1 PRESIDENT MOURY: All eight members are 2 present. At this time, I would like to stand for the 3 Pledge of Allegiance. 4 5 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance was 6 recited.) 7 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. We got Chair 8 Announcements. 9 We had a chair announcement -- excuse me --10 an executive session of Council conducted prior to 11 coming in to the floor on July 13, 2020 for personnel 12 and legal issues. 13 At this time, I would like to return to the 14 Reports of the Officials; and the Library Director's 15 Report. 16 MS. McINTOSH: Okay. Good evening. name's Christine. I'm the director of your public 17 18 library, where we provide opportunities to explore, 19 learn, create, and connect. 20 Happy to announce that the library opened to 21 the public on June 15. Prior to that, we were doing 22 curbside pickup. We do have limited hours. We are there Monday through Thursday from 10:00 a.m. until 23 24 6:00 p.m.; Friday and Saturday, 10:00 until 2:00. We

are closed on Sundays in the summer regardless.

We do have limited capacity, so we're asking you to please come in, conduct your business, and then leave to allow others to use our services as well.

Computer use is limited to one hour per day.

Curbside pickup is still available during operating hours. You can call the library to request your items or you can visit our website. We have an item request form that you can email to us, and then we'll give you a call when your items are pulled and ready to pick up.

Bethel Park is the only library out of the 12 in the South Hills that is currently open for in-person services. Most, if not all, of the others are doing curbside only. We are very busy with an average of 384 items checked out per day, which is on par with the number of checked out items per day when I looked back at July of 2019, when we were open an additional 24 hours a week.

Just a reminder that masks are required to be worn while in the Municipal Building, including in the library. Good news is, you may now place requests for items in any library throughout Allegheny County. That began today. Prior to that, you could only get

items that we had in our collection.

Virtual programs are continued to be offered Facebook, BPTV, and on YouTube. We are planning in-person programs and classes for the fall. But we do have a back-up virtual plan as well. Our current limited operating hours will continue through Labor Day weekend.

Summer reading for youth and adults is in full swing. Adult summer reading runs through August 30th. So you could submit an entry either in person or online for each book read or listened to. No newspapers or magazines. And all the entries for that week go into a drawing for a \$25 gift card. And all entries received by August 30 will be eligible for a dash camera grand prize.

Youth summer reading runs through August.

We have three age groups. We have birth through preschool, kindergarten through sixth grade, and teens that are seventh through 12th grade. All of our classes for summer reading are virtual. So you can visit the library's website for more information.

One event that we're going to continue to do in person is Storytimes in the Park. This will be Tuesday, August 4th through the 18th, at 9:30 a.m. Come

read and play with us while we explore and discover some of our community's finest parks. Don't forget to bring a blanket and some sunscreen. And we will be practicing social distancing at these events, so stay with your family.

Storytime in the Park is for children ages 2 through 6 years old with their caregiver. No registration is necessary. You can just show up. So August 4th is we'll be in Simmons Park, August 11th at Elm Park, and 18th at Miner's Park.

Follow the library on Facebook and check our website for updates. We will be here unless or until local, county or state officials tell us otherwise.

So thank you, everyone, for coming. And thank you for your patience.

PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very much.

Can we turn to the Police Chief's Report; and Chief O'Connor.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Good evening, Mayor, Council. Hi, everybody. Chief here.

First, I want to thank everyone who has sent to the department items and cards to support for the officers throughout this crisis.

You know, the officers cannot work from

home. They have to be out. We deal with people in crisis. And some of the things they had to do throughout this C-19 crisis is use the AED, render first aid, administer Narcan to overdosed victims, take people to county jail, to psych hospitals.

So we are in close contact with people, and that does put them at daily risk. And we are so appreciative of all the support that has been given to us by the community. I want to again just thank everybody for that. It means a lot.

And our courts are open, which makes me happy because we can cite violators, we can send summons, and get warrants for arrest, and put people in jail. So we are fully open. And we're willing and eager to put you in jail if you come out here and break the law.

So one of the things that we will not be doing this year is National Night Out. So we're not going to have any formal activities. We're probably just going to ask everybody on Tuesday, August the 4th, turn on your porch light and send these criminals a reminder they have to beware when they come out here. So we'll have more on that.

And in the meantime, follow us on our

1 Facebook page, and we will have periodic updates.

MAYOR ALLEN: Wow. First, I want to welcome everyone back. It seems like it's been months and months since we've been here. It's been three. But welcome back to everyone, and especially the viewers on BPTV.

I also want to thank Laurence and his staff. I mean, it's been incredible what they've all done over the last three months. I mean, we put out SwiftReach messages. Laurence makes sure he fills them in to tell everybody what's going on. So you did a terrific job. We still have a way to go, unfortunately. But you've done a terrific job.

Okay. And since we do have a way to go, we still need to wear our masks out, still social distance.

The county numbers were down today, which is good for the first time in a week. So we have to still keep after it.

The building -- the Municipal Building is still open. There is a lot of act- -- not a lot. But there is activity. You can come here for permits, for dye tests, whatever you need. There are boxes for drop-offs. You can do things online. But the building is open for your use.

Tomorrow, the farmer's market will be open again, and every Tuesday until the end of September from 3:00 to 7:00 at the VIP parking lot. The County has different guidelines, so it may look a little bit different this time. But it is open. And as long as things keep going in the right direction, it will continue to be open.

What won't be open is Route 88 and Clifton
Road starting this Saturday. And that should go for a
week. And the people that use that area know that when
the first bridge was put in, it was amazing how they
built that bridge in one week. So now they're going to
do the other bridge. And by the end of this month, it
will just be a brand-new section down there.

And the last thing I have was, we have

trolley beautification boxes. I don't know if you've seen them along the trolley line. And these are done by volunteers. Mayor Morton started it many years ago.

And I just wanted to give a shout-out for the people that have already done it for this year that put a lot of work into it.

So if you're ever going on East Library or West Library Road or Brightwood, take a look. And this year, the people that have volunteered to do one of the boxes is Mr. Chogaway (phonetic), Artist Memory Care, the Blackhawk Family Relief Fund, Lisa and Jim Jenkins, a new one, Bethel Craft Company, the Democratic Committee, Bethel Park Lions Club, the Upper St. Clair/Bethel Park Rotary Breakfast Club, and, of course, our favorite is Erin -- I forgot her last name.

It is difficult when the new age of social distance to kind of -- to run these Council meetings. But I think the team here at Bethel Park does an amazing job. And we're so proud of them.

What I'd like to do with these -- with the Manager's Report is highlight individuals. So, in my quarter century in the Army we had something called the Hail and Farewell. So when an organization wanted to bring new people on board, you would hail them, and then when you -- when good people left, you would farewell them. So, we always want to start with the good first and then we end with some of the sad notes.

So first and foremost, I would like to bring up two new members of the team. If you can -- Cassidy and Drew, if you could come on up, please.

So the nice part about this one -- we'll get all separate -- 6 feet -- is that I will go ahead and

1 turn it over to them, let them talk about themselves.

But, again, these two individuals are going to be incredible valued members of the team. And we're so lucky to have them on board.

Cassidy is our new human resources director. She brings a wealth of experience to this. And she's going to bring so much depth and knowledge, it's going to be amazing.

And Drew does the same thing. He's coming on board as our project manager. And we have absolutely dumped a really big one on his lap, first and foremost. So, but he's running with scissors, and he's taking that one -- he's taking that challenge on.

So I'll lead it out with Cassidy.

24	First, I want to thank and congratulate				

everybody here for being able to have a first open 1 meeting in a long time. So that was great. 2 I came here to see about an item that I 3 thought might be on the agenda I heard through some rumor about something. And I don't see it on here. 5 So hopefully it's not because putting it down as a 6 non-agenda item. But it was related to some kind of lawsuit that we had going on, personnel and that. 9 It sounded like it was substantial. But I don't know enough 10 details. And I don't see it on here. 11 12 So if it's not, then maybe will it be on the 13 agenda, that I need to come to another meeting or, you know -- or was it -- did I miss it? 14 PRESIDENT MOURY: You -- we did add it to 15 16 the agenda. And there's something on the table in the back that outlines all the items that are going to be 17 18 discussed tonight.

MR. WERKMEISTER: Oh, okay. Thank you very much.

PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you.

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MR. WERKMEISTER: That's it.

PRESIDENT MOURY: We have four comments from the residents via email.

MR. CHRISTIAN: The first comment is from Paul McKenzie. And it states, Good afternoon. We are over run by deer on Ridgeway Drive. Could you please help us with this? Two of my older neighbors had Lyme disease last year. Thank you.

The next comment came from resident Nathan Chaffin. In the phone message about this meeting it said that social distancing would be encouraged. Why is it not required? Does the Council not think that's a wise step to take to keep the community safe? Signed, Nathan Chaffin.

The third comment and fourth comment are both from the same individual, Pat Kaczmarek. And he [sic] would like to bring this up to the Council meeting tonight. And it states -- and he [sic] sent this to the state senator.

Senator representative, please help us in Bethel Park to get our peace and quiet back. I've been in close contact with Police Chief Tim O'Connor, and sent an email to Governor Wolf.

Ever since the bill was passed to approve fireworks to be legally purchased and set off in Pennsylvania, our lives in Bethel Park have been seriously affected. Days, but mostly nights, have been

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interrupted at all hours up until 12:05 a.m. with loud bangs and fireworks displays that scare us and cause many neighbors to be alarmed and frightened.

I watch over four of my closest elderly neighbors. They all count on me for handling problems for them. Three are in their 90s. They have medical issues with their hearts and PTSD. Some of the loudest bangs, you can actually feel in your home.

This bill was passed along with other amendments. This was to bring revenue in Pennsylvania. Change this law.

There are numerous repetitive neighbors who blast these fireworks off almost daily. My police department has given out warnings. I want these people fined. None of these homes are 150 feet away from a structure. They have no regard for their neighbors. They are not abiding by the other restrictions on firework displays.

My husband has dementia, and really sets him off with these loud blasts. My dog and my family dogs that have -- that I pet sit have seizures from being so frightened. I'm tired of repeatedly medicating my dogs. Also, I'm tired of taking my dog to an emergent 24-hour center to get IV sedatives, and paying large vet bills.

I need to know how to get this law changed now. How do I start a petition? Or what else can I do?

Chief O'Connor has been very sympathetic and helpful, but the policemen can only do so much. They

My next step is to contact the news agencies. They've been hearing residents concerned on this matter. Signed, Patricia Kaczmarek, Florida Avenue.

This has been a very sensitive topic for a lot of people over the last several months. We have held two public hearings with the pandemic. The Applicant has been willing to work with us to spread out the -- to go outside the normal traditional limits because we weren't able to get together.

I would say I'm going to -- I'll comment a little bit, maybe, from a personal perspective or observation of the last meeting, and then get into kind of one of the reasons why I'm going to vote the way I'm going to vote.

I guess at the most recent -- the most recent meeting, and how the process works is we hire an expert that goes in and evaluates, because we don't have anybody on staff that's a telecommunications expert. So we consult with a company that is paid for by the Applicant to go out and find out if they're meeting our

ordinance and if they're doing everything properly.

1.7

I guess I was a little disappointed. We had two public hearings. And at the second public hearing, there was a lot of facts that were brought up for potential deficiencies in what the application was. And the Applicant's representative seemed to spend more time challenging the gentleman who actually did the study versus what the meat of the study was, what the concerns were. So we really didn't get any of our questions answered as far as the deficiency goes in the application.

Now on to kind of -- where I'm kind of going with this. When I went today to look on the internet and found -- and you can find anything there, by the way -- cell towers in the area. And I found it -- I was a little bit surprised, within a two-mile area of the location where they're looking to place it, there was six registered cell towers or communications towers within that two-mile area, which was very surprising.

And just to put things in perspective, this tower is going to go in the middle of the industrial park. The tower -- the electrical towers on -- across on -- was it Logan Road, averaged between 80 and, I think, 92 feet. The proposed tower they're talking

about building is going to be 140 feet. So that's significantly higher than everything in that area.

The other thing that was interesting is -we learned is the fall zone. If that tower is to
collapse, which they say that it won't or it may
collapse on itself, I don't know. But, in theory, you
have 140-foot radius around the base of that tower that
people can be injured. There could be a major
consequence, if that happened.

My concerns with the three or four businesses that fall within that area, and let me refer that to maybe as the danger zone, where if there is some type of catastrophic event, you know, it could be devastating to the area.

One of the questions that was asked by Dr. Campbell, who is not here tonight, but he's a ham radio operator, what about maybe putting two smaller towers in or utilizing a couple different locations that are preexisting, that could we get a better communications, could we pick up?

Because, understanding, if this tower was to go in, we're still going to have dead spots. This is not going to 100 percent resolve the problem that we have in that general vicinity. It's going to help, I'm

sure. But it's not going to resolve.

So if we added towers 60 feet, maybe, or 50 feet that maybe fit in a little bit to the area, and maybe there was two of the, or they could do some co-locations, you know, you'll cover a bigger geographic area. I'm sure the cost will be a little bit more, but it's not as intrusive to the people that live in the area. And the response we got, "This was the application that was presented."

My last comment's going to be -- I did bring this up at the meeting. I find it interesting, when I looked at the Applicant's map, and this is some of the documentation we have received from them (indicating), and it shows where there's bad spots today, and it shows how it's going to improve with the tower. I get that. Makes sense.

But yet when I go to the Verizon website, if I was a consumer and I use Verizon, at least I used to, but when you look at their website, it shows no problems, no issues in that whole vicinity. If you look in the middle, I put the location of the pole, I put that in their -- in the Verizon website, and this is the map that came up (indicating). So they're not showing any.

1 So I asked the question at the Public 2 Hearing to one of their consultants, or one of their 3 engineers, why would this map be different than what you 4 turned in? I don't understand. 5 And the question -- the answer I got to the 6 question, well, this was done by kind of the marketing 7 people. 8 So, where do you believe what map is right 9 and what map is wrong? This is the -- millions of people look at this when they go to buy a cell phone. 10 So I'm a little concerned that, you know, are they being 11 12 disingenuous with some of the information that's 13 provided? 14 But having said all that, I'm concerned for a lot of reasons. I'm not sure they met the obligations 15 of the Ordinance, and that's why I will not be 16 17 supporting this motion tonight.
