3 PRESIDENT MOURY: Okay. I'd like to
4 call to order the Regular Council Meeting of
5 October 9, 2023.

6 Ms. Denne, would you please call the
7 roll.

8 MS. DENNE: Yes.

9 Mr. Consolmagno?

10 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Here.

11 MS. DENNE: Dr. Campbell?

12 DR. CAMPBELL: Here.

13 MS. DENNE: Oh, excuse me. Dr. --
14 let me start again. I apologize.

15 Dr. Campbell?

16 DR. CAMPBELL: Still Here.

17 MS. DENNE: Mr. Cenci?

18 MR. CENCI: Here.

19 MS. DENNE: Mr. Consolmagno?

20 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: I'm here, too.

21 MS. DENNE: Mr. Espinar?

22 MR. ESPINAR: Here.

23 MS. DENNE: Ms. Flinn?

24 MS. FLINN: Here.

25 MS. DENNE: Mr. Janosik?

1 MR. JANOSIK: Here.

2 MS. DENNE: Mr. Moury?

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: Here.

4 MS. DENNE: Mr. Oakes?

5 MR. OAKES: Here.

6 MS. DENNE: Mr. O'Brien?

7 MR. O'BRIEN: Present.

8 MS. DENNE: Mayor Allen?

9 MAYOR ALLEN: Here.

10 PRESIDENT MOURY: All present.

11 Before we stand for the Pledge of
12 Allegiance, Bethel Park, last week, lost a
13 good friend and Mayor of Bethel Park, Cliff
14 Morton. I would ask following the Pledge of
15 Allegiance, if we could remain standing for a
16 moment of silence for Mayor Morton.

17 MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Moury, I guess when
18 I describe Cliff Morton, I served with him for
19 16 years, honor, duty, and country really
20 represent what he was. And over these last
21 few weeks, I found out that he also is a man
22 of God.

23 He was one of the most good-spirited
24 and happy people you'd ever meet. And one of
25 the -- and the most compromising Marine I ever

1 met. However, when he had an issue and he
2 thought it was right, he would stand up very
3 hard and proud and make us, at times, think
4 twice or reevaluate our direction.

5 I think -- at his service they put
6 out a pamphlet for his funeral. And I think
7 it says it best on the cover of that missal
8 for Cliff Morton, "Well done, oh, good and
9 faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of
10 the lord."

11 Thank you, Cliff Morton, for all that
12 you did for this wonderful town of Bethel
13 Park.

14 PRESIDENT MOURY: At this time, could
15 we stand for the Pledge of Allegiance.

16 - - -

17 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance
18 was recited, and a moment of silence took
19 place.)

20 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you.

21 Okay. At this time, I would like to
22 do -- turn to Chair Announcements.

23 Executive Session of Council was
24 conducted tonight, October 9, 2023, before we
25 came to the floor for legal issues.

1 Okay. At this time, can we turn to
2 the Reports of the Officials; and the Library
3 Director's Report.

4 MS. McINTOSH: Good evening. My name
5 is Christine. I'm the Director of your Public
6 Library, where we provide opportunities to
7 explore, learn, create, and connect.

8 First, I want to thank all the
9 individuals that donated to the Library during
10 Love Your Library Month in September. We had
11 just under \$7,500 in donations from
12 individuals.

13 Our Friends of the Library group
14 donated \$10,000 to the Library to outfit our
15 new Adult Program room, as well as refresh our
16 study rooms. And we received just over \$8,500
17 from our annual golf outing as part of the
18 Bethel Park Fantastic Four Charities.

19 So all told, we raised just over
20 \$26,000. That will qualify for a match pool
21 from the Jack Buncher Family Foundation. So
22 thank you to all that donated.

23 Construction will begin in our Adult
24 Program room in early November with an
25 expected completion date in early December.

1 This will give us another room to have
2 programs. We're always forever trying to get
3 Council Chambers. We have so much going on.

4 It's a little larger than our Youth
5 Program room. It should be able to
6 accommodate 50 to 75 people, depending on how
7 it's set up.

8 In September, the Library hosted 44
9 programs for adults. We had 544 people attend
10 62 programs and classes for youth. We had
11 1,647 in attendance. And we participate in
12 12 outreach programs with 374 people in
13 attendance.

14 The Library will close at 5:00 p.m.
15 on Tuesday, October 31st. Traditionally, it's
16 a very slow evening for us. And we like to
17 get out staff home before all the kids are out
18 on the street trick-or-treating.

19 But for more information on any of
20 our classes and programs or any of the Library
21 services, come in and visit us or check out
22 our website at bethelparklibrary.org.

23 That is all.

24 PRESIDENT MOURY: Any questions?

25 MS. McINTOSH: Thank you.

1 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Christine?

2 MS. McINTOSH: Yes.

3 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Is there an event
4 this Friday?

5 MS. McINTOSH: Oh. Thank you, Joe.
6 I would be remiss.

7 The Friends of the Library are
8 sponsoring a Yinzer event at the Library on
9 Friday the 13th, from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m.
10 Tickets are \$30 apiece. And we feature really
11 good Pittsburgh food, like haluski and stuffed
12 cabbage and Islay's chipped ham BBQ
13 sandwiches. We have raffles going on. And
14 there will be a trivia contest -- a Pittsburgh
15 trivia contest.

16 So, thanks, Joe, for reminding me.

17 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: That's what I'm
18 here for.

19 MS. McINTOSH: Thank you.

20 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
21 much.

22 At this time, can we turn to the
23 Police Chief's Report; and Chief O'Connor.

24 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Good evening,
25 Mr Mayor, Council. Hi, everybody. Chief

1 here.

2 I want to thank everybody that
3 attended our Crime Watch meeting last Monday.
4 We had a pretty good turnout.

5 Our next meeting will be November
6 the 6th, 7:00 p.m. at the Community Center.
7 Detective Gorman is working on bringing a
8 special guest in. So you don't have to listen
9 to me.

10 And then Halloween will be on
11 Tuesday, the 31st. We ask that everybody
12 that's out driving around that evening, please
13 drive carefully. Drive carefully. Be
14 cognizant of the kids that will be walking
15 around.

16 And, also, we request no smashing of
17 pumpkins. We seem to be seeing a trend in
18 people's pumpkins being smashed. So don't
19 do that. Don't be that guy that does that
20 stuff.

21 So, hope to see you at our Crime
22 Watch. And shalom.

23 Questions?

24 MR. O'BRIEN: Can I smash my own?

25 CHIEF O'CONNOR: Don't -- don't be

1 that guy. Do you want to go out of here --
2 you want to go out of here on a high note.
3 Don't be that guy.

4 Is that it? That's it.

5 PRESIDENT MOURY: Don't be in the
6 paper.

7 Okay. Thank you very much, Chief
8 O'Connor.

9 Turning to the Fire Chief's Report.

10 MR. MARK: Good evening, everyone.
11 My name is Jon Mark, Second Captain for the
12 Bethel Park Volunteer Fire Company.

13 For the month of September, we ran
14 two structure fires, one mulch fire, four gas
15 leaks, one Hazmat spill, one lift assist, one
16 water break, one animal rescue, eight good
17 intent calls, one accident with entrapment,
18 one vehicle over a hill, two electrical
19 conditions, 19 fire alarms, and three CO
20 alarms, totaling 47 calls.

21 Everyone who came yesterday, we would
22 like to thank them for attending our Open
23 House. Special thanks to Shop Save, Evey's
24 Hardware, the Bethel Park Public Library,
25 State Farm, Britney Hollick, Bethel Bakery,

1 and the School District.

2 They gave us a pallet of those wipes
3 to help pass out and distribute. They had a
4 lot of them left over from Community Day, so
5 we told them we'd help pass them out.

6 Our second mailing for the year is
7 out. So if you have not donated, please do
8 so, if you are able to.

9 Council in the past has done a great
10 job helping us where they can. But if you
11 came to our Open House, you know, a lot of
12 people ask how much it costs and everything.
13 There is a great deal of cost.

14 I think the average is about \$20,000
15 to outfit and train a firefighter. So, great
16 costs there that we have to pay for.

17 It is Fire Prevention Week this week.
18 The theme this year, as I stated last month,
19 is Cooking Safety.

20 When cooking, always stay in the
21 kitchen while using your stove. Turn off the
22 stove if you leave the room. Designate a
23 kids-free zone at least 3 feet away from the
24 stove. Always turn pot handles towards the
25 back of the stove, and use the back burners

1 whenever possible. Roll up sleeves before
2 cooking; loose-fitting clothing can catch
3 fire. Clean the stove, oven, and burners
4 regularly to prevent grease buildup. Keep
5 items that can catch on fire such as
6 dishtowels and potholders away from the stove.
7 So those are just some tips there.

8 And the last thing I have, the Chief
9 wanted me to remind -- or mention this.

10 Kristen Fonda, who is a teacher at IMS, has
11 started a club, the Be Kind Kid Club. They
12 have done an amazing job.

13 The last two months, they provided
14 us with dinner. This month was actually just
15 home-cooked, you know. I shoveled food in my
16 mouth real quick before I came here. But it
17 was delicious. And we really appreciate it.
18 She's doing a great job with that.

19 That's that.

20 PRESIDENT MOURY: Any questions?

21 (No response.)

22 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none --
23 thank you very much -- could we turn to the
24 Mayor's Report.

25 Or do we want to do the Manager's

1 Report?

2 MS. DENNE: I -- you know, wherever
3 you --

4 PRESIDENT MOURY: We'll do the
5 Manager's Report real quick.

6 MS. DENNE: Okay. I'll keep it
7 brief.

8 PRESIDENT MOURY: Even though it's
9 the most important report of the night. No
10 pressure.

11 MS. DENNE: No, no. I'm going to
12 defer that the Mayor's is.

13 But a couple just brief
14 announcements. Next week, on the 18th, from
15 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., we will be having a
16 flu clinic for free for any residents. This
17 is being put on by Bethel Park and
18 Tri-Community South Medical. Again, that's
19 at the Community Center on the 18th, from
20 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

21 There is work that's going to be
22 going on this week on Fort Couch Road. And
23 it is going to be between Donati to
24 Dorchester. And that will be down to one
25 lane. So anybody traveling that route, please

1 keep that in mind. It probably will be pretty
2 busy.

3 The best event is this month, is
4 there will be the Halloween Parade on
5 October 28th. This will be my first parade.
6 But I am quite excited to see how that goes
7 along.

8 We are going to be having changes
9 to our refuse and recycling starting in
10 January of 2024. We will be sending a flyer
11 and a newsletter to the homes. And there's
12 also information on our website that details
13 some of the changes that are going to be made.

14 But, again, we are going to try to
15 put out as many communications as we can to
16 the residents to let them know what changes
17 are coming.

18 Last month, there was a question
19 brought up by someone about if there is a way
20 to send an inquiry regarding permits. There
21 is an email. It is available on our website.
22 It is permits@bethelpark.net. So if anyone
23 has any code enforcement or permit-related
24 questions, that email again is
25 permits@bethelpark.net.

1 And the final item is that we have
2 had a demolition permit applied for for
3 Popeye's restaurant. I know that people have
4 been, you know, talking about and curious
5 about that for many years. So the demo permit
6 has been filed for that property.

7 That's all, sir.

8 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
9 much.

10 Can we turn to the Mayor's Report.
11 We hope we didn't steal your thunder.

12 MAYOR ALLEN: I'm done.

13 Okay. Thank you very much. I have
14 a few things this evening. I'll keep it
15 short.

16 As you noticed when you looked up to
17 the front, we have quite a few markers for
18 Wreaths Across America. It's going to be
19 December 16th at noon.

20 This program started three years
21 ago. It started with the Bethel Cemetery.
22 Last year, it also included Peters Creek
23 Cemetery.

24 So, Jim and Lisa Jenkins head this
25 project. So if you can let us know about what

1 we need to do to buy wreaths or whatever.

2 MR. JENKINS: Thank you, Mayor.

3 I'm Jim Jenkins. I'm here to talk
4 about Wreaths Across America.

5 It was an event that was started a
6 few years back at the National Cemeteries to
7 place wreaths on the veterans' graves to
8 remember and honor them.

9 About four years ago, at least, I
10 was out at the National Cemetery, and it was
11 when they were still doing construction. The
12 traffic was terrible. People couldn't even
13 get there. So we decided to look into doing
14 it on a more local level to make it easier for
15 people in Bethel Park to get to our cemetery
16 at Bethel Cemetery.

17 We have approached Wreaths Across
18 America and initiated the local ceremony here
19 at Bethel Cemetery. There are over 900
20 veterans' graves that we need to honor by
21 placing wreaths on this December.

22 Last year, as the Mayor said, we had
23 it at Peters Creek Baptist Church Cemetery,
24 where there are veterans dating all the way
25 back to the Revolution.

1 We have a very meaningful ceremony
2 at Bethel Cemetery on December 16th at
3 12 noon, followed by placing wreaths on the
4 graves of the veterans.

5 The Municipality's involved. The
6 wreathes get trucked in a few days earlier.
7 There's a little bit of a ceremony when the
8 wreathes are delivered.

9 And then we have this great event at
10 the cemetery. It's a family-oriented event
11 which will help to teach children about our
12 veterans. And we encourage their
13 participation in the ceremony as well to place
14 the wreaths on the graves.

15 So, Lisa can tell you a little bit
16 about that.

17 MS. JENKINS: So, I'm with the Bethel
18 Park Historical Society, who is backing us in
19 this endeavor. And so we are asking
20 individuals to sponsor wreathes. They're
21 \$17.00 each. You can send a check to the
22 Bethel Park Historical Society.

23 There are sponsorship forms. They're
24 everywhere. I have posted posters, flyers.
25 There's QR codes. You can go directly online

1 to donate. You can call one of us, contact
2 the Historical Society, anyone who's on the
3 board.

4 And we'd appreciate, you know, if
5 everyone could just donate one wreath. That
6 way we can cover all 900. Even if you can't
7 donate a wreath, please come to the ceremony
8 and participate. Because we do have 900
9 wreaths that we need to place onto the graves,
10 and that takes a lot of people, a lot of help,
11 especially if it's a snowy day.

12 After that ceremony, we do go down
13 to the Peters Creek Cemetery and we place
14 those there. There's just a very small
15 ceremony there. But the Municipality is
16 wonderful in participating, making our
17 ceremony successful.

18 Thank you.

19 MAYOR ALLEN: Thank you very much.

20 And I will mention --

21 MS. JENKINS: I'll be out in the
22 hallway.

23 MAYOR ALLEN: For donations?

24 MS. JENKINS: No, for information.

25 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay.

1 MS. JENKINS: I'll be out in the
2 hallway for information.

3 MAYOR ALLEN: I will mention that
4 when Lisa first started this three years ago,
5 at the time being the Commander at the Legion,
6 we wrote a check, and I believe it was for
7 either 5 or \$750.

8 MS. JENKINS: Correct.

9 MAYOR ALLEN: By the time the check
10 came they were sold out, so we had to wait
11 until the following year.

12 So, we will sell out. I mean, 900
13 sounds like a lot. The Jugo-Slav Club usually
14 donates between 5 and 700. We're looking for
15 individual ones. But we're also looking for
16 any groups that you have might have that could
17 purchase, you know, a bunch of them.

18 Okay. The second thing I had, and
19 Kristen mentioned a little bit, is since it's
20 the month of October, we have our Halloween
21 activities.

22 Don't forget, we have our -- nominate
23 your home or someone else's home by October
24 24th. Send your nominee addresses to Janet
25 Davin at jdavin@bethelpark.net, or you can

1 call her at 412-831-6800, Extension 211.
2 You'll hear her number a few times tonight
3 because she does all the work.

4 There's one winner per Ward. And
5 we're still looking for judges. So, you can
6 also contact Janet if you want to be a judge
7 in some of the Wards. I think there may be
8 three or four open. And then the winners will
9 be announced at the Council meeting in
10 November.

11 The second thing, which is new this
12 year, is a called Booze and Bites. We're
13 holding a new Booze and Bites, wine, beer,
14 cider, and spirit tasting event through our
15 Park and Play Program on Saturday, October
16 28th, from 3:00 to 7:30 p.m. at the Community
17 Center.

18 This is for ages 21 and over,
19 obviously. There will also be live music,
20 food, alcohol, vendors, and more. Part, full,
21 partial, and VIP tickets are available. So
22 just go to www.bethelpark.net/parkandplay for
23 tickets and more information. So, this is the
24 first year for that.

25 And, actually, I saw this today. I

1 saw Salty the Skeleton going up Logan Road
2 about 2:30 or something like that. So if you
3 haven't seen him, he's out there. Be on the
4 lookout.

5 Our Halloween parade is October 28th,
6 at 9:00 a.m. I do believe I saw some fresh
7 pumpkins on the road.

8 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yes. It started
9 today.

10 MAYOR ALLEN: Okay. So the pumpkins
11 have been painted. There's a north route and
12 a south route. And you can find which
13 roads -- just look at our website, it will
14 give you an idea what roads.

15 And then last, but not least,
16 Trick-or-Treating, October 31st, from 6:00 to
17 8:00 p.m. So just be careful.

18 PRESIDENT MOURY: That wasn't O'Brien
19 smashing those pumpkins on the street, was
20 it?

21 MR. O'BRIEN: No. They painted them.
22 That was the painting.

23 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you.

24 MAYOR ALLEN: Yeah, they were -- they
25 were too perfect to be smashed.

1 We do have another program. I'm just
2 going to have to -- I'll show you and then
3 I'll...

4 Okay. We have a new -- it's called
5 Name That Fence campaign for our new Splash
6 Park. We've launched it at the Community
7 Center. And this is a unique way for
8 residents and businesses to show their support
9 for this exciting new facility and have it
10 proudly displayed for the life of the park.

11 So, that's a 9-inch by 5-inch
12 engraved metal plaque. They're available for
13 purchase. It will be mounted on the fence
14 around the new Splash Park.

15 So you can put an individual name.
16 You can put your family's name, name of a
17 loved one who's not with us anymore. Prices
18 range from \$100 to 150.

19 The Splash Park is well on its way
20 to being complete. And this is just another
21 way that we will be able to fund it.

22 You got that? Thank you.

23 All right. Okay. The next thing I
24 have is, from time to time, usually it's a
25 month or every other month, we recognize a

1 person or group that has done special work for
2 Bethel Park.

3 So tonight I want to recognize John
4 Buch of Buch Electric for his work with the
5 Municipality for 41 years. John's been an
6 electrician since the age of 20, and has lived
7 in Bethel Park for over 30 years. In his own
8 words, he is a proud Bethel Park resident.

9 John began to work for the
10 Municipality as a local electrical contractor
11 back in 1982, and then went to Oakland Buch
12 Electric in 2004, where he continued to
13 perform work for us ever since.

14 He and his wife Debbie have three
15 children, three grandchildren, and, if this is
16 up-to-date, two more on the way. Okay.

17 So, John, thank you.

18 And one thing about John, if you
19 needed him in the middle of the night, he was
20 available. He would show -- you know, he
21 would actually come and help us out.

22 So, John, if you want to come up.
23 Bring your family.

24 (Applause.)

25 MAYOR ALLEN: I will say I've been

1 here for 26 years, so I met John when I first
2 started, and you're finishing out.

3 So, we have a certificate for you to
4 recognize everything you've done for us in
5 Bethel Park.

6 MR. BUCH: Thank you so much.

7 MAYOR ALLEN: So, do you want to say
8 a few words?

9 MR. BUCH: Sure.

10 Well, first of all, I'd like to thank
11 my family and friends for --

12 MAYOR ALLEN: Do you want to bring
13 them up?

14 MR. BUCH: Come on up.

15 MAYOR ALLEN: Come on up.

16 MR. BUCH: Come on, grandkids, kids.

17 AUDIENCE MEMBER: You might regret
18 that.

19 MR. BUCH: If you hear any of the
20 noise, that's the grandkids. They're the
21 noisemakers.

22 So, I appreciate all the
23 encouragement from my family and from my
24 friends over the years. And I also want to
25 recognize Gary Staley, who I hope will do as

1 good as a job as I had and have as much fun as
2 I have over the years.

3 I really appreciate the opportunity,
4 because it was so much fun for me. I love
5 being an electrician. And I loved doing jobs
6 for you-all over the years. So that's why
7 when I -- when you called, I came, because I
8 like it. And it's -- to me, it was a great
9 career over all the years.

10 And what I'd like to also say is, to
11 any parents out there that aren't really sure
12 what their children want to do in their lives,
13 don't necessary push them into college. If
14 you think that they are somebody that likes to
15 build puzzles, someone who likes to work with
16 their hands, somebody that likes to get
17 outside, move around, do different things
18 every day, day to day is different, you're
19 always doing something different, it would be
20 -- or any of the trades would be a great
21 opportunity.

22 So just because their friends are
23 going to college, don't force them into
24 college if they really don't want to go. They
25 won't make it through the year. So, it's just

1 a little tidbit of information from me, so...

2 And that's about it. I'd like to
3 again thank the Municipality, Sue, and
4 everybody else for the opportunities. Thank
5 you so much.

6 (Applause.)

7 MAYOR ALLEN: Well, thank you very
8 much.

9 Okay. And the last thing I have for
10 this evening is, I wanted to mention we have
11 our Fall Clean-Up this month, which is October
12 21st, from 9:00 to 4:00. Again, call Janet,
13 412-831-6800, Extension 211.

14 And then, again, we supply the things
15 that you need; the bags, gloves, whatever you
16 need to pick the trash up. And we've been
17 doing it for many years. We need to do it to
18 make the neighborhoods look good, so...

19 And that's my report. Thank you.

20 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
21 much, Mayor.

22 Okay. At this time, can we turn to
23 Approval of the Minutes; and Mr. O'Brien.

24 MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you, Mr. Moury.

25 I approve of 9/11/2023 Regular

1 Council Meeting minutes.

2 I move that we approve the 9/11/2023
3 Regular Council Meeting minutes.

4 DR. CAMPBELL: Second.

5 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion
6 by Mr. O'Brien and second by Dr. Campbell that
7 we approve the 9/11/2023 Regular Council
8 Meeting minutes.

9 Any discussion of this item?

10 (No response.)

11 PRESIDENT MOURY: Ms. Denne, would
12 you please call the roll.

13 MS. DENNE: Dr. Campbell?

14 DR. CAMPBELL: Yes.

15 MS. DENNE: Mr. Cenci?

16 MR. CENCI: Yes.

17 MS. DENNE: Mr. Consolmagno?

18 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Yes.

21 MS. DENNE: Ms. Flinn?

22 MS. FLINN: Yes.

23 MS. DENNE: Mr. Janosik?

24 MR. JANOSIK: Yes.

25 MS. DENNE: Mr. Moury?

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: Yes.

2 MS. DENNE: Mr. Oakes?

3 MR. OAKES: Yes.

4 MS. DENNE: Mr. O'Brien?

5 MR. O'BRIEN: Yes.

6 PRESIDENT MOURY: Motion passes 9 to
7 0.

8 Mr. O'Brien.

9 MR. O'BRIEN: Approval of the

17 At this time, I would like to turn
18 to the Residents' Comments section for
19 non-agenda items.

20 We have Mrs. McNulty signed up to
21 speak.

22 If you could come up and state your
23 name and address for the record. And we also
24 have a three-minute limit. And at two
25 minutes, we'll ask you to conclude your

1 comments .

2 MS. McNULTY: Thank you very much.

3 My name is Mary Cecilia McNulty. I
4 live at 5563 Clarene Drive, here in Bethel
5 Park.

6 A couple of weeks ago I sent a
7 citizen's line request about signs that were
8 out in places for the upcoming election or
9 before the time allotted prior to the
10 election. Those emails were ignored. Then
11 signs started going up.

12 There was a law -- an Ordinance
13 passed by this Council or a previous Council a
14 couple of years ago after the primary, where
15 someone -- primary, Natalie Mihalek, it was
16 Steve Renz, and there were signs everywhere.
17 It was just littered everywhere.

18 So it was supposed to be one sign
19 per candidate per parcel. And that passed.
20 I don't know the number of the Ordinance,
21 because it's not my job to know that.

22 The public parcels just look like
23 junkyards. And there are candidates, you have
24 multiple signs in those open spaces. I
25 emailed about this. I never got a response.

1 And that was ignored.

2 There's also a parcel between my
3 house on Clarene Drive and O'Neil that is --
4 now has a "private property" sign stuck in it.
5 There were signs for all candidates in that
6 area. And only the Republican ones remain
7 with the "private property" sign.

8 I have an issue with that property
9 because it's a homeowner's association. They
10 pay no taxes. The Municipality mows the grass
11 there. No one maintains that. The vines that
12 have overtaken the trees have taken down a lot
13 of trees in that area.

14 We used to go down and clean that
15 out. But when the sewer lines failed for my
16 lower neighbors and there was sewage going in
17 there, no one went down there to take care of
18 the homeowner's association problem. And now
19 there's no -- like, half the trees are gone.

20 It's not private property. If it is,
21 somebody would be paying taxes on it.

22 So I don't -- and I don't understand
23 why when a resident uses the proper channels
24 to send emails to say, hey, there's a problem,
25 number one, there's no real response. And,

1 number two, ordinances for signs in public
2 places are just not enforced.

3 There's also faith, family and
4 freedom signs that have nothing to do with any
5 candidate, and they're littered everywhere.
6 We look like some garbage community with these
7 multiple signs. I really thought that this
8 Ordinance would make it look orderly.

9 So, I would like to know what Council
10 is planning on doing about that? And what
11 Council is planning on doing about making sure
12 that people are responsive to the residents
13 when they send a citizen's alert or an email?
14 You know, not even a phone call. I got
15 nothing.

16 So, thank you.

17 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
18 much.

19 Are there any other residents that
20 would like to speak on non-agenda items?

21 MR. MESINA: Yes, please.

22 PRESIDENT MOURY: If you could come
23 to the microphone and state your name and
24 address for the record. We have a
25 three-minute limit.

1 MR. MESINA: Oh, sure. My name's
2 Mathew Mesina. I live at 660 Clifton Road.

3 There's a -- our -- our driveway --
4 Manoah, which is a private street, but there's
5 a storm drain out at the end of our drive- --
6 right next to our driveway.

7 And at the end of our driveway, the
8 pipe runs underneath the end of our driveway.
9 And where the concrete is curved due to the
10 pipe, it's sinking a little bit. There's a
11 hole -- the concrete near the storm drain has
12 started to cave in, and there's a hole.

13 I put a bag of gravel and a bunch of
14 dirt in there. There's a lot. And I know it
15 wasn't an animal that -- like, a ground hog
16 that did it, because the hole didn't form
17 until subsequent to the soil erosion.

18 So, I was wondering if there's any
19 way anyone could come and look at that for
20 us?

21 PRESIDENT MOURY: If you could give
22 us -- leave with Adam your phone number or
23 email.

24 MR. MESINA: Sure.

25 PRESIDENT MOURY: I know on Manoah,

1 there was questions in the past, and it was a
2 private issue.

3 MR. MESINA: Yeah.

4 PRESIDENT MOURY: But we'll have
5 somebody reach out and contact you tomorrow
6 and we'll look at it. Whether it's us or --
7 we'll look at it, whether it's a PennDOT,
8 ours, or it's a private issue, we'll be able
9 to tell you.

10 MR. MESINA: I would really
11 appreciate that.

12 Is Adam here?

13 PRESIDENT MOURY: Right there.

14 MR. MESINA: Okay. Right there?

15 PRESIDENT MOURY: Yes.

16 MR. MESINA: Okay. Thank you so
17 much.

18 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you.

19 Are there any other residents that
20 would like to speak?

21 (No response.)

22 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, could
23 we turn, then, to the citizens -- the agenda,
24 and General Policy and Finance; Dr. Campbell.

25 We have nobody signed up to speak.

1 DR. CAMPBELL: Thank you,
2 Mr. President. I only have two items under
3 General Policy and Finance this evening.

4 The first is the Field Lighting
5 Project at Millennial Park -- Millennium Park,
6 the RACP Interim Financing Resolution.

7 I move that we approve Resolution
8 No. R10-09-23, confirming the committed
9 funding for the Millennium Field Lighting
10 Project.

11 MR. ESPINAR: Second.

12 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion
13 by Dr. Campbell and second by Mr. Espinar
14 that we approve Resolution No. R10-09-23,
15 confirming the committed funds for the
16 Millennium Field Lighting Project.

17 Any discussion of this item?

18 (No response.)

19 PRESIDENT MOURY: Ms. Denne, would
20 you please call the roll.

21 MS. DENNE: Yes.

22 Dr. Campbell?

23 DR. CAMPBELL: Yes.

18 DR. CAMPBELL: My second item,

19 Mr. President, is Cowden MMO.

20 I move that we approve the Minimum
21 Municipal Obligation Cowden presented at the
22 September 25th Council Committee meeting.

23 MR. OAKES: Second.

24 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion
25 by Dr. Campbell, second by Mr. Oakes that we

1 approve the Minimum Municipal Obligation
2 Cowden presented at the September 25th Council
3 Committee meeting.

4 Any discussion of this item?

5 (No response.)

6 PRESIDENT MOURY: I'll briefly speak
7 to that.

8 Each year, we do an evaluation of
9 our pension process or our pension funds. And
10 there's an MMO, which is a Municipal
11 obligation, which, based on the funding level
12 of our pension funds, is what the Municipality
13 needs to contribute.

14 Part of that money comes from the
15 General Fund and part of the money comes from
16 the State and fire insurance money.

17 And, really, under full disclosure,
18 our pension funds are managed by a company.
19 We have a subcommittee of Council, including
20 two members of Council, the Manager, and two
21 members of staff. We have two separate
22 pension funds.

23 Mr. Janosik and I sit on both the
24 uniform and nonuniform, which is the police,
25 and the Public Works, and management people.

1 We meet quarterly. We have an investment
2 statement.

3 So we oversee the management of those
4 funds. It's certainly up to Council to make
5 any decisions or directional changes on what
6 we do. This is to determine --

7 The good news of going on to this
8 whole story is, our obligation for 2024, last
9 year's total, which includes both pension
10 funds and the state money we get, was about
11 1.8 million. This year projected for 2024 is
12 870,000.

13 And part of that's based on the
14 numbers and calculations they do. But it also
15 goes to having a sound financial investment
16 policy and what we follow.

17 And I'm happy to report that they
18 reported two weeks ago that -- if we look, and
19 I'll compare to the City of Pittsburgh. I
20 looked it up today. It was about 69 percent
21 funded in their pension funds.

22 Our police pension fund is 101
23 percent funded. And nonpolice, which is the
24 Public Works and Municipal staff, is 111
25 percent.

1 What does that mean? It means that
2 we're slightly above where we need to be. And
3 I know the way the accounts work, next year it
4 will be a little bit lower. But, really,
5 under full disclosure, we're determining
6 tonight what our contribution's going to be.

7 Our pension funds, I believe,
8 together are in excess of 53 million dollars.
9 And we keep a close eye on it to make sure
10 we're at or above the benchmark, which we've
11 been for the last 10-plus years. So we're
12 paying attention.

13 And this is the benefit which is a
14 fully funded police and nonuniform. But it
15 also reduces the Municipal obligation that the
16 taxpayers have to contribute.

17 Any other discussion?

18 MR. JANOSIK: Yeah, Mr. President.

19 I would just add, as someone who is
20 part of this for their living, having pension
21 funds this funded is fantastic. And I'm
22 really happy with the work they're doing. And
23 we do have a meeting coming up. I think the
24 next quarterly meeting is next week.

25 PRESIDENT MOURY: Yeah, the 18th.

1 Correct?

2 MR. JANOSIK: Yep.

3 That's all I have. Thank you.

4 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you very
5 much.

6 Any other discussion?

7 (No response.)

8 PRESIDENT MOURY: Ms. Denne, would
9 you please call the roll.

10 MS. DENNE: Dr. Campbell?

11 DR. CAMPBELL: Yes.

5 Dr. Campbell.

6 DR. CAMPBELL: I have no other items,
7 Mr. President.

8 PRESIDENT MOURY: I'll just briefly
9 talk about one that's not a good item, I don't
10 think.

11 But we did receive our 2024 Municipal
12 Budget draft version in the email on Friday.
13 I believe it is on our website.

14 The good news is, it appears the
15 Sewer Fund is fully funded. And there will
16 not be a rate increase needed to fund the
17 Sewer Fund.

18 But on the Municipal side, as we all
19 know, a few months ago we passed a new garbage
20 contract that we estimated was going to be
21 close to a million and a half dollars more in
22 2024 than we paid in 2023.

23 So we're facing a tough situation
24 where we have a deficit. We discussed tonight
25 at general overview, we got to come up with a

1 couple million bucks worth of either reduced
2 expenses or increased revenue.

3 So, next Monday night we're going to
4 be having one of our first budget meetings to
5 really talk about the direction we want to
6 take the community from a capital perspective,
7 where we want to be, what are our priorities.

8 There was a couple projects that were
9 budgeted, the Drake Trail is an example,
10 roughly 1.4 million dollars for next year.
11 Based on our discussions with the Port
12 Authority, or whoever it is, PRT, Pittsburgh
13 Regional Transit, it's going to be delayed
14 until probably 2026.

15 So there's about 1.4 million that
16 we're going to push to 2026. We're going to
17 continue to apply for grants.

18 But not good news on that front,
19 there's probably going to be some type of a
20 millage increase or an income tax, if we
21 wanted just to maintain the level of service.

22 Once again, the garbage fee was a
23 big hit. And it's roughly, I believe, close
24 to a million and a half dollars in new
25 expenses in 2024 that we didn't have in 2023.

1 So, sorry for the bad news.

2 Is there any other discussion under
3 General Policy and Finance?

4 MS. FLINN: President Moury, this
5 weekend I attended the Pennsylvania Municipal
6 League's Annual Leadership Summit. And I had
7 the opportunity to participate in some really
8 great sessions. One that highlighted various
9 -- what communities are doing with their first
10 responders, social workers, and community
11 intervention, as well as another one on how
12 to make affordable housing work in any
13 community.

14 It was really great to collaborate
15 with other elected officials and local
16 government leaders across the state. But
17 when I go to these types of events, it really
18 does make me incredibly grateful for the
19 Municipal staff that we have right here in
20 Bethel Park.

21 The leadership and the creativity
22 that we have from Public Works, Parks and Rec,
23 Engineering, BPTV, and everyone in between
24 just really is truly remarkable.

25 So, I'm always proud to share all

1 the hard work and dedication that our staff
2 just does so beautifully here.

3 So, thank you.

4 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you
5 Ms. Flinn.

6 One other note, I may jump in here.
7 But those of you that are here tonight, you
8 see a little bit different ceiling tiles, some
9 curtains in the back. We don't have people
10 with the cameras.

11 As many of you know, in the last
12 probably three, four years, we've done a
13 complete technology upgrade of the
14 Municipality. We went to a cloud-based
15 system. The entire building was rewired with
16 fiberoptic, and the security steps were taken.

17 And, really, this is the last step
18 in our upgrade, at least this phase of it, was
19 the technology in the room and in Council
20 Chambers. So, we have cameras mounted that
21 are permanent. We don't need people standing
22 in the back of the room.

23 So, it's just -- this was the last
24 of our technology upgrade for this phase. And
25 we're still working on all our records and

1 getting them PDF'd and upgraded, so...

2 Is there any other discussion?

3 (No response.)

4 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, can
5 we turn to Health, Safety and Welfare; and
6 Mr. Cenci.

7 MR. CENCI: Thank you, Mr. Moury.

8 I have one item today. It's the
9 permanent status of Officer Amber DiFranco.

10 I move that we approve granting
11 permanent status to Officer Amber DiFranco.

12 MS. FLINN: Second.

13 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion
14 by Mr. Cenci, second by Ms. Flinn that we
15 approve the granting of permanent status of
16 Officer Amber DiFranco.

17 Any discussion of this item?

18 (No response.)

19 PRESIDENT MOURY: Ms. Denne, would
20 you please call the roll.

19 evaluations. And the motion we approved
20 tonight is to grant permanent status based on
21 the recommendation of Chief O'Connor.

22 Mr. Cenci?

23 MR. CENCI: I have no other items,
24 Mr. President.

25 PRESIDENT MOURY: Are there any

1 additional items?

2 MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Chairman?

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. O'Brien.

4 MR. O'BRIEN: I have an announcement
5 for an event. It's a Trunk or Treat event at
6 the South Hills Assembly of God, Saturday,
7 October 21st, that's 2725 Bethel Church Road,
8 from 3:00 to 6:00 p.m. There's going to be
9 food trucks and other activities.

10 The Fire Department is coming. And
11 also Mr. Jenkins so kindly is bringing his
12 vintage fire truck.

13 Thank you, Jim.

14 The police are going to stop by. So,
15 let's pray for good weather and -- for the
16 kids.

17 Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

18 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,
19 Mr. O'Brien.

20 Any other discussion?

21 MR. OAKES: Mr. Moury?

22 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Oakes.

23 MR. OAKES: We have received a number
24 of questions on our park closing and our
25 policies. And one of our colleagues,

1 Mr. Cenci, put on our agenda for our committee
2 meeting to come up with a new policy for our
3 parks.

4 I'm happy to report our parks will
5 be open all year long with the exception of
6 inclement weather. There will be postings on
7 our social media, our web page, and our
8 communications team. Our bathroom facilities
9 will close November 15th.

10 But other than that, we're really
11 working. Now that we're having a pickleball
12 court, we're having a use of year-round
13 facilities, so this will enable people to use
14 all our parks all year long.

15 Thank you.

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,
17 Mr. Oakes.

18 Any other discussion?

19 (No response.)

20 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none,
21 can we turn to Planning and Zoning; and
22 Mr. Janosik.

23 And we have no residents signed up to

1 Two items for Planning and Zoning

3 The first one, Requested Policy for
4 Land Development Application.

9 of Bethel Park; Subdivisions, adopted by
10 Ordinance 12-8-86F.

11 MS. FLINN: Second.

12 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion
13 by Mr. Janosik, second by Ms. Flinn that we
14 approve the Municipal Manager's policy
15 establishing processes for Land Developments
16 and associated applications as defined by
17 Chapter 60 of the Municipal Code of Bethel
18 Park; Subdivisions, adopted by Ordinance
19 12-8-86F.

20 Any discussion of this item?

21 (No response.)

22 PRESIDENT MOURY: This just
23 establishes a process when an application
24 comes in. Some of the zoning has changed.
25 This will go -- like a rezoning will go

1 directly to the Planning Commission and not
2 come to Municipal Council first. So it's just
3 more of a process.

4 MR. JANOSIK: And a reiteration that
5 we remain neutral.

6 PRESIDENT MOURY: Correct. Yes.

7 Any other discussion?

3 MR. O'BRIEN: That's a yes.

4 PRESIDENT MOURY: Motion passes 9 to
5 0.

6 Mr. Janosik.

7 MR. JANOSIK: Next item, Duquesne
8 Light Company, Anchor Installation.

9 I move that we approve signing the
10 Right-of-Way Agreement to install two anchors
11 along Baptist Road.

12 MS. FLINN: Second.

13 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion
14 by Mr. Janosik, second by Ms. Flinn that we
15 approve signing the Right-of-Way Agreement to
16 install two anchors along Baptist Road.

17 Any discussion of this item?

18 MR. JANOSIK: Mr. President?

19 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. Janosik.

20 MR. JANOSIK: Just for those that
21 were wondering, there's two telephone poles
22 that needed additional support, so we have to
23 go through this sort of thing to give them the
24 permission to do it.

25 So, that's all.

1 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you.

2 Any other discussion?

3 (No response.)

4 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none,
5 Ms. Denne, would you please call the roll.

6 MS. DENNE: Dr. Campbell?

7 DR. CAMPBELL: Yes.

8 MS. DENNE: Mr. Cenci?

9 MR. CENCI: Yes.

10 MS. DENNE: Mr. Consolmagno?

11 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Yes.

12 MS. DENNE: Mr. Espinar?

13 MR. ESPINAR: Yes.

14 MS. DENNE: Ms. Flinn?

15 MS. FLINN: Yes.

16 MS. DENNE: Mr. Janosik?

17 MR. JANOSIK: Yes.

18 MS. DENNE: Mr. Moury?

19 PRESIDENT MOURY: Yes.

20 MS. DENNE: Mr. Oakes?

21 MR. OAKES: Yes.

22 MS. DENNE: Mr. O'Brien?

23 MR. O'BRIEN: Yes.

24 PRESIDENT MOURY: Motion passes 9 to

25 0.

1 Mr. Janosik.

2 MR. JANOSIK: Just one other item I
3 wanted to add.

4 I wanted to repeat what Ms. Denne
5 said about the old GameStop building. All the
6 rumors you heard on Facebook were untrue. It
7 is coming down. And we're looking forward to
8 having more selections here.

9 So, that's all. I just wanted to
10 mention that.

11 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: When I see it, I'll
12 believe it.

13 MR. JANOSIK: Thank you.

14 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you all.

15 Okay. Any additional comments?

16 (No response.)

17 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, could
18 we turn to Public Works and Maintenance; and
19 Mr. Consolmagno.

20 We have no residents signed up to
21 speak.

22 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Mr. Moury, I have
23 one item. The First Street Retaining Wall
24 Project, Change Order 1.

25 I move we approve Change Order 1 in

1 the amount of \$68,685.

2 MR. OAKES: Second.

3 PRESIDENT MOURY: There's a motion
4 by Mr. Consolmagno, second by Mr. Oakes that
5 we approve Change Order 1 in the amount of
6 \$68,685.

7 Any discussion of this item?

8 (No response.)

9 PRESIDENT MOURY: This is the First
10 Street retaining wall in Molinar. It was a
11 little more extensive than what we
12 anticipated. We were initially going to do it
13 in two phases. And I know Mr. Janosik
14 requested that we get the entire street done
15 at one time.

16 So this is the approval of having
17 that entire street wall done.

18 MR. JANOSIK: I just want to add,
19 thank you to Council for, you know, letting us
20 do this. And it really helps that
21 neighborhood that was in some need of TLC.
22 So, thank you very much.

23 PRESIDENT MOURY: Don't thank us
24 until we vote yet.

25 MR. JANOSIK: That's right. In

1 advance of your vote.

2 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you.

3 Any other discussion?

4 (No response.)

5 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none,
6 Ms. Denne, would you please call the roll.

7 MS. DENNE: Dr. Campbell?

8 DR. CAMPBELL: Yes.

9 MS. DENNE: Mr. Cenci?

10 MR. CENCI: Yes.

11 MS. DENNE: Mr. Consolmagno?

12 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Yes.

13 MS. DENNE: Mr. Espinar?

14 MR. ESPINAR: Yes.

15 MS. DENNE: Ms. Flinn?

16 MS. FLINN: Yes.

17 MS. DENNE: Mr. Janosik?

18 MR. JANOSIK: Yes.

19 MS. DENNE: Mr. Moury?

20 PRESIDENT MOURY: Yes.

21 MS. DENNE: Mr. Oakes?

22 MR. OAKES: Yes.

23 MS. DENNE: Mr. O'Brien?

24 MR. O'BRIEN: That's a yes.

25 PRESIDENT MOURY: Motion passes 9 to

1 0.

2 Mr. Consolmagno.

3 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Mr. Moury, you
4 always comment about me spending money. But
5 you don't say one word about Mr. O'Brien
6 spending \$1,499,324.02. It's a little bit
7 more than what I spend on a monthly basis,
8 just for record. Thank you.

9 PRESIDENT MOURY: I think he was just
10 covering for you. We wanted to make you look
11 good tonight.

12 Okay. Are there any additional
13 items?

14 MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Moury, I have an
15 issue.

16 PRESIDENT MOURY: Mr. O'Brien.

17 MR. O'BRIEN: And this is not an
18 issue that I really enjoy doing, but it's
19 something that I have to take care of because
20 it's ongoing.

21 At this time, I'd like to tell people
22 that I am not running for re-election.
23 Although my Democrat -- my fellow Democrat --
24 I am a Democrat, and always have been a
25 Democrat. But the Democrat candidate in the

1 6th Ward seems to be making me an issue in her
2 campaign.

3 Election Day was in the early spring.
4 And I chose not to attend Election Day. And
5 I've always been there every Election Day to
6 reach out to the people.

7 I chose not to, to allow the new
8 candidates, which I do know Mr. Jenkins and I
9 know Jessica's family over the years, to allow
10 them to blend with the people, to allow them
11 to get to know them so they can make a
12 decision.

13 What I find is a posting, and I'm
14 listed in this posting, along with the Mayor,
15 about something that I didn't do.

16 So I saw the posting, and I said,
17 "Well, okay, maybe I -- maybe I missed
18 something. Maybe there was a problem." So
19 the first thing I did was start to investigate
20 the issue.

21 And the second thing I did was to
22 reach out to the Mayor and say -- across
23 political lines; I'm a Democrat, he's a
24 Republican. We've become friends over the
25 years. And I asked the Mayor, "Has this

1 person contacted you?"

2 And he said, "Yes, I talked to this
3 person more than once about this issue."

4 So I said to myself, "Why did I not
5 get the information to talk with this person?"

6 Well, I did an investigation, and I
7 found out that there was a problem with my
8 phone system. During the summer I had major
9 phone problems, and I had to get a new number.
10 It happens to all of us. I made the
11 appropriate transfer. I listed my number with
12 the Municipality.

13 So I went back and checked all my --
14 my messages. I went back and checked my
15 emails. I went and checked -- back and
16 checked my mail. I went back and checked my
17 Municipal emails and my Municipal call- --
18 messages. There was no record of it.

19 But I did find that my answering
20 machine for my home phone, which I
21 disconnected, was not connected, or was
22 reconnected and was still receiving messages.

23 For that, I am truly sorry for anyone
24 who was trying to get ahold of me, because I
25 did not know this was happening.

1 As for that resident, I did stop by
2 a few times. And, obviously, she wasn't home
3 because of the nature of her -- of the issue
4 at her home. But I did send the lady, who
5 I've known for 30 years, an apology that she
6 could not get ahold of me and talk to me.

7 But the Democratic candidate in this
8 election is using it as a campaign thing by
9 tearing someone down to build themselves up.
10 And, to me, that is just very disappointing.

11 And when this person on social
12 media -- I don't participate in social media,
13 but I read it all. When confronted, the
14 answer they got was "you're hostile."

15 And that is disappointing to me.
16 Because I know this young lady was not raised
17 like this at home, and she did not learn this
18 kind of behavior in the neighborhood.

19 And what we have accomplished here
20 in this last 30 years is Democrats and
21 Republicans working in harmony for the
22 betterment of this town, Bethel Park. If this
23 is the way she's going to govern, I'm very
24 disappointed in this type of activity.

25 I don't know why, maybe I'm not blue

1 enough. I was told I'm not blue enough. I'm
2 the same blue I was yesterday and the day
3 before. I'm the same blue as my father and my
4 father before me. And that's my story, and
5 I'm sticking to it.

6 Thank you, Mr. Moury.

7 PRESIDENT MOURY: Thank you,
8 Mr. O'Brien.

9 Are there any additional comments?

10 (No response.)

11 PRESIDENT MOURY: Hearing none, is
12 there a motion to adjourn?

13 DR. CAMPBELL: So moved.

14 PRESIDENT MOURY: So moved by
15 Dr. Campbell.

16 Second?

17 MR. JANOSIK: Second.

18 PRESIDENT MOURY: Second by
19 Mr. Janosik.

20 All in favor, say aye.

21 DR. CAMPBELL: Aye.

22 MR. CENCI: Aye.

23 MR. CONSOLMAGNO: Aye.

24 MR. ESPINAR: Aye.

25 MS. FLINN: Aye.


