2 (Commencing at approximately 7:35 p.m.)

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. I'd like to
4 call to order the Regular Council Meeting of
5 October 10, 2022.

6 Mr. Christian, would you please call
7 the roll.

8 MR. CHRISTIAN: Dr. Campbell?

9 DR. CAMPBELL: Here.

10 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Cenci?

11 MR. CENCI: Here.

12 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Consolmagno?

13 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Here.

14 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Espinar?

15 MR. ESPINAR: Here.

16 MR. CHRISTIAN: Ms. Flinn?

17 MS. FLINN: Here.

18 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Janosik?

19 MR. JANOSIK: Here.

20 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Moury?

21 PRESIDENT MOURY: Here.

22 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Oakes?

23 MR. OAKES: Here.

24 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. O'Brien?

25 MR. O'BRIEN: Present.

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: All members present
2 and accounted for.

3 Could we stand for the Pledge of
4 Allegiance.

5 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance
6 was recited.)

7 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. I'd like to
8 turn to Chair Announcements.

9 Executive session of Council was
10 conducted on September 26, 2022 for personnel
11 matters and possible real estate acquisition;
12 and tonight, before we came out, October 10,
13 2022, for personnel matters and possible real
14 estate action.

15 At this time, I would like to go
16 off the agenda and turn it over to Chief
17 O'Connor.

18 And we have a special guest and a
19 swearing in ceremony; so welcome Judge Arnoni.

20 JUDGE ARNONI: Thank you,
21 Mr. President.

22 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Thank you,
23 Mr. Mayor, Council. Hi, everybody. I'm very
24 happy to preside over this this evening.

25 So I'm going to call up first our new

1 officer, Amber DiFranco. Would you come up,
2 Amber.

3 Amber has been with us for a week.
4 And just so you know, she was with the
5 Pittsburgh Bureau of Police since 2009. She
6 started as a patrol officer at Zone 1 on the
7 North Side. And through her hard work and
8 dedication, she was made a detective assigned
9 to the Intelligence Unit. She was there a
10 couple years, and then she left to go to the
11 mounted patrol. And she's been there for five
12 years. "Mounted" as on a horse. Yeah.

13 So we also are going to have her
14 sworn in tonight. And the wise and learned
15 Judge Ronald Arnoni is here, and he's going to
16 do the swearing in.

17 Come on up, Judge.

18 JUDGE ARNONI: Thank you, Chief.

19 Thanks, Chief. And thank you all.
20 It's great to be here swearing in another new
21 officer to our Police Department.

22 Thanks Mayor, Mr. President, Members
23 of Council, Administration of Bethel Park.

24 This is the Oath of Office for the
25 Municipality of Bethel Park. And if you would

1 raise your right hand, please, and repeat
2 after me.

3 (Whereupon, at this juncture Police
4 Officer Amber DiFranco was sworn in by Judge
5 Ronald Arnoni and took the Oath of Office.)

6 (Applause.)

7 PRESIDENT MOURY: If you can keep
8 your speech to under ten minutes, that would
9 be fine.

10 JUDGE ARNONI: Oh, I did want to
11 know, are we getting -- Chief Dixon said we
12 might be getting a mounted patrol here in
13 Bethel.

14 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Yeah, and I'm going
15 to -- yeah, when the Dixons' taxes got raised,
16 then we'll get a -- (indiscernible).

17 (Laughter.)

18 MR. JANOSIK: We just started budget
19 talks.

20 PRESIDENT MOURY: So the answer is
21 no.

22 CHIEF O'CONNOR: I do want to thank
23 Council for Amber's hiring. This is going to
24 bring us up to 39 full-time officers. And
25 based on events recently, we need them,

1 including today.

2 So here's what I'm going to do is
3 I'm going to present you now with your
4 official Bethel Park Police badge.

5 MS. DiFRANCO: Thank you.

6 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Okay.

7 (Applause.)

8 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Questions?

9 PRESIDENT MOURY: Anybody?

10 (No response.)

11 PRESIDENT MOURY: No. Thank you.

12 CHIEF O'CONNOR: I didn't say
13 anything about your tie.

14 Okay. Thank you.

15 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you, Chief.

16 Can we now turn to the Reports of
17 the Officials; and the Library Director's
18 Report.

19 MS. McINTOSH: I always hate
20 following the Chief; he's too funny all the
21 time.

22 Good evening. My name's Christine.
23 I'm the director of your Public Library, where
24 we provide opportunities to inform, inspire,
25 create, and connect.

1 I just want to say thank you to our
2 sponsors and volunteers of the Fifth Annual
3 Bethel Park Fantastic Four Golf Outing.

4 We had a great day. It started out
5 very rainy, but 20 minutes before tee-off it
6 cleared up and we had a great day.

7 The event raised over \$32,000 to be
8 split equally between the Bethel Park
9 Education Foundation, the Community
10 Foundation, the Historical Society, and the
11 Library. So it was our most successful year.

12 And also, a big thank you to all who
13 donated during Love Your Library Month during
14 the month of September. We raised just under
15 \$20,000 for the Library with the prorated
16 match that will be forthcoming from the Jack
17 Buncher Family Foundation.

18 Our next fundraising event is Yinzer
19 2022, an Evening of Pittsburgh Food and Fun.
20 This will be held on Friday, October 21st, at
21 the Library, from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m.

22 This event is sponsored by the
23 newly-rejuvenated Friends of Bethel Park
24 Public Library. Tickets are \$30 each or two
25 for \$50. They're available at the Library

1 or at Evey Hardware. And the proceeds do
2 benefit the Library for our programs and
3 activities.

4 In addition to our daily storytimes
5 and our monthly book groups, we have a few
6 events coming up this month. We have our
7 Haunted Hat Tea on Friday, October 14th, at
8 11:00 a.m. This is for adults.

9 So you can come and experience the
10 spirit of Halloween while enjoying tea and
11 finger sandwiches. We ask that you wear a
12 Halloween hat because we do award a prize for
13 the most unusual Halloween hat.

14 Teen Tuesdays will be on October
15 19th, at 6:30 p.m. In October, they'll be
16 playing breakout games. And there will be
17 popcorn and apple cider. This is for students
18 in grades seven and up.

19 And we have Family STEM Day on
20 Saturday, October 22nd. So you can stop in
21 any time between the hours of 11:00 and 2:00
22 for hands-on activities and demonstrations
23 incorporating science, technology,
24 engineering, and math. This is for all-age
25 children. But a reminder, the children that

1 are under the age of ten need to be
2 accompanied by an adult.

3 And if you haven't been in the
4 Library in the last two weeks, you should come
5 in. We have seven, hopefully, fertilized
6 chicken eggs in an incubator. We're part of
7 the Hatch the Chicken program. So we've been
8 watching them. The staff is just as excited
9 as the kids. Our projected hatch date is
10 October 19th, so that's next week.

11 We will be filming some of that and
12 putting it up on Facebook and Instagram and on
13 our YouTube channel. But it's very exciting.
14 Then we'll have the chicks for two weeks, then
15 they go back to the farmer, who is in
16 Freeport. So we're very excited about that.

17 That's all I have this evening.

18 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
19 much.

20 Any questions?

21 (No response.)

22 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, does
23 the Chief have any additional report?

24 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Negative.

25 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay.

1 I will now turn to the Fire Chief's
2 Report.

3 MR. USELMLAN: Good evening, Council.
4 Good evening residents of Bethel Park. My
5 name's Rob Uselman. I am the Assistant Chief
6 of the Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company.

7 And I have the Incident Report for
8 September 2022. So, last month we had a
9 rather busy month. We had three structure
10 fires, one cooking accident, one debris on
11 fire, four vehicle accidents, two elevator
12 rescues, three gas leaks, one electrical
13 condition, one assist the police with traffic,
14 six good indent calls, four smoke
15 investigations, 15 false alarms, and two
16 CO detector activations for a call -- for an
17 incident total for the month of 43 calls. So
18 a rather busy month. Hopefully it quiets down
19 in the next few months.

20 We would like to thank our -- on
21 October 2, a couple Sundays ago, we had our
22 annual Open House. We haven't had it for a
23 few years due to COVID, so it was our first
24 one in quite a while.

25 We appreciate everybody coming up

1 to support us, all the residents who showed
2 up. We had a -- even though the weather was
3 rather bad from the hurricane that kind of
4 went through Florida and came up, we still had
5 a great turnout.

6 We'd like to thank the police for
7 sending a unit, Tri-Community for sending a
8 unit to assist with us. Also, some local
9 establishments helped out. Bethel Bakery came
10 by and handed out cookies for everybody. And
11 Andy from Evey's Hardware stopped up to help
12 talk to the community about smoke detectors
13 and all the good stuff for fire safety.

14 So it was a good turnout. We
15 appreciate everybody that showed up to support
16 us.

17 Also, this time of year, if you
18 notice, the leaves are changing and falling.
19 We ask residents not to burn your leaves.
20 That is illegal. Please do not burn them.
21 And we would rather have you put them in paper
22 bags and leave them on the curb when the
23 collection dates happen.

24 If you need to know the collection
25 dates, check the Municipality website. Or you

1 should have gotten something in the mail that
2 tells you when leaf bags will be picked up.
3 So we ask you to do that.

4 And one final thing. This week is
5 National Fire Prevention Week. It is
6 sponsored by the National Fire Protection
7 Association, which is NFPA. Believe it or
8 not, they have been doing this for 100 years,
9 it has been a National Fire Prevention Week.

10 And it's really important -- we
11 obviously want to prevent fires as
12 firefighters. So it's really important that
13 we go out and use the information that the
14 National Fire Protection Association gives us.

15 For residents who are interested in
16 more, there is a website NFPA.org that they
17 can go and access. And there is so much
18 safety information out there that will help
19 you if you have questions about things like
20 planning your escape routes, smoke detectors,
21 what to do with cooking fires, all kinds of
22 different information. So we ask the
23 residents to check that website out. Again,
24 that's NFPA.org.

25 And this year's theme is "Fire Won't

1 Wait, Plan Your Escape."

2 And that is all I have.

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
4 much.

5 Any discussion from Council?

6 (No response.)

7 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, we
8 will turn to the Municipal Manager's Report;
9 Mr. Christian. Thank you.

10 MR. CHRISTIAN: Mayor Allen, Members
11 of Council, thank you so much.

12 I'm just going to go through a brief
13 summary real quick of some updates for the
14 month of September.

15 "What is the Month in Review?" It's
16 a new process by which I can overlay some
17 statistics and an analysis from the
18 Municipality's staff. What this is going to
19 do is provide some just generic information
20 on the efficiency and effectiveness of the
21 staff.

22 For the Month in Review for
23 September, municipal budget used, currently
24 we're at 61 percent of the general fund
25 operating --

1 I'm sorry. I got a tickle in my
2 throat. It's been killing me for two weeks
3 now. My apologies.

4 -- currently with expenditures of
5 19 million dollars to date. With the sewage
6 fund, we're currently about 11.9 million
7 dollars expended to date.

8 Revenue collections owe, we're at
9 roughly 69 percent. I think that's -- we're
10 good -- we're in a good position with that.

11 And real estate taxes, obviously you
12 can see, make up -- which make up 36 percent
13 of that one. And Act 511 which will make up
14 54 percent of that.

15 Now, that's the breakdown on the far
16 left-hand side there.

17 On the far right-hand side, you'll
18 see we're well into the strategic development
19 process right now.

20 That plan will be presented to
21 Council here in the next week to ten days in
22 its draft form. And we'll go through some
23 revisions, and allow the Council to give that
24 final input and refine it from the staff.

25 Moving on to some specific things

1 that we've done for the community to date.
2 Recent ones, as you notice, we had some social
3 media exploits for Pine Tree Park. That is
4 well in its throws right now.

5 There are people, the Public Works
6 and members of our Council and philanthropic
7 groups, had dismantled the playground, and
8 we're transferring it over to Lions Park.

9 And that park, we're about a couple
10 weeks out from getting a brand-new playground
11 set. There are different improvements that
12 are going on with that particular park. So
13 that is a wonderful park and a wonderful
14 project that will hopefully come to conclusion
15 here in the next couple of months, with the
16 final aspects of it being done in the spring,
17 with it being a really nice path, some new
18 greens in there, and a lot of nice little
19 improvements.

20 On the right-hand side of the screen
21 you'll see a couple of key things that Public
22 Works has done. They're going through each
23 one of the parks recently. They just hit
24 Simmons Park. They really did a good job
25 cleaning that one and prepping it for the

1 winter. Because it's all -- it's all coming.
2 We know it's coming.

3 We have a tree planting operation
4 that's going to go on at Miner's Park. And so
5 they've been busy for doing that one here.
6 They got the trees on hand. They're ready for
7 the Shade Tree Commission and key members of
8 the community and Council to go over there at
9 Miner's Park on Friday and plant some tree to
10 keep our shade -- our tree canopy in a good
11 place.

12 That street sweeper, I know you hear
13 it early in the morning. And it's keeping our
14 streets right where they need to. It's so
15 imperative that we keep those MS-4 credits for
16 the whole Municipality. It keeps things out
17 of our streams. It keeps it right where it
18 needs to be. And it goes to the dump. And
19 it's right where it should be rather than our
20 streams and our rivers. So that's vitally
21 important to the health of our community.

22 A couple of small highlights there.
23 As you notice Planning and Zoning, Council
24 approved the new Sign Ordinance last month,
25 which takes effect in two days. So that is

1 going to be a great improvement for our
2 community. We're really happy about that one.
3 A lot of more -- a lot of definition on there,
4 a lot of fidelity for that specific. So we're
5 happy where that's going.

6 And, also, they had a Short-Term
7 Rental Ordinance. Council did a first review
8 on that one. And that's over to Allegheny
9 County for their 45-day review. So it's going
10 to be a lot of -- we expect some comments and
11 some revisions back. And we'll get those for
12 you to present it back to Council.

13 So overall, ladies and gentlemen,
14 that's my report.

15 If you have any questions?

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: Any questions?

17 (No response.)

18 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, thank
19 you very much.

20 At this time, I would like to turn to
21 the Mayor's Report; and Mayor Allen.

22 MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you, Mr. Moury.

23 Good evening, everyone. I have just
24 a few items tonight.

25 I did want to mention that when

1 Judge Arnoni was here, he's having his LEAD
2 Family Night, and that's this Wednesday,
3 October 12th, at the Upper St. Clair High
4 School auditorium. It starts at 7:00 p.m.

5 He's done quite a few of these. If
6 anyone is available to see it, it's about
7 leadership development. So he'd appreciate,
8 you know, people going out to watch his
9 program.

10 Well, we're getting towards the
11 middle and end of October, so I want to talk
12 about our Halloween Parade. We'll have our
13 Halloween Parade on Saturday, October 29th,
14 from 9:00 to 11:00.

15 And it's the same route as last year.
16 So those orange pumpkins that are on the
17 ground will be used again this year. If you
18 want to see a copy of the -- or the parade
19 route, you can go on our website.

20 Also with Halloween, we have our
21 annual decorating contest. We're looking for
22 judges. If anyone out there would like to
23 judge, they can call Janet at 412-831-6800,
24 and her extension's 211.

25 And we do it by Ward. And the

1 judging will happen between the 24th and the
2 31st of this month.

3 Also, Fall Cleanup is Saturday,
4 October 22. We do have quite a few volunteers
5 for that. But you can never have enough
6 volunteers for the cleanup.

7 At this point, I'd like to bring up
8 Joe Spinnenweber. Joe is a member of the
9 Marine Corps League.

10 And I will say, and I didn't know
11 this, and maybe Council knew this, but last
12 Wednesday evening, the Marine Corps League
13 presented the Clemente family with a plaque.
14 Because I didn't know that Roberto Clemente
15 was actually a veteran of the U.S. Marines.

16 So Joe wants to tell you about a
17 program that they're sponsoring or they're
18 dealing with.

19 MR. SPINNENWEBER: Thank you, Mayor.
20 Good evening, ladies and gentlemen, Council.

21 Joe Spinnenweber, I'm a resident of
22 Bethel Park.

23 Yes, Mayor, thank you, you and the
24 American Legion, for attending our meeting
25 Wednesday night.

1 And it's true, Roberto Clemente, Jr.
2 -- Roberto Clemente, No. 21, did serve in the
3 United States Marine Corps. I'll go over it
4 briefly.

5 From 1958 to 1964, he served active
6 duty for the first six months, and then went
7 on to Reserve. So that's a little bit of his
8 history. I could go into a lot of what he has
9 done.

10 But he did receive a couple awards,
11 for sure, both federal and state. So he's a
12 well-known marine. His family was there on
13 Wednesday evening, Roberto Clemente, Jr., and
14 also his son Luis.

15 And I also managed to get my
16 grandson up there, to come up and take a
17 picture with him. So it was a pretty good fun
18 night.

19 But thank you, Mayor. I appreciate
20 that.

21 And then, also, I'm here for another
22 big event that's coming up that got started
23 here in the City of Pittsburgh. What's
24 happening is, on November the 11th, in the
25 evening at approximately 5:30 at night, we're

1 going to go through a program "Light to
2 Unite."

3 It's the National Flag Foundation and
4 the Military Order of the Purple Heart are
5 partnering to corroborate a celebration of the
6 204th anniversary of the Purple Heart Award.

7 What we're doing is, the Koppers
8 Building downtown will be lit up in purple.
9 And we -- the United States Marine Corps
10 League, both here in Pittsburgh and the other
11 70 detachments, and our Division 10, and also
12 the Pennsylvania Marine Corps League and the
13 National Marine Corps League are coming into
14 town.

15 And we're going to celebrate by
16 starting here in Pittsburgh, turning on the
17 purple light at the Koppers Building at 5:30
18 in the evening.

19 Right after that, New York will
20 start. And then from there, along the East
21 Coast, the rest of the cities will start to
22 light up their night -- their buildings, and
23 also other Marine Corps League detachments
24 throughout the East Coast.

25 At 5:30 Central Time, the same thing

1 happens, the Marine Corps League, in cities
2 and buildings, are also going to start
3 lighting up.

4 Mountain time, 5:30, once again,
5 additional buildings, Marine Corps League
6 detachments and departments and states will
7 light up. And then also on to the West Coast.

8 So what it is, it's the -- what
9 we're doing is, we're trying to have and pass
10 a bill in Congress and the U.S. Senate, where
11 we could have the Department of Defense put
12 together a database of all military men and
13 women who have received the Purple Heart
14 Award.

15 And one of them we pretty well know
16 is Rocky Bleier, who served in the -- both the
17 United States Army, and also a Pittsburgh
18 Steeler. And along with that, we have two
19 other Marines also: John Banaszak served in
20 the Marine Corps, and also another Pittsburgh
21 Steeler -- I always mess up his name --
22 Villaneuva, I believe, is also a United States
23 Marine, and for the Steelers.

24 But, Mayor, thank you for the
25 opportunity to speak. I appreciate that.

1 And also one more thing: Do you
2 think we can light up the military veterans
3 out front purple or red, white and blue on the
4 evening of the 11th?

5 MAYOR ALLEN: We'll talk about it
6 tomorrow night.

7 MR. SPINNENWEBER: Okay. Thank you.

8 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

10 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. Finally, the
11 last thing that I have this evening. Last
12 Friday, we had our 90-Plus luncheon for anyone
13 that's 90-plus -- or 90 years of age or older.
14 We had close to 100 people there. That
15 included, obviously, the caregivers and so on.

16 It's amazing. It's the nicest thing
17 -- or the best thing that I do in a year.

18 And I want to thank all of Council.
19 Because if it weren't for them, we wouldn't
20 have that program. So thank you for
21 supporting it.

22 And that's the end of my report.

23 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
24 much, Mayor.

25 Okay. At this time, could I turn to

1 the Approval of the Minutes; and Mr. O'Brien.

2 MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you,
3 Mr. Chairman.

23 I get free speech. Jack and I have
24 met before. And we sent out the Solicitor to
25 kind of take a look and see. I met with the

1 Municipal Planner. And I'm hearing back it's
2 all free speech.

3 When you look at those pictures, I
4 can -- I understand free speech. And I'm
5 fully supportive of free speech. And I can
6 deal with body parts hanging down and Zombie
7 babies, and even the axe to the neck.
8 Although it's a little extreme, you know.

9 But the one picture that I really
10 have trouble with is the two skeletons. The
11 one kneeling with the Biden T-shirt, and the
12 other has a gun.

13 And both the gun and T-shirt are
14 back. They had been gone for a while when I
15 met with Jack. But they're back.

16 An execution, and it's -- it's -- it
17 takes your breath away to look at it. And
18 it's an execution because it's the way that
19 this one skeleton cast his ballot.

20 And I always -- I understand free
21 speech again. But, and I'm thinking, what
22 about the nuisance code? There must be
23 something in the nuisance code. But I guess
24 everything's okay with that.

25 What I'd like to do -- what I'm here

1 for is to see if there's any possible way that
2 I can amend or that I can propose an amendment
3 to that nuisance code so that some of these
4 things are not allowed. You know, especially
5 the gun. You know, the rest, it's --

6 We watch Criminal Minds at home, you
7 know, but we switch the channel when my
8 granddaughter comes over. We're very careful
9 of that.

10 So that's -- that's what I'm here
11 for. And, again, if there can be some
12 discussion or if someone can tell me what to
13 do at this point.

14 And most of the -- most of the people
15 that have seen my pictures, which were on my
16 phone, their first response was not, "Oh, he
17 does have free speech." They're saying, "You
18 have how many kids?" And, "What's -- what's
19 going on in that neighborhood that this is
20 allowed to stand?" So --

2 Any additional items?

3 (No response.)

4 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, can
5 we turn to Health, Safety and Welfare; and
6 Mr. Cenci.

7 And we have nobody signed up to
8 speak.

9 MR. CENCI: I have no items,
10 Mr. President.

11 But I would like to say one thing.
12 Last month, I dropped the ball and forgot
13 about somebody's birthday. So if we could all
14 sing for Councilwoman Flinn; it's her 40th
15 birthday. And that's a very special --

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: Strike that from
17 the minutes.

18 (Whereupon, everyone joined in to
19 sing Happy Birthday in harmony to Ms. Flinn.)

20 (Applause.)

21 MS. FLINN: You're next, Councilman.

22 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. Can't top
23 that, can we, now?

24 MR. JANOSIK: Mr. President?

25 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Janosik.

1 MR. JANOSIK: I did have an item for
2 Health, Safety and Welfare.

3 I just wanted to remind the community
4 about the Day of Healing on November 6th, from
5 1:00 to 4:30 at the Community Center.

6 It's going to be a day to reflect and
7 heal from those we lost, whether you've been
8 affected by the opioid epidemic, COVID or any
9 other personal crisis, we want you to know
10 that you are not alone. This will be a
11 community support day to grieve, to heal, and
12 to celebrate life.

13 Activities and informational tables
14 will be made available. The Mayor will be
15 speaking, Judge Arnoni. And it's going to be
16 a really good day. There's going to be some
17 activities; yoga, Qigong, Tai-chi, that type
18 of thing.

19 And so this is our first time we're
20 doing it, so logistics are a little here and
21 there. And the day will be probably a little
22 sloppy. But I think, you know, like you said,
23 Mr. Moury, if we help one person, it's worth
24 it.

25 So I just wanted to send that message

1 out there to the community. Thank you.

2 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
3 much.

4 Real quick. Under Health, Safety
5 and Welfare, I'll just note, the Whitetail
6 Management control deer hunt started, and it
7 coincides with archery season. So you'll see
8 the bow and arrows out there.

9 We are exploring the opportunities
10 to do a calling sometime early next year
11 similar to what the towns around us are doing.
12 We're working with the state to see if it's
13 something they would -- it would be
14 permissible.

15 The deer herd, we have a lot of
16 additional accidents. It's growing. The
17 archery, we're taking, on average, around 60
18 deer a year. But I think they're multiplying
19 quicker. So stay tuned for more information
20 as we get closer to that.

21 Okay. At this time, I would like to
22 turn to Planning and Zoning; and Mr. Janosik.

23 And we have no residents signed up to
24 speak.

25 MR. JANOSIK: Thank you,

1 Mr. President. Just one item for tonight.

2 There's a Resolution to create a

9 here.

11 Committee for the Economic Development -- for
12 Economic Development per the Grant
13 Writer/Redevelopment Coordinator's memorandum
14 dated October 6, 2022.

15 MS. FLINN: Second.

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion
17 by Mr. Janosik, second by Ms. Flinn that we
18 approve Resolution No. R-10-10-22A to create
19 a Steering Committee for the Economic
20 Development per the Grant Writer/Redevelopment
21 Coordinator's memorandum dated October 6,
22 2022.

23 Any discussion of this item?

24 MR. JANOSIK: Mr. President?

25 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Janosik.

1 MR. JANOSIK: Real quick. This is a
2 committee that's going to be made up of five
3 local individuals with an interest background
4 in economic development; the Redevelopment
5 Coordinator, the Municipal Planner, some
6 residents we're going to ask so join, some
7 Councilmembers going to be there as liaisons.
8 And there will be more information about that
9 in the future.

10 Thank you.

11 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,
12 Mr. Janosik.

13 Any other discussion?

15 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none,

13 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. There are no
14 additional items.

15 MR. O'BRIEN: I have one.

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. O'Brien.

17 MR. O'BRIEN: It's going to be a
18 little lengthy, but I think it's necessary.

19 It's about the splash pad. We've
20 worked a long time on it. To think a
21 conversation on the second floor of the
22 schoolhouse some time ago was just an idea,
23 and then it moved to a Council and a
24 conversation.

25 And then questions were asked like:

1 Is it possible? Can we get grants? How much?
2 How much will be done? How much will it cost?
3 Is it necessary? Is it needed? Can it be
4 done? What will it look like? That's the
5 beginning process.

6 So at that point, we reached out to
7 our elected officials, Representative Natalie
8 Mihalek and State Senator Devlin Robinson.
9 And they just picked up the ball to help us
10 with some grants and some opportunities. In
11 fact, their staff worked very diligent at it.
12 And they also, both of them, have hands-on to
13 help us through this process.

14 Now, the Council, Manager, and staff,
15 and the rec board, they all worked together to
16 put field trips together, to put the design
17 together. KP worked on the fundraising. And
18 KP has been kind of the glue holding it
19 together, and the Manager.

20 And then there's subcommittees.
21 There was a subcommittee to talk about what
22 we wanted it to look like. Tim Moury, the
23 President, has kind of been the guy that keeps
24 all this together. And Lori -- Lori Gibbons
25 was on that, myself, and Joe Consolmagno, and

1 Tim.

2 And then there -- and then the Mayor
3 and Council were willing -- the willingness to
4 compromise. Because everyone has -- we have
5 nine -- ten people here that all are bosses
6 to compromise on what we can do and what it
7 will look like. We all come with different
8 ideas.

9 And I truly applaud Council and the
10 Mayor for bringing that here. And all the
11 help that Council over the years has put this
12 together.

13 So I asked -- I asked the Manager to
14 put me together -- put together the people on
15 our staff that helped with this project. I
16 was amazed; it's almost everyone. Everyone in
17 our staff, from our directors, they had a part
18 in this, little parts to bring it all
19 together.

20 And then you have to understand,
21 working with grants is like putting together
22 a bicycle on Christmas Eve, and it has to be
23 done before the morning. Or trying to put
24 together a piece of Ikea furniture, and
25 there's always some parts missing.

1 So, to the fundraising, the design,
2 the timetable, the cost, the PR, what a team
3 effort. All the work was done, and we were
4 ready to go except for one thing: We had a
5 \$950,000 grant from the state that they told
6 us we had, but in order -- and Mr. Moury is
7 correct -- in order for us to move forward, we
8 need a confirmation letter.

9 So after some inquiries, the staff,
10 they kind of exhausted all the avenues. And
11 they found out that the letter -- that this
12 grant is in the Governor's office.

13 Now, in my mind, I see this giant
14 table with all these grants on it, and it's
15 sitting there. And then we have to try and
16 get somebody to pick it up and look at it.

17 We -- we -- some time passed, and we
18 were asking and getting the same answers,
19 "It's in the Governor's office." We want to
20 move forward. We want to do this.

21 So in -- in this realm that we have
22 here -- you have to think about ways you can
23 connect to people to try and get people to
24 help you.

25 So I decided to call Lieutenant

1 Governor Fetterman. Not because I'm a friend
2 with him. Not because I know him personally.
3 It's because John and I have a bond. My
4 mother, my grandmother, my uncles, and my
5 great- -- my grandfather all are from
6 Braddock. My grandfather, he worked as a
7 laborer in ET. He came from Slovakia. And
8 that was his first job.

9 And over the -- as a young man, I
10 spent a lot of time on the streets of Braddock
11 with my uncles and my brother and my
12 grandmother. And I just enjoyed what he was
13 trying to do to a place that I grew up, that I
14 found so enjoyable.

15 So, I wrote him a letter, and he
16 answered. And he put his staff on it right
17 away. Their response was immediate. And you
18 can ask our staff, there was a different tone
19 moving forward.

20 And we did find that one of those
21 Ikea pieces were missing. It was maybe a
22 cross in the T or something. So they got it
23 through. They went and found it, wherever it
24 was in whatever room. They brought it back.
25 They looked at it. They said, "Get it done."

1 And then it took some time, but it
2 happened. We got the notice -- we got the
3 letter -- what, Friday -- that we got the
4 \$950,000.

5 You know, but this is a lesson for
6 all of us. All of us here aren't one party,
7 and we work really well together. Natalie and
8 Devlin, they're one party and John's another,
9 and they got it done.

10 Maybe there's a lesson for all of us
11 in this country: If we work together, what
12 can we get accomplished? And I'm excited.
13 Now let's hope our bids don't come in too
14 high. And that's my story.

15 By the way, they stuck -- they
16 really communicated with me every week through
17 this process to try and get this through. And
18 I thought that was amazing for that office.

19 Because sometimes you get, "Okay,
20 we'll get on it." You don't hear anything.
21 Every Friday, "Did you hear anything?" "We'll
22 inquire." "Did you hear anything." "We'll
23 inquire. We'll find out."

24 And I'm just -- I'm -- I'm very --
25 I'm forever profoundly grateful for that kind

1 of service to this Municipality of Bethel
2 Park.

3 Thank you.

4 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you.

5 MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you.

6 (Applause.)

7 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. At this

25 \$839,500. So it's a sizable chunk of change

1 for these items.


