At this time, I would like to turn to the Reports of the Officials; and the Library Director's Report.

MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. My name is Christine. I'm the director of your public library, where we provide opportunities to explore, learn, create, and connect.

I just have a quick announcement.

The Library is open once again for in-person services. Our hours of operation are Monday through Thursday, 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.;

Friday and Saturday from 10:00 a.m. until

2:00 p.m. We are currently closed on Sunday.

So come on in and you can use the computer, you can, you know, browse the collection, make copies, that kind of stuff.

We do ask that you keep your visit to under an hour just to keep the virus low -- as low as possible. So we are open, come on in.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Chief here. Can you hear me?

Unfortunately, due to circumstances beyond Bethel Park, we've been receiving some inquiries whether there is any -- to our knowledge, any unrest or threats of violence locally. But, gladly, I'm reporting that we have no such knowledge of those types of activities here.

But, again, we count on the citizenry to be our eyes and ears. So if someone sees something, please say something. And they best by doing that to our Tip Line on our website. And we will evaluate and take action or get it to where it needs to be, the appropriate agency.

So moving on, I would also like to

thank our residents who did donate toys for our drive that we had over the holidays to help some people in need. And I would also give a special thanks to the John McMillan Church and Zion Lutheran for donating gift cards. And we are able to get those out to people in need also.

So it was a successful event. And I do thank everyone for that. And God bless.

PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. Thank you very much, Chief.

At this time, can we turn to the Fire Chief's Report.

MR. GERBER: Yeah. In the month of December, the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company ran 44 calls. We had two gas leaks, two carbon monoxide detectors, we assisted the police with a water leak, we had three motor vehicle accidents, one person stuck in an elevator, the odor of electrical wires burning, we had four calls of that, we had eleven good intent calls, and 20 fire alarms, totaling 44 total calls.

Things are way down this year. As far as calls, we had 472 total calls. That's actually down 150 from last year, which is a good thing. And it was very impressive that a lot of it -- when COVID first started, we had the lockdown and all, we thought we were going to get an awful lot more calls because people were home. We actually got a lot less.

So, like I said, we were down 150 calls from last year. But we have noticed November, December, and already in January, people are getting a little more frisky, going back out, and we've been busy as heck again.

So, with that, the only other thing I would like to say is, just remember for anybody who had a live Christmas tree in their house, you just can't take that out back and burn it in a fire pit or anything. It's against county ordinance.

They ask you to dispose of that either in your trash or any of the local area places that take the Christmas trees, and then they have one big get-rid-of-them ceremony.

So with that, that is all I have for the evening.

The second thing I wanted to mention was the COVID-19 vaccines. We're going to try to post a website that has the breakdown of who and when they may be available.

They are -- the vaccines are given in Phase 1-A, 1-B, 1-C and Phase 2. And by the looks of the report that we have, 1-A should just be close to finishing up, and then they'll start in 1-B. So there is a website.

We will post it because it's long and involved.

But I will say that I got an email today from AHN. And they're on top of it.

They're telling you when -- or possibly when the vaccines may be available to you. They're different patients. And they will get back to you when they're available.

So I'm sure that UPMC and everyone else is on top of it. But keep an eye out for when it may be possible to get your vaccine.

And the last thing I wanted to mention is, I also do a program on BPTV called Jack-Of-All-Trades. We do a lot of different -- a lot of different subjects from the 100th Anniversary of Coverdale and so on.

This week we're going to be doing a program on Pittsburgh's own Skyliners. We have one of the Skyliners living in Bethel Park. So just keep an eye out for that. That should be very interesting.

You know, the acute COVID numbers are quite high across the country, and locally, and predictably so. It was expected, especially after the holidays we saw.

As Mr. Moury mentioned, I'm away on a COVID deployment in support of the pandemic. And there's still -- I still come across a lot of folks who don't think the pandemic is real. They think this is fabricated. But if you've seen what I've seen, the human cost are significant and tragic. It's no shorter than tragic.

I would like to make a couple comments that, as far as we are into this -this pandemic now, about a year, you know,
folks get a little bit of battle fatigue.
They get tired. They get tired of doing all the things that we're encouraged to do.

You know, it's -- this is a marathon. This isn't a sprint. And, you know, as far as the guidelines with social distancing, hand hygiene, masking in public, they're still very, very great public health tools that in

our toolbox that really, really work.

The vaccine is -- now we're hearing

-- the Mayor talked about it a little bit ago.

We're seeing that it's unfolding and the work

-- the information that supports it is

tremendous.

I had my vaccine this past week as well. But, you know, if you're eligible as a physician, as a citizen, I'd strongly, strongly recommend you get it. Unless there's an avid contraindication, and those are very far and few between.

I had to write it down because I wanted to make sure I recognize all the individuals responsible. So if you allow me the time.

I'm happy to announce with the help of State Representative Natalie Mihalek,
Bethel Park was awarded a \$750,000 grant to upgrade the facilities at the Community Center on Park Avenue.

The grant was awarded by the Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program with the State of Pennsylvania. We were also awarded a \$200,000 grant a few months ago with the help of State Senator Pam Iovino and State

Representative Natalie Mihalek for this project.

While the plans are very preliminary, the funds will be used to add a splash pad for the children at the site of the current T-ball field, along with bathrooms, and a new playground. We are also hoping to add new bleachers to the Park Avenue field and some other amenities to the site.

As I mentioned, the plans are very preliminary. We will now begin a master plan for the site and develop a cost estimate to see what we will be able to complete. This will take some time, and hope to begin the project in early 2022. We will keep everybody posted during the planning process.

All the recreation improvements came from a Park's study that the Municipality completed a few years ago. I'm also very happy to report that the plans for moving the T-ball field from Park Avenue to Millennium Park are also moving forward.

We had hoped to complete this project in 2020, but COVID-19 has delayed the process. We will be going out to bid this week for a

major renovation project at Millennium Park.

Since moving the field sports from Millennium Park to the newly-turfed field at Village Green Park, we will be installing a new T-ball field on the large grass field at Millennium Park. This will include a turf infield with a grass outfield, along with backstops and field amenities.

We will also be renovating the bathroom buildings and adding a concession stand. We will be replacing the playground equipment. And if bids come in as we hope, we will be adding an additional walking path around the field similar to what was done at Village Green Park.

This will be a lot going on at the two parks, and may be a little inconvenience for everybody, but in the end we were planning a lot of improvements over the next few years.

And I hope that helps in absorbing some of the expenditures that we made for our great Public Works Department.

So that's all I have, Mr. Moury. Thank you.
