PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. I'd like to call to order the Regular Council Meeting of January 10, 2022.

Mr. Christian, would you please call the roll.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Dr. Campbell?

DR. CAMPBELL: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Cenci?

MR. CENCI: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Consolmagno?

MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Espinar?

MR. ESPINAR: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Ms. Flinn?

MS. FLINN: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Janosik?

MR. JANOSIK: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Moury?

PRESIDENT MOURY: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Oakes?

MR. OAKES: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. O'Brien?

MR. O'BRIEN: Present.

1           PRESIDENT MOURY: All members are  
2 accounted for.

3           At this time, can we stand for the  
4 Pledge of Allegiance.

5           (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance  
6 was recited.)

7           PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. At this  
8 time, I would like just to make some  
9 announcements.

10           Number one is: We had a  
11 reorganization of Council last Monday.  
12 Myself, Tim Moury, was elected president; Mark  
13 O'Brien, vice president. We have members that  
14 were re-elected and four new members. So  
15 tonight, I would just like to make those  
16 introductions.

17           I'll start: Re-elected was Mayor  
18 Jack Allen. Welcome back.

19           MAYOR ALLEN: Glad to be here.

20           PRESIDENT MOURY: And we'll do it by  
21 Council Wards.

22           Joe Consolmagno from Ward 1.

23           MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Thank you,  
24 Mr. Moury.

25           PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,

1 Mr. Consolmagno.

2 We have John Oakes from Ward 3.

3 MR. OAKES: Thank you.

4 I'd like to just take a second and  
5 I'd like to thank all the citizens in Ward 3  
6 and throughout the Municipality for entrusting  
7 me with this responsibility. I appreciate it.  
8 I will work hard for you every day.

9 I'd also like to thank Council for  
10 the help, the amount of information, and the  
11 stuff that they have to deal with every day.  
12 These are great teachers for us.

13 And I'd also like to -- my partners,  
14 the other three newly-elected Council people,  
15 I would like to thank them for their time,  
16 everything they put forth to do this every  
17 day, all day. I'd just like to say thank you  
18 to all you guys.

19 Thank you.

20 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,

21 Mr. Oakes.

22 And representing Ward 5, Mr. Janosik.

23 MR. JANOSIK: Thank you, President  
24 Moury.

25 I'd like to echo what Mr. Oakes said.

1 Thank you to all the folks in Ward 5 who voted  
2 for me and supported me throughout this.

3 Thank you to my family. I couldn't have done  
4 it without them.

5 I'd also like to thank the outgoing  
6 members. I know there's a lot of experience  
7 that we lost. But hopefully we can get some  
8 fresh ideas here for you guys.

9 I'd be remiss if I didn't acknowledge  
10 Mr. Harrison's 48 years of service to the  
11 community.

12 Mr. Harrison, thank you very much.

13 Also, I'd like to thank the new  
14 members that joined with me. Your willingness  
15 to raise your hand and stand up for our  
16 community is greatly appreciated.

17 And that's all I have, Mr. Moury.

18 Thank you.

19 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,  
20 Mr. Janosik.

21 And from Ward 7, Mr. Espinar.

22 MR. ESPINAR: Thank you, Mr. Moury.

23 I'd like to first start off by  
24 thanking the residents of Ward 7. I'm honored  
25 to have this opportunity to represent Ward 7

1 and all the citizens of Bethel Park. I also  
2 look forward to continuing the long-lasting  
3 tradition of excellence here in Bethel Park.  
4 I value the initiatives envisioned by the  
5 previous Councilmembers placed into action and  
6 taking it into the next level.

7 I look forward to working with  
8 members of the Council to continue to make  
9 Bethel Park a special place to live, work, and  
10 raise a family.

11 Thank you.

12 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,  
13 Mr. Espinar.

14 Ms. Flinn.

15 MS. FLINN: Hi. Going last,  
16 everybody said everything.

17 PRESIDENT MOURY: We saved the best  
18 for last.

19 MS. FLINN: I know.

20 No, I'm honored to serve Bethel Park,  
21 especially alongside all these folks right  
22 here. And I'm committed to being open minded  
23 and to, most importantly, listen and ask  
24 questions. And I welcome any thoughts and  
25 suggestions that any of the residents would

1 have.

2 And I'm just -- and it's a privilege  
3 that I don't take lightly. And I thank all of  
4 Bethel Park. And I'm excited -- excited to  
5 serve.

6 Thank you.

7 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,  
8 Ms. Flynn.

9 I would be remiss not to mention  
10 that they actually got sworn in on the 3rd,  
11 but they began their journey in early  
12 December. They met with Mr. Christian and  
13 our staff to kind of get a heads up, an  
14 overview.

15 And they also are all attending a  
16 local government academy for the newly-elected  
17 officials courts, which, many years ago, when  
18 I went, it wasn't as detailed, I'm sure. But  
19 it's a three-, four-month commitment. There's  
20 many meetings.

21 And we, I think, all look forward to  
22 working with all the new members. And  
23 hopefully we provide you the guidance to make  
24 good decisions.

25 And just remember one thing, all the

1 good stuff is us. Anything bad is the  
2 Manager. I don't think they'll teach you  
3 that. But that's your lesson for tonight.

4 Okay. At this time, I would also  
5 like to mention for the Chairs, I -- for  
6 General Policy and Finance, Dr. Campbell will  
7 be the Chair; Health, Safety and Welfare,  
8 Mr. Cenci will be the Chair; for Public Works  
9 and Maintenance, Mr. Consolmagno; and  
10 Mr. Janosik will be the Chair of Planning and  
11 Zoning. And that will be our most active  
12 committee, I think, in future months.

13 So thank you all for your willingness  
14 to serve. And here's to, you know, the next  
15 two years.

16 Okay. Under Chair Announcements,  
17 executive session of Council was held on  
18 Monday, January 10, before we came out, 2022,  
19 for personnel matters and contract  
20 negotiations.

21 At this time, I would like to turn to  
22 the Reports of the Officials; and the Library  
23 Director's Report.

24 MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. My  
25 name's Christine. I'm the Director of your



1 Public Library, where we offer opportunities  
2 to explore, learn, create, and connect.

3 I have one big announcement. As of  
4 January 1st of this year, the Library is now  
5 fine free as part of our strategic plan and  
6 the strategic initiative to reduce barriers to  
7 service.

8 So now if your items are overdue, you  
9 will not be charged a late fee. However, that  
10 doesn't eliminate replacing the cost -- if you  
11 do lose an item, you will be responsible for  
12 replacing the cost for that.

13 Also, Winter Reading Club for  
14 children birth through high school started  
15 this week, and it will continue through the  
16 month of January. So we hope you come in and  
17 pick up some materials and start reading.

18 All of our story times are back in  
19 session, as are adult programs and clubs.  
20 So you can visit our website at  
21 [bethelparklibrary.org](http://bethelparklibrary.org) for more information, or  
22 stop in and see us.

23 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very  
24 much.

25 Is there any discussion from Council?

1 (No response.)

2 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none --  
3 thank you, Christine -- can we turn to the  
4 Police Chief's Report; and Chief O'Connor.

5 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Good evening,  
6 Mr. Mayor, Council. Hi, everybody. Chief  
7 here.

8 I want to wish everybody a happy and  
9 safe New Year. But winter is upon us. Winter  
10 is upon us. So just a couple of things.  
11 Please drive carefully when there's snow and  
12 icy conditions out.

13 The one thing you can really do is  
14 make sure you have good tires on your car,  
15 weigh down the back of your vehicle. Please  
16 maintain a safe distance between you and the  
17 vehicle in front of you. And go slow. You  
18 know, tailor your speed to the conditions, not  
19 to the posted speed limit, and we'll all get  
20 through this right into the spring, right into  
21 St. Patrick's Day.

22 Right, Mr. Vice President? That has  
23 a nice ring to it.

24 And I'm going to watch the game  
25 tonight. Roll Tide.

1 Any questions?

2 PRESIDENT MOURY: -- any questions  
3 from Council?

4 (No response.)

5 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Excellent.

6 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, can  
7 we turn to the Fire Chief's Report; and I  
8 believe we have Chief Gerber on the line.

9 CHIEF GERBER: Hi there. Happy New  
10 Year to everybody. Glad to see everybody.  
11 Congratulations all the new Councilmembers and  
12 to all the returning Councilmembers.

13 For the month of December, in 2021,  
14 we had four structure fires, one vehicle fire,  
15 one gas leak, two electrical conditions, three  
16 power lines down, one we assisted a resident  
17 who was locked out of their house, one water  
18 condition, ten good intent calls, two smoke  
19 investigations, ten fire alarms, and three CO  
20 alarms, totaling 38 calls for the month of  
21 December.

22 In 2021, the Bethel Park Volunteer  
23 Fire Company ran 538 calls. That's up 65  
24 over last year. Last year, we were down.  
25 Amazingly enough, with COVID and all, we were

1 down a good 100 calls. So the call volume  
2 is going back up, and we're keeping busy and  
3 all.

4 Just one quick thing I would like to  
5 ask everybody. Unfortunately, as Chief  
6 O'Connor said, it's wintertime. It's starting  
7 to snow and stuff again, unfortunately. If  
8 you have any kind of snow accumulation and you  
9 have a fire hydrant on your property, if it's  
10 across from your property that, you know,  
11 there's not a house or anything, we ask that  
12 you clean out the fire hydrant, a 3-foot  
13 radius around the hydrant.

14 So that if, unfortunately, if we  
15 would have to use it, we can get to the  
16 hydrant. The guys and ladies from the fire  
17 department, we can connect the hydrant. But  
18 we ask that you please try and maintain some  
19 snow clearing and stuff around the hydrant  
20 just so in case we need it so we can get to  
21 it.

22 The last thing you want to do with an  
23 emergency is to have us to have to start  
24 shoveling before we get water. So a very  
25 important item. And we'd appreciate anybody

1 who can help us with that to take care of  
2 that.

3 Other than that, that's all I have.  
4 Other than have a Happy New Year to everybody.  
5 And thank you.

6 CHAIRMAN MOURY: Thank you, Chief  
7 Gerber.

8 At this time, I would like to turn  
9 to the Mayor's Report; and Mayor Allen.

10 MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you,  
11 Mr. President.

12 I did want to mention Chief  
13 O'Connor's comment about drive slow because of  
14 the roads being slick. And he said don't  
15 worry about what the posted speed limit is.  
16 Please drive slow to the posted speed limit,  
17 and we'll all be happy.

18 The only thing I have tonight are the  
19 awards for the 2021 Holiday Lighting Contest.  
20 And I have it by Ward, a couple honorable  
21 mentions. There are a few people here. Let  
22 me read the award.

23 This is the Award for Excellence  
24 presented this 10th day of January 2022, by  
25 the Municipality of Bethel Park to certain

1 residences, and acknowledge them of the  
2 outstanding 2021 holiday season display of  
3 decorations as your residence.

4 You are hereby presented the Mayor's  
5 Award of Excellence. This recognition is  
6 given to your home that signifies that your  
7 holidays decorations were judged to be the  
8 best in your Ward. Bethel Park appreciates  
9 your effort to enhance our community's image  
10 at this special time of year. So  
11 congratulations and best wishes for a bright  
12 2022.

13 So in Ward 1 -- and I don't know if  
14 they're here. We have a few that said they  
15 were coming -- it's Robert and Laura Butt, at  
16 5501 California Avenue.

17 Okay. Ward 2, 6089 Great Dane Drive,  
18 and that's Joseph and Shirley Regrut. And I  
19 don't believe they're here.

20 With an Honorable Mention of Thomas  
21 and Irene Sumansky, at 6159 Boxer Drive.

22 Ward 3, 963 Willow Glen Drive, that's  
23 David and Pamela Bruchwalski.

24 Ward 4, and it says that they're  
25 here, so that's at 7028 Dumbarton Place, Ralph

1 and Raylene Masucci.

2 Do you want to come up?

3 (Applause.)

4 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. And the  
5 spokesperson is? Just tell us a little bit  
6 about your display.

7 MS. MASUCCI: Well, you did the  
8 decorating.

9 MR. MASUCCI: Well, I got the whole  
10 outside of the house done with lights across  
11 the roof and that. I got quite a few blowups,  
12 some little animation stuff, the whole yard  
13 circled in lights and everything there. I  
14 didn't have a picture. I was going to --

15 MAYOR ALLEN: Oh, we have a picture.

16 MR. MASUCCI: Oh, you have a picture?

17 MAYOR ALLEN: Yes.

18 MR. MASUCCI: Okay.

19 MS. MASUCCI: And it was outlined in  
20 candy canes.

21 MAYOR ALLEN: Yeah, it's very nice.

22 A lot of lights --

23 MR. MASUCCI: Yeah.

24 MAYOR ALLEN: And a lot of  
25 decorations.

1 MS. MASUCCI: Yeah.

2 MAYOR ALLEN: We want to thank you  
3 for your participation --

4 MR. MASUCCI: Okay.

5 MAYOR ALLEN: -- and look forward to  
6 seeing you next year.

7 MR. MASUCCI: All right. Thank you.

8 MS. MASUCCI: Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

10 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. Ward 5 isn't  
11 here. It's Freyvogle residence, and they're  
12 at 2350 Casswell Drive.

13 That brings us to Ward 6, Raymond  
14 and Joan Bruschi, and that is 5724 Wilson  
15 Drive.

16 (Applause.)

17 MAYOR ALLEN: And you've been here  
18 before?

19 MR. BRUSCHI: I was honored two years  
20 ago.

21 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. Just tell us a  
22 little bit about your display.

23 MR. BRUSCHI: Well, I put up the  
24 lights. My wife choreographs.

25 MAYOR ALLEN: Well, when this is --



1 this program is rebroadcast, they do put the  
2 pictures up.

3 So, we'll give you your award. A lot  
4 of lights. It looks very nice. And thank you  
5 very much.

6 MR. BRUSCHI: Thank you.

7 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. Ward 7 is 3232  
8 Comanche Road. That's Stephen and Pam Hart.  
9 I don't believe they're here.

10 Ward 8, 4960 Lindermer Avenue, Thomas  
11 and Jodie Burke.

12 Okay. Ward 9, Honorable Mention,  
13 Robert and Jennifer Bitkowski, and they're at  
14 164 Rocky Ridge Road.

15 And the winner of Ward 9 is Bob and  
16 Amy Jo Edkins, at 690 Clifton Road. And  
17 they're not here also.

18 I've given the awards to their  
19 Councilperson, and they'll deliver them to  
20 you, I hope.

21 And that's all I have, Mr. President.

22 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very  
23 much, Mayor.

24 At this time, can we turn to the  
25 Approval of the Minutes; and Mr. O'Brien.

1                   MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you,  
2 Mr. Chairman.

3                   Approval of the Minutes, December 13,  
4 2021 Regular Council Meeting Minutes.

5                   I move that we approve the minutes  
6 from December 13, 2021 Regular Council  
7 Meeting.

8                   DR. CAMPBELL: Second.

9                   PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion by  
10 Mr. O'Brien and second by Dr. Campbell that we  
11 approve the minutes from the December 13, 2021  
12 Regular Council Meeting.

13                   Any discussion of this item?

14                   MR. OAKES: Mr. President?

15                   PRESIDENT MOURY: Yes.

16                   MR. OAKES: I would like to mention  
17 that I will be recusing myself for the  
18 Approval of Minutes and the Bills and Payrolls  
19 because I was not in Council at that time, and  
20 would like to recuse myself from those two  
21 items.

22                   PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,  
23 Mr. Oakes.

24                   Is there any other discussion?

25                   (No response.)

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none,  
2 Mr. Christian, would you please call the roll.

3 MR. CHRISTIAN: Dr. Campbell?

4 DR. CAMPBELL: Yes.

5 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Cenci?

6 MR. CENCI: Yes.

7 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Consolmagno?

8 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Yes.

9 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Espinar?

10 MR. ESPINAR: Yes.

11 MR. CHRISTIAN: Ms. Flinn?

12 MS. FLINN: Yes.

13 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Janosik?

14 MR. JANOSIK: Yes.

15 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Moury?

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: Yes.

17 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Oakes, abstain.

18 PRESIDENT MOURY: Motion passes 8-0  
19 [sic] with one abstention.

20 At this time, I would like to turn  
21 to the Approval of the Bills and Payrolls;  
22 Mr. O'Brien.

23 MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you, Mr. Moury.

24 Bills and Payrolls, Bill List 011022.

25 I move that we approve Bill List

1 011022 in the amount of \$1,841,138.27.

2 DR. CAMPBELL: Second.

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion  
4 by Mr. O'Brien, second by Dr. Campbell that  
5 we approve Bill List 011022 in the amount of  
6 \$1,841,138.27.

7 Any discussion of this item?

8 (No response.)

9 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Christian,  
10 would you please call the roll.

11 MR. CHRISTIAN: Dr. Campbell?

12 DR. CAMPBELL: Yes.

13 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Cenci?

14 MR. CENCI: Yes.

15 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Consolmagno?

16 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Yes.

17 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Espinar?

18 MR. ESPINAR: Yes.

19 MR. CHRISTIAN: Ms. Flinn?

20 MS. FLINN: Yes.

21 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Janosik?

22 MR. JANOSIK: Yes.

23 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Moury?

24 PRESIDENT MOURY: Yes.

25 MR. CHRISTIAN: And Mr. O'Brien?

1 MR. O'BRIEN: Yes.

2 PRESIDENT MOURY: Motion passes 8-0,  
3 with one abstention.

4 At this time, I would like to turn to  
5 the Resident Comment Section.

6 Mr. Harrison is signed up to speak.

7 MR. HARRISON: I served 48 years as  
8 it is as a 5th Ward Councilman. During that  
9 time I commented many times about the slippery  
10 slope our precious nation created by our  
11 forebears slid slowly toward socialism.

12 President Moury took the microphone  
13 each time to state that Harrison's -- "that's  
14 Harrison's opinion and not supported by  
15 Council or the staff." He never polled  
16 Council to determine if that's a fact. He  
17 just stated the case and ruled like a  
18 dictator.

19 A few years ago I read into the  
20 record -- several years ago I read into the  
21 record a quote by then-Soviet Premier  
22 Khrushchev. He said, "We will take America  
23 without firing a shot. We will bury you. We  
24 can't expect the American people to jump from  
25 capitalism to communism, but can we assist

1 their elected leaders in giving their small  
2 doses of socialism until they awaken one day  
3 to find that they have communism. We do not  
4 have to invade the United States, we will  
5 destroy within." This quote was by  
6 then-Premiere Nikita Khrushchev several days  
7 ago.

8 As of January 20, 2021, the United  
9 States has become a socialist nation. America  
10 needs to not -- needs to acknowledge that fact  
11 and immediately expend effort to reverse it.  
12 Year 2020- -- the reason I'm citing this is,  
13 year '22 is an election year where all the  
14 seats in the House of Representatives and a  
15 third of the seats in the Senate are up for  
16 election. As I stated, this is an opportunity  
17 --

18 Just a second. Yes.

19 This is an opportunity for the  
20 citizens to correct the situation that our  
21 nation is in at this time. So my purpose for  
22 making these presentations is to encourage  
23 people to determine who are the candidates  
24 that are running for election that will  
25 support our constitutional system is formed by

1       our framers, and hopefully that will resolve  
2       the situation we're going in.

3                Because I don't -- I don't talk to  
4       many people that are very happy with the  
5       situation we're in now. And hopefully we can  
6       rectify that by electing people who will  
7       support the constitution form of the  
8       government that was -- that was put together  
9       by our framers.

10               So I would appreciate that people  
11       would take -- take note of the fact that this  
12       is an election year, expend some efforts  
13       learning who are the candidates that will push  
14       our nation back to a constitutional  
15       organization and not socialism, and see if we  
16       can reverse this trend.

17               Thank you very much.

18               PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,  
19       Mr. Harrison.

20               Are there any other residents who  
21       would like to speak?

22               (No response.)

23               PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, can  
24       we turn to General Policy and Finance; and  
25       Dr. Campbell.

1 DR. CAMPBELL: President Moury, we  
2 have one item under General Policy and  
3 Finance, the Opioid Settlement Participation.

4 I move that we authorize the  
5 Municipal Manager to sign the agreement forms  
6 to participate in the J&J Settlement and the  
7 Distributors' Settlement.

8 MR. O'BRIEN: Second.

9 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion  
10 by Dr. Campbell, second by Mr. O'Brien  
11 authorizing the Municipal Manager to sign the  
12 agreement forms to participate in the J&J  
13 Settlement and the Distributors' Settlement.

14 Any discussion of this item?

15 DR. CAMPBELL: President Moury?

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: Dr. Campbell.

17 DR. CAMPBELL: Two settlements were  
18 reached for the opioid crisis between the PA  
19 state general -- general office -- general  
20 attorneys office in Johnson & Johnson this  
21 past year, as well as with three  
22 pharmaceutical distributors as well.

23 Pennsylvania was one of 46 states to  
24 join with four territories and the District  
25 of Columbia in negotiating these settlements.



1           This motion is necessary for us to --  
2 as Bethel Park to opt in on the claims made  
3 by the state. To put this in perspective,  
4 the settlement is currently around 26 billion  
5 dollars. Pennsylvania stands to gain  
6 possibly a billion dollars from the -- from  
7 payments.

8           And just to kind of drive the lesson  
9 kind of home and let us know how personal this  
10 is: In Pennsylvania, we had 16,800 people  
11 die in Pennsylvania between 2017 and 2020.  
12 The population of Bethel Park is about twice  
13 that. So we've lost the equivalent in  
14 Pennsylvania in those few years as many as  
15 half of our population of Bethel Park alone.  
16 In 2021, we lost 5,172 Pennsylvania residents.

17           So the opioid crisis is palpable.  
18 It's real. In one way or another it affects  
19 all of us. You may not think that it affects  
20 you in a lot of different ways. But by  
21 insurance premiums, by rates of crime,  
22 insurance policies, everything across the  
23 board, it will -- healthcare, it affects us to  
24 some degree.

25           So it is my desire and wish that we

1 certainly proceed with this motion.

2 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very


