PRESIDENT MOURY: All nine members are present at this time.

Can we stand for the Pledge of Allegiance.
(Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.)

PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. At this
time, I'd like to turn to Chair Announcements. An Executive Session of the Council was conducted on February 22,2021 for police personnel issues.

At this time, I would like to turn the Reports of the Official; and the Library Director's Report.

MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. My name is Christine. I'm the director of your public library, where we provide opportunities to explore, learn, create, and connect.

I want to say happy spring to
everybody, and to remind you that the Library is open regular operating hours. We are there from Monday through Thursday, 10:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m.; Friday and Saturday, 10:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m.; and sunday, 1:00 to 5:00 p.m.

Just a reminder that the Library is

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not offering AARP tax preparation this year. If you're looking for a location near you, you can pick up the phone and dial 211, where you will be connected to the United way help line. From there, you will press 7 to be put in the tax help que, and you can leave a name and number and they'll get back to you.

The Library is hosting a eResource Treasure funt for adults from mid-March until the end of March. So you'll just follow the link from the Library's website or from our social media post and answer five questions about the Library's services and resources, and you'll be entered into a drawing for a $\$ 25$ gift card for South Park Shops.

We ask that you submit one entry per person. And it's an opportunity for us to call to your attention data bases, web pages, and services with which you may not already be aware.

All story times and classes for youth are still being provided virtually. We do have take and bake kits available in the library, which are cute little crafts for the kids.

The Library will be closed on Sunday, April 4 th in celebration of the Easter holiday. And the Library will be hosting a pop-up book sale on Sunday, April 18 from $10: 00$ a.m. till 3:00 p.m. in the parking lot at Evey's True Value Hardware.

And because of quarantining issues, the Library cannot accept book donations at this time. If you have some that you would like to have included in this pop-up book sale, we ask that you hold on to them until the week of the sale, and you can drop them off at Evey True Value Hardware.

At this time, can we turn to the Police Chief's Report; and Chief o'Connor.

CHIEF $O^{\prime}$ CONNOR: Our Mayor, Council, Colonel, good evening, everyone. Chief here.

I just want to report on what's been going on around the area and how it's impacted us. As of early february until 12 noon today, 235 Bethel Park residents have reported to us that they've received debit cards in the mail,
and these cards were opened without their authorization. Most of these cards have been issued by Chase Bank.

So what - we are not alone in this.
Many South Hills communities and residents in
the City of Pittsburgh have also received these cards. So there's many agencies investigating this. We here have been in contact with Chase Bank security department and also the United States Secret Service. If you get one of these cards, please report it to Bethel Park Police so we can document it, and immediately cancel the card with Chase. We will continue to investigate this and hopefully bring these people to justice that are causing all this havoc around town. So, again, call - - you get the card, callus.

On a final note, $I$ just want to make everybody - - wish them have a happy and safe St. Patrick's Day. I know there's no parade again this year. It will come back. Correct?

UNIDENTIEIED SPEAKER: Absolutely.
CHIEE O'CONNOR: I won't be there, though. I gave them up years ago. I was
getting in too much trouble down there.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: There's people that are getting debit cards in the mail from Chase Bank, and they did not request them.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: So that's -- that's why - we believe that - Chase Bank's running a promotion: You open a new account, they'll give you $\$ 200$. That might be the motive behind this. So they open one in your name, and then they get a $\$ 200$ award for it, but delivered somewhere else.

MR. HARRISON: They passed me by. That's fine.

CHIEF $O^{\prime}$ CONNOR: Yeah. Yeah, you just stay under the radar.

PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very much, Chief o'connor.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Okay.

PRESIDENT MOURY: Can we turn to the Fire Chief's Report.

MR. USELMAN: Good evening. My
name's Rob Uselman. I'm the Assistant Chief with the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company. And I have the monthly report for february 2021 .

We had a total number of incidents of 33; three structure fires, one cooking fire, three gas leaks, four electric conditions, one vehicle accident, three smoke conditions, one assist the police, six good intent, ten fire alarms, and one co detector. It wasn't a very busy month, and we like it that way.

But we do have a few reminders as we head into spring. We know a lot of people will be out doing yardwork and cleaning up debris in their yard. There is a county ordinance against what you can and cannot burn in your burn pits, and rules and regulations to follow there.

If you go to our website
www. bethelparkvfc. com, there' s actually a link you canclick on on how to burn and recreation fires and how to use that. So we suggest you
do that before you do any spring cleaning around your yard.

Another interesting thing that's out on our website is our Annual Report is out for the year 2020. So if you're interested on the number of calls we went on, where are the zones, where are the districts, things like that, you'll be able to go out there and download the Annual Report of the fire department.

Another big thing is, this weekend we all spring forward for Daylight Savings. We'd like to remind residents to change your batteries in your smoke detectors and your co detectors, your carbon monoxide detectors, and also make sure they're functioning properly.

It's a good reminder. Luckily, they put Daylight Savings in there just for that. So we'd like to recommend that all residents do that.

And, finally, we are 100 percent volunteer. I'm not sure how many people still realize that. So one good thing is, is even though we're in a covid environment, we're always accepting new members and memberships.

So if you're interested in joining or want to find more about the fire department, Monday nights around 6:30 or 7:00, come down to our main station right here on Brightwood Road, right beside Bethel Bakery, and someone's there, and we'll give you a tour and tellyou what we're all about. And we are always accepting new members.

And we'll turn to the Municipal Manager's Report; and Mr. Christian.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Thank you, sir. Appreciate it.
I'd like to take just a couple minutes real quick and provide an update on some of the key projects. Specifically, having to do with our information system, information technology upgrades that were in the $2020--$ sorry --2021 budget.

A couple of the big projects - -
actually, allof the big projects are being lead by this gentleman right over here, Drew Dowdell. He is our Director of Special Projects. And he's handling these over the course of the next probably about 12 months in fruition.

The first one is the IT transition project. For the most part, allof the municipal staff have been transitioned to Microsoft Office 365 , and they're now transitioning to Microsoft Teams.

This is a collaborative suite that was - training has already begun. It's going to allow the staff to be a lot more collaborative in nature and also efficient and effective.

Transition to Microsoft Office 365 will provide a host of capabilities that we have not seen previously and have not had previously. We've already begun transitioning to several onsite premises servers to these cloud-based operations and capabilities specifically within our finance and Public Works departments already. So that's - - we've
already seen some transition to our cloud-based servers.

We're in the process of doing a data center move and also a building rewire. The building hasn't been updated in about 15 to 20 years. They're still using coaxial cable throughout. Now we're getting to cat6 cable throughout. And what that's going to provide is pretty much on a magnitude of 10 factor for speed and connectivity across the board.

We have a firewall takeover project. Currently the Municipality doesn't own the firewalls that it utilizes. But that's what's being rectified in the near future.

They are also doing a printer refresh project. This project seeks to audit our current printer utilization, see how much we're actually using for printing and spending, and that will help us identify where we can do some cost savings. And then implement a commercial off the (inaudible) from a low-cost solution for security and management utilization.

Because right now, I mean, everything is susceptible to cyber security. I think we
probably all heard across the United States sister communities outside and inside Pennsylvania that have been susceptible to cyber attacks.

And the majority of all of these IT projects are going to harden our internal and infrastructure to help us be more defensive in nature against these types of attacks.

We have a couple of different ones that will help our community and nature. One of them specifically is our field and program management system. That's going to be done by the Recreation Department.

That's going to be really beneficial for a lot of our athletic associations because that's going to allow us to schedule and maintain all of our fields, all of our programs across the board. That will allow a collaborative nature at the association level all the way up to both the municipal level, and utilizing the school district facilities as well.

The last couple ones are ones that will take over time. Our geographic information system, this is a multi-department
initiative right here. This involves the Department of Engineering, this is Code Enforcement, Public Works. This will help across the board both in a collaborative nature, but also as a repository for allof our paperwork.

Right now, Bethel Park Municipality
is a paper-based system. We're trying to go to an online web-based system that we can use these documents and access these documents anywhere, out in the field, here. And search and survey doesn't take hours or days; it takes key strokes and seconds. That's - that's our ultimate goal for this system.

We are transitioning our document management system and a document archiving system. What this allows us to do is stay compliant with the Pennsylvania Commission archives, the retention and destruction standards.

There's a very long book - - a lengthy manual that allows and puts the retention and destruction structure standards out for local government municipalities. That's - - that whole system just talked about will allow us
to get to that stage.
And, finally, we're looking at a - an HRIS, a human resources information system. This is potentially both a human resources and potentially a payroll upgrade to our system. We haven't quite figured out what the depth and scope is going to be.

But all of these items over the next 12-plus months will help the Municipality of Bethel Park become efficient, effective, more - it will provide more rigor in our operating system and our infrastructure, and allow us to become a better organization focused on serving our residents.

And that's just in time for our award-winning Farmers Market. That will begin May $4 t h$ by the ice-skating rink in South Park. And so far we have 30 vendors signed up. And that will go on through the summer, into the fall.

Again, $I$ want to thank Spartan Pharmacy and the volunteers at the vaccine clinic that have been held at the community Center, a great job. Mr. Moury was there a couple weeks ago.

Dr. Campbell, we can't say enough, the job that you're doing.

It's just - they've had three so far, and it's just very smooth. And everyone's doing a great job over there.

Operation Feed a Neighbor, the spring food drive will be held Saturday, March 27 th, from 9:00 to 12:00 at the Spencer Family YMCA by the high school. If you can drop off foods - or food, gift cards, paper products to help support our local families.

I also wanted to mention a show that I do. It's called Jack of All Trades. It's on BPTV and also YouTube. We've been doing it about six months. We've had shows about the best breakfast in Bethel Park, the trolley beautification project, the oldest homes in Bethel Park. We've also done interviews with the Skyliners and our own Mark Ferrari.

And the reason $I$ bring it up is, next month we will have our local state reps, including Devlin Robinson, our state senator, just to go over some of the things that they're doing in Harrisburg.

And, finally, $I$ just received this afternoon that Bethel Park has once again received the Banner Community Award for 2021 .

So thanks to our staff. I mean, it's agreat accomplishment, and it's well-deserved for all the work they do.

I would encourage eligible people to register on the Spartan Pharmacy web site at www. spartanpharmacy. com, and they will communicate directly with you when there are available appointments. We all appreciate the work that Spartan has done putting - - into hosting these events.

There are a few others I'd like to acknowledge for making these events possible and run as smooth as they do. First, my colleague, Dr. Tim Campbell, for helping facilitate and work these events, allof the Bethel Park Community Center staff, andour Public Works employees, and especially our Community Center director, Cathy Muscato, who coordinated the logistics of this effort, the Bethel Park Police Department for making sure
things flowed smoothly inside and outside the building, and all the volunteers that donated their time to help others, including all the medical professionals who mainly volunteered to administer the vaccines.

To the casual observer, it would appear that this is a well-oiled machine. But there are countless hours that went into the planning process to make this event go as smooth as it did.

I would like to also thank Laurence Christian for all his hard work in coordinating this effort. In speaking with a medical professional, to put thingsin perspective, it is estimated that this effort could have saved nearly 100 lives.

I had the opportunity to attend this past $S a t u r d a y$ 's event and was totally amazed at how smooth things ran. In times of need, Bethel Park people come out to help no matter what the circumstances are. And that is why I'm proud to call Bethel Park my home.

look back. We've had our one-year
anniversary. And last month we had a
milestone of over 500,000 deaths from CoVID-19 across our nation.

You know, what's the value of a year? Years used to flip by. I mean, I think we all have a different definition of what a year means now and how valuable it really is. And I think $I$ have to recognize - - and I'll start at the top.

This Council and the Mayor, we all
bring some unique talents to this table, and they're very different. But during this
pandemic each Council person used their talents to help do what they needed to do or what they felt comfortable to do to help this community through this pandemic, this emergency, this thing we've never really faced before.

And then when you go down to the next level, you have our Manager, and our Chief, and our head of -- the fire department, and EMS, and all the employees, the policemen, the firemen, the EMS, the strain and stress that's been on them. They're here to serve. They're here to protect. They're here. And they understand what needs to be done. And they do it under great guidelines. And through the grace of God, we've made it through without a very serious lack of personnel. Although it's not over.

And I'd like to talk about our staff, how they reinvented what we do here. And everyone here kind of adapted themself to it.

And then we go - and our Public works and all the employees of the Municipality.

And then we go down to the next
level; our businesses, our restaurants, our organizations that all have stepped up, and the people of Bethel Park, just the volunteers wanting to help, and doing it in a safe manner.

You know, we turn on our TV, we click it or we swipe or we tap our mouse or our screen, and we see all the things that go on in the world, and we can shut itoff. But until it hits, until it becomes part of your world or your family, it seems far away. And then with a blink of an eye, one-halfa second, it's your world. And that is something we have to recognize.

And I'd like, tonight, to honor those that we have lost from Bethel Park. The number is 53. That's more than we've lost in all our wars in Bethel Park -- of Bethel Park residents from the American Revolution until today. And we did that in one year.

They're not just names and faces. They'refathers, and mothers, and sons, and
daughters, grandfathers, grandmothers, and friends, maybe coworkers, people you run into at Ace, and at Evey's, at Pasta II, and at Al's. It really hits home.

So I would like to offer a moment of silence for those 53 tonight. And we are on a great place. We're headed in the right direction. We still have to be cautious. And we have to understand where we came from.

We're voting tonight on two separate contracts, both related to the 2021 Road Program. The first is the actual contract for the actual paving, and the second contract is for the landscaping around the paving.

Last year, we decided to split the contract, as pavers are not good landscapers and landscapers are not good pavers. What we learned is that we received better pricing on both, and we ended up with better service to our residents.

In regards to our Road Program, several years ago we were one of the first communities to contract with a company called Robotics. Robotics is a start-up company out of Carnegie Mellon that actually performed a
municipal-wide assessment of allour streets.
They do this by videotaping all of our roads, and providing an unbiased assessment. Based on this information is how we determine which streets to be paved. There's a little bit of a risk. But it utilizes state-of-the-art technology which takes out the subjectivity for our road paving program. Robotics is now used in over 250-plus communities in 34 states.

And with that said, I move that we accept the low bid of $\$ 1,533,890.50$ from Mele \& Mele \& Sons for the combined base bid, Alternate No. 1 and Alternate No. 2, per the Director of Engineering's memorandum dated February 17,2021 .

improvements. The project we will be voting on tonight is another step in our recreational facility upgrade plan. In 2018, we commissioned a study of allofour recreational facilities to get a better understanding of where we are and where we want to be.

As part of the study, it's
recommended that we realign our parks along with upgrading our facilities. It is

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important for two reasons. First, to align all of our major parks to meet the current and future needs of our residents, and also provide a long-term strategy that allows us to apply for grants to help offset the cost of our upgrades.

The first phase of the recommended plan was to turn Village Green into field Sports Park. With the help of the state and the soccer association, we were able to fund a turf field, upgraded bathroom, concession stand building, new ADA playground, new pavilion, and add a walking trail.

Once the Field Sports Park was completed, we are now able to turn the large field at Millennium Park into a diamond park for baseball and softball.

The contract we are voting on tonight will add a small baseball field with a turf infield, upgrading bathrooms, adding a concession stand, new playground equipment, and a walking trail around the park.

The total cost of this project is nearly one million dollars. But because of our planning and submitting several grant
applications, we were awarded around 700,000 in grants to accomplish our goal.

The third step in our roadmap was the upgrading of Park Avenue fields. We announced back in January that we have received $\$ 900,000$ in grants to accomplish this project. We are still in the planning stages, but this project will include a splash pad and other amenities. We are hoping to announce the final plan this fall, and construction in 2022 .

We have all spent a lot of time, along with the Recreation Board, to develop a plan for improving our recreational facilities. The most important part of the planning, as this enables us to seek out and apply for grant money to offset our costs, I am happy to report that we have received nearly two million in grant money. And we are becoming our - beginning our search for step four grants planning 2023 and beyond.

With that said, I move that we award the base bid and Alternate No. 1, 2, and 4 to Plavchak construction in the amount of $\$ 710,682.50$ for the general contracting work per the Director of Engineering's memorandum
dated February 18, 2021 .

In the past, we had a community celebration that was centralized in Millennium Park. But in 2021, the celebration will be centralized outside of Millennium Park.

Our preliminary plans have us shooting off the fireworks at Millennium Park. And since we do not have activities in the park, this will enable us to shoot the fireworks higher, making them visible over a wider area.

While the plans are still very preliminary, the current strategy could be to establish a numer of smaller areas for people to view the fireworks. While nothing's finalized yet, our communications team will keep everybody updated as we get closer to the event. Stay tuned for more fireworks
information.
