PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. I'd like to call to order the Regular Council Meeting of April 10, 2023.

Chief O'Connor, would you please call the roll.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Dr. Campbell?

DR. CAMPBELL: (No response.)

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Cenci?

MR. CENCI: Here.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Consolmagno?

MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Here.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Espinar?

MR. ESPINAR: Here.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Ms. Flinn?

MS. FLINN: Here.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Janosik?

MR. JANOSIK: Here.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Moury?

PRESIDENT MOURY: Here.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Oakes?

MR. OAKES: Here.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. O'Brien?

1 MR. O'BRIEN: Present.

2 PRESIDENT MOURY: We have all members
3 present.

4 Can we stand for the Pledge of
5 Allegiance.

7 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance
8 was recited.)

9 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. At this
10 time, I'd like to turn to Chair Announcements.

11 Executive Session of Council was
12 conducted on March 27, 2023 for personnel and
13 legal issues.

14 An executive Session of Council was
15 conducted on April 1, 2023 for personnel
16 manager interviews.

17 And tonight, before we came out, an
18 Executive Session of Council was conducted on
19 April 10, 2023 for personnel and legal issues.

20 At this time, could we turn to the
21 Library Director's Report.

22 (No response.)

23 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, can
24 we turn to the Police Chief's Report.

25 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Good evening,

1 Mr. Mayor, Council, Mr. Vice President. Hi
2 everybody, Chief here.

3 How about this good weather?
4 Everybody enjoying this weather? Good, I'll
5 take credit for it, then.

6 Okay. Oh, and along with the good
7 weather, the parks are open. The parks are
8 open. So please go out and enjoy our
9 magnificent parks that we have.

10 We had our Crime Watch meeting this
11 month. It was very well attended. I want to
12 thank everybody that came. We had two game
13 wardens from the Game Commission there,
14 talking about the game laws.

15 And I didn't know this. You can hunt
16 coyotes. Do you know that? You can hunt
17 coyotes. I might start hunting. But we were
18 very appreciative that they came up and gave
19 their time and answered a lot of questions.

20 Our next -- next Crime Watch meeting
21 will be May the 1st. That's the first Monday,
22 May the 1st, 7:00 p.m. at the Community
23 Center. Please come, if you can. I don't --
24 I don't know if we have a speaker lined up or
25 not. But we're working on that. But I hope

1 to see everybody there.

2 And that's all I have for you guys.
3 Ciao.

4 Questions?

5 PRESIDENT MOURY: Any questions?

6 (No response.)

7 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Negative.

8 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
9 much, Chief.

10 Can we turn to the Fire Chief's
11 Report.

12 FIRE CHIEF: Thank you, Chief.

13 Council, good evening. Residents of
14 Bethel Park, good evening. My name's Rob
15 Uselman. I'm the Assistant Chief with the
16 Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company.

17 And he stole my thunder. I was going
18 to take credit for the good weather. But what
19 we'll do is we'll talk instead about the
20 Chief's Report.

21 We had a total of 63 incidents this
22 past month. Rather busy for us; obviously due
23 to the storms. We had 18 incidents related to
24 the storms that came through. We had six
25 structure fires, one vehicle fire, one brush

1 fire, one telephone pole fire, one vehicle
2 into a building. Actually, I believe it was
3 the Library up here. Luckily, there was no
4 major damage. One high angle rescue, one
5 elevator rescue, two assist the police, eight
6 good intent calls, six CO gas and Hazmat
7 investigations, and 17 fire alarms. So, a
8 rather busy month.

9 Everybody just calm down. The
10 weather's getting nice. Be good. Let's
11 practice some safe things. And some things
12 you can practice while the spring weather is
13 upon us.

14 Make sure that you pull your gas
15 grills out, you inspect them and they're in
16 good working order.

17 I actually pulled mine out and the
18 bottom was rusted out, so now I got to get a
19 new gas grill.

20 But check your propane tanks.
21 Especially make sure the hoses are working
22 properly; there's no cracks or leaks. Propane
23 is highly flammable. So please be careful
24 with those.

25 Also, as you break out your lawn care

1 equipment, make sure you use gasoline, and you
2 store it properly. Use it as motor fuel only.
3 Don't use it as cleaner or to break down
4 grease on your lawn equipment. Also, make
5 sure you store it in a proper -- a
6 properly-marked container. You can get those
7 at any hardware store.

8 And that is all I have for the March
9 report.

10 Any questions?

11 PRESIDENT MOURY: Any questions from
12 Council?

13 (No response.)

14 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
15 much.

16 Can we turn to the Mayor's Report;
17 and Mayor Allen. It's your shadow tonight.

18 MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. Welcome, everyone.

20 We have a few things tonight. In
21 fact, I might take up more time tonight than
22 Joe does spending money, so it might not be a
23 bad thing.

24 PRESIDENT MOURY: That is a tough
25 record to beat, just saying.

1 MAYOR ALLEN: Yeah, we can do it. We
2 can do it.

3 Okay. We have a couple items
4 tonight. The first one, I invited Joe
5 Consolmagno up because he was involved in this
6 project. And we have a Yard of the Season
7 award.

8 So, Joe, why don't you tell us about
9 it and who gets the award.

10 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Thank you, Mayor
11 Allen.

12 Yes, this Yard of the Season, it all
13 developed a couple years ago. I was noticing
14 this one particular yard on Madison Avenue.
15 And I got in touch with our Code Enforcement,
16 Robert Hicks and David Rudolph. And I said to
17 them, "You know, wouldn't it be nice to tell
18 someone what good they've done in Bethel
19 Park?"

20 And these two individuals, Brian and
21 Mary Ellen France, I'd like to bring up now.
22 Their yard, if you haven't driven by it -- I
23 don't have to tell you what house it is
24 because you'll notice it from the very
25 beginning.

1 But Robert Hicks and David Rudolph
2 will be looking at other nicely-landscaped
3 yards this coming season to see what's the
4 next house that we can identify as the Yard of
5 the Season.

6 And at this time, I'd just like them
7 to tell you a little bit about their yard and,
8 you know, how it all came about.

9 It was a three-year project; is that
10 right?

11 MRS. FRANCE: Yeah. It started in
12 the back yard along a fence that was going to
13 be a pain. He likes formal gardens. So it
14 just grew and grew until we ended up doing the
15 whole yard. We're both gardeners. And I've
16 always wanted my entire yard to be a garden,
17 so.

18 MR. FRANCE: The Evanovich's
19 (phonetic), and they're very good at what they
20 do.

21 MRS. FRANCE:

22 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: There's fountains
23 involved too.

24 MRS. FRANCE: Yeah, in the back.

25 (Applause.)

1 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: That sign will be
2 displayed in their yard for a period of time
3 until we get the --

4 Oh, sure, a photo opportunity.

5 PRESIDENT MOURY: Will they need a
6 permit for that sign?

7 (Laughter.)

8 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Thanks, Adam.

9 MR. O'BRIEN: The sign is green,
10 that's a no.

11 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: That's an Irish
12 sign.

13 MR. O'BRIEN: That's an Irish sign.

14 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
15 much. Congratulations.

16 MAYOR ALLEN: All right. And you did
17 notice it said "Ward 1." So there's eight
18 other Wards up here that, you know. Of
19 course, you can have repeat winners too.

20 The second thing that we have today
21 is actually pretty cool, because we got a
22 Proclamation here that I'm going to read for
23 Arbor Day.

24 And in the meantime, we received a
25 letter today in the mail stating that Bethel

1 Park is Tree City USA for 2022. And that just
2 came in.

3 So the gentlemen that are here now, I
4 don't know if they knew that part, but they
5 certainly knew about the Arbor Day. So if I
6 could bring you up.

7 And we have, okay, Brian Tarbert,
8 Greg Ament, Jim Jenkins, and Brian Joos.

9 We actually do this every year. But
10 we never presented it, I don't believe, at a
11 meeting. It's an official Proclamation. I
12 might need my glasses.

13 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. Official
14 Proclamation. In 1872, the Nebraska Board of
15 Agriculture established a special day to set
16 aside for planting of trees. And this holiday
17 called Arbor Day was first observed with the
18 planting of more than a million trees in
19 Nebraska. And Arbor Day is now observed
20 throughout the nation and the world.

21 The trees are a renewable resource,
22 giving us paper, wood for our homes, fuel for
23 our fires, and countless other wood products.

24 And the trees in our city increase
25 property value and enhance the economic

1 vitality of the business area and beautify our
2 community. And trees, wherever they're
3 planted, are a source of joy and spiritual
4 renewal.

5 So, I, Jack Allen, Mayor of Bethel
6 Park, do hereby proclaim April 28th as Arbor
7 Day in the Borough of Bethel Park.

8 And I urge all citizens to celebrate
9 Arbor Day and support efforts to protect our
10 trees and our woodlands.

11 So I want to present that to you.

12 (Applause.)

13 And what I'd really like to do now is
14 have them talk a little bit about Tree City
15 USA and how that came about, and the hard work
16 that the Shade Tree Commission puts into it.

17 MR. TARBERT: Thank you, Mayor Allen.

18 I'm Brian Tarbert. I'm Chairman of
19 the Shade Tree Commission in Bethel Park.

20 We've only been around for about
21 four and a half years, but it's been a fun
22 four and a half years. I mean, who can't
23 resist planting trees and smiling about it?

24 But from our starting of only three
25 of us on the committee, we've now grown up to

1 full-time members, three alternates, two ISA
2 certified arborists, and seven residents from
3 the community that decided to be registered
4 tree tenders. So we've had a lot of growth in
5 that time.

6 We've also started to work with --
7 to get things going for the Tree City
8 certification, one of our first things we did
9 within the first year, we acquired a company
10 to come in and do a tree inventory of every
11 tree in the parks and our community public
12 spaces.

13 From that inventory, through the help
14 of Public Works and Susie Dolinar, they've
15 been going through and maintaining our trees,
16 getting rid of the dead ones, old ones, things
17 like that.

18 We've also had the opportunity and
19 blessings of being able to plant 343 trees
20 throughout the community -- throughout the
21 Municipality. So through the parks and
22 through the School District, they've been
23 graciously to give us space to do that. We've
24 been able to do that over the past four and a
25 half years.

1 So, also, I'd like to turn this over
2 now to Greg Ament. He's our vice chairman.
3 He's going to tell us about our -- this year's
4 Arbor Day plantings that we're going to be
5 doing.

6 MR. AMENT: Good evening, everyone.
7 It's a pleasure to be up here and be a part of
8 this to see that we've got the Tree City USA
9 designation.

10 This coming April 21st, we'll be
11 celebrating Earth Day. It will -- we will
12 plant eight trees at the Miner's Park. And
13 this will complete 27 trees that we planted in
14 the past year at Miner's Park.

15 So if you get a chance to go over
16 there, it's a beautiful park, take a look
17 around, let us know what you think of what's
18 been accomplished there.

19 The Municipality has been very
20 gracious in helping us with their Public Works
21 and going in and augering the trees and then
22 helping us plant the trees.

23 So that will happen on April 21st,
24 Earth Day. And we'll have the Environmental
25 Club from the high school helping to plant

1 those trees.

2 And then on Arbor Day, which is the
3 28th, the next Friday, at 10:00 a.m., you can
4 come to Pine Tree Park, which is over by
5 St. Germain's Church in the Georgetown plan.
6 There's a park that is surrounded by the homes
7 there. And they just completed some
8 playground renovations there. We'll be
9 planting 19 trees there.

10 So some good things are happening.
11 And if you can join us, we'd be glad to have
12 you at 10:00 on the 28th at Pine Tree Park.

13 I'll give it to Jim Jenkins, and he's
14 going to talk further.

15 MR. JENKINS: Thank you. I'm Jim
16 Jenkins. I've been on this committee almost
17 since it started, as well.

18 Tree City USA program was founded in
19 1976 to celebrate towns and cities committed
20 to growing their urban canopy. It's lead by
21 the Arbor Day Foundation, along with the
22 United States Department of Agriculture Forest
23 Service and the National Association of State
24 Foresters.

25 There's over 3,600 communities that

1 have been helped by the Tree City USA program.
2 To get this certification you have to go above
3 and beyond in a lot of different areas, things
4 that we've already done, the inventorying,
5 committing time and money to maintenance of
6 the trees and upkeep of trees and watching out
7 for any trees that are dangerous, and having
8 them removed by the municipal workers and so
9 forth.

10 We also involve volunteers in some
11 of the things that we do. And it's a really
12 great thing.

13 The most important standards, there's
14 four of them, to become a -- for recognition:

15 You have to form a tree board or a
16 department, which we did several years ago;

17 Establish a tree care ordinance.

18 That was one of the first things that we
19 worked on three for four years ago;

20 Maintain a community forestry
21 program, where you're seriously spending money
22 on the trees and maintaining them, which is
23 something that the Borough has taken on to do;

24 And then you have to every year
25 proclaim and observe Arbor Day.

1 And as you heard everybody say, we're
2 doing an Arbor Day planting. We're also doing
3 a planting the week before. And also,
4 tomorrow morning, there's going to be a small
5 tree planting up at the high school. 50 trees
6 will be planted along Church Road.

7 The Environmental Club is going to
8 be doing that, along with the people from Tree
9 Pittsburgh. Tree Pittsburgh is an
10 organization that a number of years ago we
11 reached out to, and they decided to help out
12 in Bethel. And they -- their goal is to plant
13 one tree per child.

14 And so we've done a lot of small tree
15 plantings at some different schools that
16 they've been involved with, along with the
17 children. It's a great thing. It's good to
18 get the kids outside and get them involved in
19 things that are outside and make the community
20 look better with the trees and so forth.

21 (Applause.)

22 MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you very much.

23 I know you guys worked hard at it, so
24 you certainly deserve that. And then, of
25 course, we'll have our sign to go up. Okay.

1 Thank you. Photo time.

2 (Brief pause.)

3 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. Next on the
4 agenda, we present over the last 10 years
5 people that make Bethel Park a better place to
6 live. We've done different civic groups,
7 different athletic groups. But tonight, to
8 me, it's special.

9 I mean, they all are, but this one's
10 special to me because Nino a Pitt graduate,
11 and so am I, and that's why it's special.

12 So if I can have Nino and his parents
13 come up.

14 Okay. For those who don't know Nino
15 Bonaccorsi, I don't understand who that would
16 be, but... So this is a Proclamation for Nino
17 Bonaccorsi Day, and that's April 15, 2023.

18 Whereas, Nino Bonaccorsi won the NCAA
19 National Championship at the BOK Center in
20 Tulsa on Saturday March 14; and

21 Whereas, Nino Bonaccorsi is the first
22 Pittsburgh Panther wrestler to win a National
23 Championship since 2008; and

24 Whereas, Nino had a 21-0 season
25 including the NCAA tournament wins making him

1 only the eighth Pittsburgh Panther to wrestle
2 and to finish undefeated; and

3 Whereas, Nino was a three-time
4 Champion ACC, a three-time All American, and a
5 member of the U.S. Junior National Team that
6 traveled to Serbia to compete in the Under 23
7 World Championship; and

8 Whereas, Nino Bonaccorsi, at Bethel
9 Park High School, posted a 147-21 record, and
10 finished his high school career and ranked
11 second in the country.

12 He was a two-time PIAA runner-up at
13 Hershey, a two-time WPIAL champion, and a
14 FloNationals and Powerade winner.

15 Now, therefore, I, Jack Allen, the
16 Mayor of Bethel Park, Pennsylvania, do hereby
17 proclaim April 15th to be Nino Bonaccorsi Day.

18 And I urge each individual in the
19 community to congratulate and recognize the
20 outstanding achievements of this young man.

21 (Applause.)

22 MR. BONACCORSI: Thanks, everybody.
23 Thanks to the community. I first want to
24 start off by saying thanks to Bethel Park as a
25 whole. You know, throughout my whole season

1 and tournament, I really felt the love and
2 support from everyone. It really didn't go
3 unnoticed.

4 And, you know, it's nice -- you know,
5 a seven-minute match on Saturday to win
6 Nationals was great, but, you know, this was a
7 20-year process, and I couldn't have done it
8 without these two on my right.

9 So, thank you, everyone. And, you
10 know, I'm just very grateful.

11 (Applause.)

12 MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you.

13 MR. BONACCORSI: Thank you.

14 MAYOR ALLEN: Oh, picture time.

15 (Brief pause.)

16 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. And finally,
17 winding down, I just wanted to mention that
18 May 2nd is our first Farmer's Market in South
19 Park.

20 And our Spring Clean-Up is April
21 22nd. We're still looking for people to sign
22 up for that. Call Janet Davin at Extension
23 211.

24 And that's my report tonight. Sorry
25 it took so long.

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: No problem, Mayor.
2 Thank you very much.

3 Okay. At this time, I would like to

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
