Before we get into the agenda for the residents who are 9 10 attending the meeting tonight, under Item C --11 Item G, appointing of a Zoning Hearing Board 12 alternate, that item has been removed from the 13 agenda. I would like to turn to Chair 14 15 Announcements. 16 An executive session of council was 17 conducted on January 28, 2019, to discuss personnel items and legal issues, and tonight 18 19 before we came out, February 11, 2019, 20 personnel items and legal issues. At this time I would like to turn to the 21 Reports of Officials, and the library 22 23 director's report. MS. McINTOSH: Thank you. 24 Good evening. My name is Christine. 25 Ι

am the director of your public library where we provide opportunities to explore, learn, create and connect. I have a few classes and services to talk about this evening.

The first is an APP Playground For Parents, which will be held on Thursday, February 21st, at 7:00 p.m.

All parents worry about screen time with their children. If you're looking for some guidelines on quality apps for your kids, this class is for you. Come and try out a few of our favorite age and educationally appropriate apps before you download. Your children are welcome. We want them to play, too. We do ask that you register so we have enough devices.

Tuesdays in February we have Adapted Storytime. This is 9:30 in the morning. So this class engages participants through story, music, and movement, and offers educational and social opportunities for children with differing abilities, their siblings, parents, caregivers, and their typically developing peers.

The storytime will take place in a safe,


non-judgmental environment with interactive book-based experiences. There is limited registration so there's not an overwhelming number of children or a lot of noise. This storytime is for Ages 2 to 6 with a caregiver.

Beginning Tuesday, February 19th, and continuing through April 9th, the library will be hosting an AARP Tax-Aide, which is free tax assistance for taxpayers with low or middle income, with special attention to those who are age 60 or older.

The AARP Tax-Aide volunteers will be available every Tuesday at the library from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. Registration is first come, first served. We do not take appointments. We do ask that you bring last year's tax return and any pertinent documents for this year's tax return.

And I want to make sure everybody knows that the municipal building doors do not open until 8:00 a.m. So if you come, you're going to be stuck outside.

While we're talking about taxes, Tax Forms. The PA Department of Revenue has discontinued the practice of sending bulk



forms to the library and to the post office, for that matter, in a -- in an effort to meet their strategic goal of providing more electronic filing options for taxpayers. So the library does not have any state tax forms.

The library does, however, have the new federal Form 1040. There's no longer a 1040EZ or a 1040A. All taxpayers will use the redesigned Form 1040. And many people will only need to file the 1040 and no schedules, like a half a page. But if you have any deductions or credits, you'll have to complete some of the Form 1040 schedules. The library does not have copies of any of these schedules. The IRS is not printing them in bulk.

So forms for PA tax or IRS schedules can be downloaded from the respective websites. You can also call the respective departments and request that forms be e-mailed, faxed or mailed to you.

And just one announcement. The library will be closed on Monday, February 18th, for staff development day. Just a remainder that late fees are not charged on days that the

library is closed. And that is all. 1 Any questions? MR. MOURY: 2 (No response was heard.) 3 MR. MOURY: You're safe for one 4 5 extra day, O'Brien. MR. O'BRIEN: I'm safe. 6 MR. MOURY: Thank you very much. 7 Can we turn to the Police Chief's report, 8 and Chief O'Connor. 9 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Good evening, Mr. 10 Mayor, Council. Hi, everybody. Chief here 11 with my report. 12 I want to thank Dr. D from Tri-Community 13 who appeared at our last crime watch meeting. 14 It was very well attended and very 15 informative. So I want to thank him and 16 17 Tri-Community. The next crime watch will be Monday, the 18 4th of March, at 7:00 p.m. at the Community 19 Center, and we'll work on getting another 20 21 speaker. I do have one -- one personal appeal to 22 everybody out there. Please, in the overnight 23 hours, do not leave your cars unlocked. 2.4 not leave your cars unlocked with valuables in 25

your cars. Do not leave your cars unlocked with valuables and firearms in your cars. We have someone out there that's prowling around and we have several items missing from several cars over the past week.

So if we take items out of the cars and lock our cars up, there would be no thievery out there. So I'm going to thank everybody in advance for their cooperation.

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MR. MOURY: Any questions? (No response was heard.)

MR. MOURY: Hearing none; thank you very much, Chief.

Can we turn to the Fire Chief's report.

ASSISTANT CHIEF BEESON: All right.

I'm here on behalf of Dave Gerber, our Fire

Chief. I'm Assistant Fire Chief, Russ Beeson.

The total run calls for the month of January, the volunteer fire company was very busy in January with a total of 52 calls; three structure fires, one chimney fire, one vehicle fire, one outside fire, one -- no, five gas leaks, two electrical conditions, two carbon monoxide incidents, one vehicle

accident cleanup, thirteen good intent calls, twenty fire alarms, and three alarms.

And we would like to, also, put our message out to the community as well. Home fires are more often to occur in the winter than any other season. As you stay cozy and warm this winter season, be fire smart.

Half of all home heating fires occur in the months of December, January, and February. With that said, keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from a heat source like your fireplace, your wood stoves, or those space heaters. Plug only one space heater in per outlet in your home.

If you're burning in your fireplace and you remove your ashes, store your ashes in a tight covered metal container and keep it at least 10 feet away from your home or any other nearby buildings.

With that, that's the Fire Chief's report. Any questions or comments?

MR. MOURY: Any questions?

(No response was heard.)

MR. MOURY: Hearing none; thank you very much.

MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you very much. MR. MOURY: Can we turn -- I 3 apologize for not adding this at the beginning -- we have the EMS Director's 4 report. You are now on. 5 MS. HELFRICH: I am now on. 6 Are you sure I'm now on? 7 you. Good evening. I'm the EMS Director for 8 Tri-Community South. I've been asked to come 9 to bring up our subscription drive. 10 second mailing -- hi. He came to visit me --11 started, will be mailed this week, and we're 12 hoping people will support their EMS service. 13 We don't receive any tax dollars from any of 14 the three communities that own and operate us 15 and we're nonprofit. 16 Currently we only have 5,422 residents 17 out of 28,000 households that support 18 Tri-Community at this time. So that's where 19 we generate the revenue to operate so your tax 20 dollars are not used for us. So we hope you 21 support us. Thank you. 22 Thank you very much. MR. MOURY: 23 We'll turn to the Mayor's Report, and 24

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Mayor Allen.

Thank you. And I MAYOR ALLEN: 1 will say firsthand I know it's better to 2 subscribe to the EMS than try to use them if 3 you don't have a subscription. It costs a lot 4 more. 5 MS. HELFRICH: Yes, it does. 6 I forgot. We run over 7,200 calls a year 7 and about 600 a month. 8 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. 9 MS. HELFRICH: So, thanks. 10 MAYOR ALLEN: All right. 11 actually just have a few housekeeping items 12 this evening. 13 The first one I want to talk about is our 14 pole painting. We have, and as you've 15 probably noticed, new signs going up on all 16 the streets in Bethel Park. So we're in the 17 midst now of putting a program together with 18 the public works director to paint the poles. 19 The poles will be painted black. 20 So if you have an organization, Boy 21 Scouts, Girl Scouts, Indian Princess, that can 22 help that, if you contact the municipal 23 building, (412)831-6800, extension 211 is 24

Janet, and she'll be able to take your

information and then we'll see what we have available.

I want to thank Dr. Campbell because he did a town hall meeting this past week which was very, very -- I mean, he did a great job, and there was a lot of information that we learned from there.

And the one thing I wanted to bring up is that we do have a website, www.BethelPark.net, and anything that you want to know about Bethel Park is on that website. You can sign up for Savvy Citizen. You can find out the construction projects that are going on. On 88 especially you'll know exactly what's going on down there. Questions about garbage pickup and recycling. And you can get ahold of anyone or phone numbers for any of the municipal offices.

Which brought me to the one idea or one thing I wanted to mention, was the Swiftreach program that we have. We don't use it that often, but it's very important when we do. We did it in the case of the flooding last year. We did it about three weeks ago when we were supposed to get a big snowstorm.

But if we don't have your number in the system, we can't call you. You can go to our website and you can put the information in.

If you have an unlisted number or you have a cell phone, you can be contacted that way.

And I do know that my daughter has a cell phone. She was in Disney World when she got contacted about the snowstorm in Pittsburgh.

So it didn't affect her, but ...

Also, on the bottom of the one page
you'll find the Blueprint icon. The
municipality is seeking public input for the
long range comprehensive plan update,
otherwise known as Blueprint Bethel Park.

If you have any thoughts or ideas concerning walkability, housing, attracting new businesses, infrastructure like roads and sewers and parks, please attend the second public meeting, and that will be held Thursday, March 14th, at 7 o'clock at the Community Center.

In the meantime, if you click on that site, there'll will be a survey there. You can open that and give your input on what you think Bethel Park should look like in the next

10 years. So that's our website, BethelPark.net.

And, finally, if anybody wants to watch council meetings or anything from BPTV, you can go on YouTube and you can see council meetings from over 10 years ago.

MR. MOURY: Is that a good or a bad thing?

MAYOR ALLEN: Well, you'll see some people you didn't -- you'll say I remember that person, so... But I just want to thank everyone, just a little housekeeping, and that's my report.

MR. HARRISON: Mayor, maybe I can just comment because I've had some interaction with people.

A lot of people had their landline phone numbers in this system and they -- and they went to cell phones and they did away with their landlines. So I think those folks ought to just maybe remember that if they did away with their landline, they won't get the call unless they give us the correct number --

MAYOR ALLEN: Right.

think that's the point you made. 1 2 MAYOR ALLEN: Absolutely. A lot of 3 people are doing that. MR. At this time I'd like to turn to the Residents' Comments section for non-agenda items.

Mr. Pahler, if you'd come up and state your name and address for the record, please.

MR. PAHLER: Richard Pahler, 1119

Logan Road. I have a few pieces of paper that
I got through the borough about my property.

I'm just going to go over a couple brief
things.

One was, you know, a bill from 1996 that the borough paid about \$15,000 to install some things on my property, a catch basin and some piping, which at that time I had a conversation with the engineer and explained to him how the water flows through my property and that really was -- you know, it might make a dent in it, but that's about it.

On the same document there's a -- a note here, and I've run across this a few times, it's from Bill Spagnol, the old borough manager, and -- I'll leave the person's name out of it. After you read and review this, please call me. Bob Cygrymus and I don't

believe Mr. Pahler has a legitimate concern request for the municipality.

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So what they're saying is I don't have a lawsuit against you guys. But yet on another document from a meeting I had in 1998 with Bill Spagnol, Bob Cygrymus, Thor DiCesare, and, again, they've left a person's name off of this, it goes through all the issues that I had, some damage that was done when the borough came into my property. And the thing I want to point out is it says -- Mr. Spagnol further stated the municipality would consider a final monetary settlement -- money settlement with Mr. Pahler, who could then make whatever property improvements he wanted. However, Mr. Pahler would have to agree in writing that such sum of money would be a final settlement. In other words, I'd be stuck with the house and I'd be stuck with the problem.

They have a note on here with respect to the above items -- now, this is your document. With respect to the above items, Mr. Pahler indicated that he would consider the municipality's offer. That's a flat out lie.

I asked for them off of my property.

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Okay. I think I know why one of the reasons is, that this one person's name was left off of this meeting, left off the other documents, it's the same reason that Thor DiCesare's name, who was the engineer at the borough at the time, he resigned shortly after that. And when I ran into him, he explained that he had a law degree, too, and he wasn't going to lose his law degree over Bethel Park.

So that kind of tells you why there was a name left off of here who was at that meeting and why this guy resigned. They offered me a whopping \$5,000 to, in Mr. Spagnol's words, to make me go away. Okay. It's unethical.

And then there's a written note on the bottom, Pahler never proposed a monetary settlement amount. They never asked me for one. So I'll come today and ask you for one. Give me \$150,000 and I'll go away and I'll turn over my house to you guys.

The same thing with the property. The property -- you know, these are -- there's a note here from Lowry Engineering in 1999 that gave you guys suggestions on how to try to fix

the problem. Nothing was ever done. So you paid an engineer, did nothing about it.

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Further in the documents, let me find it here, conclusions and recommendations. The topographical features and the direct concentrate surface water runoff into and through the property cannot be altered in any significant way that would materially change the volume of both the surface and ground water, which is concentrated and conveyed -- and conveyed through the property.

So what they're saying -- what your own pro -- you're saying, nothing can fix this problem. But an unwritten rule, you don't want to buy -- you won't buy properties. But that -- that's not true. You do buy properties. You just won't buy my property. Because you -- you have bought other properties.

When your own documentation says that it can't be fixed, then I think the taxpayers need to know why. You know, here's 15,000.

I'm sure if I dig deeper, you're probably up to about \$100,000. Back in 1996 when I brought this to your attention, you could have

bought the house for that. You could have stopped -- or at least slowed down the additional flooding that has happened since -- in the last 30 years.

There's a lot of things that could have been done but, again, you guys keep spending money, taxpayer money, and it's not fixing anything.

You could have easily spent the same amount of money, bought the property, built a detention pond and saved all those homeowners downstream from me.

MR. MOURY: I'd ask you conclude your comments, please.

MR. PAHLER: Okay. One last thing. Statement of the problem, okay, this is from your -- the property is located -- okay, my property does not receive flooding directly from Logan Creek. The property is located 350 feet north of the stream channel. The house on the property's site ground elevation is 1,072 feet. The stream channel is an elevation of 1,060 feet. So I'm 12 feet over the creek, okay, which -- and the property digs down, too. So it's even worse.

While the property is not directly flooded from the stream overflow to the property, it is adversely impacted during the stream flooding due to the reduced capacity of drainage system. Okay. So, again, it's not -- it's backing up. The property's situated within a natural drainage swale which is a sub-catchment of Logan Creek. The upstream land area, which drains to the property, consists of approximately 22 acres and includes Gatewood Drive, part of Greenbriar Road, and part of Scenic View Drive and Sarah Street. where they built all the homes that created this flooding. MR. MOURY: 16 17
