MR. MOURY: Okay. I'd like to call to order the Regular Council meeting of June 10, 2019.

Chief O'Connor, would you please call the roll.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Campbell.

DR. CAMPBELL: Here.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Consolmagno.

MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Here.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Dixon.

MR. DIXON: Here.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Gibbons.

MS. GIBBONS: Here.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Hannan.

MR. HANNAN: Present.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Harrison.

MR. HARRISON: Present.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: McLean.

MR. McLEAN: Here.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Moury.

MR. MOURY: Here.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: O'Brien.

(No response was heard.)

1 MR. MOURY: Okay. At this time  
2 could we stand for the Pledge of Allegiance.

3 (Pledge of Allegiance was said.)

4 MR. MOURY: Okay. I'd like to turn  
5 to Chair Announcements.

6 An executive session of Council was  
7 conducted on Monday, May 20, 2019, for  
8 personnel and legal matters, and an executive  
9 session of Council was conducted tonight, June  
10 10, 2019, on personnel matters, and that is  
11 all.

12 At this time I'd like to turn to the  
13 Reports of Officials, and the Library  
14 Director's Report.

15 MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. My  
16 name is Christine. I'm the director of your  
17 public library where we provide opportunities  
18 to explore, learn, create, and connect.

19 It's June, so summer learning is under  
20 way. This year's theme is A Universe of  
21 Stories in conjunction with the anniversary --  
22 50th anniversary of the moon landing.

23 So for first through sixth grade you can  
24 pick up your summer learning booklet and earn  
25 badges and enter for a chance to win one of

1 our end-of-summer raffles.

2 One of the activities that you can earn a  
3 badge for is to check out a cookbook, make a  
4 recipe, and bring it in and feed the  
5 librarians. We always want to eat.

6 Today she -- one young woman, one  
7 particular young girl I should say who was  
8 going into kindergarten, they made us  
9 Bruschetta, which was quite lovely, with fresh  
10 basil from the garden.

11 So for teens, for each book that they  
12 read, they receive a scratch-off raffle  
13 ticket. They can scratch that off. If  
14 they're an instant winner, they may win  
15 earbuds, gift cards, or other surprises.  
16 Non-winners are entered into an end-of-summer  
17 raffle for a \$100 Amazon gift card.

18 With it being a science-themed summer  
19 learning this year, we have a lot of STEM  
20 related classes that are free and fun,  
21 particularly for those in elementary ages.

22 We also have some fun classes. We have  
23 blacklight BINGO. So get out your neon. We  
24 have that for kids and then also for teens.  
25 And we also have a program called Are You

1 Smarter Than a Bethel Park Librarian. So that  
2 should be fun.

3 Adult summer reading is in full swing as  
4 well. You can sign up at the library. For  
5 every book that you read or listen to,  
6 including e-books, you can complete an entry  
7 form. We have a weekly drawing for a \$25 gift  
8 card. And then all those -- all entries  
9 received before July 29th will be eligible for  
10 a grand prize drawing, which is a Fitbit Alta.

11 And in the summer we have New Movie  
12 Release Tuesdays for adults. This happens at  
13 10:00 a.m. in the Fireplace Room, and we will  
14 screen that Tuesday's Blockbuster DVD release.  
15 So for June 11th we have Captain Marvel. Then  
16 on the 18th we have a horror movie, Us, which  
17 looks very scary.

18 Just a reminder, the library is closed on  
19 Sundays during the summer, and we will be  
20 closed on July 4th for the Independence Day  
21 holiday.

22 That is all.

23 MR. MOURY: Now, if you're looking  
24 for another game, are you Smarter Than a  
25 Member of Council.

1 MS. McINTOSH: Really?

2 MR. MOURY: I will nominate Mark  
3 O'Brien.

4 MS. McINTOSH: He's not here. He's  
5 in then.

6 MR. MOURY: Mark O'Brien is in.

7 MS. McINTOSH: Okay. Thank you.

8 MR. MOURY: Okay. Thank you very  
9 much.

10 Can we turn to the Police Chief Report --  
11 Police Chief and Manager's Report.

12 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Only 20 more days.

13 MS. McINTOSH: Not that you're  
14 counting.

15 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Good evening, Mr.  
16 Mayor, Council. Hi, everybody, O'Connor here.  
17 I just want to thank everyone who attended our  
18 Crime Watch June open house at BPPD. We had a  
19 really good turnout. We will be adjourning  
20 for the summer and we'll pick back up the  
21 first Monday in October over at the Community  
22 Center.

23 So in the meantime, follow us on social  
24 media. If we have anything, we will be  
25 putting it out via the Crime Watch e-mail list

1 or on social -- and on social media. So with  
2 that, I want to have -- wish everybody a safe  
3 summer.

4 We have now -- we have a special guest  
5 here tonight that we're going to honor. We  
6 have Russ Posch here. He is the head of the  
7 school crossing guards, and he has been for --  
8 for many years, approximately 28, 29 years.

9 You don't know it, but the school  
10 crossing guards fall under the police  
11 department. And I can say as a group, we --  
12 we rarely have heard -- hear a complaint about  
13 them, and those men and woman are out there  
14 every day, no matter what the weather is,  
15 making sure the kids are crossed safely and  
16 they get on the bus safely.

17 They do a remarkable job. A lot of it is  
18 -- is due to Russ' leadership and his  
19 commitment. And they also come out on all of  
20 the parades, you know, and help us walking the  
21 streets and everything. It would be very hard  
22 to function without them.

23 So with that, I'm going to have Russ come  
24 up here because we're going to honor you.

25 MR. POSCH: I need help to get up

1           anymore.

2                   (Clapping was heard.)

3                   CHIEF O'CONNOR: I have a little  
4 information on him in case you weren't aware  
5 of this. He was born and raised in the  
6 Arlington section of Pittsburgh and graduated  
7 from South Hills High School in 1947.

8                   In the summer of 1947 he went to work  
9 for J&L Steel in their main office, first in  
10 the mail room and then as an assistant junior  
11 clerk. He attended the University of  
12 Pittsburgh from 1948 to 1952 where he received  
13 a bachelor's degree in business  
14 administration.

15                   In April of 1948 he married his wife,  
16 Loretta. They have two children, a son in  
17 Minneapolis and a daughter in Cranberry  
18 Township. He has two grandchildren by his  
19 daughter, a boy and a girl.

20                   In September of 1952 he was drafted into  
21 the US Army. He was in the finance corps at  
22 Fort Ritchie, Maryland, and in Germany.

23                   After discharge from the Army, he went to  
24 work for the accounting department of Isaly's  
25 Dairy in October of 1954. In 1962 Isaly's



1 sent him to their Youngstown office. In 1969  
2 he left Isaly's to be controller of Meadow  
3 Brook Dairy in Erie.

4 In 1979 he returned to Pittsburgh where  
5 he was self employed, selling advertising and  
6 later table pads and window treatments.

7 He retired in 1899 -- excuse me, 1989.  
8 He's not that old.

9 (Laughing was heard.)

10 CHIEF O'CONNOR: He retired in  
11 1989, but became a crossing guard in 1990.  
12 Then he became their supervisor, and that's  
13 why I stand here tonight.

14 So we have a plaque to give you, also, in  
15 recognition of outstanding excellence honoring  
16 Sergeant Russ Posch on your retirement. So  
17 we're going to give this to you.

18 MR. POSCH: Okay. Thank you,  
19 Chief.

20 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Okay. So thank  
21 you very much and God bless you and thank you  
22 for all of your hard work and dedication over  
23 the years to those kids. God bless you.

24 (Clapping was heard.)

25 MR. POSCH: I wanted to thank Chief

1 O'Connor. He's one of the good ones, I'll  
2 tell you. He's helped us. If there's a  
3 problem, he's first in line to help us get it  
4 solved.

5 I worked with the guards for a long time  
6 and I'm so damn proud of that group. I tear  
7 up when I think about it. I'll tell you, I've  
8 seen them out there when it's freezing cold  
9 and pouring rain and, you know what, when  
10 they're putting the kids on the buses and  
11 they're crossing the street, they have smiles  
12 on their faces. They're glad they're there.

13 They're the best group of crossing guards  
14 that I know of, and when they raise their stop  
15 signs, everybody better stop.

16 (Clapping was heard.)

17 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Enjoy your  
18 retirement.

19 MR. POSCH: Thank you.

20 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Enjoy your  
21 retirement.

22 MR. POSCH: Are we allowed to  
23 leave?

24 CHIEF O'CONNOR: You can leave,  
25 yeah. You don't have to stay.

1 MR. MOURY: People that get awards  
2 have to stay until the very end.

3 MR. POSCH: Thank you, everybody.

4 (Clapping was heard.)

5 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Thank you.

6 We actually went to the same high school.

7 I went to go to South Hills High School for  
8 summer school because I failed algebra and  
9 English. Who does that?

10 (Laughing was heard.)

11 CHIEF O'CONNOR: So, any questions?

12 MR. MOURY: Nope?

13 (No response was heard.)

14 MR. MOURY: Hearing none; can we  
15 turn to the Fire Chief's Report, unless you  
16 have the Manager's Report.

17 CHIEF O'CONNOR: The only thing I  
18 would say is it was an honor serving you guys  
19 for about five months as manager. I thought  
20 it would only be maybe about 60 days, but we  
21 got through it. And thank -- you guys are a  
22 fine community of people and it was an honor  
23 serving you. Thank you and God Bless.

24 (Clapping was heard.)

25 MS. PARKER: All right. Hello.

1 I'm Eva Parker. I am one of the captains at  
2 the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company, and  
3 I'm here to give our Chief's Report.

4 In the month of May we had 47 calls; five  
5 structure fires, one vehicle entrapment, two  
6 vehicle fluid clean-ups, one elevator rescue,  
7 six odor investigations, one assist the  
8 police, one assist the medics, two wires down,  
9 four good intent calls, nineteen fire alarms,  
10 and five carbon monoxide calls, for a total of  
11 47 calls.

12 Our fire prevention of the month is  
13 grilling tips. Stay alert when grilling. Do  
14 not grill if you're sleepy or drinking  
15 alcohol. Don't leave your grill or cooking  
16 areas unattended and keep children and pets at  
17 least three feet away from the grill area and  
18 remove flammable objects from around the  
19 grill.

20 That's all I have.

21 MR. MOURY: Any questions?

22 (No response was heard.)

23 MR. MOURY: Thank you very much.

24 MS. PARKER: You're welcome.

25 MR. MOURY: At this time we'll turn

1 to the Mayor's Report.

2 MAYOR ALLEN: Good evening. I have  
3 just a couple things. And then the people  
4 that left, left on time because tonight is the  
5 State of the Municipality address, so they  
6 knew when to leave.

7 First I'd like to introduce Mr. Dan Duff.  
8 Mr. Duff is from the Community Foundation and  
9 he has a presentation.

10 MR. DUFF: Thank you.

11 Good evening, Mayor and Council and  
12 staff, everyone. I'm Dan Duff. I'm with the  
13 Bethel Park Community Foundation. And if you  
14 weren't on Council before, I'm here always to  
15 hand out checks. The Community Foundation is  
16 celebrating its 25th year of being -- giving  
17 out money to the community. In fact, I did a  
18 quick math. You may be interested, in the  
19 past four years we have been able to give  
20 \$213,575 back to the community. We'd like to  
21 continue on that tradition for the next 25  
22 years or more.

23 Just a quick note. Coming up -- I'll get  
24 this right here, starting on -- in early July  
25 and through August we have the Dean Streeter

1 Concert Series. If you have a free Sunday  
2 afternoon, we have the Community Dance South,  
3 the Vintage Brass Band, Mon Valley Community  
4 Band, the Allegheny Brass Band and, my  
5 favorite, the Keystone Barbershop Chorus and  
6 the Pittsburgh Banjo Club. So that's at the  
7 Community Center at about 2 o'clock. We'll  
8 have information and posters up shortly.

9 But I'd like to now bring up Bill Holden,  
10 vice president of the foundation, and Bob  
11 O'Connell from Friends of the Montour Trail.  
12 Bob is also a special guest. Not only is he  
13 representing the Montour Trails, but he is a  
14 World War II veteran. So I thought with  
15 D-Day, we're very happy to have him represent  
16 the trails. Come on over here.

17 So we were approached by Friends of the  
18 Montour Trail several months ago. Up near  
19 where the trail crosses Clifton Road, there  
20 are some access ramps that go from Highfield  
21 and from the Washington School area.  
22 Originally those were gravel, and every time  
23 it rained, you know what happens in Bethel  
24 Park, the water runs and the sidewalk was  
25 washed away.

1           So the Montour Trail folks thought it  
2 would be a great idea to pave it, but we  
3 didn't want to have more water coming down so  
4 we did some stormwater management with the  
5 municipality and we have some beautiful new  
6 paved trails to get up to there.

7           One of the nice features is we also found  
8 out -- and with the help of Ellis Paving, then  
9 we actually did some additional improvements.  
10 Anyone who is handicapped can park at  
11 Washington School and get access to the trail  
12 or any student from the school can now have  
13 access to the trail where they couldn't  
14 before.

15           So tonight Bill Holden and myself are  
16 happy to present Bob here a check for \$10,700  
17 for improvements to the ramps on the Highfield  
18 and Washington School area.

19           (Clapping was heard.)

20           MR. DUFF: Thank you very much.

21           MR. O'CONNELL: By the way, my name  
22 is Bob O'Connell.

23           MR. DUFF: Oh, okay. Thank you for  
24 the correction.

25           MR. O'CONNELL: I want to thank

1 you, Dan Duff, and the Bethel Park Community  
2 Foundation for the generous help on the trail,  
3 the ramps.

4 Actually, I'm standing in for Mike Pucci,  
5 who actually is one of our members who managed  
6 this project from its inception to its  
7 completion and did all the work. But Mike is  
8 away and he gives his regrets that he could  
9 not be here.

10 We also want to thank Bethel Park  
11 engineer John Quinlisk, if I'm pronouncing  
12 that right. He helped us with the water  
13 retention issues, which were pretty important  
14 at the time.

15 So thank you for this. We appreciate it.  
16 The people that use this will appreciate it.

17 MR. DUFF: Wonderful. Thank you  
18 very much.

19 MR. O'CONNELL: You're welcome.

20 MR. DUFF: And thank you for your  
21 service, sir. Thank you very much.

22 MR. O'CONNELL: Oh, thank you.

23 (Clapping was heard.)

24 MAYOR ALLEN: That kind of segues  
25 us to my next award here. Whereas Mr.



1 O'Connor's a World War II veteran, The  
2 Community Foundation is 25 years old, this is  
3 the 100th year of the American Legion. So  
4 there's a few members here from the Legion.  
5 So if you'll come up here, I have a  
6 Proclamation for you.

7 Gentlemen, this is Proclamation 2019  
8 Bethel Park, American Legion Centennial Day,  
9 to designate June 10, 2019, American Legion  
10 Centennial Day.

11 WHEREAS, the American Legion has been a  
12 staunch advocate for veterans and their  
13 families since 1919; and

14 WHEREAS, the American Legion was founded  
15 on the four pillars of care for veterans, a  
16 strong national defense, Americanism, and  
17 children and youth; and

18 WHEREAS, the American Legion has played a  
19 leading role in initiatives and breakthroughs  
20 that have affected the lives of Americans in  
21 every community from U.S. Flag Code to the GI  
22 Bill; and

23 WHEREAS, Post 760 has fulfilled the  
24 Legion's mission since 1945 through programs  
25 such as American Legion Auxiliary, Legion

1 Riders, Sons of the Legion, and South Hills  
2 Honor Guard; and

3 THEREFORE, I, Mayor Jack Allen, as Mayor  
4 of the Municipality of Bethel Park, do hereby  
5 proclaim June 10, 2019, as American Legion  
6 Centennial Day, and I encourage the community  
7 to observe this day with appropriate programs,  
8 ceremonies and activities.

9 (Clapping was heard.)

10 MR. NORMILE: Thank you very much.  
11 I accept this on behalf our commander, Jack  
12 Allen.

13 MR. AUL: Yeah, me, too.

14 MR. BEAVER: I concur. Thank you  
15 very much.

16 MAYOR ALLEN: That wasn't planned.  
17 Okay. Thank you.

18 MR. NORMILE: Thank you.

19 MAYOR ALLEN: Mr. President and  
20 Council, it is my honor and privilege to  
21 provide the annual State of the Municipality  
22 as required by our Home Rule Charter.

23 I'd like to begin by recognizing and  
24 commending the Council, municipal staff, the  
25 police department, the volunteer fire

1 department, and the EMS team for all their  
2 hard work and dedication to this community.

3 I must also mention how appreciative  
4 Bethel Park is for all those men and women who  
5 serve on our various boards and committees and  
6 the authorities and for the hundreds of folks  
7 who volunteer their time for the dozens of  
8 activities that go on here in the  
9 municipality. For the most part, their pay is  
10 just our gratitude and the good feeling that  
11 they get serving others.

12 I am pleased to report that again this  
13 year the auditing firm of Maher Duessel has  
14 completed the 2018 municipal audit and report  
15 that we noted no matters involving internal  
16 control and its operation that we consider to  
17 be reportable conditions under the established  
18 standards by the American Institute of  
19 Certified Public Accountants.

20 The financial department, like all other  
21 departments, continually seek ways to be more  
22 efficient and readily accept the advice and  
23 recommendations of the auditor on matters that  
24 are beneficial to the people in Bethel Park.  
25 So we thank you gentlemen and your staff for

1 another outstanding year.

2 Our financial situation is sound. The  
3 municipal millage at 2.74, and that includes  
4 the fire department at .34, is among the very  
5 lowest in Allegheny County. Our three  
6 bordering neighbors, South Park Township is at  
7 3.06, Mt. Lebanon at 4.71, and Upper St. Clair  
8 at 3.83.

9 So last year in the report I mentioned  
10 some significant developments and  
11 redevelopments within the community. So I'm  
12 pleased to report that this is an ongoing  
13 process. So since last June we've seen the  
14 following:

15 The Cool Springs Carriage Homes up by  
16 Cool Springs, 20 out of the 23 units have been  
17 issued final certificates of occupancy and  
18 three units have been issued building permits.

19 Bethel Park Senior Housing, which is the  
20 former YMCA property, at the intersection of  
21 McMurray Road and Limestone is now 90 percent  
22 complete.

23 The Willow Terrace Plan of Lots off of  
24 88, 23 houses have final certificates and  
25 building permits have been issued for two

1 other lots. There are no vacant lots  
2 remaining there.

3 Aldi additions, the development was  
4 approved for a 4,500 square foot addition in  
5 the front of the existing grocery store and  
6 that actually is nearing completion.

7 Projects that I mentioned last year were  
8 the Guardian Self -- Guardian Self Storage,  
9 No. 1 and 2, and they are both taking on  
10 occupants at this point.

11 Bethel Park Shopping Center  
12 redevelopment, that's the one up by Walmart  
13 and Giant Eagle, that development is no longer  
14 being pursued by the owners.

15 The Bethel Park Animal Clinic opened this  
16 year. The building looks -- was issued a  
17 temporary certificate and is currently in  
18 business.

19 There are three other projects that the  
20 board -- or planning and zoning are looking at  
21 right now. That's the American National --  
22 Natural Development. That's at Cool Springs.  
23 That's coming before the board. South Hills  
24 Village redevelopment, they're building a  
25 swimming pool up there, also. That's in the

1 process. And one that's just beginning is  
2 called Bethel Pines, and that's a housing  
3 development off of Bethel Church Road.

4 A re-dedication was held last month at  
5 Simmons Park for the improvements made there.  
6 This included new playground equipment, the  
7 zip line, new bathrooms, as well as upgrades  
8 to the fields. We've also purchased the land  
9 on the other side of the creek to be used for  
10 trails in the future.

11 Bethel Park has also entered an agreement  
12 with the Allegheny Land Trust to purchase the  
13 40 acres off of Valley Drive at the  
14 intersection of Route 88 and Connor Road.  
15 That land will remain green space with the  
16 possibility of walking trails in the future.

17 So I believe that as a Council and the  
18 staff we must continue to have a vision that  
19 Bethel Park will always be looking to the  
20 future and it's our responsibility to walk a  
21 delicate line between development and  
22 protecting our residents and our neighbors.

23 So, Mr. President, it's my observation  
24 and my opinion that the State of the  
25 Municipality is strong in all areas. I think

1 that it continues to go forward and we are  
2 positioned to adequately meet our immediate  
3 and future challenges. Thank you.

4 MR. MOURY: Thank you very much,  
5 Mayor.

6 Any other discussion?

7 MR. HARRISON: One. At this time  
8 why don't we tell the public about the meeting  
9 that's going to be held relative to the  
10 Guttman property.

11 MR. MOURY: Okay. Yes, as the  
12 Mayor mentioned, the Allegheny Land Trust,  
13 we've entered into an agreement with them to  
14 acquire the Guttman property off of Valley and  
15 Route 88 across from Connor Road. There's  
16 going to be a Public Hearing held here in  
17 council chambers on June 25, 2019, beginning  
18 at 6:30.

19 What that will be is the Allegheny Land  
20 Trust will be hosting it. It will talk about  
21 the acquisition. There is a funding gap.  
22 There's going to be fund-raising needed.  
23 There's going to be grants that we're going to  
24 need to get to secure this property. They  
25 have until the end of 2019 to raise these

1 funds. If they're successful, the property  
2 will be deeded to the Allegheny Land Trust.

3 I'll just make a personal comment. One  
4 of the reasons why we chose the trust -- or  
5 two reasons. One is they're familiar with  
6 doing this. They have the wherewithal and the  
7 knowledge to do it. And No. 2 is this -- if  
8 acquired by them, it will put this -- make  
9 this property vacant forever. Not that this  
10 Council or future Councils would ever change  
11 that, but if it goes into the Land Trust,  
12 we're secure for forever virtually, that's in  
13 their bylaws, that they cannot sell the  
14 property.

15 So meeting from the Allegheny Land Trust,  
16 June 25, 2019, at 6:30 p.m. in Council  
17 chambers at the Bethel Park Municipal  
18 Building.

19 MR. HARRISON: And if I may  
20 mention, part of the proposed budget to -- to  
21 pay for this project is -- is an amount that  
22 hopefully we'll get contributions from the  
23 public to help this get developed and I'd  
24 appreciate if you folks would come to the  
25 meeting. You'll have a chance to ask any



1 questions you want to and then consider  
2 whether you want to make a contribution so  
3 that the development can go ahead. Thank you.

4 MR. MOURY: Thank you very much.

5 Okay. At this time can we turn to the  
6 Approval of Minutes, and Mr. Hannan.

7 MR. HANNAN: The first item -- the  
8 only item is the Regular Council Meeting of  
9 May 13th.

10 I move that we approve the Regular  
11 Council Meeting minutes of May 20, 2019.

12 MS. GIBBONS: Second.

13 MR. MOURY: There's a motion and a  
14 second we approve the Regular Council Meeting  
15 minutes of May 13, 2019.

16 Any discussion of this item?

17 (No response was heard.)

18 MR. MOURY: Chief O'Connor, would  
19 you please call the roll.

20 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Campbell.

21 DR. CAMPBELL: Yes.

22 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Consolmagno.

23 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Yes.

24 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Dixon.

25 MR. DIXON: Yes.

1 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Gibbons.

2 MS. GIBBONS: Yes.

22 At this time I'd like to turn to  
23 Residents' Comment section for non-agenda  
24 items.

25 MR. PAHLER: Rich Pahler, 1119

1 Logan Road, talking about the flooding again.

2 After hearing everything, I mean, we're  
3 about -- we're just a little over a week away  
4 from the anniversary of last year's flood.  
5 And hearing what the Mayor had to say about  
6 all the projects and all the things going on  
7 here, I really wish Council and the  
8 Municipality would take this -- the flooding  
9 that's been going on here in Bethel for 50  
10 years a little more serious and make it more  
11 of a priority to get fixed.

12 I mean, we're -- you guys spend a lot of  
13 money on a lot of projects and that project  
14 seems to fall through the cracks all the time.  
15 With all that out there, you know, if you want  
16 to help the residents, I mean, 450 homes were  
17 flooded last year, 450 homes. I guess those  
18 residents don't matter.

19 You know, I just wish you would take --  
20 you know, get your priorities on the flooding  
21 more than all the other recreation and all  
22 this stuff that goes on. Those are, you know,  
23 law abiding, tax paying citizens that you --  
24 you tend to ignore.

25 I know there's some projects underway,

1 but, you know, it's been almost a year since  
2 this last flood. Like I said, it's been going  
3 on a long time. For you guys not to sit down  
4 and do a comprehensive long-term plan to fix  
5 this flooding throughout the municipality, I  
6 mean, there was even some jokes made tonight  
7 about it, you know, it's sad and it's  
8 disappointing.

9 There's people that suffer with this  
10 every day. Every time it rains, they lose  
11 sleep, you name it. You know, they can't  
12 leave their homes because if -- if the power  
13 goes out, their homes will flood because, you  
14 know, the -- the -- the things they have in  
15 place to help stop that flooding will fail.

16 So I really wish this Council, the  
17 Municipality, the Borough, everybody would  
18 take the flooding in this Municipality  
19 seriously and raise the priority of it with  
20 these other programs you guys are talking  
21 about. You know, I think that would help a  
22 lot of residents here.

23 MR. MOURY: Thank you very much.

24 MR. PAHLER: Thanks.

25 MR. MOURY: Okay. Any other

1 resident comments?

2 (No response was heard.)

3 MR. MOURY: Hearing none; can we  
4 turn to General Policy and Finance, and Mr.  
5 McLean. And we have no residents signed up to  
6 speak.

7 MR. McLEAN: Thank you, Mr.  
8 President.

9 The first item on the agenda under  
10 General Policy and Finance is Ordinance No.  
11 6-10-19A, Amendment to the Home Rule Charter.

12 I move that we approve Ordinance 6-10-19A  
13 to initiate a referendum to amend the Home  
14 Rule Charter to remove the provisions  
15 requiring the Municipal Planner and the  
16 Municipal Financial Officer to become  
17 residents of the Municipality of Bethel Park  
18 within one year of employment.

19 MS. GIBBONS: Second.

20 MR. MOURY: There's a second and a  
21 second that we approve Ordinance No. 6-10-19A  
22 to initiate a referendum to amend the Home  
23 Rule Charter to remove provisions requiring  
24 the Municipal Planner and the Municipal  
25 Financial Officer to become residents of the

1 Municipality of Bethel Park within one year of  
2 employment.

3 Would you like to give an overview, Mr.  
4 McLean.

5 MR. McLEAN: Thank you, Mr.  
6 President.

7 So the thinking behind this, so folks  
8 have the context for it, is under the Home  
9 Rule Charter as it was originally adopted  
10 there are four positions, which consist of  
11 department heads, that include a requirement  
12 that the holder of that position either live  
13 in Bethel Park or agree to move into Bethel  
14 Park within one year. Those are the Municipal  
15 Manager, the Chief of Police, the Municipal  
16 Planner and the Municipal Financial Officer.

17 And what experience of late has shown us  
18 is that with respect to two of those  
19 positions, the Planner and the Financial  
20 Officer, the candidates that we get for those  
21 positions when there are openings, while they  
22 are often wonderful, like Mr. Villella whom we  
23 ended up hiring and who lives in Bethel, we  
24 get fewer candidates. They tend to be  
25 specialized positions and we realized that in

1           today's day and age, when you have two people  
2           in the home who are working, people are just  
3           not as mobile and able to move. So it's  
4           become a bit of a requirement that is limiting  
5           the candidates that we get for those  
6           positions.

7                        So the recommendation that's coming from  
8           Council is that as to those two positions, not  
9           the Manager or the Chief, but as to the  
10          Municipal Planner and the Financial Officer,  
11          we revise the charter so that those folks are  
12          not required to move into the Municipality  
13          within one year.

14                       We're always hopeful that they will, and  
15          once they get to meet Council I'm sure they'll  
16          want to live in Bethel Park, but for purposes  
17          of the Home Rule Charter, this would appear on  
18          the ballot in November. If adopted tonight,  
19          it will go through the process of the county  
20          and then the electorate would have to vote on  
21          it. If they do, then that requirement would  
22          be removed for those two positions.

23                       MR. MOURY: Thank you.

24                       Just to follow up on that, these are the  
25          only two positions. We have four positions



1 that are mandated and charged, as Mr. McLean  
2 said. We have negotiated -- with our unions,  
3 we have requirements. So this is completely  
4 separate. This only impacts two positions.

5 We also have other management positions  
6 that we do, by policy, require to live in  
7 Bethel Park. And we have waived that policy  
8 on some of them as we go out and try to source  
9 new candidates, but this question is just for  
10 these two positions.

11 Any other comments?

12 MR. HARRISON: Mr. Moury --

13 MR. MOURY: Mr. Harrison.

14 MR. HARRISON: -- I want to  
15 congratulate Council for putting this on the  
16 agenda in a timely manner so it's consistent  
17 with the rule. Thank you very much.

18 MR. MOURY: Thank you, Mr.  
19 Harrison.

20 Any other discussion?

21 (No response was heard.)

22 MR. MOURY: Hearing none; Chief  
23 O'Connor, would you please call the roll.

19 MR. McLEAN: The second agenda item  
20 is Ordinance No. 6-10-19B, PENNVEST General  
21 Obligation Note.

22 I move that we approve Ordinance  
23 6-10-19B, increasing the indebtedness of the  
24 Municipality by the issue of a General  
25 Obligation Note with PENNVEST for \$1,367,000

1 for the construction of three storm water  
2 management projects serving areas downstream  
3 of Oak Tree Park, Logan Road ponds, and Birch  
4 Tree Park.

5 MS. GIBBONS: Second.

6 MR. MOURY: There's a motion and a  
7 second that we approve Ordinance No. 6-10-19B,  
8 increase it -- increasing the indebtedness of  
9 the Municipality by the issue of a General  
10 Obligation Note with PENNVEST for \$1,367,000  
11 for the construction of three storm water  
12 management projects servicing areas downstream  
13 of Oak Tree Park, Logan Road pond, and Birch  
14 Tree Park.

15 I'll just make two comments here. I will  
16 be abstaining from this vote. I serve on the  
17 PENNVEST board of directors. So I believe to  
18 be -- this would be a conflict of interest.

19 I also, just for the record, abstained  
20 from the vote by the PENNVEST board when they  
21 discussed our application.

22 The second part of this is this is really  
23 the start of expanding the flooding or the  
24 storm water management program we have in the  
25 Municipality. Last fall we asked our staff --

1 we challenged them to look at areas where we  
2 can have an impact, where we can implement  
3 programs not only to help with the storm water  
4 management, but more importantly our MS4,  
5 getting the sediment out of the ponds or out  
6 of our streams, which we're required to.

7 They came back with a list of probably 8  
8 to 10 to 12 items. They put together their  
9 own criteria. This Council had no involvement  
10 in any of the selection process. We're  
11 following the recommendations from staff.

12 This is our 2019 projects. We applied  
13 for the PENNVEST loan late in 2018. We're  
14 currently working on three projects for 2020.  
15 We'll be passing an application process  
16 sometime this summer for consideration of  
17 PENNVEST sometime this fall. I believe at  
18 their September or October meeting.

19 So we have been working I don't want to  
20 say behind the scenes, but our staff has been  
21 working diligently. One of the challenges we  
22 have with getting these loans is you have to  
23 have all your permits and everything completed  
24 before you can actually apply for the loan.  
25 So it's a little longer up front.

1           These projects are currently being bid  
2 out. This number may change based on the  
3 amount of money that -- how the bids come  
4 back. It may go up or down. And if it's  
5 above or below, we would have to go back to  
6 the PENNVEST board and ask them for the  
7 adjustment based on what the total of the  
8 three projects are going to cost.

9           So having said that, any additional  
10 items?

11           (No response was heard.)

12           MR. MOURY: Hearing none, Chief  
13 O'Connor, would you please call the roll.

14           CHIEF O'CONNOR: Campbell.

15           DR. CAMPBELL: Yes.

17 MR. DIXON: Mr. President, we have  
18 no items under Planning and Zoning.

19 MR. MOURY: Thank you, Mr. Dixon.

20 Are there any additional items?

21 (No response was heard.)

22 MR. MOURY: Hearing none, can we  
23 turn to Health, Safety and Welfare, and Mr.  
24 Consolmagno.

25 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Mr. Moury, we

1 have one item.

2 I move that we approve the Police  
3 Department Organizational Chart per memorandum  
4 dated May 16, 2019.

5 MS. GIBBONS: Second.

6 MR. MOURY: There's a motion and a  
7 second we approve the Police Department  
8 Organizational Chart per memorandum dated May  
9 16, 2019.

10 That's just assigning the dispatchers  
11 going from the lieutenants, they'll be  
12 reporting to the sergeant in charge of each  
13 shift. Am I correct, sir?

14 CHIEF O'CONNOR: And the patrol  
15 lieutenant.

16 MR. MOURY: And the patrol  
17 lieutenant. I'm sorry.

18 Okay. Any discussion of this item?

19 (No response was heard.)

20 MR. MOURY: Chief O'Connor, would

24 have in Bethel Park and, you know, for all the  
25 kids to use and, you know, older adults like



1 myself to enjoy. And I just wanted to thank  
2 the Montour Trail Committee for doing it.  
3 Thank you.

4 MR. MOURY: Thank you, Mr.  
5 Consolmagno.

6 Are there any additional items?

7 (No response was heard.)

8 MR. MOURY: Hearing none, can we  
9 turn to Public Works and Maintenance, and Ms.  
10 Gibbons.

11 MS. GIBBONS: Resolution No.  
12 R6-10-19A, DCED Flood Mitigation Grant.

13 I move that we approve Resolution No.  
14 R6-10-19A to apply for a DCED Commonwealth  
15 Financing Authority Grant for the Oak Tree  
16 Park Stormwater Project.

17 MR. HANNAN: Second.

18 MR. MOURY: There's a motion and a  
19 second that we approve Resolution No.  
20 R6-10-19A to apply for a DCED Commonwealth  
21 Financing Authority Grant for the Oak Tree  
22 Park Stormwater Projects.

23 This will supplement -- if we're able to  
24 get the DCED grant, we will borrow less on the  
25 PENNVEST loan.

1 Any discussion of this item?

19 MR. MOURY: Mr. Dixon.

20 MR. DIXON: I just wanted to --  
21 with regard -- this is with regard to the  
22 ordinance to amend the Home Rule Charter.

23 I just wanted to commend our Philadelphia  
24 lawyer for advising us to put that on the  
25 agenda tonight.

1 MR. MOURY: Thank you, Mr. Dixon.

2 Is there any other item?

3 DR. CAMPBELL: Mr. Moury.

4 MR. MOURY: Dr. Campbell.

5 DR. CAMPBELL: Last month we had  
6 the re-dedication ceremony at Simmons Park,  
7 and it was a -- it was a great event. We had  
8 representatives from local, county, our state,  
9 as well as federal representatives there, and  
10 it was very well attended.

11 There we announced, as the chief  
12 mentioned, and as -- that we have a lot of  
13 projects in the plan of Bethel Park, a lot of  
14 projects that really enhance the quality of  
15 our community.

16 One of these projects is the Live Well  
17 Allegheny Initiative. It's actually a county  
18 initiative, but it's also -- our version of  
19 that, our flavor of that is Live Well  
20 Pennsylvania -- Live Well Bethel Park. It's  
21 in partnership with the county to do what we  
22 can to enhance the health, not only the mental  
23 health, but the physical health of our  
24 residents.

25 It's been a multiprong approach. We're

1 looking at a lot of different aspects. You  
2 heard the Mayor talk about the Allegheny Land  
3 Trust and the capabilities of making that  
4 conservatory, that 40 acres in South Hills,  
5 that's almost unheard of, to be able to  
6 preserve for all time and eternity as green  
7 space. That's beautiful. That's wonderful to  
8 see that happening.

9 But dovetailing into this also is  
10 expanding the parks. You've heard previously  
11 we almost doubled the size of Simmons Park by  
12 picking up 25 more acres in there. And we  
13 have future plans for there as far as  
14 expanding a lot of the rail trails, expanding  
15 the trails within the park, developing  
16 connectors to our -- to our parks and  
17 developing new trails in themselves.

18 We'd like to augment our sidewalk program  
19 a little bit more to develop walking through  
20 local parks. You can see a lot of this is  
21 basically what we can do to enhance the  
22 well-being of our residents mentally as well  
23 as physically.

24 Part of that is we're going to start a  
25 speaker series. It's going to be community

1 partners, folks who are subject matter experts  
2 in their fields, community hospitals, local  
3 gyms, local individuals who'd like to go ahead  
4 and speak and talk and give us some  
5 information, evidence-based information, good  
6 evidence that we'll be able to help our  
7 citizens and things that can be workable  
8 items, things that can be put into play.

9 I'll be able to talk on obesity items and  
10 with the little things that can be done,  
11 evidence-based things that can be done  
12 specifically for weight loss.

13 For those of you who haven't known me  
14 long, four years ago I was 100 pounds heavier.  
15 I'm not real proud of that. As a doc, it  
16 didn't look real good, I can assure you. But  
17 I've been able to lose a fair amount of weight  
18 over the last four years and I've done it  
19 healthy, in a healthy manner, diet and  
20 exercising properly.

21 But there's a lot of -- so many cool  
22 things that are taking place. Some of the  
23 other things we're going to talk about are an  
24 education program, exercise, mental health,  
25 depression, anxiety. Talk about smoking and

1 alcohol sensations. It's an ultimate crisis.  
2 It is a crisis. Every single one of us will  
3 be touched at one time or another with just an  
4 onslaught of what opioids can do.

5 So I'd just like to share a few of my  
6 skills and then as a doc be able to speak in  
7 the future. But, again, this can be a great  
8 forum in which we can find some really great  
9 talent, really great individuals to come into  
10 our community to speak and to talk to us. And  
11 the nice thing about this, it costs us  
12 nothing, nothing. And it dovetails nicely  
13 into the Bethel Park blueprint. Actually, it  
14 goes hand in glove as well with one of our  
15 alternative plans.

16 So look for the upcoming Bethel Park  
17 Chronicles, the next edition, and we'll be  
18 seeing some of the things that we'll be doing  
19 with Live Well Bethel Park in that.

20 MR. MOURY: Thank you very much.

21 I just have two things to mention. No.  
22 1, I just wanted to give a shout out to  
23 Allegheny County. For those of you who have  
24 driven down Fort Couch Road, speaking of  
25 sidewalks, they have been in not very good



1 shape. We have been working with the county  
2 for some time and I really want to give  
3 special thanks to our county councilperson Sue  
4 Means who really stepped up and shuffled the  
5 project through to make sure we get the  
6 sidewalks repaired.

7 As I came down there today, Allegheny  
8 County Works -- Public Works Department was  
9 repairing -- or replacing the sidewalks, and  
10 they were much needed. So I'd just like to  
11 thank our county councilperson Sue Means.

12 And last but not least, I would like to  
13 thank Chief O'Connor for stepping up. I kind  
14 of enjoy him sitting up here and he now laughs  
15 at my jokes once in a while. No, but we  
16 really -- we really do appreciate everything  
17 you've done, stepping up, and I know it -- we  
18 thought it would be a shorter process and  
19 maybe turned out to be longer than  
20 anticipated, but without hesitation, when we  
21 discussed this with the Chief, he said yes, he  
22 would do it. And I just want to let him know  
23 on behalf of myself, Council, and the  
24 community, we really appreciate your  
25 commitment not just to the police department,

1 but to municipal staff and the community. So  
2 thank you.

3 (Clapping was heard.)

4 MR. MOURY: And you are welcome to  
5 sit up here anytime you want.

6 CHIEF O'CONNOR: I'll take it under  
7 consideration.

8 MR. MOURY: On that note, is there  
9 a motion to adjourn?

10 MR. HANNAN: I move we adjourn.

11 MR. MOURY: Second. All in favor.

12 DR. CAMPBELL: Aye.

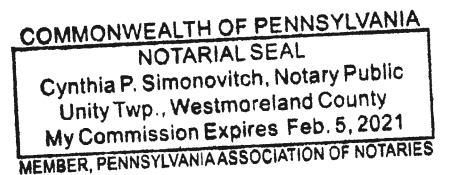
