2 (Commencing at approximately 7:32 p.m.)

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. I'd like to
4 call the Regular Council Meeting to order of
5 January 13, 2020. I apologize. We're running
6 a few minutes late.

7 Okay. At this time, Mr. Christian,
8 would you please call the roll.

9 MR. CHRISTIAN: Campbell?

10 MR. CAMPBELL: Here.

11 MR. CHRISTIAN: Cenci?

12 MR. CENCI: Here.

13 MR. CHRISTIAN: Consolmagno?

14 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Here.

15 MR. CHRISTIAN: Gibbons?

16 MS. GIBBONS: Here.

17 MR. CHRISTIAN: Hannan?

18 MR. HANNAN: Present.

19 MR. CHRISTIAN: Harrison?

20 MR. HARRISON: Present.

21 MR. CHRISTIAN: McLean?

22 (No response was heard.)

23 MR. CHRISTIAN: Moury?

24 PRESIDENT MOURY: Here.

25 MR. CHRISTIAN: O'Brien?

1 (No response was heard.)

2 PRESIDENT MOURY: He got lost on his
3 way out. Everybody laugh when he comes out,
4 will you?

5 We have seven members present.

6 At this time, can we stand for the
7 Pledge of Allegiance.

8 (The Pledge of Allegiance was
9 recited.)

10 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. O'Brien is
11 here.

12 (Laughing heard.)

13 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. We have
14 Chair Announcements. On January 13, 2020,
15 before we came out this evening, Executive
16 Session of Council was conducted for personnel
17 and legal issues.

18 At this time, we turn to the Reports
19 of Officials, and the Library Director's
20 report.

21 MS. MACINTOSH: Good evening. My
22 name is Christine. I'm the director of your
23 public library. We provide opportunities to
24 explore, learn, create, and connect.

25 Over the holidays, I was home for a

1 few days, and I was reminded of a great
2 service that the library provides. It's
3 Hoopla. And Hoopla is a digital media service
4 offered at the library that allows you to
5 borrow movies and music to enjoy on your
6 computer, tablet, phone or your TV.

7 So there's no waiting. Titles can be
8 streamed immediately or downloaded to your
9 phone or tablet for offline enjoyment. Movies
10 can be borrowed for two or three days, music
11 for seven days, and all new current stuff.

12 So if you're tired of paying for
13 Netflix, Hulu, Amazon TV, you can get it free
14 at the library with your library card.

15 And a few events that are coming up.
16 Family STEM Day on Saturday, January 18. Stop
17 in any time between 11:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.
18 for hands-on activities and demonstrations
19 incorporating science, technology,
20 engineering, and math. All ages are welcome.
21 But children ten and under must be accompanied
22 by an adult. No registration is necessary.

23 Also on Saturday, January 18, we're
24 having international -- or not international
25 -- intergenerational bingo at the Residence at

1 Logan, located at 5851 Keystone Drive, here in
2 Bethel Park. So, it's an opportunity for us
3 to connect with members of another generation.
4 It's fun for the whole family, including
5 teens. Prizes will be awarded.

6 And we have sports author and
7 historian Jim O'Brien coming to the library on
8 Tuesday, January 21 at 7:00 p.m. He'll be
9 here to discuss his new book Franco Rocky and
10 Friends that provides insight into why Chuck
11 Noll and the Steelers were the NFL team of the
12 decade, and how Rocky and Franco fit into the
13 picture.

14 So, if you want any information on
15 these or many of the other great programs and
16 services, you can visit the library's website,
17 give us a call or stop on in. That is all.

18 PRESIDENT MOURY: Any discussion from
19 Council?

20 (No response was heard.)

21 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
22 much.

23 MS. MACINTOSH: Thank you.

24 Can we turn to Police Chief's Report,
25 and Chief O'Connor.

1 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Mayor. Council.
2 Hi already everybody, Chief here.

3 First of all, I want to thank
4 everyone who contributed presents for the
5 Presents from Police program for the kids at
6 Children's Hospital. Bethel Park had a
7 tremendous generous donation of presents.

8 The presents were taken out, and all
9 the kids received presents on December the
10 20th. So it was a big success. And, again,
11 just thank everyone who contributed. Thank
12 you so much.

13 Also, I want to thank all those who
14 attended the Coffee with Police on January the
15 3rd at the Schoolhouse Arts building. It was
16 such a success. I think we'll make that a
17 regular event.

18 How's that, Mr. Seasak (phonetic)?
19 Good?

20 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Sounds good.

21 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Oh, thank you.

22 It was his idea, that's why.

23 (Laughing was heard.)

24 CHIEF O'CONNOR: And we will have
25 Crime Watch on Monday, February the 3rd, 7:00

1 p.m. at the Community Center. So hope to see
2 you there.

3 And, finally, I just wanted to wish
4 everybody a safe New Year. Thank you.

5 Any questions?

6 PRESIDENT MOURY: Any questions?

7 Hearing none; can we turn to the Fire
8 Chief's report. And we've got two special
9 guests here tonight.

10 MR. GERBER: Good evening. My name's
11 Dave Gerber. I'm the Fire Chief for the
12 Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company.

13 This evening, I bring along help with
14 me tonight. I'd like to introduce to
15 everybody the new president of the fire
16 department. This is Steve McGuff.

17 Steve's been a member now for going
18 on three years?

19 MR. MCGUFF: Yes, sir.

20 MR. GERBER: Three years with the
21 fire department. Steve is a very smart, young
22 man. He is a teacher, a music teacher at
23 Peter's Township Middle School. Middle
24 school?

25 MR. MCGUFF: Four through 12, music.

1 MR. GERBER: Okay, four through 12,
2 music. Bigger kids than I thought, so...

3 Anyway, I just wanted to introduce
4 him. We're up here for another presentation
5 in a little bit. But I just wanted to
6 introduce him to everybody so everybody knows
7 who he is.

8 In December, the Bethel Park
9 Volunteer Fire Company ran 38 calls. We had
10 six fires. One person -- or one group of
11 people stuck in an elevator, one gas leak, one
12 motor vehicle accident, four smoke conditions,
13 eight good intent calls, seven CO calls, and
14 ten fire alarms. So like 38 calls for the
15 month of December.

16 To finish out the year, the fire
17 department ran 616 calls January 1 through
18 December 31. That is up 89 calls from 2018.
19 It's up 176 calls from 2016. And it's up 264
20 calls from 2007.

21 Our call volume keeps going up and
22 up. We do our best to do what we can to keep
23 up with that. But, you know, we -- we try our
24 best and do what we can.

25 So calls by Ward: Ward 1 through

1 2019 ran 48 calls. Ward 2 ran 32. Ward 3 had
2 31. Ward 4 had 97. Ward 5 had 56. Ward 6
3 had 20. Ward 7 had 64. Ward 8 had 107. Ward
4 9 had 29. And we ran 132 calls out of town.

5 And then just one last bit of info.
6 Call totals, we had 60- -- we ran 63 fires
7 last year, two over-pressure hazardous
8 condition calls, 15 rescue calls, 125
9 electrical hazardous condition calls, 28
10 system and services calls, 134 good intent
11 calls, 242 fire alarm and CO alarms, and seven
12 severe weather calls. So with that equals
13 another very busy year for the fire
14 department.

15 We thank everybody for their support.
16 Council and everybody, we always appreciate
17 everything you guys do for us. So thank you
18 very much.

19 And just one last safety tip.
20 Eventually it's going to snow this winter. I
21 have a feeling it's going to. So if you have
22 a fire hydrant in your front yard, across the
23 street from you, whatever, it's always very
24 important that if it snows and the fire
25 hydrant gets covered and all, we ask that you

1 go out and try and shovel out a little bit of
2 an area so that if we have a call, we do have
3 maps in the truck that tell us where all the
4 hydrants are so we can find them. It's just
5 getting to them. And if we have to connect to
6 a hydrant, we need to get to it quickly.

7 So if you have one in your front yard
8 or anything like that, we ask that you try and
9 shovel out a three-foot area around the
10 hydrant so that we can get to it, easily
11 access it, and do what we need to do in case
12 there is a fire.

13 So with that, that is all I have.
14 Unless anybody has any questions?

15 PRESIDENT MOURY: Any discussion?

16 (No response was heard.)

17 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
18 much, Chief.

19 At this time, if we turn the Mayor's
20 Report, Mayor Allen.

21 MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you.

22 I have two things this evening. The
23 first one, since I see a lot of people in blue
24 here, I want to bring up Britney Hollick.
25 Britney is the brand-new president of the

1 Community Foundation. And it's nice to see
2 someone other than Dan Duff up here, so...

3 MS. HOLLICK: We look pretty much the
4 same.

5 MAYOR ALLEN: So I will turn this
6 over to you.

7 MS. HOLLICK: Okay, great. Thanks,
8 Jack.

9 Hi, everyone. Like he said, I'm
10 going to be the new president of the Community
11 Foundation this year. I've been here in
12 Bethel Park with my State Farm office for the
13 last four years, so going into year five.
14 I've learned a lot from a lot of people. So
15 I'm really excited to be a part of this
16 community.

17 Tonight, I have Erin Musciano with
18 me. She's a realtor here in Bethel Park.
19 She's part of the Community Foundation. But
20 we wanted to give a shout-out and present
21 these checks to the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire
22 Department.

23 If you guys want to come up and take
24 a picture with us.

25 And then Tri Community South EMS,

1 they both had submitted grant requests for
2 safety equipment. If you want to describe the
3 safety equipment, you can probably do a much
4 better job than I can.

5 But we truly appreciate all the hard
6 work that they do, and especially risking
7 their lives for the community of Bethel Park.
8 So, we wanted to say thank you. And we
9 figured this would help you save more people.

10 MR. BOWER: The way things are
11 happening in the community and all over the
12 world right now, we, along with the fire
13 department, decided that we needed to offer
14 protection for our personnel. So we
15 approached the Community Foundation, and they
16 were able to give us grants to purchase
17 protective vests for the fire department and
18 the EMS personnel.

19 So we're really happy we can provide
20 this service and protect our personnel at the
21 same time. We really appreciate the Community
22 Foundation's help in doing that.

23 MS. HOLLICK: That's all I have.

24 (Clapping was heard.)

25 PRESIDENT MOURY: Would the Fire

1 Department have any comments?

2 MR. GERBER: We can -- yeah.

3 We would just also like to thank the
4 Community Foundation. You guys have always
5 treated us pretty well. We appreciate
6 everything you do.

7 As Mr. Bower said, you know, it's not
8 something that we want to do or want to have.
9 But it is a good piece of equipment just in
10 case anything crazy goes on, unfortunately,
11 the way seems to do. So, thank you guys very
12 much.

13 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
14 much.

15 MAYOR ALLEN: And the second thing
16 that I have for this evening is our 2019
17 holiday lighting and decorating contest
18 winners. I'm not sure how many's here. I
19 have a list of who should be here. But I
20 don't want to miss anyone.

21 So, the award itself, it says, Award
22 for excellence presented this 13th day of
23 January 2020 by the Municipality of Bethel
24 Park to the individual residence, in
25 acknowledgment of the outstanding 2019 holiday

1 season display of decorations at your
2 residence located at your address, you are
3 hereby presented the Mayor's Award of
4 Excellence. This recognition herein given to
5 your home signifies that your holiday
6 decorations were judged to be the best in your
7 Ward. Bethel Park appreciates your efforts to
8 enhance our community's image this special
9 time of year. So congratulations and best
10 wishes for a bright 2020.

11 So the first winner is Ward 1. And I
12 don't believe they're here. Honorable mention
13 was 5411 California Avenue.

14 And which is kind of neat about this,
15 as we're giving these awards out, the people
16 at home are actually seeing your house on
17 television. So there's a picture for you, but
18 now the people are seeing your home also.

19 And the Ward 1 winner is Robert and
20 Lauren Butt, 5501 California Avenue. They're
21 not here, correct? Okay.

22 MAYOR ALLEN: And I don't believe
23 Ward 2 is here either. Honorable mention,
24 1283 Clifton Road, 5575 Saddlebrook Drive.
25 And the winner for Ward 2 is Robert and

1 Patrice Andres at 562 Saddlebrook Drive.

2 Okay. Ward 3 is here, I hope. The
3 honorable mentions, 957 Clifton Road, 3429
4 South Park Road, 3566 South Park Road. And
5 Ward 3 winner, who's not a stranger, Daniel
6 and Kerri Hartman, 760 McMurray Road.

7 (Clapping was heard.)

8 MR. HARTMAN: Local company made that
9 T-shirt.

10 MAYOR ALLEN: I'm looking forward to
11 seeing what he does next year. He's going to
12 have a sequel to the movie. Thank you.

13 Oh, you got to tell the people what
14 you did this year that is new from last year.

15 MR. HARTMAN: Well, assuming most of
16 you guys have drove past my house. But I
17 wasn't going to do it this year. I really
18 wasn't. But I got a late start at it and
19 ended up doing it. But every year I keep
20 adding a little more to it. And I was stuck
21 for ideas what to add this year.

22 So, there's an empty lot across the
23 street from my house up there on McMurray
24 Road. And we strung up a, you know, a movie
25 string and basically built a drive-in theatre

1 up there. We made a movie a couple days
2 before Christmas.

3 MAYOR ALLEN: That's terrific.
4 And we'll have to ask the Police
5 Department how that actually worked out.
6 Chief?

7 CHIEF O'CONNOR: (Nods head.)

8 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. Thank you very
9 much.

10 (Clapping was heard.)

11 MAYOR ALLEN: Ward 4, we have our
12 winner is Thomas and Heather White, 629
13 Clearview Drive.

14 (Clapping was heard.)

15 MAYOR ALLEN: These are the helpers.

16 MR. WHITE: Yeah, these are the
17 helpers.

18 MAYOR ALLEN: These are the little
19 elves. The elves.

20 MRS. WHITE: Thank you.

21 MAYOR ALLEN: If you would like to
22 tell us a little bit about your house.

23 MR. WHITE: Yeah, I just --

24 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Got carried away.

25 MR. WHITE: I was going to go crazy

1 and do lights all the way around. But I
2 changed it up this year. And I just got some
3 floodlights, and I just did, like, the warm
4 LEDs on the bushes.

5 MRS. WHITE: He went classy.

6 MR. WHITE: Real, you know, just
7 classy.

8 MAYOR ALLEN: People are looking at
9 it now, so, yeah.

10 MR. WHITE: So, yeah, just kept it
11 simple. I like to make it fun for the kids,
12 so...

13 MAYOR ALLEN: Girls, you guys have
14 fun?

15 CHILDREN: Yes.

16 MAYOR ALLEN: All right. Thank you
17 very much.

18 (Clapping was heard.)

19 MAYOR ALLEN: Our Ward 5 winner --
20 honorable mention, 141 Highland Road. And the
21 Ward 5 winner is Albert and Carolyn Freyvogel
22 of 2350 Castle Drive. And I think they're
23 here.

24 (Clapping was heard.)

25 MS. FREYVOGEL: Number one, I want to

1 thank everybody who voted for us. We've been
2 in Bethel for 50 years, decorating for the
3 past 35 Christmas. But our next big event, if
4 everybody anybody wants to go past the house,
5 is Easter. That's -- we decorate for
6 Halloween, Thanksgiving, Easter, Christmas.

7 But at Easter time, if you have
8 children, and you if come that Monday before
9 Easter, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday,
10 Friday, Saturday, if you have small children,
11 you will see the Easter bunny sitting out
12 there as usual. So all are welcome.

13 And if it wasn't for my son, we
14 wouldn't have any decorations. And I think
15 our house is -- of all the decorations that
16 I've seen, I think our house has the most
17 blowups. Yeah, we have 19 blowups in our
18 yard, plus lights and reindeer and that. So
19 thanks for voting for us. I've been there for
20 50 years, so...

21 MAYOR ALLEN: Congratulations.

22 MS. FREYVOGEL: Thanks a lot.

23 (Clapping was heard.)

24 MAYOR ALLEN: I want to give a thank
25 you shout-out to the judges. Because we do

1 have one different judge in every ward. And
2 they come back with the winner. So that's how
3 we determine which house wins.

4 Okay. Ward 6, honorable mentions,
5 5988 Glen Hill Drive, 1108 McKnight Drive.
6 And Ward 6 winner is Raymond and Joe Bruschi
7 of 5724 Wilson Drive. And I don't believe
8 they're here, right?

9 Okay. Our Ward 7, honorable mention,
10 346 Marbury Road. And our winner for Ward 7
11 Teddy and Rebecca Dougherty, 411 Linwood
12 Drive. And they should be here.

13 MR. DOUGHERTY: Yep.

14 (Clapping was heard.)

15 MAYOR ALLEN: They should be here.

16 MRS. DOUGHERTY: I'm taking pictures.

17 MAYOR ALLEN: Congratulations.

18 MR. DOUGHERTY: Okay. Ever since my
19 daughter was a little child, we've been in
20 Bethel about 14 years, she asked me to put a
21 little bit of Christmas lights up. Well, it's
22 been 14 years, and just growing and growing to
23 where it's overcome the whole house and the
24 yard. And it's a runway going up the house,
25 up the driveway, and just lots of colors and

1 old-school colors.

2 MAYOR ALLEN: How long does it take
3 you to put that up?

4 MR. DOUGHERTY: It takes about four
5 days to put it up and about two hours to take
6 it down.

7 (Laughing was heard.)

8 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. Thank you.

9 Okay. I'm not sure about Ward 8.
10 Honorable mentions, 2480 Driftwood Drive, 174
11 Meadowbrook Drive, and 5050 Orchard Avenue.
12 And the winners for Ward 8 is Bruce and Regina
13 Bosle at 2789 Milford Drive.

14 Okay. And our last one, Ward 9,
15 honorable mention is 198 Thunderwood Drive.
16 Winner was Richard Rendulic at 124 Rocky
17 Ridge. And I don't believe he's here either.

18 So, but I want to thank everyone who
19 did it. The ones that are recognized are who
20 grow theirs year after year. And it's a great
21 time. People enjoy the lights. People talk
22 about the lights.

23 And congratulations to the winners.
24 And we look forward to seeing you next year.
25 Thank you. That's my report.

20 Before we go to the Residents'

21 Comment section, I would like to do this in

22 the beginning. For those of you watching

23 tonight, we have a different face up here.

24 With the retirement of Mr. Dixon, I believe,

25 Ward 4, we have Mr. Cenci who took over. He

1 was elected and sworn in last Monday.

2 So welcome.

3 (Clapping was heard.)

4 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. At this
5 time, I would like to turn to the Residents'
6 Comment section for non-agenda items. If
7 anybody would like to say anything, come up to
8 the microphone, state your name and address.

9 MR. DUERR: Hi everyone. Tom Duerr,
10 1008 Brianna Lane. I just wanted to come and
11 introduce myself. I'm the new County Council
12 member for Allegheny County for District 5,
13 which includes all of Bethel Park, Mt.
14 Lebanon, Upper St. Clair, and Bridgeville.

15 I've lived in Bethel Park my whole
16 life, since I was two. So it is a tremendous
17 honor for me to now be an elected official
18 representing this area. And I look forward to
19 working with this entire body to continue the
20 work that you guys have done my entire life
21 living here. So thank you all for that.

22 And, you know, looking forward to
23 getting started. I had my first meeting a
24 couple weeks ago. And I'm going to do my best
25 to come to as many Council meetings here in

1 Bethel Park as I can over the next four years
2 here. So thank you very much. I just wanted
3 to come and introduce myself.

4 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
5 much, and welcome.

6 Are there any other residents that
7 would like to speak?

8 Hearing none; can we turn into -- to
9 General Policy and Finance, and Mr. Hannan.

10 MR. HANNAN: There are no agenda
11 items under General Policy and Finance,
12 Mr. President.

13 PRESIDENT MOURY: That you, Mr.
14 Hannan.

15 Are there any additional items?

16 MR. HARRISON: Mr. Moury?

17 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Harrison.

18 MR. HARRISON: I had some information
19 I'd like to enter into the record.

20 Welcome to 2020. I've been waiting
21 92 years for this occasion.

22 I announced at the December meeting
23 that the \$35,000 budget item from the Bethel
24 Park population for the Bethel Park Green Land
25 Development, Guttman property, was

1 approximately \$700 short of the goal.

2 I requested that people who intend to
3 make contributions, please make a contribution
4 before the end of the year to reach the stated
5 goal. When the meeting ended that night, one
6 of my Fifth Ward constituents approached the
7 dais with checkbook in hand and requested the
8 information needed to make a contribution.
9 Subsequently, several other people made
10 contributions before the end of the year.

11 I am happy to report that at the end
12 of the year the total was \$37,243. So a lot
13 of people made Christmas gifts. I wanted to
14 express my sincere thanks to all the folks who
15 responded to the donation request.

16 This is an important year for the
17 nation and for Bethel Park. We have a
18 national election. We're blessed with the
19 President who is keeping his campaign
20 promises.

21 One important promise is to drain the
22 D.C. swamp. That is an arduous task for the
23 -- for the residents -- for the President due
24 to the resistance of the swamp dwellers.
25 Hopefully, with his one more year in this term

1 and four more years in his second term, he
2 will accomplish this important mission.

3 Bethel Park has its own swamp that
4 has to be drained. Mr. Moury and his cohorts
5 at this dais verbally trashed me at every
6 opportunity. The most recent time was at the
7 November 2019 meeting. The subsequent was the
8 introduction of the proposed Master Plan.

9 I expressed my concern that the plan
10 is overburdened with unnecessary details. In
11 particular, I objected to the Bethel Park
12 downtown plan along Brightwood Road and West
13 Library Avenue. I alluded to the plan as pie
14 in the sky. Implementation of the plan would
15 be very expensive and require a tax increase.

16 In essence, Mr. Moury said they were
17 looking futuristic -- futuristic and I'm
18 living in the past.

19 The Master Plan is a ten-year plan.
20 And they admit that the downtown plan will not
21 likely be implemented in that time frame. I
22 guess if not favoring unreal- -- unrealistic
23 plans for the future is what Mr. Moury
24 considers living in the past, then we have a
25 disagreement. He is basically saying that I'm

1 not allowed to disagree with him and his
2 cohorts.

3 Now I will further enlighten the
4 public to the disservice that the Moury group
5 provided to the public.

6 A gentleman named Tom Dougherty, who
7 is an executive in an organization named
8 Allegheny Land Trust, presented a development
9 plan to Council to preserve open space located
10 on the east side of Route 88 between Milford
11 Drive and Connor Road. This line -- this land
12 is located north of Valley Drive and east of
13 Richard Drive.

14 This property and the Millenium Park
15 property are both located in the Fifth Ward,
16 which I represent. The property is known as
17 the Guttman property.

18 Tom Dougherty presented a budget plan
19 for acquiring this property. The budget plan
20 includes the 34,000 -- \$35,000 line item,
21 which is a proposed population financial
22 contribution.

23 I was unaware of this plan until Tom
24 Dougherty gave the presentation. Moury spoke
25 up and said, "Harrison can contribute \$1,000."

1 I then spoke up and said, "I will contribute a
2 year of my Council's pay to the project." Tom
3 Dougherty thanked me. A promise made, a
4 promise kept.

5 When I reported my contribution from
6 this dais and noted that Moury had made the
7 \$1,000 comment, he immediately told a
8 bold-faced lie by denying he said it. Several
9 people sitting at this dais right now were at
10 the meeting when Moury made that comment.
11 They tolerated him lying.

12 Many times, I have told the public
13 that my mother reared my siblings and me by
14 the use of adages. She had an adage for most
15 every situation. The adage for this situation
16 is silence is consent. Their silence probably
17 results from Moury having the power of
18 appointments and disappointments. They
19 probably tolerated his lie to maintain their
20 committee chairmanships.

21 Now, another more significant item.
22 Due to the ineptness of Moury and the general
23 policy chairman, the ordinance to place a
24 question on the primary ballot to enact -- to
25 enact a tax for the fire department was

1 invalid. It violated the Home Rule Charter.

2 The Ordinance did not support the
3 Election Bureau timeline for putting the
4 question on the primary ballot. I had
5 informed the Council members of the concern
6 prior to the vote on the ordinance.

7 Therefore, the Council members were
8 aware that a yes vote on the proposed
9 ordinance violated the Home Rule Charter. All
10 of the Council members, except me, who were
11 present at the meeting voted yes on the
12 invalid ordinance even with the fore
13 knowledge.

14 Mr. McTiernan, Solicitor, did not
15 comment on this violation. The proof that
16 Mr. McTiernan was a willing participant in the
17 violation was made crystal clear by
18 Mr. McTiernan's following action.

19 According to the Home Rule Charter,
20 an ordinance is not effective until 30 days
21 after its enactment. Mr. McTiernan delivered
22 the ordinance to the Election Bureau three
23 days after its enactment by Council. This is
24 27 days before the ordinance effective date in
25 accordance --

1 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Excuse me, Don.
2 How long are we going to keep hearing this
3 year after year?

4 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay, Mr.
5 Consolmagno, let him complete.

6 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: I have --

7 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Harrison, go
8 ahead. Continue.

9 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: New Year's
10 resolution, Don.

11 MR. HARRISON: Yes.

12 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Thank you.

13 MR. HARRISON: This is 27 days before
14 the ordinance effective date in accordance
15 with the Home Rule Charter. He hand-carried
16 the ordinance to the election -- the Election
17 Bureau.

18 Even more disservice by Council.
19 Council sued me many years ago, claiming that
20 I had stole information from the police
21 department. This claim was unfounded, untrue.
22 And it was strictly a political move against
23 me, like you see happens at this dais.

24 The Solicitor at that time,
25 Mr. McTiernan's predecessor, ruled that he

1 could not legally represent a part of Council
2 against another part of Council. He opined
3 that Council could employ a lawyer at the
4 expense of the taxpayers. He opined that I
5 had to pay for my legal representation.

6 I believe that Council thought when I
7 found out the cost of my legal representation,
8 I would forgo the expense. Council was wrong
9 again.

10 The case was heard in Common Pleas
11 Court, and the Court ruled in my favor.
12 Council returned the case to Common Pleas
13 Court, claiming that additional evidence had
14 been obtained. The Court again ruled in my
15 favor.

16 Council appealed the case to
17 Commonwealth Court. The Commonwealth Court
18 ruled in my favor. Council was pursuing an
19 appeal of the case to the State Supreme Court.

20 My lawyer said not to worry. He was
21 preparing an appeal for reimbursement of my
22 legal fees plus a claim for punitive damage.
23 Council's spines got weak, and they dropped
24 the case. I had spent several thousand
25 dollars on a legal defense that spanned over

1 eight years.

2 I then did some research -- I then
3 did some research and discovered that the
4 Solicitor had rendered approximately 150 legal
5 opinions relative to my case. This is after
6 he said he couldn't represent one party of
7 Council against another.

8 He charged the Municipality for each
9 opinion, taxpayer money. I reported this
10 information to the public at each Council
11 meeting for over the next two years. Council
12 was mum on my complaint -- my claim.

13 Finally, Council could not tolerate
14 this information being spread on the record.
15 Council directed the Solicitor to reply to my
16 claims. At the next meeting, the Solicitor
17 replied to three of my claims. There was no
18 mention of 147 claims. I motioned to
19 terminate the Solicitor. The motion was
20 passed.

21 I requested that the total cost to
22 the Municipality be tabulated and provided to
23 the public. This request was never honored.
24 I estimated the total expenditure for the
25 politically motivated, unfounded court action

1 cost the Bethel Park taxpayers well over
2 \$100,000.

3 Mr. McTiernan was appointed as the
4 replacement solicitor. Mr. McTiernan
5 apparently didn't learn from the basis for his
6 appointment. As noted above, Mr. McTiernan --
7 Mr. McTiernan built a case against himself.
8 He was complicit in the violation of the Home
9 Rule Charter.

10 Therefore, the information presented
11 above should provide sufficient evidence to
12 terminate Mr. McTiernan as the Municipality
13 Solicitor. Thank you.

14 MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Chairman?

15 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. O'Brien.

16 MR. O'BRIEN: Does the public have
17 any idea how long ago this was? Well, let me
18 enlighten you.

19 Council didn't lose its spine and
20 back off the case. I was appointed. That was
21 almost 29 years ago. And I voted to not
22 continue the lawsuit. And I also voted to pay
23 Mr. Harrison his legal fees to try and have an
24 olive branch to move on from all the sins of
25 the past. But here we return to 29 years ago.

1 We just had an election. There will
2 be another election in two years. Mr.
3 Harrison will be on the docket. Please,
4 somebody step forward. Please. Thank you.

5 MR. HANNAN: Mr. Moury?

6 PRESIDENT MOURY: I'll be brief.
7 I'll stand by my comments that Mr. Harrison
8 lives in the past and we plan for the future.
9 I think he just gave my summation.

10 And my other comment is, none of what
11 he said is true. Thank you. Can we move on?

12 Okay. At this time, any other
13 comments?

14 Hearing none; we turn to Planning and
15 Zoning, Ms. Gibbons.

16 MS. GIBBONS: Resolution R1-13-20,
17 transfer of liquor license from the City of
18 Pittsburgh to 4607 Library Road.

19 Based on the evidence at the previous
20 Public Hearing, I move that we approve
21 Resolution R1-13-20 authorizing the transfer
22 of Liquor License Number R-6705 from the City
23 of Pittsburgh to 4607 Library Road per the
24 Engineer's Memorandum dated January 20, 2020
25 [sic]. January 2, 2020.

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: Second?

2 MR. HANNAN: Second.

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. There's a
4 motion and a second that based on the evidence
5 of the previous Public Hearing, I move that we
6 approve Resolution R1-13-20 authorizing the
7 transfer of Liquor License Number R-6705 from
8 the City of Pittsburgh to 4607 Library Road
9 per the Engineer's Memorandum dated January 2,
10 2020.

11 Any discussion of this item?

12 MR. HARRISON: Point of order.

13 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Harrison?

14 MR. HARRISON: Is it appropriate for
15 the Chairman to make motions according to
16 Robert's Rules?

17 PRESIDENT MOURY: That's why we're
18 here, Mr. Harrison. The Chairman of Planning
19 and Zoning made the motion. I don't know why
20 you're confused.

21 MR. HARRISON: Okay.

22 PRESIDENT MOURY: Can you please
23 explain.

24 MR. HARRISON: Well, you guys talk
25 into the mic- -- into the microphone, I'll be

1 able to hear better.

2 PRESIDENT MOURY: We all certainly
3 talk into the microphone, Don. Pay a little
4 closer attention, please.

5 Are there any other items? Are there
6 any other discussions?

7 (No response was heard.)

8 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Christian, will
9 you please call the roll.

10 MR. CHRISTIAN: Campbell?

11 MR. CAMPBELL: Yes.

12 MR. CHRISTIAN: Cenci?

13 MR. CENCI: Yes.

14 MR. CHRISTIAN: Consolmagno?

15 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Yes.

16 MR. CHRISTIAN: Gibbons?

17 MS. GIBBONS: Yes.

18 MR. CHRISTIAN: Hannan?

19 MR. HANNAN: Yes.

2 Would the Chairman of Planning and

4 to the next item.

5 MS. GIBBONS: There are no additional
6 agenda items.

7 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you, Ms.
8 Gibbons.

9 Are there any additional items?
10 Hearing none; can we return to
11 Health, Safety and Welfare. And, Mr. O'Brien,
12 we have no --

13 MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you, Mr.
14 Chairman.

15 PRESIDENT MOURY: We have no
16 residents signed up to speak, sir.

17 MR. O'BRIEN: First item, Permanent
18 Status of Officer Matthew Kearns.

19 I move that Matthew Kearns be granted
20 permanent status as a Bethel Park Police
21 Officer effective January 3, 2020 in
22 accordance with the letter dated December 20,
23 2019 from Chief O'Connor.

24 MS. GIBBONS: Second.

25 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion

1 and a second that Matthew Kearns be granted
2 permanent status as a Bethel Park Police
3 Officer effective January 3, 2020 in
4 accordance with the letter dated December 20,
5 2019 from Chief O'Connor.

6 Any discussion on this item?

20 provided a wreath for our veterans during the
21 holiday season. So, a special thanks to them.

22 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you, Mr.

24 Are there any additional items?

2 DR. CAMPBELL: On January 21,
3 Tuesday, a week from tomorrow, we're going to
4 continue with our Live Well Bethel Park
5 educational series.

6 We have really interesting speakers
7 coming up who will be addressing us in a
8 week's time. It's Dr. Rob Dingle. He's the
9 outreach coordinator for UPMC Sports Medicine.
10 And he's going to speak on sports-related
11 concussions.

12 This is a huge, huge health issue.
13 He's going to do an evidence-based
14 presentation, not only on the presentations in
15 defining concussions, but how they occur.
16 And, more important, what could be done to
17 mitigate some of the damage that are caused by
18 contusions.

19 This would be appropriate for
20 students, teachers, anybody involved with any
21 kind of contact athletics. And that includes
22 everything from gymnastics to cheer to soccer
23 to football to baseball. It would be great
24 for teachers. It would be great for coaches,
25 certainly, as well. And certainly parents.

1 Anybody who's interested in -- in this.

2 Again, as always, all of our teacher
3 -- speaker series are all free. They'll be at
4 the Community Center from 7:00 to 8:00. We
5 keep it about an hour. But we bring in some
6 really talented folks to go ahead and speak.

7 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you, Dr.
8 Campbell. We appreciate your time and effort,
9 and encourage everybody to attend.

16 Arts building for the Coffee with the Cops.

17 We had over 50 residents show up with
18 children. It was just a great event. Nice,
19 quiet. But we showed our respect and our
20 appreciation to our officers.

21 And this month is -- January is
22 National Law Enforcement Appreciation month.
23 And, please, if you get a chance, put a blue
24 light in your window showing our appreciation
25 for our law enforcement. And the dedication

1 that they show us, we can show a little light
2 for their time and effort.

3 Thank you, Chief. Appreciate it.

4 POLICE CHIEF: You're welcome.

5 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you, Mr.
6 Consolmagno.

7 I just have one comment. Those of
8 you here this evening, if you notice, the
9 chairs are now black. And I would like to
10 thank Susan Dolinar, our Public Works
11 Director, and all our Public Works staff, that
12 they reupholstered these chairs in a
13 cost-cutting maneuver.

14 The chairs were not quite as old as
15 the stories that Don told tonight, but they
16 were yellow when I got here. So now after 25
17 years, they have changed colors. So thank you
18 very much to everybody involved.

19 Are there any other comments?

20 MR. HANNAN: I move we adjourn.

21 PRESIDENT MOURY: Second? Is there a

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
