for its abundance of potential in advancement."

During his remarks, Bethel Park High School Principal Mr. Joseph Villani complimented the members of the Class of '23 for its excellence in the classroom, on the playing fields, on the stage, and most importantly, in the community.

"I am so proud of the effort and dedication this class has committed to reaching while elevating our school to the national stage, as you did this past year

when Bethel Park joined an exclusive list of American high schools to be named a 2022 National Blue Ribbon School," he said. "That recognition, which formally designated BPHS as an Exemplary High Performing School, was derived largely from the test scores and other achievements by this graduating class."

Assistant Superintendent **Dr. Mark Korcinsky** encouraged the students to celebrate their achievements and acknowledge the unique challenges they have overcome during their high school years.

"You have endured a global pandemic that disrupted your education, changed how you learn, and tested your resilience," he said. "Despite these obstacles, you have demonstrated remarkable adaptability and strength and emerged stronger and more prepared for the future."

In keeping with tradition, red, white, and blue military cords and BPHS challenge coins, were presented to the students who will soon serve in the armed forces. Principal Advisory Council of Students President **Drew Lippert** gave the background and descriptions of the coins. Retired Major Dr. Erek Clacks coordinated the presentation. Air Force Staff Sergeant Kristen Erb and Army Sergeant **Matthew Sunseri** joined him.

Class President Colin Fink gave the Senior Farewell, encouraging his fellow graduates to remain optimistic during an otherwise challenging time.

"There's this idea that we, as a generation, were born too late and into a world where everything has either been thought of or monopolized," he said. "Where we no longer have control over the technology that has been created. And where it's more important to prove others wrong than to prove oneself right.

"I would suggest that we are specially equipped to carry the torch and say that the uniqueness of our generation, given that we were raised during the genesis of modern technology, gives us a unique opportunity quite literally to change the world," said Fink.

Student Government Association President **Melina Stewart** concluded the ceremony by leading the class in the traditional turning of the tassels and tossing their caps.
