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PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. I'd like to call to order the Regular Council Meeting of May 8, 2023.

Chief O'Connor, would you please call the roll.

CHIEF O'CONNOR: Dr. Campbell?

DR. CAMPBELL: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Cenci?

MR. CENCI: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Consolmagno?

MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Espinar?

MR. ESPINAR: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Ms. Flinn?

MS. FLINN: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Janosik?

MR. JANOSIK: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Moury?

PRESIDENT MOURY: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. Oakes?

MR. OAKES: Here.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Mr. O'Brien?

1 MR. O'BRIEN: Present.

2 PRESIDENT MOURY: All nine members
3 present.

4 Before we stand for the Pledge, I
5 would like to ask everybody for a moment of
6 silence, as we lost a good friend in Bethel
7 Park, Jim Boyle.

8 Jim served on the Bethel Park
9 Municipal Authority for more than 25 years.
10 In the last number of years, he actually acted
11 as the chairman. We lost him just two short
12 weeks ago.

13 So following the Pledge, I would ask
14 everybody remain standing for a moment of
15 silence in Jim's memory.

16 At this time, can we stand for the
17 Pledge of Allegiance.

18 - - -

19 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance
20 was recited, and a moment of silence took
21 place.)

22 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you.

23 Okay. At this time, I would like to
24 turn to Chair Announcements.

25 Executive Session of Council was

1 conducted on April 18, 2023 for manager
2 interviews.

3 Executive Session of Council was
4 conducted on April 24, for pers- -- 2023 for
5 personnel matters and legal issues.

6 And Executive Session of Council was
7 conducted tonight, before we came out, May 8,
8 2023 for personnel and legal issues.

9 I also wanted to update the community
10 on the status, not that we don't enjoy Chief
11 O'Connor as Acting Manager, but hopefully
12 we're in the final stages and we'll be able to
13 announce in the near future the next Bethel
14 Park Municipal Manager. So that will be
15 upcoming over the next, hopefully, month or
16 so.

17 At this time, I would like to turn to
18 the Reports of the Officials; and the Library
19 Director's Report.

20 MS. McINTOSH: Good evening,
21 everyone. My name is Christine. I'm the
22 Director of your Public Library, where we
23 provide opportunities to explore, learn,
24 create, and connect. I just have a few things
25 tonight.

1 First, I wanted to let everyone know
2 that all the student library cards are
3 distributed to students at IMS and at the high
4 school. This is a partnership that we have
5 with the school district to try and get the
6 kids to have more resources available to them
7 for education and for recreation.

8 Very exciting news, patron pick-up
9 lockers and self-check kiosk are going to be
10 installed at the Library by the end of May.
11 They have will be live as of June 5. We have
12 to do some training for our staff.

13 So with the patron pick-up lockers,
14 if you can't get to the Library during the 48
15 hours that we're open every week, you can come
16 at your convenience to pick up items from a
17 locker. And they'll be located at the top of
18 the ramp above the Library courtyard.

19 And self-check kiosk will be able for
20 those who prefer to check out their own items,
21 or if you just don't feel like talking to us
22 that day. And don't worry, your favorite
23 library desk workers will still have jobs. We
24 have plenty of things to do.

25 And not everyone -- we're not going

1 to be Walmart. You're not going to have to
2 check yourself out all the time.

3 Summer Learning for birth through
4 high school begins Saturday, June 3. You can
5 stop by between 11:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. out
6 in the courtyard for the Summer Learning
7 kickoff. We'll have a lot of fun activities.
8 And you can sign up for the Summer Learning
9 program and all of our free classes for the
10 summer.

11 Summer Reading for Adults begins
12 June 5 and continues through July 30. To
13 submit an entry for every book you read or
14 listen to for a chance at a weekly drawing for
15 a \$25 gift card. All participants will be
16 entered into the grand prize drawing for an
17 Amazon Fire Tablet that will take place August
18 1st.

19 The Library will be closed on Sunday,
20 May 28 and Monday, May 29 for the Memorial Day
21 holiday. And then the Library will be closed
22 on Sundays for the summer until after Labor
23 Day.

24 So, that is all I have.

25 PRESIDENT MOURY: Any questions from

1 Council?

2 (No response.)

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
4 much.

5 MS. McINTOSH: Thank you.

6 PRESIDENT MOURY: At this time, could
7 we turn to the Police Chief's Report; and
8 Chief O'Connor.

9 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Good evening,
10 Mr. Mayor, Council.

11 Do you mean I might not have to do
12 this anymore? Is that what you're alluding
13 to?

14 PRESIDENT MOURY: I -- maybe.

15 CHIEF O'CONNOR: I'm going to hold
16 you to that.

17 PRESIDENT MOURY: You look good --
18 you look good in a suit.

19 CHIEF O'CONNOR: No, I don't. I'm
20 not like these guys that get their suits at
21 Brooks Brothers, I'll tell you that.

22 MR. O'BRIEN: Men's Warehouse.

23 CHIEF O'CONNOR: This is lace-curtain
24 Irish guys. That ain't me. I used to get my
25 stuff in Gimbels basement.

1 All right. Before I get started,
2 Mike, why don't you come up here with me.

3 We have a special guest tonight.
4 This is Mr. Mike Rizzo, PE. He is the new
5 Municipal Engineer. So he just came on board
6 a week ago. He's got his work cut out for
7 him. And we are so glad that he is here.

8 So thank you for coming.

9 MR. RIZZO: Thank you guys for having
10 me.

11 (Applause.)

12 PRESIDENT MOURY: Now, Manager
13 O'Connor, did you tell him he had to give a
14 ten-minute speech?

15 CHIEF O'CONNOR: I did not.

16 MR. RIZZO: The best I can do is
17 five.

18 CHIEF O'CONNOR: It's too hot in
19 here.

20 All right. On a more somber note --
21 on a more somber note, on May the 15th is
22 Police Memorial Day. Police Memorial Day came
23 about from an order by President Kennedy in
24 1962. So every May the 15th, we honor the
25 fallen.

1 The morning of May 15 -- Monday,
2 May the 15th, here at BPPD, we believe, at
3 9:00 a.m., we will be doing our annual wreath
4 laying ceremony.

5 We're a little tentative on the time
6 because we're trying to get a piper. But we
7 believe it will be 9:00 a.m. Everybody is
8 invited.

9 As of today, line-of-duty deaths in
10 the United States of officers is 36th,
11 line-of-duty deaths. 17 of those were killed
12 by gunfire, including, sadly, two in Allegheny
13 County at the beginning of this year.

14 So we will honor all fallen at
15 9:00 a.m., Monday the 15th, in front of the
16 Police Memorial at the entrance to the police
17 station, lower -- lower parking lot in the
18 Municipal Building.

19 Then on June the 5th, keep this date
20 open, June the 5th, we are having an open
21 house here at BPPD. So we won't have a Crime
22 Watch meeting that night. Come here Monday,
23 7:00 p.m., June the 5th for the open house.

24 You can see our new equipment, meet
25 the officers. You can even ask me questions.

1 We may even be -- something tells me we're
2 going to demonstrate some of our new equipment
3 that night. I believe so.

4 So no Crime Watch meeting on the 5th.
5 Police Memorial Day on the 15th. I also think
6 we're going to be hearing something more about
7 this shortly, too.

8 So, ciao. Questions?

9 PRESIDENT MOURY: Any questions?

10 (No response.)

11 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, could
12 we turn to the Fire Chief's Report.

13 Now, are you going to be doing the
14 Manager's Report, too, sir?

15 MR. McGOUGH: I'm sorry?

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: (Indicating.)

17 CHIEF O'CONNOR: I will be coming
18 back up, I think --

19 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay.

20 CHIEF O'CONNOR: -- for a
21 proclamation.

22 MR. McGOUGH: He likes the long walk
23 around the desk.

24 Good evening. My name's Steve
25 McGough. I'm a lieutenant with the Bethel

1 Park Volunteer Fire Company. I'm here to read
2 the Chief's Report for last month.

3 So on April 2023, we reported four
4 structure fires, we had one cooking fire, a
5 Dumpster fire, one vehicle fire, four mulch
6 fires, one piece of yard equipment on fire, we
7 assisted the EMS once, we had five gas leaks,
8 reported six electrical problems, two smoke
9 investigations, one animal rescue. So, yeah,
10 we actually do rescue cats sometimes. We had
11 assist police three times, seven good intent
12 calls, ten fire alarms, and also two carbon
13 monoxide conditions, for a total of 49 calls
14 for the month of April.

15 So in terms of a fire prevention tip.
16 As the weather warms up, we're going to start
17 using our grills a little bit. So a couple
18 practical things you can do before you go up
19 and fire -- go ahead and fire up your grill
20 for the year is, first off, just check it
21 over, give it a general once-over, look at the
22 gas lines, see if there are any cracks or
23 brakes or anything.

24 Certainly, if you smell any gas,
25 don't use it. Leaks or breaks in gas lines

1 were a factor in 11 percent of grill fires
2 that cause structure fires, and 23 percent of
3 the outside unclassified grill fires.

4 Make sure the grill's clean. Up to
5 20 percent of the fires that did end up
6 setting structures on fire were caused by
7 excessive amounts of grease and other things
8 that can burn left in the grill. So make sure
9 it's clean.

10 Another practical thing you can do is
11 to make sure it's far enough away from your
12 home or any other items that might catch on
13 fire being near the grill.

14 One thing you have to be really
15 careful with is, especially if you have vinyl
16 siding, you want to make certain that the
17 grill is far enough away from it so that it
18 doesn't melt or potentially ignite that vinyl,
19 which is a petroleum product, and it will go
20 up pretty quickly, so...

21 And it says here gas grills
22 contribute to a higher number of home fires
23 overall than their charcoal counterparts. So
24 those of you that like to use charcoal, good
25 for you. There you go.

1 Two things that we like to talk about
2 any time we have an audience, number one, is
3 volunteerism. Of course, Bethel Park
4 Volunteer Fire Company is 100 percent
5 volunteer. We respond to nearly 600 fire
6 calls over the past -- each year over the past
7 couple years.

8 We are fortunate that we do have a
9 pretty healthy crew. We have two folks up at
10 our meeting up the street right now that are
11 enlisting one woman and one young man.

12 So if you don't think that you fit
13 the role of firefighter, you'd be surprised
14 all the different roles that people hold in
15 our firehouse, different ages. Obviously, men
16 and women are welcome.

17 And if it's something you've ever
18 been curious about, if you're a mom or a dad
19 that has, I don't know, a son or daughter
20 that's 18 or older that needs to learn a
21 little something about discipline or working,
22 send them our way.

23 A little bit before Monday -- I'm
24 sorry -- a little bit before 7:00 any Monday
25 night would be great. That's when we have our

1 drills. And we'd be happy to talk to and
2 educate anybody on anything that they need to
3 know.

4 And the other thing that we're going
5 to talk about is our second mailer for the
6 year requesting donations did go out. We're
7 very grateful in the Fire Company for the
8 mutually beneficial levy that exists between
9 -- that puts a roof over the firefighters'
10 heads.

11 Like I said, we had 600 fire calls --
12 nearly 600 fire calls last year. So every
13 minute that is volunteered, every minute
14 that's given up is a minute that somebody,
15 like, has given up from something else they
16 needed to do.

17 We're not there struggling, holding
18 fish fries to patch a hole in the roof. We're
19 able to know that we have a home that's in
20 good solid condition.

21 However, generally speaking, if you
22 turn the firehouse upside down, anything that
23 falls out the Fire Company is responsible for
24 purchasing. The apparatus we have are very
25 experience. For instance, we're replacing a

1 30-year-old piece of equipment here, and
2 we're looking at over \$800,000 for a
3 reasonably-priced pumper engine. So
4 everything is quite expensive.

5 So if you donated, we thank you very
6 much. The community's very generous. If you
7 haven't and you got that second mailer, please
8 consider donating. There's multiple ways to
9 do so. If you go to our website, you can
10 check it out.

11 You know, oftentimes, Council
12 President Moury chimes in with a little bit of
13 a commercial for us because he has a very
14 intimate understanding of the financial aspect
15 behind the agreement between the Fire Company
16 and the Municipality.

17 So, again, we are greatly
18 appreciative to the Council. We're greatly
19 appreciative to all the members in the
20 community that donate.

21 And, also, we're hoping that, as I
22 know -- I hear that we have some longstanding
23 members that are retiring, we're moving on to
24 greener pastures -- or, maybe not greener, but
25 different colored pastures, we'll call them,

1 right -- but, hopefully, current
2 Councilmembers that don't have a solid
3 understanding of the relationship, we'd be
4 happy to help you understand it. And it is --
5 it's very important.

6 So thank you very much.

7 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you.

8 Any questions from Council?

9 (No response.)

10 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, can
11 we turn to the Mayor's Report; and Mayor
12 Allen.

13 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: I don't have a
14 question. But on my Public Works, I do have
15 a new Clifton Fire Station roof. So this is
16 a very important aspect of the fire
17 departments, so...

18 I don't want to hear any trouble from
19 you, Mr. Moury. Thank you.

20 MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you, Mr. Moury,
21 Joe.

22 Okay. Well, it seems like May is
23 recognition month. So I have three
24 proclamations this evening.

25 The first one is the 2023 Emergency

1 Management Service Week. And it's to
2 designate the week of May 21st to 27th as EMS
3 Services Week.

4 And if we have a couple
5 representatives from Tri-Community, please
6 come up.

7 Thank you for being here, number one.
8 So the proclamation is:

9 Whereas, emergency medical service is
10 a vital public service and the members are
11 ready to provide compassionate, lifesaving
12 care to those in need 24 hours a day, seven
13 days a week; and

14 Whereas, access to quality emergency
15 care dramatically improves the survival and
16 recovery rate of those who experience sudden
17 illness or injury; and

18 Whereas, the emergency medical
19 service system consists of first responders,
20 emergency medical technicians, paramedics,
21 emergency medical dispatchers, firefighters,
22 police officers, educators, administrators,
23 pre-hospital nurses, emergency nurses,
24 emergency physicians, trained members of the
25 public, and other out of hospital medical care

1 providers; and

2 Whereas, it's appropriate to
3 recognize the value and the accomplishments of
4 emergency medical service providers.

5 Therefore, I, Mayor Jack Allen, as
6 Mayor of the Municipality of Bethel Park, do
7 hereby proclaim the week of May 21st through
8 the 27th, 2023 as Emergency Medical Services
9 Week with the theme "Where Emergency Care
10 Begins."

11 The community encouraged to recognize
12 the value and accomplishments of all these
13 involved in Emergency Medical Services Week as
14 a vital public service; and

15 That the Council of the Municipality
16 of Bethel Park wishes to specifically
17 recognize Tri-Community South EMS for its
18 superior service to Bethel Park and the entire
19 South Hills.

20 The print's a little small there,
21 that's why I have a cheat sheet.

22 Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 MAYOR ALLEN: Do you want to say a
25 few words?

1 MR. MORSE: Again, thank you. My
2 name is Keith Morse. I am the new chief of
3 Tri-Community South EMS. Thanks again for the
4 proclamation and the support that we receive
5 from all the Municipalities we serve.

6 I'm very happy to be a leader of a
7 great organization made up of great folks that
8 make up Tri-Community South EMS. It's a week
9 that's very important to us where we are
10 celebrated. And it is a great honor to be,
11 again, here tonight. Thank you.

12 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. Thank you very
13 much. And thank you for all of you do.

14 (Applause.)

15 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay, Chief.

16 The Chief's actually going to accept
17 two proclamations.

18 So this is a proclamation to
19 designate the week of May 14th to May 20, 2023
20 Bethel Park National Memorial Week.

21 The Chief mentioned that, Whereas, in
22 1962, President John F. Kennedy signed a
23 proclamation which designated May 15th as
24 Peace Officers Memorial Day and the week in
25 which that date falls as a National Police

1 Memorial Week; and

2 Whereas, our law enforcement officers
3 are the guardians of life and prosperity;
4 defenders of the individual right to be free;
5 warriors in the battle against crime; and are
6 dedicated to the preservation of life and
7 property; and

8 Whereas, the Municipality of Bethel
9 Park honors the valor, service, and dedication
10 of all Police Officers, and publically salutes
11 the service of each and every one of our own
12 Bethel Park Police Officers;

13 Whereas, in appreciation of the
14 outstanding efforts of our Bethel Park Law
15 Enforcement, it is appropriate to recognize
16 the value and accomplishments of the Bethel
17 Park Police Department by designating National
18 Police Memorial Week;

19 Now, therefore, I, Mayor Jack Allen,
20 do hereby proclaim the week of May 14th to
21 May 20, 2023 as National Police Memorial Week.

22 And I encourage the community to
23 observe this week with appropriate programs,
24 ceremonies, and activities.

25 So thank you, Chief. Thank you for

1 your service.

2 (Applause.)

3 MAYOR ALLEN: Public Works.

4 PRESIDENT MOURY: I think this is the
5 award for spending the most money, just for
6 the record.

7 MAYOR ALLEN: You know what, it says
8 that right here.

9 CHIEF O'CONNOR: No respect.

10 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: I know.

11 MAYOR ALLEN: It's the first line,
12 who can spend the most money.

13 MR. O'BRIEN: With no respect.

14 MAYOR ALLEN: Yeah.

15 This is to designate the week
16 May 21st to the 27th as National Public Works
17 Week.

18 And what it does is it acknowledges
19 the help that the -- our Public Works give all
20 of our citizens. They do outstanding work.
21 They go above and beyond what they need to do.
22 And this is the week that we're to recognize
23 them.

24 So, Joe, I'll give you their
25 proclamation since you're in charge of that.

1 So thank you very much.

2 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Thank you.

3 (Applause.)

4 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. Just a few
5 items. We're getting ready for Trolley
6 Beautification. We probably have about eight
7 or nine beds. Some of them need claimed.

8 So if you know of anybody that wants
9 to take over one of our beds, there's one in
10 front of the Municipal Building, they're up
11 and down Brightwood Road, please call Janet at
12 412-831-6800, Extension 211 so we can use your
13 help.

14 I also want to thank all the people
15 that volunteered on our Spring Cleanup. They
16 did a great job. They spent their Saturdays
17 when they had other things to do. But they
18 did help and did a great job this year, as
19 they usually do.

20 Farmer's Market started last Tuesday.
21 And that will run through -- it will run
22 through September. So if you haven't been
23 there, we keep going up. It was number --
24 voted No. 3 a couple years ago. I believe
25 No. 2 last year. So with your support, we'll

1 get that No. 1 spot.

2 Speaking of Public Works. On Sunday,
3 May 21st, we have the Annual Touch-A-Truck.
4 That's over at the Public Works Complex. It's
5 from 12:00 to 3:00.

6 They have 40 tons of play sand over
7 there. And what happens is the little kids,
8 they dig through it. And what's left over
9 we'll put in the playground. But they dig
10 through it and they get prizes from different
11 vendors in the community. So that's a great
12 thing.

13 We're at the beginning of May. But
14 I'd be remiss if I didn't mention our Memorial
15 Day celebration. We kick off our ceremony
16 here at the Municipal Building at 8:00,
17 followed by the parade at 9:00. And then we
18 have our ceremony in the cemetery, and that
19 usually starts around 10:00.

20 So if you have any groups that may
21 want to march in the parade, again, get ahold
22 of Janet Davin, 412-831-6800, Extension 211.

23 And then also, preparing for Memorial
24 Day, Mark, Tim, and the committee, they
25 cleaned the Memorial out front. They scrub it

1 down. They paint the lines. They're looking
2 for help.

3 So if you can help to clean the
4 Memorial, that's May 20th, and that is at 9:00
5 in the morning. So if you're interested, call
6 Janet. Janet's going to be a very busy
7 person. But just call Janet.

8 And that's all I have.

9 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
10 much, Mayor.

11 Okay. At this time, can we turn to
12 the Approval of the Bills and Payrolls; and
13 Mr. O'Brien.

14 MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you, Mr. Moury.
15 Bill List 050823.

16 I move that we approve Bill List
17 050823 in the amount of \$2,450,149.82.

18 DR. CAMPBELL: Second.

19 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion
20 by Mr. O'Brien and second by Dr. Campbell that
21 we approve Bill List No. 050823 in the amount
22 of \$2,450,149.82.

23 Any discussion of this item?

24 (No response.)

25 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, Chief

1 O'Connor, would you please call the roll.

2 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Dr. Campbell?

3 DR. CAMPBELL: Yes.

4 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Cenci?

5 MR. CENCI: Yes.

6 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Consolmagno?

7 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Yes.

8 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Espinar?

9 MR. ESPINAR: Yes.

10 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Ms. Flinn?

11 MS. FLINN: Yes.

12 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Janosik?

13 MR. JANOSIK: Yes.

14 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Moury?

15 PRESIDENT MOURY: Yes.

16 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Oakes?

17 MR. OAKES: Yes.

18 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. O'Brien?

19 MR. O'BRIEN: That's a yes.

20 PRESIDENT MOURY: Motion passes 9 to
21 0.

22 At this time, I'd like to turn to
23 the Residents' Comment Section for non-agenda
24 items.

25 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Mr. Moury?

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: Yes,
2 Mr. Consolmagno.

3 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: I would just like
4 to have the privilege tonight to announce on
5 June 6, 2023 in the Hershey, PA, the PSAB,
6 which is the Pennsylvania State Association of
7 Boroughs, will be awarding the Councilmember
8 of the Year to the 32-year Councilman from
9 Ward 6, my dear friend and fellow Councilman,
10 Mr. Mark O'Brien.

11 (Applause.)

12 MR. O'BRIEN: You know, I'm -- I'm
13 kind of speechless and humbled by this award.
14 But it doesn't come for just me. It comes
15 with a lot of people before me.

16 When I first came here, there was
17 people throwing daggers at each other, people
18 going after other people's jobs. And it was
19 just -- it was just a real difficult place to
20 govern.

21 And through some efforts of some
22 really good people, Mr. Moury, who -- he
23 changed the character, the moral character,
24 the character in which we govern, the
25 character in which we talk to each other, how

1 we -- how we do things, how we include
2 everyone, how we mold things to make sure
3 everyone's okay with the way we're going.

4 And sometimes it's a process. And
5 sometimes it takes time. But we have ten
6 people that are all leaders and want to lead.
7 And it takes a special person to lead leaders.

8 Mr. Moury has made that atmosphere
9 that allowed all of us -- all of us to succeed
10 and build this community in a way that none of
11 us ever imagined that we could.

12 If you look back and look at all the
13 accomplishments, not just by me, by all of us,
14 there are many. They're large. They're huge.
15 In comparison to other communities, you know,
16 we were known as a place of governing, not
17 just government, because we did it in a way
18 that this country seems to have lost its way.

19 You can look at all of us and you may
20 guess our registrations, who's Democrats and
21 Republicans. I imagine you might get them
22 wrong, because we're one body.

23 We've learned to take all our --
24 maybe our differences, political differences,
25 and put them aside and learn to work together

1 and become friends. And it's just been such a
2 joy.

3 And this award -- and I'd like to get
4 -- I'd like to see a copy of the application
5 because that person probably should be
6 nominated for an Emmy or an Oscar. For them
7 to pick me out of all the applications is just
8 humbling.

9 And, you know, all the characters
10 that came before us, Tim, all the Council that
11 are no longer even here on this earth and
12 others who are not here because they chose to
13 move on, the list is long and the list is
14 wonderful.

15 So I thank you for that, Joe. I
16 thank you. I thank for whoever played a part
17 in nominating me. I will be there to accept
18 that award. I'm very humbled by it.

19 And I just want to say thanks to
20 Mr. Moury.

21 And Jack would -- Jack was here when
22 we started this war. This war was going on.
23 And he had this bold idea to build this
24 Memorial that he was passionate about.

25 And he reached across the table and

1 he asked people on both sides to be a part of
2 it. And that helped, too, to get to know each
3 other. There's a lot of healing that went on.

4 I ask everyone who follows us to
5 remember where we were, to remember where we
6 worked to get. It's not easy, but it can be
7 done.

8 Thank you, Mr. Consolmagno.

9 (Applause.)

10 PRESIDENT MOURY: You are, in fact,
11 the senior statesman up here. Do you realize
12 that?

13 MR. O'BRIEN: Oh, wow. No, my
14 granddaughter is the senior statesman. She's
15 the one.

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: And for those who
17 we work with here, there's always a backstory.
18 So we'll leave it at that.

19 Congratulations, Mark, and thank
20 you.

21 MR. O'BRIEN: Sure. Thank you, Tim.

22 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. At this
23 time, can we turn to General Policy and
24 Finance; and Dr. Campbell.

25 DR. CAMPBELL: Sure. Mr. President,

1 I have just three items under General Policy
2 and Finance.

3 The first item is 2023 Fireworks
4 Contract.

5 I move that we approve the
6 Celebration Fireworks contract for \$30,000 to
7 provide the fireworks for the 2023 Summer
8 Spectacular.

9 MR. OAKES: Second.

10 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion
11 by Dr. Campbell and second by Mr. Oakes that
12 we approve the Celebration Fireworks contract
13 for \$30,000 to provide the fireworks for the
14 2023 Summer Spectacular.

15 Any discussion of this item?

16 DR. CAMPBELL: Mr. Moury?

17 PRESIDENT MOURY: Dr. Campbell.

18 DR. CAMPBELL: That's 90 cents per
19 resident.

20 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay.

21 Any other discussion?

22 (No response.)

23 PRESIDENT MOURY: Chief O'Connor,
24 would you please call the roll.

25 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Dr. Campbell?

1 DR. CAMPBELL: Yes.

25 MR. OAKES: Second.

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion
2 by Dr. Campbell, second by Mr. Oakes that we
3 approve the purchase of an under-the-counter
4 freezer from Fountain Products in the amount
5 of \$1,095.

6 Any discussion of this item?

7 (No response.)

8 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, Chief
9 O'Connor, would you please call the roll.

10 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Dr. Campbell?

11 DR. CAMPBELL: Yes.

12 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Cenci?

13 MR. CENCI: Yes.

14 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Consolmagno?

15 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Yes.

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: Motion passes 9 to
4 0.

5 Dr. Campbell.

6 DR. CAMPBELL: The third item, the
7 final item, Mr. President, is the Mollenauer
8 Properties for Eminent Domain.

9 I move that we approve moving forward
10 with the eminent domain for the properties
11 317-F-208, 317-F-204, 317-F-147.

12 MR. OAKES: Second.

13 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion
14 by Dr. Campbell and second by Mr. Oakes that
15 we approve moving forward with eminent domain
16 for properties 317-F-208, 317-F-205 -- excuse
17 me -- -204, 317-F-147.

18 Any discussion of this item?

19 DR. CAMPBELL: Mr. President?

20 PRESIDENT MOURY: Dr. Campbell.

21 DR. CAMPBELL: Whenever you hear
22 eminent domain, it raises people's eyebrows.
23 I shared last month that the Municipality has
24 no desire to get into the business of owning
25 property.

1 These three properties are in the
2 Mollenauer area. They're vacant lots. And
3 they've been vacant for quite some time.
4 We've been doing our due diligence trying to
5 find the original owners.

6 One of these properties was sold in
7 1949. Some of the properties are just -- we
8 know that they're -- the original owners have
9 passed and the heirs have passed. So in this
10 case, we've been doing our due diligence in
11 trying to locate these individuals, and we're
12 not having much luck.

13 We'd like to do what we can and
14 continue our work with cleaning up the tax
15 rolls. So, and that's what this is to do,
16 take that off the tax rolls.

17 And there's a quite of bit of cost
18 involved in taxing and lienning these
19 properties every year, when we know we're
20 never going to recue (phonetic) anything.
21 And it also impacts our finances. And then we
22 -- this looks like it's supposed to be income
23 for the Municipality on our books, and it is
24 not. So that's the purpose of proceeding with
25 this.

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,
2 Dr. Campbell.

3 Any other discussion?

4 (No response.)

5 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, Chief
6 O'Connor, would you please call the roll.

7 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Dr. Campbell?

8 DR. CAMPBELL: Yes.

9 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Cenci?

10 MR. CENCI: Yes.

11 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Consolmagno?

12 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Yes.

13 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Espinar?

14 MR. ESPINAR: Yes.

15 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Ms. Flinn?

16 MS. FLINN: Yes.

2 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. O'Brien.

3 MR. O'BRIEN: Yes.

4 PRESIDENT MOURY: How dare I forget
5 you.

6 Motion -- is it okay?

7 MR. O'BRIEN: Yes, that's fine.

8 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. Motion
9 passes 9 to 0.

10 Dr. Campbell.

11 DR. CAMPBELL: I have nothing
12 else under General Policy and Finance,
13 Mr. President.

14 PRESIDENT MOURY: Are there any
15 additional items?

16 (No response.)

17 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, can
18 we turn to Health, Safety and Welfare; and
19 Mr. Cenci.

20 MR. CENCI: Mr. Moury, I have no
21 items under Health, Safety and Welfare this
22 month.

23 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
24 much, Mr. Cenci.

25 Any other additional items?

1 (No response.)

2 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, can

2 Pennsylvania Department of Health's Walk Works
3 Program.

4 MS. FLINN: Second.

5 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion
6 by Mr. Janosik, second by Ms. Flinn that we
7 approve Resolution No. R5-8-23A to apply for
8 the \$25,000 grant, and submit the grant
9 application to the Pennsylvania Department of
10 Health's Walk Works Program.

11 Any discussion of this item?

12 MR. JANOSIK: Mr. President?

13 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Janosik.

14 MR. JANOSIK: Yeah, real quick. This
15 is just an application for \$25,000 that we're
16 going to use to help develop a community-wide
17 Active Transportation Plan.

19 Mr. Janosik.

20 MR. JANOSIK: Item C under Planning
21 and Zoning, the GTRP Grant Resolution, Drake
22 Trail Construction.

23 I move that we approve Resolution
24 No. R5-8-23B, and approve of submission of the
25 grant application to DCED.

1 MS. FLINN: Second.

2 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion
3 by Mr. Janosik, second by Ms. Flinn that we
4 approve Resolution No. R5-8-23B, and approve
5 of submission of the grant application to
6 DCED.

7 I'll briefly talk about this. We've
8 applied for a grant before. This is the
9 former Drake spur that starts at where the
10 Evalee, formerly the Dorchester apartments,
11 runs over to McMurray Road, where the Drake
12 Loop used to be, when I was a kid. I think
13 Mr. O'Brien rode it the last time.

14 MR. O'BRIEN: I did ride the last
15 trolley. You're right, I did.

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: That's another
17 backstory.

18 MR. O'BRIEN: Yeah.

19 PRESIDENT MOURY: But, anyhow, we
20 did a grant, and we are currently doing a
21 budget as trial design. The cool thing about
22 this, we're working with the Port Authority,
23 which is the owner of the property. We're
24 working on a long-term lease.

25 And we're doing this jointly. And

1 Upper St. Clair Township is going to be
2 passing a similar resolution to apply for a
3 grant to do the project. Two-thirds in
4 Bethel, one-third is in Upper St. Clair. And
5 the goal is long-term to potentially connect
6 this to McMurray Road and into the St. Clair
7 system. That's their long-term strategy.

8 Diana Alberta is kind of spearheading
9 the grant application. We appreciate all the
10 work. We got the preliminary numbers in,
11 which we're going to use.

12 It's a project we've been working on
13 for probably five years now. One, it started
14 as a concept by a residential, and it's kind
15 of grown into. Nothing happens quickly.

16 But the Port Authority has given us
17 an indication that they want to do this. They
18 need to maintain the property. But we're
19 looking to get a long-term lease to turn it
20 into a walking trial.

21 Any other discussion?

22 MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Chairman?

23 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. O'Brien.

24 MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Moury is very
25 humble. This was his brainchild. He came up

1 with this.

2 PRESIDENT MOURY: Only if it's good.
3 If it turns out nice, it was me.

4 MR. O'BRIEN: It's beautiful. If
5 you -- if you know where this is at. This was
6 his concept. And Jimmy McClain, they kind of
7 worked together on this.

8 And even -- and I'm not sure how he
9 did it, but even sold the idea to
10 Upper St. Clair. And they agreed on something
11 that we proposed. And maybe it will go
12 through.

13 But if you're over that way, it's
14 just simply a beautiful place. And this old
15 line --

16 And I did ride the trolley, the last
17 trolly, you're right. It was very sad. But
18 it was nice.

19 But, yeah, this would be something
20 that can last for this community for a very
21 long time in a very prestigious part, an
22 older part of Bethel Park that has great
23 history.

24 So I'd like to thank Mr. Moury for
25 walking through all these different obstacles

1 and hurdles, and it still continues. So,
2 thank you.

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you.

4 And I also -- Mr. McClain was the
5 Councilmember a few years ago that helped
6 start this project. Now Mr. Espinar has been
7 activity involved in helping in the trail
8 development, and an advocate for, you know,
9 development of the trail. Because it spans
10 between -- initially in Ward 8 and into Dave's
11 Ward, so...

12 It's a great project. It's going to
13 connect us with one of our neighboring
14 communities. And, hopefully, it's a great
15 opportunity to get some grant money.

16 Any other discussion?

17 (No response.)

18 PRESIDENT MOURY: Chief O'Connor,
19 would you please call the roll.

20 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Dr. Campbell?

21 DR. CAMPBELL: Absolutely yes.

22 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Mr. Cenci?

23 MR. CENCI: Yes.

20 Gerry Harbison starts on May 15. And he's
21 been coming to the last few Planning and
22 Zoning Commission meetings. So, looking to
23 hit the ground running.

24 And that piggybacks on -- behind your
25 manager conversation. So we're moving along.

1 We're filling the positions. And it's looking
2 good.

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: Good. Thank you,
4 Mr. Janosik.

5 Are there any additional items?

6 (No response.)

7 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, can
8 we turn to Public Works and Maintenance; and
9 Mr. Consolmagno.

10 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: You got it.

11 Clifton Fire Station Roof.

12 I move that we approve the acceptance
13 of the low bid from Kalkreuth Roofing and
14 Metal for \$69,650 with funds to come from the
15 Capital Account 40-409-840.

16 MS. FLINN: Second.

17 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion
18 by Mr. Consolmagno, second by Ms. Flinn that
19 we approve the acceptance of the low bid of
20 Kalkreuth Roofing and Metal for \$69,650 with
21 funds to come from the Capital Account
22 40-409-840.

23 Any discussion of this item?

1 this money's being paid for out of the
2 dedicated tax money because, as they stated
3 earlier, when you turn the building upside
4 down, the roof should stay on. So that part
5 is owned by the Municipality. And this will
6 be funded out of the dedicated tax money.

22 voting for people to replace 32-year veteran
23 Mr. O'Brien, Mr. Moury, our president, and
24 Dr. Campbell.

25 Like Mr. O'Brien said, you come on

1 this Council and it doesn't matter what
2 political affiliation you are. We are here
3 for one reason, and that's for the Bethel Park
4 residents.

5 It's an honor to serve with these
6 gentlemen. I'm sorry to see them go. But we
7 have some big shoes to fill. So just go out
8 and vote. Thank you.

9 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
10 much.

11 Are there any additional items?

12 (No response.)

13 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, is
14 there a motion to adjourn?

15 DR. CAMPBELL: So moved.

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: Dr. Campbell.
17 Second?

18 MR. JANOSIK: Second.

19 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Janosik.
20 All in favor, say aye.

21 DR. CAMPBELL: Aye.

22 MR. CENCI: Aye.

23 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Aye.

24 MR. ESPINAR: Aye.

25 MS. FLINN: Aye.

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MR. JANOSIK: Aye.

PRESIDENT MOURY: Aye.

MR. OAKES: Aye.

MR. O'BRIEN: Aye.


